Mrs. Leopold Scarlett, quoting from "Jamaican Tracts," writes that the *Blessing*, Jas. Gilbert master, also conveyed settlers from Barbados to Jamaica. Stokes was Commander of the *Marmaduke*. The *Griffin* was sent to Barbados July 27 to fetch Lady Modyford and the General's family, and the *Westergate* and *Swallow* ketch left Jamaica for England. The *Swallow* returned after five months hardship to Port Royal; the others were never heard of afterwards. Capt. Munroe, who had a commission from Jamaica, turned pirate, and took merchant ships bound thither. Capt. Ensom in the *Swallow* ketch was sent out to take him, who beat him, and Capt. Munroe was killed in the fight, his men brought in and hanged.

BOOKPLATE OF HAUGHTON JAMES, ESQ., OF JAMAICA.



ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, Azure, on a chevron between three lions passantguardant Or, as many mullets of six points Sable [JAMES]; 2, Sable, a man Argent holding in the dexter hand a club []; 3, Argent, three bars Sable [HAUGHTON].

CREST.—A stag statant. (Burke's "Armory" gives : A demi-lion rampant, etc.)

"Papworth," p. 498, gives: "Azure, on a chevron between three lions passantguardant Ermine, as many escallops Gules [JAMES, Haughton Hall, Hanover, Jamaica]; quartering HAUGHTON, HALTON, FISHER, FOWLER, DRAYNER, and PARSON." These quarterings are all on the tomb at E. Barnet, co. Herts, of Sir Simon Haughton Clarke, Bart. (Cussans' "Herts," iii., 68.)

The will of Haughton James, Esq., of Jamaica was proved in 1744 (216, Anstis). He had been M. of A. for Hanover 1726-36, and is stated to have died in 1740 (Feurtado). Haughton James, son of Haughton James of Jamaica, Esq., matriculated from St. Mary Hall 9 May 1755, aged 17 (Foster). 1813, Oct. 23. In Piccadilly, Houghton James, esq. ("G.M.," 508). As the bookplate is in the Chippendale style it probably belonged to the last-named. Some twenty years ago I met a Mr. Haughton James in the R.M.S. "Moselle" going to Jamaica, so I hope the family may still be flourishing in its native island. [EDITOR.] **VOL. II**, B

# The Settlement of Nevis.\*

The two following Chancery Suits from the P.R.O. (the references to which were sent me on 25 October 1899 by the late Mrs. V. T. C. Smith) give very valuable authentic information about the early planters of this island. There is no other such early list in existence. The skins are in good order, and the names, with two or three exceptions, quite legible :--

# CHANCERY PROCEEDINGS, CHARLES I., L. 14, No. 48.

# LITLETON V. GLOVER. BILL OF COMPLAINT.

12 Nov. 1629. Humblie complaining your orator Thomas Litleton of London merchant that whereas about Sept. 1627 he and one Roger Glover citizen and vintner of London agreed to send into Turkey an adventure of goods costing 1600<sup>1</sup> your orator having one third and Glover two thirds and later it was agreed that Glover was to bear the whole adventure and pay your orator 8 per cent. on all sums advanced and Glover now owes 9001 and 3161 for tobacco and about the month of January 1627 your orator did fit forth a ship called the *ffaith* to take her voyage to the Island of S<sup>t</sup> Christofers<sup>†</sup> and thence to Newfoundland and the Straights of which Glover was to have a quarter share but by reason of tempestuous and contrarie winds and a great mortalitie amongst the men of the ship wherein the cheife comanders were lost and all the victualls spent the voyage to Newfoundland<sup>‡</sup> and the Straights was lost to the damage of your orator in 600<sup>1</sup> and upwards. Glover refuses to pay his share of the charges contrary to his promise and about May 1628 your orator set forth three sayle of shipps and consigned them upon an adventure to "one of the Caribee Islands" and Glover desired to have a share but having no ready money signed a bill for 250<sup>1</sup> and they were bound to several persons for the freight and Glover and Francis Goare for their friends desired your orator to acknowledge a recognizance in the high court of chancery of 15001 unto Glover which your orator did on the 6 May last and Glover has paid 10001 in part payment and the adventure to Turkey is not paid and Glover hath prosecuted your orator in the Pettybag Office intending to lay the whole penalty of the recognizance on your orator contrary to equity your orator desires to be relieved of all engagements with Glover and prays for a subpena for Glover to appear in this court and answer this bill and put in all accounts and stay proceedings in the office of Petty bagg. # THE ANSWER OF DEFENDANT.

It was agreed that complainant was to become free of the Turkey Company before the goods arrived at Leaghorne. Defendant shipped for Aleppo goods of 17001 value mostly bought at his own credit and Complainant refused to take up his freedom thinking to lay the loss of the adventure on this defendant if the same had miscarried-denies claims and contests the figures. It is true that in January 1627 plaintif set out the ship the Faith for St Christophers and then to Newfoundland and the Straights and agreed for a quarter share but the ship spent so much time in England before she departed for St Christophers and staid so long at St Christophers to discharge her lading that she lost her voyage for Newfoundland and could not arrive there time enough to lade with fish but returned to England and the agreement was given up by the complainant to this defendant to be cancelled. It is true that in May 1618 [sic] three ships were consigned to one of the Caribbee Islands and defendant adventured 2501 and they

were both bound for goods to several persons [all named] to the amount of  $865^1$  also bonds to Henry Gardner and George Griffith for  $3000^1$ , to the mariners of the *faith*  $1000^1$  for wages, to the Guyana Company  $800^1$ , to the owners of the ship called the *faith*  $800^1$ , to the owners of the *London Merchant*  $1000^1$ , to the owners of the *Hopewell*  $600^1$ . Prays action may be dismissed and asks for his costs. [One skin.]

### CHANCERY PROCEEDINGS, CHARLES I., L. 6, No. 10.

#### LITLETON v. BULLOCK. BILL OF COMPLAINT.

XXIX April 1631. Your orator Thomas Litleton of London merchant for himself and company complaineth that in 1628 he did furnish three ships with meal bread victualls municon apparrell and other necessarie furniture to the value of 5000<sup>1</sup> bearing the sole charge and cost and did consign them for Nevis ats Dulcina in the West Indies whither they safely arrived and appointed John Procter his agent and factor in Nevis to sell the goods and at the request of Captaine Anthonie Hilton then governor of the said Isle under the Rt. Hon. [One skin.]

# Answer of Defendant.

Sworn 3 May 1631. The Answer of Rowland Bullock, one of the Defendants. It is true he bought goods for 16<sup>1</sup> and is willing to pay. [One skin.]

Including the Governor there are eighty names of planters in the above suit, and as probably every man in the island got something out of the ships the number of settlers did not much exceed eighty. The ship Hopewell is probably the same vessel which was fitted out by Ralph Merifield of London, merchant, commanded by Captain John Jeaffreson, and arrived on 18 March 1624 at St. Christophers. Captain Tho. Warner returned in her to England, and obtained on 13 September 1625 a royal commission reciting his discovery of St. Christophers, Mevis, etc., and appointing him Governor. On 3 May 1626 Ralph Merrifield petitioned the Privy Council that he had set forth two ships (not named) under Captain Warner and Captain Smith to the "new plantation in the Caribbee Islands." On 2 July 1627 James Earl of Carlisle obtained a grant of all the Caribbees. On 26 October 1627 the Hopewell, under Captain William Smith, with stores from the Earl of Carlile, arrived at St. Christophers. Captain John Smith,\* writing in 1629, said : "In this little Ile of Mevis, more than twenty yeares agoe, I have remained a good time together, to wod, and water and refresh my men." This proves that the island was used by navigators before 1609, though no permanent settlement was effected. He then says: "The last yeare, 1628, Master Littleton, with some others got a Pattent of the Earle of Carlile, to plant the Ile called the Barbados, thirty leagues Northward of Saint Christophers; which . . . . they called Dulcina, but when they came there, they found it such a barren rocke, they left it .... At last .... they came to Mevis, a little Ile by Saint Christophers; where they seated themselves, well furnished with all necessaries, being about the number of an hundred, and since increased to an hundred and fifty persons, whereof many were old planters of Saint Christophers, especially Master Anthony Hinton [sic], and Master Edward Thompson."

Capt. Smith's narrative is probably accurate. The island Barbados is an error for Barbudos or Barbuda, an uncultivated island north of Antigua. Mevis or Nevis is styled Dulcina in certain wills, but I never heard of the name being applied to Barbuda. If Littleton's three ships sailed for Nevis in May 1628, and on arrival found Governor Hilton and over 80 planters there, how did the latter go out?

In the British Museum [Egerton MS. 2395] is preserved the narrative of John Hilton in 1675, storekeeper and chief gunner of Nevis. He stated that his brother Anthony Hilton, born in the Bishoprick of Durham, being sent by the merchants of Barnstaple to Virginia, touched at St. Christophers, and waited on Capt. Tho. Warner the Governor. On returning from Virginia he landed in Ireland, where he met Capt. Vallett and other gentlemen who provided him with a ship and men, intending to grow tobacco at St. Christophers, as being a better place than Virginia. These men were the first that settled on the Windward side of St. Christopher, but being attacked by the Indians, removed to the Leeward side. [Hilton's name appears as a witness to the Treaty between the English and French, dated 13 May 1627.] Having raised a crop he returned with several planters to London, and having sold their tobacco for 20<sup>d</sup> per lb.† they were sent by M<sup>r</sup> Littleton merchant, who had a commission from the Earl of Carlile, to settle Barbados (Barbuda), but not liking it, nor Antegoa nor Mountserrat, came down to Nevis y<sup>e</sup> 22 of July 1628, where they settled.

John Hilton said that Jacob Lake "came over with us at y<sup>e</sup> first settling." This date of 22 July 1628 would be about the time of arrival of the three ships Littleton despatched according to the Chancery Suit in the previous May; but the two accounts do not agree, and further evidence is desired. On 8 Nov. 1628 Hilton was one of those who signed another French Treaty. On 7 Sept. 1629 both St. Christopher and Nevis were plundered by the Spaniards, who took away as hostages for Nevis, Capt. John Coolle of London, Capt. John Husbands, a Yorkshireman, Robert Merreton of London, and John Hilton, brother of Capt. Anthony Hilton and author of the narrative.

Capt. Anthony Hilton, who had left for England in Aug. 1629, returned with more men and resettled the island. During his absence the people had elected Mr. James Russell as their temporary governor. Mr. Tho. Littleton then went over with the object of recovering debts, to whom Hilton then resigned the government and removed to "Tartodus," where he shortly after died. John Hilton, after 5 years imprisonment in Spain, returned in a Dutch ship to Nevis, where he met Governor Tho. Littleton, Mr. Procter the factor, Mr. Luke Stoakes, and Capt. Sparrowe. Governor L. afterwards followed John Hilton to Tartodus and died on the voyage. The list of Governors as given by John Hilton is as follows, and to this I have added notes :-

- 1. Capt. Anthony Hilton, who arrived 22 July 1628. Governor again after Russell, and until 1635.
- 2. Capt. Wm. Vallett, his Deputy during Hilton's absence in England. He fled in Sept. 1629.
- 3. James Russell, chosen by the people pro tem.
- 4. Thos. Litleton, the Founder of the colony. Succeeded Hilton about 1635, d. 1636.
- 5. Luke Stoakes, his Deputy.
- 6. Capt. Tho. Sparrow, put in by Sir Tho. Warner about 1636.
- 7. Major Henry Hunckes 1638-9. Governor of Barbados 1640.
- 8. Capt. Jenings
- These three not named in the Colonial Calendar, so 9. Jenkin Lloyde they were probably appointed locally. 10. Parson John Meakem
- 11. Capt. John Kettleby, put in by Sir Tho. Warner about 1642.
- 12. Capt. Jacob Lake. In 1639 fought the Spaniards [d. Oct. 1649. See ante, I., 190.

- 14. Col. James Russell 1659-1671 [same as No. 3]; d. 15 Nov. 1674 at Bristol.
- 15. Col. Randall Russell 1671-1678, brother of James; d. before 29 June 1678.

Thos. Littleton's pedigree was recorded in the Visitation of Surrey of 1662-8. He was the son of Sir Edward Littleton of Henley, co. Salop, Kt., by Mary, dau. of Sir Edward Lloyd, and is entered as "Thomas Littleton of ye Citty of London, Governor of Mevis, Ar.," and by his wife Eliz., dau. of John Abeels of London, merchant, left an only son and heir, James.

Petition of Capt. Wm. Digby 1 July 1652, reciting that ten years since Sir Tho. Warner assigned to him a plantation in Nevis formerly confirmed to Warner by "Capt. Kettleby then Governor of Nevis," ... the present Governor, Capt. Luke Stoakes, has taken away about 280 acres. The patent, dated 11 Dec. 1648, was from the Earl of Carlisle for "240 geometrical paces\* of land." (Colonial Cal., p. 385.)

Certificate dated 10 Feb. (?) 1659 of Capt. Edward Blagge, that he has traded for more than 20 years with Nevis, "especially in the time of Capt. Jacob Lake's government, and knows him to have been a person of integrity and very prudent and laborious in the discharge of his trust. Col. Luke Stokes, who succeeded him, behaved faithfully and was attached to the Commonwealth; and Major Russell, the present Governor, is very fit for his present employment and beloved amongst his neighbours." His brother Mr. Lake, a minister, arrived in the Carlile on 7 Sept. 1629 at the same time as the Spanish Fleet, but that vessel escaped by cutting her cables. (Colonial Cal., p. 474.) Capt. Lake commanded a company at that time, but his men ran away. A Capt. William Vallett was in 1661 a Member of the first Council of Jamaica.


In conclusion, it appears probable that settlers from St. Christopher passed

over the straits called The Narrows, only two miles wide, to Nevis, or else that the Earl of Carlile sent them over from London in one of his ships, and that Capt. Anthony Hilton was appointed their first Governor by him or Thomas Warner. At that time men were pouring into St. Christopher, and the surplus population would naturally overflow to the neighbouring islands. Capt. John Smith said that in 1628 there had been 30 sail of English, French, and Dutch ships at St. Christophers. Littleton's adventure was a purely commercial undertaking. There is a good map of Nevis in Bellin's "Description geographique des Isles



The following will is the earliest known one relating to Nevis. The pedigree of the Bournes of Bobbingworth and Greensted was entered in the 1612 Visitation of Essex, though the testator's name only appears as "John 3 sonne." Wm. was his half brother.

[56, St. John.] 18 March 1629. I, John Bourne of Daggenham, co. Essex, gent., "shortly intended a voyage to certayne Islands in the West Indies within the parts beyond the Seas," and not having assets sufficient to pay my debts and being seized of the Manor of Grinsted Hall in the said co. authorise Margaret my wife, Wm. Streachey gent. my bro-in-l., Anthony Luther Esq. & Gerrard Gore gent. to sell my lands there of 100 acres (boundaries given — Wm. Bourne gent. & S<sup>r</sup> Jas. Pointz &c.) to pay my debts. To my wife all my lands for life, she to maintain & educate our son Rich. B. & pay him 20<sup>1</sup> a year at 21 & to him all my lands at her death & in default to my sister An Streachy wife of the said W<sup>m</sup> S., then to my cosen Rich. B. 2<sup>d</sup> s. of my brother Wm. Bourne. To any future child 200<sup>1</sup>. All residue to my wife & sole Ex'trix. Wm. Streachy, Anthony Luther & Gilbert Garrard to be overseers. In the presence of John Meade, John Milles, Kath. Young, Peter Newsam, scr.

Codicil 10 Sep. 1630. Late of Greenstead ats Grynstead, co. Essex, gent., "now of Dulcina ats Neves in the province of Carliola in the West Indies," Sick. As for the estate I have adventured as servants, provisions, arms, tools &c. I leave them to the disposal of my friend John Young of the said Island planter & late of Misden co. Hertford gent. Confirm the will I made in England. My debts



to be satisfied out of my adventures here & the 100 acres to be unsold. My s. Rich<sup>d</sup>. My brother W<sup>m</sup> Strachey of Camberwell co. Surrey gent. "To M<sup>r</sup> Toby Rand Minister Jesus parish upon the said Island" 100 lbs. waight of tobacco. John Young to be my Ex'or & my friends Capt. John Huddlestone, Tho. Newman & Jenkyn Loyd of the said Island planters to be my overseers. (No witnesses.) Proved 12 May 1631 by Margaret Bourne the relict, power reserved to John Young.

This next will relates to the defendant in the preceding chancery suit. It is the second will on record relating to Nevis :---

My intended voyage-debts due in the Indyes & W.I. My servant Roger the Indian £10. My neece Eliz. G. dau. of my brother Joss: G. £50. Will<sup>m</sup> R. son of Rich<sup>d</sup> Rowe £30. My neece Eliz. Pemmerton £40. John Worcester £10. My frend Capten Thos. Sparrowe Gov<sup>r</sup> of Meavis 2000 waight of tobacco. M<sup>r</sup> Geo. Upcote of Meavis 500 waight & to Nicholas Godsalve Sec<sup>y</sup> 300 lbs. of tobacco. To W<sup>m</sup> Hawkins my overseer 25<sup>1</sup>. If I recover debts due from Tho. # Rev. John Featley of St. Kitts.\*

The following genealogy has been copied from a small book  $4\frac{6}{16}$  by  $2\frac{7}{16}$  inches, containing 796 closely written pages, mostly on devotional subjects, but of which the genealogy or "Vita Auctoris" occupies pp. 159 to 174. The whole Book of Psalms, pp. 101, printed in 1654, is also bound in between pp. 764 and 765. In the "D.N.B." are a long notice of Dr. Daniel Featley and a short one of

In the "D.N.B." are a long notice of Dr. Daniel Featley and a short one of John his nephew. The former was born at Charlton-upon-Otmoor, Oxfordshire, on 15 March 1582, the second son of John Fairclough (cook to Lawrence Humphrey, president of Magdalen College, Oxford) by his wife Marian Thrift, and after taking his degrees at Oxford became successively Rector of Lambeth, 1618-19, and Acton, 1626-7. He was a noted controversialist, preacher, and voluminous writer, and died at Chelsea College 17 April 1645.

John, his nephew, was son of John Fairclough, the elder brother of Daniel. H1s early life to 1656 is described in his MS. book. After the Restoration he was appointed, 29 June 1660, Chaplain Extraordinary to the King, and on 13 August to the Precentorship of Lincoln. In 1661 he was again Rector of Langar, and later Vicar of Edwinstowe, co. Notts; created, 7 June, D.D. Oxon.; died at Lincoln in 1666, and was buried in the Cathedral. He published a Sermon to the West India Company, 4to, London, 1629, also various sermons and devotional manuals, besides the Life of his uncle in 1660.

The said John Featley the elder had by his said wife Elizabeth no daughter but 4 sonnes : viz :

1. Daniel: M<sup>r</sup> of Arts, and Minister of the Gospel.

2. John: whose life is here written.

- 3. Henry: Minister of the Gospel, and Rectour of Thorpe juxta Newarke in y<sup>e</sup> County of Nott<sup>m</sup>.
- 4. Timothy: A souldier, and Lieutenant: who dyed in ye West Indiaes.

This John Faireclough (vulgo Featley) the younger, was 1. Borne at Charleton abovesaid, on May-day, being tuesday, betweene y<sup>e</sup> houres of 3 and 4 in y<sup>e</sup> afternoone : Anno Domini 1605.

2. Educated a long time in  $y^e$  University of Oxford : first in Magdalen-Hall, for about  $y^e$  space of one yeare : afterward in All-soules College for many yeares ; where hee was first Chorister, and then Clerke.

3. Chosen Master of the King's free-schoole in Chipping-Norton, in y<sup>e</sup> County of Oxford, at Michaelmasse: 1624, where hee continued for one yeare.

4. Ordained Deacon by Theophilus Field, Bishop of Landaffe, in S. Margaret's Church in West Minster: May: 12. 1625.

5. Ordained Minister by the same Bishop, and in y<sup>e</sup> same Church, Mar: 9. 1625.

6. Preferred to goe w<sup>th</sup> Captaine Thomas Warner (since Knighted) to be y<sup>e</sup> first Preacher<sup>\*</sup> in the new-settled Colonie of English in S<sup>t</sup>: Christophers (one of the Carebe Islands) in the West Indiaes: In w<sup>ch</sup> voyage hee proceeded in the end of the yeare 1625.

7. Married in  $y^e$  same S. Christophers Island, in S': Thomas parish (whereof hee was then Rectour) in his second voyage to that Island, by M<sup>r</sup> Thomas Laket (then Minister of Palmetoe-point parish in  $y^e$  same Island) Unto Anna Powell, the onely daughter of Captaine Thomas Powell, then Justice of the peace and Quorum; and Captaine of Palmetoe-point division. Since 1. Lieutenant Colonell in  $y^e$  King of Swedens warres in Germanie, Unto Colonel Will<sup>m</sup> Vavasour (since Knighted) 2 Quarter-Master Generall to Sir Will<sup>m</sup> Waller, Lieuten<sup>t</sup>: Generall in  $y^e$  Parliaments imployment, in  $y^e$  unhappy civill warres in England : Anno Dñi 1644. Martha his wife, the Relict of [blank] Webbe, Daughter of [blank] Ketlewood, Cittizen and Drugster of London. The said Cap<sup>t</sup>: Tho: Powell, and Martha his wife, had issue onely 1 Anna; afterward married to John Featley 2 Humphrey Powell. Anna Featley (formerly Powell) was borne in the parish of S. Bridget, alias Brides, at Fleete-bridg, London: on the [blank] of November: 16 [blank]. The said John Featley and Anna Powell were married on Monday: Dec: 27. 1630, in S<sup>t</sup> Christophers, as aforesaid.

8. Imployed in y<sup>e</sup> King of Swedens warres in Germanie, as Chaplaine to a Regiment of English, commanded by Colonel Arthur Aston (since Knighted) In w<sup>ch</sup> expedition hee shipped himselfe and his wife for Hamburgh, neer Michaelmasse. 1632.

9. Preferred to be Lecturer at Lambeth in Surrey (over against Westminster) where his Uncle y<sup>e</sup> famous Doctor Daniel Featley was then Rectour. Here hee preached his first sermon, as Lecturer, on Feb : 8. 1634.

\* On 8 May 1627 Warner made a treaty with the French of St. Kitts, and among the witnesses is "M<sup>c</sup> Cately Minister of Gods word for the Company of said M<sup>r</sup> Warner." In the French copy he is called "Frassy," but there is no doubt Featley is the intended name. John Warner of St. Christopher, in his will dated 20 January 1629 [72, Scroope] says: "To Mr. Bolton minister & preacher the £5 he oweth me & to M<sup>c</sup> John Feately, minister, 30 lbs. of tobacco." The last-named was a witness to the will, but it does not appear if Bolton was in the Island or England.

12. Sworne Chaplaine extraordinary to King Charles, in y<sup>e</sup> Campe royall in Hurtley field, neere y<sup>e</sup> river of Tweede; by James Clegorne: June: 20. 1639.

13. Preferred to be Lecturer at Acton in y<sup>e</sup> County of Midlesexe sixe miles from London (whereof his Uncle D<sup>r</sup> Daniel Featley was then also Rectour) in y<sup>e</sup> yeere 1639. Where hee continued Lecturer untill y<sup>e</sup> yeere 1643.

14. Moved by y<sup>e</sup> civill warres in England to make a third voyage to S. Christophers, w<sup>th</sup> his wife, and all his children then living except his young daughter Anna; 3 mayd-servants, and 2 men-servants. In this voyage they proceeded, imbarking at Tilbury-Hope on Jun: 24. 1643. w<sup>th</sup> leave both from y<sup>e</sup> King under y<sup>e</sup> broad seale and the Parliament under y<sup>e</sup> hand of Will<sup>m</sup> Lenthall Speaker. 15. Necessitated through sicknesse, to depart from S. Christophers Island in

15. Necessitated through sicknesse, to depart from S. Christophers Island in  $y^e$  month of June: 1645 w<sup>th</sup> his wife, and family; and retourne into Europe. In his retourne in a Dutch ship, hee touched at Havre-de-grace in France; where hee stayed not a full weeke. From thence hee sailed to Flushing in Zealand: where (after hee had sojourned a while) hee kept house for about three quarters of a yeare, untill newes came of hopes that  $y^e$  warres in England would cease. When  $y^e$  warres were neere composed hee returned into England; and landed at Bostone May: 3. 1646. the King delivering himselfe into  $y^e$  hands of  $y^e$  Scots before Newarke on  $y^e$  5<sup>th</sup>: of  $y^e$  said May.

16. Setled at Langar, w<sup>th</sup> his family, in y<sup>e</sup> moneth of May. 1646.

17. Enforced through y<sup>e</sup> wicked practises and mallice of Jo: Bainbrig Steward to y<sup>e</sup> Countesse of Sunderland for quietnesse sake to let a lease of his Living of Langar to y<sup>e</sup> Countesse, resserving to himselfe an hundred pounds p<sup>r</sup> annum. So hee removed w<sup>th</sup> his family to Newarke, in the moneth of June 1650.

18. Intreated by the parishioners of Southwell in the County of Nott: to be their Preacher: whither hee removed w<sup>th</sup> his family. When hee had preached at Southwell eight moneths gratis; hee was then setled the first Preacher at Southwell by authority of Parliament by y<sup>e</sup> Committee of Plundered Ministers, the Com<sup>tee</sup> for reformation of the Universities, and y<sup>e</sup> Trustees for maintenance of Ministers: and an hundred pounds p<sup>r</sup> annum setled upon him, by way of Augmentation: in y<sup>e</sup> moneths of March and April: 1651 and 1652.

19. Enforced to leave Southwell, because hee was Rectour of Langar: and none being permitted to hold two Livings, So hee, and his family, removed from Southwell to Langar againe (the Countesse of Sunderland being dead) about Michaelmasse: Anno Dñi 1655.

The above named John Faireclough (vulgo Featley) and Anna his wife, had issue as followeth : viz :

- 1. John Featley: who was begotten in y<sup>e</sup> West-Indiaes: travelled in his mothers belly into Ireland: and was borne in y<sup>e</sup> Savoy parish, London, at nine of y<sup>e</sup> clock at night on Wednesday: Nov: 9. 1631.
- 2. Mary Featley: Who was begotten at London; and borne at Hamburgh in Germanie in y<sup>e</sup> Boone-Strote, y<sup>e</sup> next doore to y<sup>e</sup> Shippers Gerelzskip, on Thursday night at eleven of y<sup>e</sup> clock Nov: 29. 1632. Shee dyed at sea in a voyage toward S. Christophers not farr from y<sup>e</sup> Barbadoes, betweene y<sup>e</sup> height of 14 and 15 degrees of North Latitude: and was heaved over board y<sup>e</sup> next day, being Aug: 23. 1643.

- 3. Joyce Featley: who was begotten in Germanie, and borne in S<sup>t</sup>: Stevens Alley in Westminster, at eight of y<sup>e</sup> clock on Saturday morning July: 5. 1634. Shee dyed at Lambeth, and lieth there interred in y<sup>e</sup> midle Isle of y<sup>e</sup> Church, between y<sup>e</sup> crosse-Isle and y<sup>e</sup> Chancell.
- 4. Daniel Featley y<sup>e</sup> elder: who was borne at Lambeth betweene twelve and one of y<sup>e</sup> clock on Monday morning, being Bartholomew day: Aug: 24. 1635. Hee dyed at Lambeth, and lieth interred in Lambeth Church under his sister Joyce, before whom he dyed.
- 5. Cecilia Featley : who was borne at Lambeth in y<sup>e</sup> moneth of Aug : 1636. Shee died at Sea, w<sup>th</sup>in lesse then a quarter of an houre after her sister Mary, of a spotted feaver (as her sister Mary) and was heaved over board in y<sup>e</sup> same shrowde w<sup>th</sup> her.
- 6. Sarah Featley : who was borne at Lambeth on Tuesday, a moneth before Michaelmasse Anno Dni 1637.
- 7. Dorothie Featley: who was borne at Lambeth on Monday Nov: 19. 1638.
- 8. Daniel Featley y<sup>e</sup> younger: who was borne at Lambeth on good Friday at 7 of the clock in y<sup>e</sup> morning: April: 3. 1639.
- 9. Conyngesby Featley: who was borne at Acton, on Tuesday in y<sup>e</sup> afternoone: Mar: 20. 1640. Hee died at Nurse at Lambeth, when hee was but a moneth old; and lieth interred in Lambeth Church, in y<sup>e</sup> same grave w<sup>th</sup> Joyce, and Daniel.
- 10. Anna Featley: who was born at Acton, on Thursday night, about 11 or 12 of y<sup>e</sup> clock a moneth before Michaelmasse. 1642.
- Pierce Featley: who was begotten at Acton, and borne in Palmetopoint parish in S. Christophers Island (his father being Rectour both of that parish and of S. Thomas parish in y<sup>e</sup> said Island) on Wednesday morning about 3 or 4 of the clock: Decem: 6. 1643.
- 12. Powell Featley: who was borne in Palmetoe-point parish in S. Christophers Island about y<sup>e</sup> tenth or twelfth day of March: 1644. Hee dyed in S. Christophers being about y<sup>e</sup> age of one yeare and an halfe: and lieth interred in the parish Church of Koyoona (vulgo Chyon) in y<sup>e</sup> same Island.
- 13. Elizabeth Featley : who was borne at Langar, about one of y<sup>e</sup> clock on Thursday morning : Jan : 1646.
- 14. Henry Featley: who was borne at Langar on Friday, Feb: 12 about 3 of y<sup>e</sup> clock in y<sup>e</sup> morning: 1647.
- 15. Robert Featley: who was borne at Langar on Friday, a litle before halfe an houre past seaven of y<sup>e</sup> clock in y<sup>e</sup> morning: Mar: 9. 1648.
- 16. Thomas Featley: who was borne at Langar on Satturday morning neer halfe a quarter of an houre past one of the clock May: 11. 1650.
- 17. Martha Featley: who was borne at Newarke upon Trent in y<sup>e</sup> County of Nottingham, on Wednesday in y<sup>e</sup> after-noone about a quarter of an hour past one of y<sup>e</sup> clock: April: 23. 1651.
- 18. William Featley: who was borne at Southwell in y<sup>e</sup> County of Nott: on Wednesday night at halfe an houre past nine of y<sup>e</sup> clock: June 2. 1652. Hee dyed at Langar of the small Poxe, on Sunday night betweene 8 and 9 of the clock: Octob: 21. 1655. and lieth interred in Langar Chancell, at y<sup>e</sup> East end, joyning to y<sup>e</sup> North and East wall, close to y<sup>e</sup> walls.
- 19. An abortive young child, not discernable of what sexe: whereof y<sup>e</sup> mother miss-carried on Monday morning: Nov: 22. 1652 at South-well.
- 20. Katharine Featley: who was borne at Southwell on Thursday night, presently after halfe an houre past eleven of y<sup>e</sup> clock: Feb: 23. 1653.
- 21. Edward Featley: who was borne at Southwell on Saturday, at halfe an houre past 3 of y<sup>e</sup> clock in y<sup>e</sup> after-noone: May. 5. 1655.

Nathaniel Hering of London, Esq., died 1678, and by his wife Elizabeth, dau. of Caleb Cockcroft of London, Esq. (through whom a descent is derived from Edward III.), had a son Julines Hering of Jamaica, a Colonel in the Army, who died 1689-90, and by Anne his wife (who remarried Rd. Scott) had a son, the above Nathaniel Hering, who died 1716, and an only dau. Bathshua, died 1750 (heiress to her brother), who married Peter Beckford, Esq., Speaker, etc., who died 1735. # Pym Letters.\*

The following West Indian letters were among the papers formerly belonging to John Pym, M.P., at the seat of his descendant, Philip Pleydell Bouverie at Brymore, co. Somerset. They were extracted by H. C. Maxwell Lyte, and printed in the 10th Report, Part VI., of the Historical MSS. Commission.

1633, October 28. Island of Providence. William Rudyerd, William Rons (sic), Roger Floyde and John Brigham, to [John Pym ?].

We do not find here the largeness that was reported. At the arrival of the Seaflower, the country was furnished with an overplus of provisions for the number of persons here. In October following, the new-comers had a crop of corn. In that month eighty more came from Bermuda, who had been dissuaded by the seamen from bringing provisions. Although they had felled a great quantity of ground by the end of November, and planted it with corn, the dry season came on so fast that little of it came to good.

These Bermudans (Baremoodians) had little help of the provision of store which was spent in the fruitless work of Warwick Fort. Thus many have endured great hardness. The island is full of hills and not so fertile as was reported. At New Westminster, and where Captn. Axe lives, the ground has this year twice failed in corn. This allotment of two acres a head will no more than find food.

Even if tobacco were as vendible as ever, the quantities from here would never cloy the market.

The tobacco that can be made between January and August may be as good as that of any country out of the Indies, if we observe the Spaniard's course of keeping it a year before sending it home. The worms eat our rafters, and the dust falling on our tobacco hinders the burning, and makes the taste bitter. Most men will have plantains and papawes in their season. Pines, orange trees, and lime trees grow, but do not bear. Potatoes are the most thriving and certain food we have. Fortification goes on slowly, and we are environed with enemies. From Fort Henry on the South West to Fort Warwick on the North East, a distance of seven miles, the land is inhabited. The 29 pieces of ordnance here, if fitly placed, would free the West side. The North side is not inhabited, and it is partly defended by breakers. Twenty pieces of ordnance are requisite for its defence. In the harbour there is good riding for twenty ships. Whatever others may relate, this is the truth. [p. 85.]

1646, May 9. [Somers Island, Bermuda.] William Rener to Alexander Pym at Derby House in Westminster. Concerning his estates in Padgett Tribe and Pembroke Tribe, and the estates of Lord Say and Sir Benjamin Rudyerd.

The Government is changed. Within twenty days after his arrival, the Governor called an assembly, pretending thereby to reform certain things amiss. All the ministers in the island, Mr. White, Mr. Goldinge, and Mr. Copeland, were Independents, and they had set up a Congregational Church, of which most gentlemen of Council were members or favourers. The burgesses of this assembly were picked out of those who were known to be enemies to that way, and they did not suffer a Roundhead (as they term them) to be chosen. Particulars of tobacco send to England in chests of cedar. [p. 95.]

# 1662, August 15. Surinam. John Treffry to Charles Pym. \*

We have been long in expectation of my Lord (Willoughby) who by his last told me that he would soon be ready to sail, having fully agreed with his Majesty concerning Barbados and this place. I hope that we shall see this colony wonderfully prosper by reason of the decline of Barbados, whence we daily expect sixty passengers and planters by the *Guiana*.

All things are excessively dear, and the sugar so bad that it will hardly be received. Money is as fluent there as in England, and taverns take nothing else —no goods, which must occasion a decay of their old trade. The Spaniards we understand have bought 500 negroes from the island for ready money at high rates. Our colony is daily improving. Seven ships have already gone hence laden with sugar, specklewood, and other commodities. Major Noel has a windmill up, and ours will be the next to be made. Every

Major Noel has a windmill up, and ours will be the next to be made. Every one is striving for the good of the public. Our sugar is far better, and of greater price than that of Barbados. Our noble Governor may justly bear the honour, having won every one not only to himself but also to industry. Some debauched persons have lately tried to make the world believe that he intended to poison Lieut.-Col. [Robert] Sanford. It was a plot of Sanford's. Particulars given. [p. 96.]

1667, December 15. Barbados. Lord Willoughby to Sir Charles Pym.

"I am going to Leeward to settle things there, and I may chance try my skill in Indian-hunting. Their late barbarities have been such that they deserve no law." Heraldic seal.

1668, November 8. Antigua. William Byam to Sir Charles Pym at Hatton House, London.

I have deserted our unfortunate colony of Surinam, war and pestilence having almost consumed it. As it is to revert to the Dutch, I have with great loss removed to Antigua, where I am hewing a new fortune out of the wild woods. Resettling is hard, the island being ruined by the French and the Indians. The titles of our lands are established to the satisfaction of all, and the inhabitants are more now than ever before. Heraldic seal. [p. 96.]

The writer was a prominent Royalist refugee officer at Barbados in 1650, but removed to Surinam after Sir G. Ayscue's reduction of the island to the Commonwealth. He published "An Exact Relation of the most execrable attempts of John Allen, committed on the person of His Excellency Francis, Lord Willoughby of Parham, Captain General of the Continent of Guiana and of all the Caribby Islands, and our Lord Proprietor." In him were united the dutiful and affectionate Son the loving Brother and truly sincere Friend.

To the memory of WILLIAM and HENRY REDWAR, only sons (and Tenants in Common) of the late HENRY REDWAR Efq<sup>r</sup>, of Spanish Town in the Island of Jamaica, who were in the enjoyment of perfect health only ten days before they were called to surrender their Spirits to HIM who gave them. WILLIAM died at their Estate Dumbarton S<sup>t</sup> Anns in the above Island, November 8<sup>th</sup> 1807, in his 24<sup>th</sup> year. HENRY died at Middlehill, in this Parish, December 27<sup>th</sup> 1807, in his 19<sup>th</sup> year. [Four lines follow.]

# BURIAL GROUND OF ST. ANDREW'S, HOLBORN, GRAY'S INN LANE.

On a large stone altar-tomb.\* There is nothing on the top slab. On the east side :--

Beneath this Tomb lie the remains of JAMES KIRKBY late of Kirkby Houfe in the Coun . . . . but formerly of this Parifh Efquire. He was second Son of WILLIAM KIRKBY of Kirkby and Afhlack in the County Palatine of Lancaster, Efquire by ALICE his 2<sup>d</sup> Wife eldest Daughter of THOMAS COMBER D.D. Dean of Durham He died the Fifth Day of September 1792 Aged 72.

At the north end :-

. . . . . . lie the remains . SARAH CUNNINGHAM Widow of JAMES CUNNINGHAM Efquire of the Island of Jamaica. She departed this Life .... Day of March 1763 Aged 63.

At the south end is a shield with these arms : Argent, two bars Gules, a canton of the last charged with a cross moline. A crescent for difference for KIRKBY. On an escutcheon of pretence the arms of CUNNINGHAM.... a shake-fork.... [This is cut as a cross pall in error.]

1761, June 30 Wm. Cunningham, Esq; of Jamaica. ("G.M.," 334.) 1804, Aug. 6 Mrs. Sarah Kirkby, relict of Mr. James K. of Kirkby-house, near Hungerford, Berks, and formerly a chemist in Bartlet's-buildings. She was daughter and sole heir of James Cunningham, of London, and also heir to her uncle Cunningham, who had been a consul. (*Ibid.*, 791.)

Col. Roger Kirkby, living in 1719, alienated his manor of Kirkby Ireleth, which had been in the family from as early as 1200. The Chapel contains marble monuments recording the deaths of William Kirkby of Kirkby 22 February 1730 and William Kirkby of Ashslack 28 December 1747. Kirkby Old Hall was the home of the family for at least ten generations. [See Croston's Edition of Baines's "History of Lancashire," vol. v., p. 615.]

# ST. MARY MAGDALEN, BERMONDSEY.

On a plain white marble tablet on the east wall of the south aisle (copied 11 August 1909) :--

> Near this place Lies Interr'd the Body of Mrs ELIZABETH WOOD who Departed this Life August the 19th 1730 Aged 42 Years. She was wife to BASIL Son of BASIL WOOD Esqr. in the County of Salop who Departed this Life in the Island of Iamaica the 14th of August 1734.

This was given in Manning and Bray's "Surrey," i. 208. There is a pedigree of Wood of Shinewood in the "Visitation of Shropshire, 1623," of whom Basil Wood, Fell. of All Souls, B.C.L. 1608, Chancellor of Rochester 1618, was buried in St. Michael's, Oxford, 30 November 1644, and was father of Basill, a Royalist Captain (born 10 February 1619-20, died 30 April 1684, buried in St. Michael's aforesaid), who was father of Basill, a surgeon, aged 31 in 1681; licenced 9 May 1673 to marry Jane, dau. of Henry Hedges of Wanborough, Wilts, gent. [See more in Foster's "Alumni Oxonienses."]

There is no entry in Archer or Roby.

# CAMBERWELL CHURCHYARD, CO. SURREY.

Here lie the Remains of DAVID THOMSON, M.D. .... Esher in the Parish of Hanover .... Island of Jamaica .... Day of August ....

David Thomson, M.D. of Camberwell, and a doctor of medicine of Aberdeen of 1739, was admitted an Extra-Licentiate of the College of Physicians 22nd September 1748. ("Munk's Roll.")

1817, April 15. At Bath, in his 73d year, Rt. Hon. Sir A. Thomson, Lord Chief Justice of his Majesty's Court of Exchequer. He was in point of years the Father of the Bench, having sat as one of the Judges many years longer than any of its present occupants. His reputation as a Judge was of the highest order, in point of legal knowledge, of perspicuity, and strict integrity of decision &c. ("G.M.," 382.)

The Judge was knighted on 7 Feb. 1787. (Townsend's "Calendar of Knights," 57.)

# WEST MOLESEY, CO. SURREY.

Roger Palmer of Palmerstown, co. Mayo, and Rush House, co. Dublin, died in Paris October 1811, after ten years detention by the French, and dying unmarried ("G.M.," 403, 486) his estates passed to his sister Elizabeth, who married Capt. Joseph Budworth, who took the name of Palmer, and died at Eastbourne 4 September 1815, and was buried on the 14th in the churchyard of West Moulsey (*Ibid.*, 390). Elizabeth his widow died at Ham Common, aged 76, when her estate of £30,000 a year devolved on Sir W. H. Palmer, Bart., of co. Mayo (*Ibid.*, 228). Their only dau., who died aged 43, married 3 August 1812 William Alexander Mackinnon of Antigua and M.P. for Lymington. (See Vol. I., p. 27.)

# EAST MOLESEY, CO. SURREY.

On a stone slab over a brick tomb in the south portion of the churchyard (copied 30 August 1909) :--

# ST. ALPHEGE, GREENWICH, CO. KENT.

On the south wall of the nave, low down. Above the tablet is an urn, on which is a shield of ARMS.—Or, three stags' heads, two and one erased Sable, impaling the same. CREST.—A stag's head as in the arms. (Copied 9 August 1909.)

# GREENWICH CHURCHYARD.

"Sarah daughter of Thomas Williams, Esq. of Nevis, wife of John Williams son of Colonel Williams of S<sup>t</sup> Kitts, 1774." (Lysons' "Environs of London," iv., 471.) On searching the churchyard on 9 August 1909 this stone was not found. There are, however, several altar-tombs covered up by creepers, and many of the inscriptions have worn away or become filled up by dirt. This churchyard is now used as a public garden.

I do not know if these entries relate to the same individual.

By Indenture of 10 December 1755 John Williams, late of Nevis, then of Great Windsor, co. Berks (and Sarah his wife), for his daughters Frances Williams and Sarah Williams, conveyed to Henry Herbert and Tho. Mills all his plantations in St. Christopher and Nevis on trust. John Williams, jun., was of Wimpole Street.

In another deed of 1760 are mentioned John Williams, sen., of Lower Brook Street, and Sarah his wife of the one part, and John Williams, jun., of Wilton, co. Middlesex.

[Extract from a letter dated 1876 by the late Sholto Pemberton, Chief Justice of Dominica.]

This family of Williams had branches settled from very early times in Antigua, St. Kitts, and Nevis. Their pedigree is rather complicated and confusing, and any information about them is desired.

# Pemberton.\*

Pemberton.— John Butler Pemberton (the first) was Clerk of Assembly in 1730.
Williams.—By a deed of 10th December 1755, John Williams, late of Nevis, then of Great Windsor, Berks, for his daughters Frances and Sarah Williams conveyed to Henry Herbert and Thomas Mills all his plantations in S<sup>t</sup> Kitts and Nevis on trust. John Williams' wife was Sarah.... A John Williams, junr., was of Wimpole Street. In 1760 was a deed between John Williams, senr., of Lower Brook Street and Sarah his wife of 1st part, and John Williams, junr., of Wilton, co. Middlesex.

Butler.—In Nevis, 1748, Duke Butler was described as of Swinden, co. Wilts, and as one of three sons of Thomas Butler, late of Nevis.

Peterson.—In a deed of 15th July 1754, John Peterson and Bates Williams Peterson are described as two of the sons of William Peterson, and Elizabeth Peterson is his widow. This William Peterson and a brother John were sons of Anthony (Book of Records, 1737, fo. 398). John was Deputy Provost Marshal. William Peterson had three other sons, James, Charles, and Robert, and three daughters, Elizabeth, Ann, and Eleanor. He owned the "Spring" plantation in Nevis.

Isabella Garnett, coloured, aged 78, daughter of Fanny Browne, both belonging to Parson Robert Pemberton, stated (in a personal interview with me), that Parson Robert Pemberton gave up North Wales estate at Nevis, and went to live at S<sup>t</sup> Kitts. His wife's sister was wife of Mr. Jones. The two sisters owned an estate called "Williams," adjoining Cane Garden. They had three sons, John Butler, Robert Hughes, and Sholto, and two daughters, Eliza and Nancy. Eliza married Ed. Davis, brother of D. Gateward Davis, late Bishop of Antigua. They separated: she went to her father's house and died there. Sholto died at his father's house, as also his sister Nancy. Mrs. Pemberton died before her husband and children. John Butler married an English lady from Tortola and had five children.

In the Almanac of Nevis for 1826 his name is entered as a barrister. No. 2 has not been identified, but she may be the "Fanny," daughter of the Rev. Nos. 3, 4, and 5 were sons of Walter Maynard P. of Spring Hill, Nevis, who was drowned at the wreck of the *Clarendon* off the Isle of Wight on 11 October 1836. No. 7, Miss Julia Huggins was residing on her estate "Mountravers" in April of last year.

# NOTE ON THE DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS PEMBERTON, LATE OF GOUGH HOUSE, CHELSEA.

During a portion of the period during which the families whose pedigrees are given in some detail above were settled in Nevis and St. Christopher, there were also members of another family of the name in the last-mentioned island. These were descended from Thomas Pemberton of Gough House, Chelsea, who was employed in the Transfer Department of the India Office for some years before his death in 1801 ("G.M.," 1153). No connection has as yet been traced between this family and the other Pembertons in the West Indies, but the publication of what is known may, it is hoped, lead to further light being thrown on the subject.

The first of them to emigrate appears to have been Thomas, eldest son of the above-mentioned Thomas of Gough House by his wife Maria, daughter of John Henry Sigerist, and went there as a planter. He was born on 9 November 1770 and baptized at S. Mary Abbott's, Kensington, on 10 December following. The date of his emigration has not been ascertained, but on 12 July 1798 he married at St. John's, Capisterre, St. Kitts, Frances Ashington Seaton, daughter of Captain William Seaton of that island.

A younger brother of this Thomas, John Busick Manning Pemberton, died at St. Kitts at the age of 22, and all others of the family there were direct descendants of this second Thomas.

He had a family of ten children, the baptisms of all of whom and also some of their marriages and burials will be found in the extracts from St. Christopher registers immediately preceding this note. Their names, in order of seniority, were Thomas Seaton, Frances Maria, William Augustus Sadler, Charlotte Hardtman, Busick Richards, Julia, Henry Seaton, Edward, Charles Davis, and Harriet Amelia Mary.

Thomas Seaton married in 1833, at St. James', Nevis, Adriana, daughter of Colonel James Daniell, President of that island, and he appears to have left St. Kitts soon after that, as his children were all born in London. His eldest son Mordaunt belonged to the Nevis bar in 1864 and became a Q.C. in 1879. He died unmarried in England in 1887.

No other member of the next generation appears to have settled in the West Indies—the only one of the six brothers who had a family being the youngest, Charles Davis, and he left St. Kitts at a comparatively early age, having been married at Broadstairs in 1846 ("G.M.," 1846, p. 420), and all his large family were born in England. He practised as a solicitor in London from the year 1846 to the year 1888, being senior partner in the well-known firm of Lee & Pemberton's of 44 Lincoln's Inn Fields.

His three eldest sons, Charles Seaton, Busick Edmonds, and Cyril Warner Lee became solicitors, and the second of the three is now senior partner of the same firm of Lee & Pemberton's. The fourth son, Seymour Blaushard, was in a West India Regiment and died at Barbados in 1881. One son, Ernest St. Clair, served in the Royal Engineers, and retired as a Colonel in 1908. Two sons, Seaton Blanshard and Willoughby Arthur (the youngest), are on the London Stock Exchange; and another, Horace Claude, has settled in the Argentine Republic. Three married daughters are also living.

Charles Davis Pemberton, the father of all these, who was born at St. Kitts a few months before the Battle of Waterloo, died at Brighton on 6 September 1899.

# LORD RODNEY'S APPOINTMENT OF HIS PRIZE AGENT IN 1782.

Mr. Noel B. Livingston of Kingston, Jamaica, copied the following original unrecorded Power of Attorney from the Records of the old Court of Vice-Admiralty. It was torn in three or four places :---

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS that I who have hereunto set my hand and seal being the Admiral and Commander in Chief of His Majestys Ships and Vessels in the West Indies &c. &c. &c. have constituted and appointed and do hereby constitute and Appoint Mr. Thomas Weir of the Island of Jamaica to be my true and lawful Attorney and Agent for me in my name and to my use to solicit transact and take care of all my concerns and interest in any Prize or Prizes Seizures or Re-captures that have been or shall be taken seised retaken or destroyed by any of His Majestys Ships or Vessels under my command or to which I am or shall be entitled by any means whatsoever and in all Head-money or other money arising from such capture and interest Giving and Hereby Granting to my said Attorney and Agent my full power and authority in the premises for Inventorying appraising condemning and selling the said Prize or Prizes Seizures and recaptures their Cargoes tackle guns apparel and Furniture and for the receiving the money arising therefrom And also the said Head Money by Bill made out by the Honourable Commissioners of His Majestys navy and my respective share of the whole and for recovering obtaining compounding and discharging the same and generally to do and act for me and for my use and safety as fully and effectually to all intents and purposes as I myself might or could do being personally present Acquittances and Releases and Other Discharges to make and grant Ratifying and confirming all and whatsoever my said Attorney and Agent or his substitute shall lawfully do or cause to be done in the premises by virtue of these presents and in case of the decease or absence of my said Attorney Mr. Thomas Weir I do hereby constitute and appoint to act in his stead as my lawful Agent and Attorney IN WITNESS WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and seal the first day of May in the year of Our Lord 1782 and in the twenty second year of the reign of Our Sovereign Lord King George the Third by the Grace of God over Great Britain &c.

#### THE SETTLEMENT OF JAMAICA.

A considerable number of the early settlers in Jamaica did not emigrate there direct from Great Britain, but were drawn from the older colonies. This point is of much interest, and should be taken into consideration by readers when inquiring into the origin of the first inhabitants.

Capt. Gregory Butler, who was recruiting for the Expedition, in his letter to the Protector in 1655 [Thurloe's State Papers, iii., 574], wrote that Antegoe was molested by Indians and had but 1200 men, so he would not enlist any. At Montserrat he raised 80, at Nevis 300, and at St. Kitts 800 or 900, in spite of the French owning one half the colony. "This island is almost worne out by reason of the multitude that live upon it. . . . The fleet appearing we shipped our men to the number of twelve hundred and departed." Penn and Venables anchored off St. Kitts on 6 April 1655, and including the above 1200, they had on board 5000 West Indian settlers, besides women and children, the majority from Barbados. The survivors took possession of Jamaica next month. Vice-Admiral Wm. Gocdson wrote on 24 June 1656: "Upon notice given from Governor Stokes of himself ard the people of Nevis their intention to transplant themselves hither, dispatched three ships for their transport, and 4<sup>th</sup> June a vessel arrived from the Governor with three gentlemen to treat with us concerning shipping and to view the country. Afterwards fitted out a small vessel to carry back our resolutions of sending ships for about 1000 people besides women, children and servants" [America and W.I. Calendar for 1675-6, Addenda 1574-1674, p. 110]. Capt. Godfrey writes on 30 June 1656: "Is going with some ships to Nevis and St Christopher's to fetch the Governor, his lady, and such planters as will come to Jamaica." [Ibid., p. 112.]

Vice-Admiral Goodson writes again in Oct. 1656: "that they arrived at Nevis road on 9th Oct. and have been embarking about 1400 men, women and children, with their goods and servants and intend sailing 21st inst." [Ibid., p. 114.]

Cornelius Burough writes on 28 Nov. 1658: "In Gen. Brayne's time about 1,000% in provisions was lent to Nevis planters settled on Port Morant, they being in great want." [*Ibid.*, p. 125.]

The reason of this emigration was also, I believe, because Nevis, like St. Kitts, was over populated. It was a very small island of some 50 square miles, with a great central mountain, and not much available land for new comers.

After the capture of St. Kitts by the French in 1666, Du Tertre says some of the English inhabitants were sent to Jamaica, etc.

In 1670 the Somer Islands were so crowded that many of its people removed to Jamaica. In 1675 most of the English with their slaves also went there from Surinam-total in three ships, 1231. Their names are given. [America and W.I., 286.]

# HISTORIC SITES IN BARBADOS.

Allusion was made in Vol. I., p. 287, to the list of such sites printed on 23 December 1909 in the "Jamaica Gazette." The Committee for Barbados has now completed its task, and on 17 June 1910 sent in its Report, of which

\* On the 10-11 Aug. of that year a most destructive hurricane occurred. Owing to the liability of the West Indies to earthquakes, hurricanes, and fires, it seems desirable that an Act should be passed, providing for the transcription of the parish registers, and for the deposit with the Bishop each year of certified copies of all entries. a printed copy has been forwarded to me by Mr. E. G. Sinckler, the Hon. Secretary. This list comprises all the old forts and batteries; tombs on plantations; and ancient "Great houses," of which Fontabelle, Drax Hall, and Nicholas Abbey were apparently all erected in the Cromwellian period. The M.I. noted relate more especially to the following families, viz.:—

more especially to the following families, viz.:--Ayshford, Collins, Culpeper, Forte, Greaves, Holder, Holloway, Hooke, Lear, Lillington, Morris, Rice, Rider, Rouse, Scott, Simmons, Skeete, Thorpe, Tyler, Walton, Wilkinson, Williams, and Worrell. As the vaults on the plantations are more liable to destruction than those in the churchyards, it is hoped that the Inscriptions at all these outlying places may be copied verbatim and the coats of arms noted and forwarded to me for publication.

The late Major Herbert Thorne of Barbados copied all the M.I. of St. Michael's, and perhaps of other parishes, and his collection should certainly be printed.

Major Lawrence Archer's well-known work relates chiefly to Jamaica, and he stated that his stay at Barbados was so short that he only noted Inscriptions down to 1750.

# ARCHBOULD OF JAMAICA (I., 264).

In the West India Committee Circular for 6 December 1910, under "Historic Sites and Monuments," appeared Mr. F. Cundall's article on "Constant Spring," from which I quote as follows :---

"When the lands on the plain of Liguanea were divided amongst themselves by Cromwell's army of occupation, that part on which the Constant Spring estate stands fell to the lot of Lieut.-Colonel Henry Archbould,\* a member of the first Council nominated in 1661. He married in 1668 (he was her third husband and she was his second wife) the mother of Sir Nicholas Lawes (afterwards Governor of the Colony), but died in the following year, she surviving him twenty years. His son Colonel Henry Archbould, who had sat for St. George from 1680 to 1688, was elected Member of the Assembly for St. Andrew in 1701-2.

"His wife Joanna Wilhelmina was sister to the wife and cousin of Sir Henry Morgan (buccaneer and Governor of Jamaica), and sister to the wife of Colonel Robert Byndlos, Chief Justice. She obtained a patent of naturalisation in August 1685. The second Colonel Archbould died in 1709, and was buried in Halfway-Tree Church. The first Colonel Archbould's second son, Major William Archbould, was member for St. Andrew in 1688. James Archbould, the son of his second wife, was member for St. Andrew in 1702-4, but sat for St. David in 1713.

"In 1759 a private Act was passed (we read in Mr. Feurtado's 'Official and other Personages of Jamaica,' 1896) for the sale of certain lands in Liguanea belonging to Henry Archbould, late of the said parish, deceased, for payment of £8000 with interest, devised by the will of the said Henry Archbould to his daughter, Sarah Elizabeth Archbould, and for other purposes.

"In 1765 Constant Spring estate, with some mountain land adjoining, called Snow Hill, was (the writer is informed by Mr. G. F. Judah) sold by Henry Archbould to Daniel Moore, etc."

# MORGAN OF JAMAICA.

Colonel Edward Morgan went out as Lieut.-Governor in 1664, and died in St. Eustatius July 1665 during the attack of that Island. By his wife, a dau. of Baron Pollnitz, he had:-

Archer gives no M.I. See article on Sir Henry Morgan in the "D.N.B."
- III. Joanna Wilhelmina, married at St. Catherine 30 November 1671 (I., 14), Colonel Henry Archbould.

# RECORDS OF BARBADOS.

"About the year 1666, the Bridge-Town was burnt; and all the chief Records lost by a Hurricane, which happen'd the same year." ("Memoirs of the First Settlement of Barbados," Appendix I.)

In 1667 a commission collected all the Acts, "the Original Rolls being lost either in the Hurricane or Fire." The earliest of these Acts was dated 1648. By No. 5 Act, dated 13 March 1648, styled "An Act for the Transcription and safe keeping of the Records," it was enacted that the Secretary should draw a list of the books of records, and send them to some able person or Chief Officer, who was to cause them to be transcribed. ("The Laws of Barbados," printed by John Baskett, fo. p. 5.) This officer was, I think, subsequently styled the Register or Registrar. By Act No. 41, passed in 1661, the Fees of the Secretary's Office were settled, and the following papers are mentioned, viz.: Deed, bill of sale, bond, ticket, deposition, licence for marriage, will, administration, inventory, etc. (*Ibid.*, p. 40.) Of the subsequent history of the Record Office I know little. Will some local authority give our readers an account of the present contents, with dates?

# Brooks of St. Elizabeth, Jamaica.\*

The earlier portion of the pedigree has been taken by Miss Nembhard from one drawn up by lawyers about 1807, endorsed "Sketch of Descent of F. G. Smyth Es<sup>e</sup> from Geo. Brooks sen. Geo. Brooks, Will Ent<sup>d</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> 1750. Lib. 28, folio 19. Papers relative to Mrs. Witter. Not examined." George Brooks, greatgrandson of testator, was Claimant under the will as Right Heir of Mrs. Witter, the surviving Dau, of the three. F. G. Smyth of Goshen was Claimant as surviving Heir of one of the Daus., being son of Fra. Geo. Smyth, deceased, and grandson of Cath. Brooks and F. Smyth. The latter portion has been taken from the pedigree drawn up by her father, the late Major-General Nembhard (1827--1905), founded on facts partly derived from his mother (1808-1874). The pedigree requires proof from wills, deeds, and parish registers, but it is probably fairly accurate.

Å bookplate of John Brooks has been preserved; it is in the Chippendale style, with the Brooks arms so incorrectly engraved as to be useless for illustration. It however shews on an escutcheon of pretence: Gules, on a chevron Or three pellets, a coat of some heiress which has not been identified. [EDITOR.]

#### SANTA CRUZ PARK, † JAMAICA.

This estate is in the parish of St. Elizabeth, some two miles from the village of Santa Cruz. About a mile from the residence known as "Pear Tree Valley are the ruins of an old house with its large overgrown flower garden still traceable. To the east, on a slight eminence four or five chains off, is the old family burialplace, about 20 feet square, enclosed by a low stone wall. Within this is a stone tomb, surmounted by a massive black marble slab, with the following arms and inscription :-

ARMS.—.... A cross engrailed per pale .... (no tinctures). CREST.—A badger passant above an esquire's helmet.

"Here lies the body of GEORGE BROOKS, Esqr the Elder, who departed this life May ye 9th, 1750, aged 62 years, who was an indulgent father, a loving husband, and a good friend."

In his will (entered in the Record Office in Libro 28, fo. 18), dated 3 March 1748 and proved 21 November 1750, he names his wife Eliz., six sons, Samuel, John, George, Christopher, Thomas, and Francis, also four daus., Anna, Elizabeth, Bonella, and Catherine.

Without the enclosure, on the north, south, and east sides, are three more tombs, of which the north side one has no inscription. The tomb on the south side has the following inscription on a limestone slab :--

"Here lieth the body of M<sup>IS</sup> ELIZABETH CHAMBERS, who departed this life on the 16 day of March, 1772, aged 52<sup>‡</sup> years 3 months and eleven days. She was an indulgent parent and a good woman."

The tomb to the east is inscribed as follows, also on a limestone slab :---

"Here lieth the body of BONELLA CHAMBERS who departed this life on Sunday the 6th September 1772 aged 31 years and four months. She was a fond affectionate wife, a dutiful child, and a benevolent woman."

The whole of the above information has been derived from an article in "The Gleaner" of Jamaica, 1898, by Leslie Alexander, a clerk in the Record Office of Kingston.

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

The above burial-ground was not noted by Archer. On p. 327 he gives a M.I. from Falmouth Church in the parish of Trelawney to: "John Tharp Chambers, son of Edward Chambers Esq. d. 1795."

There is a small paper plan, drawn up in 1792 by Fras. Robertson, Survr., giving the boundaries between Longwood and Burnt Ground plantations in St. Elizabeth's parish. "Burntground House" is marked, and "Land laid out for George Brooks," bounded at the north-west corner by Samuel Rushton and Henry Fleeming, then north and east by "Land belonging to the proprietors of Longwood Pen," and at the south-east corner by "Now Emaus Pen Patented by William Russell." Then follows a clause that "We Richard Joseph Edward and

The second John is thought to have been a natural son of George Brooks, Esq., because in 1769 and 1775 private acts were passed to authorize the latter to dispose of his estate, without regard to the Law of Disabilities, and to intitle his reputed children by Mary Powell to the same rights as English subjects (Feurtado).

Dr. George Brooks inherited a moiety of the Chester estate Trelawney and Mr. Kenyon the other from the widow of James Virgo Dunn, his great-uncle, but sold this to Mr. Kenyon in 1844. He also sold outlying portions of Burnt Ground, and negros were allowed to squat on the remainder.

His son, the Rev. George Bygrave Brooks, sold 300 acres of the Blenheim estate, which had formerly brought in £10,000 a year, to a Rev. Mr. Hildebrand, Rector of Snowdon, both estate and house then being in a ruinous condition, for £180.

# LIST OF WILLS RELATING TO THIS ISLAND PROVED IN THE P.C.C. FROM 1655 TO 1810.

The following list of testators has been gradually made during a search, extending over many years, through the volumes of wills at Somerset House. I do not think many names have been omitted, though some references are sure to have been overlooked.

In 1656 a list was drawn up of officers and soldiers engaged in the American Expedition who applied for arrears of pay, or on whose account claims were made by their widows, etc. (185 names, "Colonial Cal."). On 18 April 1656 Susanna, relict of Edward Winslowe, Esq., and Josiah, his son and ex'or, represented that her husband was appointed on 12 December 1654 one of the commissioners in the Expedition to the W.I., with a salary of £1000 per annum, but died on the voyage 8 May 1655 (*Ibid.*, p. 439). Major-General Richard Fortescue, are also among those named. See also her Petition of August 1661 (Ibid., p. 52). Considering that the death roll, at the abortive attack at Hispaniola alone, amounted to 1700, there are surprisingly few wills on record-less than 2 per cent. During the first six or seven years these relate mostly to soldiers and sailors, are very short, and of little interest, except when the ship is named, so I have not given a complete list of them. Instead of the familiar "H.M.S." the letters "S.S." for "States Ship" were used during the Cromwellian usurpation.

Clarke and John Hooke for one year their plantation and slaves in the parish of St. James in the Island of Nevis, containing 500 acres, late the estate of Tho. Butler, deceased, given by his Will dated 27 July 1739 on Trust as to one third for each of them the said John, James, and Duke Butler his sons.

Close Roll 21 Geo. II., 1747, relates to a bond from Tho. Pym to Tho. Butler of Camberwell, Esq., of £7,330 st. dated 14 Dec. 1738 to secure a sum of £3,665 advanced by way of mortgage of Pym's plantations.

# Close Roll 22 Geo. II., Part 2; No. 4.

This Indenture Tripartite made the 31 January 22 Geo. II., 1748, BETWEEN John Butler of London, Mercht, and Frances his wife (late Fra. Sanders, spinster, one of the daus. of Francis Sanders, late of the I. of Nevis, Esq., deceased) of the 1st part; John Hooke of Mansell Street, Goodmans Fields, co. Middlesex, gent., and Duke Butler of Swindon, co. Wilts, gent., of the 2nd part; and William Halford of Camberwell, co. Surry, clerke, and William Vaughan of Fritwell, co. Oxford, clerk, of the 3rd part, WITNESSETH that in consideration of a marriage heretofore had between John Butler and Fra. his wife and for the performance of certain articles of agreement before marriage dated 29 Jan. 1746 between said John Butler of 1st part, Fra. Butler, then Fra. Sanders, of the 2nd part, and Anne Sanders of Camberwell, spinster, and John Hooke of the 3rd part, to the intent that half of certain lands may be settled on Trusts and for 10s., and by Act of 21 June 4 Anne, 1705, passed at Nevis for supplying the want of fines and recoverys, John Butler and Frances Butler his wife convey to John Hooke and Duke Butler that moiety of land in the parish of St. Thomas, Nevis, containing 200 acres called Lawford Coles,\* late the estate of said Frances Sanders, deceased, and a moiety of land in St. George, containing 50 acres, and moiety of the Lower Ground near Round Hill in St. George otherwise Gingerland, containing 100 acres, or any other lands by his last will, with all negroes, mills, houses, for John Butler for his life, for Frances Butler for her life, and to their children equally as tenants in common and not as joint tenants. Sealed in the presence of William Russell, Robert Champante. Inrolled 9 Feb.

By a deed dated 7 August 1787 recorded at Nevis it appears that by an Indenture of 12 and 13 March 1785 Judith Butler and Mary Butler of Greenwich, co. Kent, spinsters, granted to Robert Pemberton of the Middle Temple, but then of Nevis, certain lands in the parish of St. George, Nevis, and four negroes in return for an annuity of £210. Robert Pemberton died intestate 14 August 1786, and his elder brother and heir-at-law, Roger Pemberton, has agreed to transfer the land to them, the annuity not having been paid. (General Pemberton's Papers.)

# CAMBERWELL, CO. SURREY.

On a large stone slab over a low vault lying in the churchyard to the south of the church, and close to the path near the porch. The Inscription is now very indistinct, and the stone has been cracked lengthwise down the centre :---

In a Vault underneath this Stone lie the Remains of MR IAMES BUTLER Merch ... late of this Town Who died the . . of Feb: 17.0 in the .... year of his Age And of his Eldeft Daughter  $M^{RS}$  IUDITH IONES Who departed this Life the . . of Iuly . . . . in the 29th year of her Age. Alfo of his Eldeft Son MR THOMAS BUTLER Who died y<sup>e</sup>...<sup>th</sup> of Au.....17...in y<sup>e</sup>...year of his Age. Likewife are here .... the two Sons of the Hon: IAMES SYMONDS of NEVIS..... WALTER WILLIAM SYMONDS Efg. who died Iune the . . . the . . year of his Age And IOHN BUTLER SYMONDS Eiq. who departed this Life . . . . year of his Age alfo the Body of M . . . . . . . . . . Relict of the above M . . . . . . . . . who departed this life the . . D . . . mber . . . 1791 .... Year of .... Age Here . . . . of  $M^R$ (Four illegible lines here.) Likewise the Body .... above M<sup>R</sup> IAMES B.... (One illegible line here.) Alfo the Body of M . . . . B . . . . above MR IAMES BUTLER who departed this life the 10 day of Oct . . . . 177 . Aged 65 Years Alfo the two Daughters of M<sup>R</sup> THOMAS BUTLER M... MARY BUTLER died Oct. 5th 1794 Aged 65 Years and MRS JUDITH BUTLER died Febry 14th 1797 Aged 68 Years.

No stone can be found of any earlier date. There may have been one in the church to Colonel Tho. Butler of 1744, but the building was completely destroyed by fire some sixty years ago.

The first-named Mr. James Butler may have been the brother of Colonel Thos. Butler, but if he was the son he was buried 7 February 1770, aged 48, at Okeford Fitzpaine, Dorset. I could not find any burial of that date in the parish register of Camberwell.

The Hon. James Symonds, President of Nevis, by his will, dated 21 July 1758, wrote, "I forgive M<sup>rs</sup> Judith Butler, widow, now in England (sister to my late wife), all sums owing," and settled all his estates on his only surviving child Judith, wife of Stapleton Dunbar of Nevis. Proved 7 September 1762 (P.C.C., 398, St. Eloy). I cannot identify this Judith Butler, widow. Testator had married, 10 July 1718, at St. George, Nevis, Mary Butler, who owned the Mountain plantation in her own right.

The following were extracted by me on 10 August 1909, but a complete search was not made owing to the fees. A search from 1700-1800 would have cost 50s.

# OCKFORD FITZPAIN, CO. DORSET.

Hutchins (iv., 332) wrote: "S. wall of Church. The following was also formerly there, but is now gone :--

Sacred to the memory of THOMAS BUTLER, L.L.B. 32 years Rector of this parish. He died April 1, 1811, aged 62. His talents made him recommended to the great, And his charity endeared him to the poor.

On the floor on a flat stone :--

Beneath are the remains of JO. BUTLER, esq. He died July 1, 1800, aged 52 years. J. B. 1770. D. B. 1779. M. B. 1786."

On my visit to the church on 28 April 1909 this floor-stone could not be found, and as the chancel has been paved with modern tiles, it was probably destroyed during the so-called restoration of the church, or covered over by the tiles.

South aisle, on a handsome marble tablet, which according to Hutchins was in his time on the north wall, but it is now on the south wall:---

Here rest the Remains of the Rev<sup>d</sup> DUKE BUTLER (Son of THO<sup>8</sup> BUTLER Efq<sup>r</sup>. of the Ifland of Nevis, who was upwards of 29 Years Rector of this Parish. He died Nov. jj<sup>th</sup>. An. Dom. 1779 Ætatis 56. (Twelve lines here.) He married MARY Second Daughter of RAUFE FREKE Efqr. of Hannington in the County of Wilts, who has caused this Monument to be erected, as a memorial of Her Affection. In the same Vault are interr'd the Remains of JAMES BUTLER, Eiqr. Brother to the Rev<sup>d</sup>. DUKE BUTLER, who departed this Life A.D. 1770 Æt. 48. Alfo the Remains of DUKE, the infant Son of the Rev<sup>d</sup> DUKE BUTLER, who died A.D. 1752. M<sup>RS</sup> MARY BUTLER, Relict of the Rev<sup>d</sup>. DUKE BUTLER, died Novr. 22d. 1786, aged 66 and lies interr'd in this Vault.

#### MARRIAGE.

Rev<sup>d</sup> Robert Frome, Rector of the Parish of Folke and Jane Butler of this Parish &c. by Lic. 8 June 1778.

Rev. Duke Butler, B.A., of Queen's College, Oxford, was instituted as Rector 30 July 1750. He commenced a new Register book in 1750, when the signature "D: Butler Rect"" first appears, and for the last time in 1778.

Rev. Thomas Butler, his son, LL.B., of Queen's College, Oxford, was instituted 11 February 1780; first signs in 1779, and last in 1809.

Rev. William Butler, brother of Thomas, as curate performed marriages on 17 October 1785, 23 December 1788, and 8 December 1793, and baptisms on 3 September 1815 and 1 April and 15 May 1816.

1811, Thursday, April 19. On Monday the 1st instant died, at Okeford Fitzpaine, in this county, in the 62d year of his age, the Rev. Thomas Butler, L.L.B. upwards of 30 years rector of that parish, and of Hannington, in the county of Wilts, and also of North Barrow, in Somersetshire.

His life was devoted to the practice of virtue, and the duties of his holy calling, yet his active mind found leisure for the pursuits of science and the useful mechanical arts.

He was afflicted with a dropsy combined with a liver complaint, the progress of which pointed out the approach of death, which he viewed undismayed, and being passionately fond of music, he took a solemn farewell of his organ a few days before his dissolution.

His known skill in mechanics occasioned professional artists of eminence, especially opticians, to consult him, to whom he fully communicated many inventions of great value. With these talents and acquirements, he was unassuming among his friends, and affectionate to his parishioners and dependants: he was therefore respected and beloved by rich and poor, and long will his loss be regretted, and his memory revered. ("Dorchester and Sherborne Journal.")

# FRAMPTON, CO. DORSET. ("Notes and Queries," 10 S., xi., 15.)

There is a small mural tablet on the south wall of the church, bearing the following inscription :---

### In memory of

the Rev<sup>d</sup> William Butler, L.L.B. Vicar of Frampton, who departed this life August 13, 1843, aged 81.

Hutchins (iv., 344) states that he was instituted Vicar of Sturminster Newton 21 November 1791, but resigned in 1800, and (ii., 302) that he was of Wadham College, Oxford, B.C.L., and was instituted Rector of Frampton 1 February 1800. A notice follows about his foxhunting taste.


In the Frome pedigree (*Ibid.*, 184) she is entered as dau. of the Rev. Duke Butler, Rector of Okeford Fitzpaine.

Her husband was LL.B. of Wadham College, instituted Rector 9 June 1777, and was also Rector of Minterne Magna and of Goathill, Somerset.

# Inhabitants of St. Kitts in 1678.

Sir William Stapleton, that most energetic Governor of the Leeward Islands, sent home in 1678 complete lists of the inhabitants of Antigua, St. Kitts, Nevis, and Montserrat, but only the totals for the Virgin Islands. These are the earliest known and of great interest. Those of Antigua having been already printed in my "History" of that Colony, I now give the list for St. Kitts, which I have copied exactly, only substituting S for the long "f" and F for "ff," as being more convenient to the reader. Some of the names are difficult to decipher, the Irish ones being worse (to me, at any rate) than the French. In the same volume are lists of the Members of the Council and Assembly, but these may be seen in the official Colonial Calendar.

I cannot account for the large number of Irish in this Island, unless they were imported to work on the estates. Later, during the war with the French, they sided with their country's enemies. Laws against Papists were then enforced, and I believe most of them were removed or went to Montserrat, which was almost wholly populated by Irish.

Many of the French, when persecuted by their own countrymen, who owned the two ends of the Island, fled across the borders to the English quarter. The Huguenots were especially welcome, and intermarried with some of the best families. In the earlier period the Dutch had all the plantation business and carrying trade. Only one Scotchman and one Welshman appear in the list!

# BRISTOL CATHEDRAL.

"F.B.J." stands for "Farley's Bristol Journal."

North transept, on a small square of white marble in the floor :--

In Memory of CATHARINE OSBORNE of Barbadoes, who died 5 Sep<sup>tr</sup>. 1782 Aged 50 Years.

Her will as of Bristol, Spinster, was proved in 1782 (555, Gostling).

1782, Sept<sup>r</sup>: 9. Catherine Osborne was buried by the Precentor. (Cathedral Register.)

1782, Sat. Sep. 14. Thursday se'nnight died in Queen-Square, Miss Catherine Osborne, of the island of Barbadoes. ("F.B.J.")

Samuel Osborne, Esq., of Barbados, from being an overseer became one of the largest landowners, and died 19 March 1736, aged 62, and was buried next day in St. Thomas's Church. There is a long obituary notice of him in the original "Caribbeana," ii., 141, published that year.

Samuel Osborne of St. Michael's, Barbados, Esq. Will dated 11 October 1756. All estate to my wife Eliz. Adm'on 7 September 1773 to Frances, Martha, Anne, and Eliz. Ford, minors, the children of Eliz. Ford, late Osborne, deceased, wife of Francis Ford, deceased. Philip Gibbes, Esq., receiving the grant for them. Proved 1773 (368, Stevens).

The will of Francis Ford of Barbados, Esq., was also proved in 1773 (357, Stevens).

Agnes, dau. and heir of Samuel Osborne, Esq., married, 1 February 1753, Sir Philip Gibbes, Bart., and her arms were: Quarterly, Azure and Erminois, a cross Argent. (Betham's "Baronetage," iii., 448.)

1741, Sept. 18. Robert Osborne, Esq; of B. to Miss Sally Hopkins, eldest Dau. of John H. of Ingatestone-Hall, Essex, Esq; Heir of the rich Hopkins; a Fortune of 10,000 *l*. and the Heirs of her Body to inherit that great Estate. ("G.M.," 500.)

1767, Aug. 2. Sam. Osborne, Esq; of B. (Ibid., 430.)

A vault of the Osbornes of Springhead (but no tablet) was in St. Thomas's Parish, Barbados. (L. Archer, 375.)

Dr. Robert Lovell of Barbados, M.D., who died 1823, æt. 69, and was buried in Bristol Cathedral, married Eliz. Osborne of Barbados, dau. and heir of Samuel Osborne. She died 12 May 1830, s.p. ("Som. and Dorset Notes and Queries," x., 248.)

1823, Ap. 11. At Begbrooke, near Frenchay, after a lingering illness, Dr. Robert Lovell, formerly an eminent physician in Bristol. ("G.M.," 476.)

# HENRY CRUGER Efqr. Ob. 3 Feb. 1780 Æ. 75.

1780, Feb. 8. Henry Cruger esqr was buried by Mr Haynes M.C. (Cathedral Register.)

1780, Sat. Feb. 12. Saturday morning died in St. James's-square, in the 76th year of his age, Henry Cruger, Esq; (father of Henry Cruger, Esq; one of our Representatives in Parliament), Having been some years in a very ill state of health, he left New-York, the place of his nativity and residence, where he had sustained a most respectable private character, and filled the various offices of Member of the Assembly, Member of the Council, and Chief Magistrate, with the highest reputation. The cheerfulness of his disposition, and the affability of his manners, had endeared him to all those who had the pleasure of his acquaintance in this country. His remains were interred on Tuesday morning in the Cathedral of this city. ("F.B.J.")

He had large interests in the West Indies, as appears by his will, wherein he describes himself as Henry Cruger, Senr, late of New York, now at Bristol. Estates in Jamaica and St. Croix; proved 1780 (125, Collins).

In St. James's Chapel, Hampstead Road, is a tablet to Lieut.-Col. John Harris Cruger, late of Russell Place, Fitzroy Square, who died 3 June 1807, aged 69. He formerly resided in New York, and greatly distinguished himself as a Loyalist officer, etc. (Cansick's "Epitaphs," i., 225.)

The following is from Sabine's "American Loyalists," 234 :---

"CRUGER, JOHN. Of New York. In 1775 he was Speaker of the House of Assembly, and during the recess that year, with thirteen other members of the ministerial party, addressed a letter to General Gage on the alarming state of public affairs. This communication is dated May 5th, on which day two members of the Council of New York sailed for England. When, in 1769, he was elected to the assembly, the success of his party was deemed a victory of the Episcopalians over the Presbyterians."

1822, May 16. At Chelsea, 78, Anne, relict of Col. Cruger, and dau. of late Brig.-gen. De Lancey. ("G.M.," 572.)

1827, April 24. At New York, aged 88, Henry Cruger, esq. formerly of Bristol, and its representative in Parliament, with Mr. Burke, from 1774 to 1780. In 1784 Mr. Cruger was again returned to the House of Commons, and on that occasion was represented on the hustings by his brother, Col. Cruger, being himself absent in America. He finally left this country for the United States in 1789, where he has since constantly resided; and it may be gratifying to his old friends (if any survive) to know, that no man ever lived more highly respected, or died more sincerely lamented. (Ibid., 94.)

Cloisters, north wall. A large marble monument\* with a cherub above, resting its right arm on a headstone. To the right is an urn with shield bearing :--CREST.—A dexter arm erect, couped, holding . . . . [broken], a coronet encircling the forearm. ARMS. - Gules, a lion rampant Ör.

\* When the Rev. John Woodward wrote in 1867 this monument was on the west wall of the

transept, and the arms were : Paly of six Sable and Ermine, a lion rampant Argent. In vol. iv. of "The Herald and Genealogist," published in 1867, there is a valuable article by him on the Heraldry of Bristol Cathedral. During the restoration, when he wrote, much destruction of ancient monuments was taking place, and several M.I. and heraldry which he recorded are now (1909) no longer in existence,

On the small headstone is the following:-

# Nevis the 16<sup>th</sup> of Aug : 1681.

The last I presumed to write to your honours was the 27<sup>th</sup> July by which in generall termes I did inform your Lordships of the murder of some of his Majesties subjects upon the Island of Barbouda which was acted on ye 4<sup>th</sup> of July last at 3 in the afternoone; 40 Indians came up to ye house wherein were only three men, two woemen, and 2 children the Indians left the rest of their companions at the seaside or in bushes it is reported they were 300 men I judge 240 in six periagoes. As they came to the house they spyed one of y<sup>e</sup> people splitting of wood whom they stuck with arrowes and left him for dead, to those in the house (they pretended as it is their custom most treatcherous) they came in friendship, and demanded drinke which was given them thorogh a window, and one of those within told them If you come in friendship goe and expell the poyson of them arrows you have shott at ye man without and cure him : butt insteed of applying y<sup>e</sup> Juce of y<sup>e</sup> indian arrow root to him one of them who spoke good English (called cap<sup>t</sup> peeter who lived formerly at Barbados with Coff Moris) staved his braines out with his owne ax sayeing hang ye dog he is not to be cured upon which they discontinued their parly and ye christian within fired and shot this peeter in ye hand and he shot ye christian in one of his fingers upon this act they parlyed again promisseing each other to fire noe more: butt those treacherous villaines killed 3 boyes that were without the house knocking their heades against a tree. In fine they gott to y<sup>e</sup> house all y<sup>e</sup> partie they had hid and forced in one of the roomes, y<sup>e</sup> people within not being able to deffend round all y<sup>e</sup> roomes, y<sup>e</sup> comander of y<sup>e</sup> place one cap<sup>t</sup> francis Malham comeing to y<sup>e</sup> deffense of y<sup>e</sup> house being abroad with some men was shot by y<sup>e</sup> Indians with a brace of Bullets thorogh the hart they killed & in all his wife ye two children and a sert woeman escaped by ye assistance of one of ye men whilst ye Indians were drinkeing kill devill or Rum (this country spiritt) and pillageing the house, there were three killed of ye Barbarous heathens two of them carried of as it is their practice if they can and left cap<sup>t</sup> peeter dead behind.

I begg your Lordships pardon If I am tedious and doe pray your honours to represent to his Majestie y<sup>e</sup> necessitie of destroyeing those caribie Indians and y<sup>t</sup> he would bee graciouslie pleased to order y<sup>e</sup> Governour of Barbados to destroye them heathens which is sole easy a thing for y<sup>t</sup> Gover<sup>t</sup> to execute in regarde of its nearenesse to y<sup>e</sup> islands of S<sup>t</sup> Vincents and Dominico, or to putt me in a capacitie to perform y<sup>t</sup> good peece of service whilst wee are in amitie with y<sup>e</sup> french who has them in subjection, or at least wise y<sup>t</sup> it may not bee disliked if I take all opportunities to make them fly to y<sup>e</sup> main: If I cannot compass their totall destruction I need not trouble your Lordships with a relation of y<sup>e</sup> importance of this affaire for y<sup>e</sup> safetie of the leeward Islands not doubting butt your honours are sensible thereof, wee are now as much upon our guardes as if wee had a christian Ennemie and more for wee feare noe such this time of y<sup>e</sup> yeare neither cann any such now surprize us butt these Cannibals may who never comes Marte Aperto thogh they have generally good fire armes from y<sup>e</sup> french and dutch and are as good firemen as any. I once more crave excuse for the prolixitie of

# BURIAL-GROUND AT DICKIE HILL, ANTIGUA.

I have omitted from the following interesting letter a lengthy M.I. to John Hawksley, Esq., from a tombstone at the west end of a small broken and empty vault, situated on the pasture land to the south-east of Bodkins sugar works. The M.I. is practically a duplicate of the one on the tablet in St. Paul's Church ("Antigua," ii., 87), which latter records that the burial was at Bodkins. Mr. Spooner's notes also relate to a burial-ground which was unknown to me. [ED.]

Dickie Hill. I see in Baker's Map of 1746—8 the residence of Richard Oliver is shewn on what is now known as "Dickie Hill." There are a number of tombstones on this hill, but most of the inscriptions are illegible and the stones badly broken. The most legible are the following :—

- 1. "Here lies the body of Mary Cameron, who departed this life July 2<sup>nd</sup> 1802, aged 8 years, 2 months, 21 days."
- 2. "Sacred to the memory of Henrietta Horsford who departed this life 17<sup>th</sup> March [rest illegible]."
- 3. "Here lies the body of Mary Darby who departed this life June [rest illegible]."

Standing up in the pasture about 150 yards from the little graveyard in which the above stones, and perhaps six or eight more, stand or lie, is one stone marked: "My Elizabeth dep. May 12<sup>th</sup> 1805." The inscription is quite clear. The stone faces the north-east, so that it may not have been the grave of a human being, but that of a slave, or possibly of an animal.

### WILLIAMS (I., 192).

As regards the Williams of Williams Farm, the W. W. on the old mill was William Williams, son of Joseph Williams. This family sprung from the Old Road Williams family, but was coloured and illegitimate. William Williams' brother was a manager here, and his daughter married a black man, who is well known here to-day in business circles—Mr. S. L. Athill. The last of them left the island years ago and the above lady is dead. The flint-stone windmill was built from money obtained under the "Earthquake Loan" of the forties, but apparently did not remain long in operation. This is why this mill does not appear in either Baker's or Luffman's maps.

# GOLDWIN AND COPPELL OF JAMAICA.

A Tho. Goldwin was M. of A. for Clarendon in 1787 (Feurtado). He appears to have retired to England, where he purchased an estate called Vicars Hill in Boldre, Hampshire. Here his wife Elizabeth was buried 27 December 1808, aged 47, and he on 23 October 1809, aged 60, s.p. His will was made 23 January and proved 16 November 1809 (822, Loveday), and in it he names his sister Lucy Breton and her ten children, niece Maria Hardy, niece Eliza Ann Burrard,

sister-in-law Susanna Coppell, cousin Louisa Aldridge, nieces Caroline and Eliz. Shickle, and refers to a conveyance by Eliz. Martha Pickering, late of Rickmansworth and formerly of Jamaica, dated 2 April 1787, to him of 65 slaves. The late Goldwin Smith's mother, Eliz. Breton, was a daughter of the above Lucy Breton. The Rev. Sir George Burrard, third Bart. (1769–1856) married firstly, on 1 September 1804, Eliz. Anne, daughter and heir of Wm. Coppell of Jamaica, and by her (who died 11 April 1815) had an only surviving child, George, the fourth Bart.

1814 Jan. At her son-in-law's, Rev. G. Burrard, Yarmouth, I. of W., Mrs. Cappell [sic], widow of Wm. C. esq. of J. ("G.M.," 99). A Tho. Goldwin of Burnham, co. Bucks, had a son Edw. (1735-1821) and a son Tho. Is the parentage of Tho. Goldwin of Jamaica known? Further information is desired about the above families.

# THE SETTLEMENT OF JAMAICA (ante, p. 45).

In pursuance of this subject it may be noted that in 1664 this Island was reinforced by Governor Sir Tho. Modyford with 1,000 Barbadians. The army during the first few years of occupation had mostly died off from intemperance, had neglected planting, and the military government had ceased in 1660.

On 27 February the King's Instructions were drawn up for Col. Edw. Morgan as Deputy-Governor of Jamaica to embark in the *Westergate* for Barbados, to hand over there a "black box" containing Commissions and Instructions and a purse of £3,000 to Colonel Sir Tho. Modyford, the new Governor of Jamaica. Lord Willoughby was also ordered to pay over £1,000 in sugars and give all possible assistance.

The Westergate arrived on 21 April, a "malign distemper" having carried off thirty of her passengers. Colonel Morgan was instructed on 2 May to sail at once with several scores of planters for Jamaica.

Sir Thomas followed a few days later, arriving about 1 June with 987 persons, in the *Westergate*, Captain Stokes, *Marmaduke*, and *Swallow*. It would be very interesting to learn the names of the above settlers from Barbados. Unfortunately the State Papers don't give them, but the Book of Patents at Jamaica should record the names of all those who took out grants of land.

Is this book still preserved, and what is the earliest dated patent it contains?

The years of that period in which the seventh of July fell on Thursday were 1743 and 1748 according to the Old Style calendar, and 1757 according to the New Style, but it seems impossible to fix the year of the festivities described with certainty.

As to the authorship of the quaint and fascinating verses, it has been suggested that the initials W. S. were those of William Shirley, the well-known Massachusetts Bay governor of the time, but they might equally well have been those of his nephew Washington Shirley, of His Majesty's Navy. Indeed, much more likely is it that the naval officer would have been attending social festivities at Antigua than that the New England governor would have done so. While it is true that the initial letters fit these names, it is unlikely that the real name of the author is divulged by them. The authorship of the poem has been ascribed in all seriousness to Rev. Charles Chauncy of Boston; but it is unfair to suppose a sedate, pious and orthodox minister of New England to have been guilty of such racy and amorous verses "after seeing the Assembly" of dancers in Antigua and Boston.

The deaths of four Governors in five years would lead one to suspect that yellow fever or some other virulent disease had become endemic owing to mosquitoes (as we now know).

#### HAYNES OF BARBADOS.\*

A short history of this family has just been published, which makes a very welcome addition to our scant West Indian genealogies. The first portion com-prises the notes made by General Robert Haynes (1769-1851). These consist of memoranda relating to his family, interspersed with bits of local history, and are very interesting and valuable. The second portion contains a genealogy sent by an American gentleman, but this is so full of incorrect dates and other errors as to be quite unreliable.

The pedigree of the family can be proved from Richard Haynes of Newcastle in St. John's Parish, who was there married to Elvy Thorne on 30 July 1718. A certain John Haynes, Constable of that parish in 1661 and Surveyor of Roads 1671, is supposed to be identical with one of those names, formerly of Barbados, then of New York, merchant, born 1639, who died 9 December 1689, and in his will, dated 24 August 1689, named his wife Eliz., his son John, then at Barbados, and his son Andrew, also his brother Robert Haynes in Barbados. This Robert was presumably identical with the man of those names who was sidesman of St. John's 1683-4, Surveyor of Roads 1684-8, and of the Vestry in 1695. The above-mentioned Richard was probably descended from one of these two brothers John and Robert, but search will be necessary to establish this.

The parish register of St. John's commences-Marriages from 16 August 1657, Burials from 10 August 1657, and several entries are given from these, but no Baptisms. Let us hope that when further data have been secured, and abstracts of wills and indentures made from the Registrar's Office at Bridgetown, a revised and fuller edition, with a tabular pedigree, may be published.

#### WEBB OF JAMAICA.

A family of Webb from the Hundreds of Keynsham and Chew Magna, co. Somerset, held estates in Jamaica during the latter part of the eighteenth century. (See query by John R. Webb, 2 Vernon Place, Birkenhead, in "Som. and Dorset Notes and Queries," i., 112.)

Granted to Ralph Payne of St. Mary le Bone in Middlesex, 1770. (Rowlandson's Heraldry.)

Ralph Payne was the eldest son and heir of Ralph Payne, Chief Justice of St. Kitts, by his first wife Alice, only daughter and eventual heiress of Colonel Francis Carlile of Antigua. He is stated ("D.N.B.") to have been born at St. George's, Basseterre, St. Kitts, on 19 March 1737-8 or 1738-9. In 1753, being then under age, he joined with his father in the settlement of certain plantations. After being educated in England (he was not at Oxford) he returned to St. Kitts, when he was elected a Member of the Assembly and chosen Speaker. In 1762 he returned to England and made the tour of Europe, and about December of this year or January 1763 his father died. On 1 September 1767 he married, at St. George's, Hanover Square, Françoise Lambertine, daughter of the late Frederick Maximilian (the "D.N.B." calls him Henry) Baron Kolbel of Saxony, a General in the Imperial Service. She had come over in the household of the Princess Poniatowski, sister to the King of Poland. In 1768 he was residing in Queen Anne Street, Cavendish Square, and was returned to Parliament for Shaftesbury, sitting until 1771. On 18 February 1771 he was created a K.B., and in May his commission was issued as Governor-General of the Leeward Islands, a post worth some £4,000 sterling a year. He arrived at Antigua on 1 February 1772. On 23 March 1775 the Legislature voted £1000 c. for a VOL. II.

sword for presentation to him. He retired to England before July of this year, and on 17 February 1776 wrote from his house in Charles Street resigning his office of Governor-General. He was Clerk of the Board of Green-Cloth 1777— 1782, and re-entered Parliament, sitting as member for Camelford November 1776—1780, and Plympton 1780—1784. He was a Whig and supporter of Fox, and entertained lavishly at his house in Grafton Street. In 1788 he went for a lengthy tour on the Continent. In 1793 he joined Pitt's party. On 1 October 1795 he was created Baron Lavington of Ireland. From 21 October 1795 to 1799 he sat for Woodstock. In February 1799 he was re-appointed Governor-General of the Leeward Islands, and on 30 October made a Privy Councillor. He arrived at Antigua 12 February 1801 and resided there until his death on 3 August 1807, aged 68. He was buried on 4 August in his garden on his plantation "Carliles." A magnificent marble monument was erected to his memory by the Legislature in St. John's Church at a cost of 1,000 guineas, which was thrown down by the earthquake in 1843, only the portion with the M.I. remaining. Lady Lavington was voted £300 a year for her life, and died in Hampton Court Palace on 2 May 1830. (See "D.N.B." and "Antigua," vols. i. and iii.)

# Sir Thomas Lynch, Governor of Jamaica.

"The Lynch family was possessed of a small estate called Grove, in the parish of Staple in the county of Kent. They were of some antiquity, for arms were confirmed to them in 1572. Theophilus Lynch, bapt. 1603, appears to have married the dau. and h. of .... Rixton of Rixton Hall, in the village of Great Sankey in the parish of Prescot in Lancashire, whose pedigree was entered in the Herald's Visitation of that county. 'Hall Whittle,' an ancient building supposed to have been the seat of the family of Sankey, was subsequently occupied by the Rixtons of Sankey, who were seated here in the sixteenth century, and is now the property of Lord Lilford." (Baines's "Lancashire," edited by Croston, v., 33.)

No entries relating to the family of Theophilus Lynch could be found in the Prescot parish register; but from Warrington (the nearest church to Sankey) the parish clerk sent me the three following, though he could not discover the marriage :-

1654, Dec. 12. Thomas Lynch, eldest son of Theophilus Lynch of Great Sankey, co. Lancaster, gent. (Foster's "Gray's Inn Admissions." 269.) He is supposed to have been an officer in the Expedition to Jamaica in 1654-5,

1664, Oct. Sir Chas. Lyttelton writes that he left the Government in the Council, who chose Col. Lynch President, whom he also appointed commander of the forces and judge of the courts. 238.

1665, Feb. 12. Lt.-Col. Tho. Lynch writes that the Governor has discharged him from his Council and office of Chief Justice. It only constrains Lynch's return and prevents the resolution he had to marry, send for his relations, and make this his England. Starts to-morrow towards New England. Intends in Spain to obtain permission to buy cattle in Cuba. Though 10 years of sufferings and hazards have endeared the Island (of J.) to him, yet resolves never to return. 277.

From 1665 to 1670 Col. Tho. Lynch apparently resided in England, and Le Neve thus records his knighthood :---

"Lanc. Sr Тномая Lynch of Rixton hall in Great Sonkey Governor of Jamaica knighted at Whitehall 3 December 1670." (Le Neve's "Knights," 243.)

A week or so later followed his marriage with Vere, daughter of Lady Herbert of Weybridge in Surrey and of the late Sir Edward Herbert (miscalled "George" in the "D.N.B."), who had been Attorney-General in the reign of Charles I., and died in 1657.

1670-1, Jan. 5. Having been this day commissioned by the King as Lieut.-Governor he returned to Jamaica with his wife and family, arriving on June 25.

1671, Nov. 29. Sir Thomas wrote "that his wife was brought to bed of a son (Charles) five weeks ago." ("America and W.I.," 277.)

In Blome's "History of Jamaica" is a map of the Island engraved in 1671, with a shield of "S<sup>r</sup> Thomas Lynch knight, present Governour of y<sup>e</sup> Isle," bearing these arms: Quarterly, 1 and 4, three lynxes rampant (for LYNCH); 2 and 3, on a bend three covered cups (for his mother, an heiress of Rixton of Rixton Hall). Sir Thomas was recalled by the King's letter of 20 November 1674, Lord Vaughan having been appointed Governor and Capt.-General by patent of the previous April 3rd.

1675. On March 7 he handed over the government to Sir Henry Morgan lately constituted Lieut.-Gov., Lord Vaughan taking over supreme command on his landing on the 13th. ("America and W.I.," 182-4.)

After settling all his accounts he left in May for England, where he took up his residence at his house in Leicester Fields. He was for the next year often called before the Lords of Trade and Plantations to give information about the Colony.

In 1679-80 he purchased the manor of Esher, a few miles from Lady Herbert's home at Weybridge.

1681. His commission as Capt.-General, Vice-Admiral, & Governor-in-Chief was drawn up on Aug. 6, & he sailed about the end of the year. After being over 16 weeks windbound he quitted Madeira on 6 April 1682, leaving his wife behind at that place in a dying condition, and arrived at his seat of government on June 14. ("America and W.I.," 99, 246.)

Lady Lynch probably returned from Madeira to Esher, as she was buried there on Sept. 30.

Sir Thomas shortly afterwards married (evidently in Jamaica) Mary, dau. and coh. of Tho. Temple of Frankton in Warwickshire (Le Neve's "Knights," 243), whose sister Anne had married in 1666 Sir Chas. Lyttelton of Jamaica.

On 25 Feb. 1684 Major Peter Beckford was described as Sir Tho. Lynch's nephew. ("America and W.I.," 590.)

1684. Col. Hender Molesworth wrote home on Aug. 30: "Sir Thomas Lynch died on the 24<sup>th</sup> instant." (*Ibid.*, 681.)

He was buried under a black marble slab in St. Catharine's Church,\* one of seven slabs lying on the floor of the chancel within the communion rails, on which were his arms, *three lynxes rampant*, and crest, *a lynx statant*, and this inscription :--

#### "Here lyes Sir THOMAS LYNCH in Peace, at Ease, & Blest Would you know more, the World will speak ye Rest."

## (Roby, 17; Archer, 58.)


He was an able upright Governor and endeavoured to suppress piracy and privateering, which in their various forms were much encouraged by certain persons, who derived large profits from the sale of captures at Port Royal. That he was honest is proved by his dying so short of ready money, that his widow was compelled to borrow £500 for the expences of his funeral. ("America and W.I.," 722.)

The charges of embezzlement his enemies brought against him after his death were apparently groundless or trivial.

Lady Lynch, who was but eighteen at the death of Sir Thomas, retired to England, where she remarried, 12 Feb. 1688-9, Col. Hender Molesworth, her late husband's great friend, for whom Sir Thomas had obtained the office of Lieut.-Governor, and who as such carried on the government after his death. (See pedigree of Molesworth in Vivian's "Visitation of Cornwall," i., 327, and Collins's "Baronetage," iv., 29.)

<sup>\*</sup> The following extract is from a letter of Mr. Frank Cundall to the Editor, dated 14 Sept. 1909: "The tablets in the Cathedral did not, I think, suffer from the recent Earthquake. With regard to Sir Thomas Lynch, Mr. Judah writes to me from Spanish Town: 'Sir Thomas Lynch was buried 25th August 1684 in the Parish Church of St. Catherine. It is safe to presume that he died the previous day.' His tombstone was evidently in the Church in Lawrence Archer's time, but when they enlarged the church some time later, the Goths put it outside the north wall of the chancel, where it now is." On 22 Sept. 1909 he writes: "I now send you the exact wording of the entry of Sir Thomas Lynch's burial :--

#### ESHER, CO. SURREY. (Noted 14 July 1909.)

Lady Lynch's monument is on the north wall of the chancel of the old disused Church, and consists of a large painted and framed wooden panel, representing a handsome marble monument of various colours in the classical style, surmounted in the centre by a shield of nine quarterings, flanked by two crests, one above either column.

CREST on the dexter side.—A falcon close holding in its dexter claw a belt (COTTON). CREST on the sinister side.—Seven arrows banded.

This name is "Clegg," but close at hand on the same wall is a tablet, with impaled shield of arms, to S' Will. Glegg, K<sup>t</sup>, who died 9 Jan. 1706, and to Eliz. his wife (dau. of Sir Rob. Cotton, Bart., by Esther his wife). Vere, Lady Lynch, was buried here 30 Sept. 1682. The Manor of Esher was sold by Philip Doughty in 1679-80 to Sir Tho. Lynch, who held his first court 26 April 1680. He died before 1685. Philadelphia and Tho. Cotton held a court 12 Dec. 1689 and sold the estate later to John Latton. Charles Herbert as Guardian to Philadelphia Lynch presented in 1689, and Tho. Cotton and Philadelphia his wife in 1699. (Manning and Bray, ii., 754.)

Five Shillings to the CLERK and the rest to the Poor of the said Parish. Four Acres Two Roods and Twenty-one Perches of Land in a certain Common Field called the Great Clay towards the repairs of the Church.

## HAUGHTON TO COTTON.

This Indenture made the 27 Sept. 1693 between Valentine Haughton of the parish of S<sup>t</sup> Maryes in the I. of Jamaica Esq<sup>r</sup> of the one part & Edward Broughton of ditto Esq. Guardian to Tho. Cotton Esq. & Philadelphia his wife sole dau. & h. of Sr Tho. Lynch late of J. Knt deceased of the other part. WHEREAS by agreement of 2 Nov. 1682 it was agreed that Sr Tho. Lynch & Val. Haughton should be partners for 12 years & V. Haughton covenanted to invest in Sr Tho. the freehold of a moiety of 1000 acres in the parish of St Maryes on which he (V. H.) lived & with the moiety of 31 negroes with their pickaninges 6 cows & 4 horses with the planted land & houses worke doggs tooles etc. except the then crop of cotton & ginger & 2 negro women & a mollata girl & 40 acres which V. H. had invested John Applegate &  $W^m$  Farrer with in consideration whereof Sr Tho. agreed to place on the plantacon 31 good negroes & pay £500 st. for necessaries £100 whereof to be for buying in England 5 coppers & 1 still & convey to V. H. the moiety of 1000 acres in St Maryes called Jennyesland & to build another sugar work & V. H. by his deed poll of 26 June 35 Chas. 2<sup>d</sup> confirmed to S<sup>r</sup> Tho. a moiety of 1000 a. bounding N. on Doctor Fulke Rose & Lieut. Tho. Martin, E. on Anthony Collyer Esq., S. on Cha. Atkinson & W. on Mr Edwd Broughton & Mr Nich. Phillpott granted by patent of 24 June 26 Chas. 2<sup>d</sup> also the  $\frac{1}{2}$  of 14 negroe men & 13 women & V. H. hath given no accompt until Ed. B. brought an action of ejectment when it was ordered by the Court in Nov. last that all accompts sh<sup>d</sup> be adjusted by Fulke Rose Esq. chosen by Ed. B., Chas. Boutcher Esq. by V. H. & John Wallters by the Court & they found that V. H. was indebted in £689 c. & 1/2 his Crawle land & £6. 6. 10 costs of the suit & £155 c. for the moiety of negroes sold to him by E. B. & 5 for costs of a former suit now V. H. in consideration of the total of £855 due to the Cottons conveys to Ed. B. for them his  $\frac{1}{2}$  of said 1000 a, the other  $\frac{1}{2}$  whereof was conveyed to Sr Tho. Guesse, S. on unsurveyed woodland & Little Slippery River & W. on Tho. Guesse, Geo. Frye & unsurveyed land which s<sup>d</sup>  $\frac{1}{2}$  was granted by S<sup>r</sup> T. L. also  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the 40 a. & his share of negroes &c. but if V. H. repay the £855 with interest on 1 Oct. 1695 this deed shall be void.

## Remonstrance of Antiguans.

The following interesting narrative was deposited by the Society of Friends in the P.R.O. in 1909.

There were in 1666 only four Quaker families in Antigua, of whom were Jonas Langford, who contributed to Besse's "Sufferings of the Quakers" the Antiguan section, and Capt. Sam. Winthrop. One of these two may have sent the paper to London. They were, however, both highly educated, and the spelling throughout is execrable, but Mr. G. Fothergill has had it copied verbatim and without alteration. Portions of the record are also illegible or destroyed.

And next Morrouning at break of day, discovering the Enimies approch drew up to the top of the hill, to which the said enimie advancing our front fired ones upon them, the rest creying out they had no ammonition, faced about & fled . . . . Lt. Coll. Bayers, except some few, with the Governor which gott into the said Muggs house here after a little resistance, they were all taken prisoners & caryed aboard their . . . . five . . . . night the said . . . . where scattered . . . . to gether with some supply for the adjacient division, made head Lt. Coll. Bayers sceeping out continuall scouts on horse back to observe the enimies motion Lt. Coll. G . . . t\*

being chosen to command by whose order the barbaddian soldyers about seven files, with sone of our Ilanders, where sent to beat up the enimies quarters who marched farr as the said Muggs & could not be persuaded to proceed any further, but to the great discouradgment of our Ilanders, retreated back again to the said Bayers house. The next Morrowining our scouts gave notice of the enemies advancing to the East side of the said Muggs house where they made a hault about an hour sending parties about to discover, in any ambush where laid for them, butt finding none (four our small number, & the people's adversness would not permitt) it they marcht on into the said Bayers pasture & there draw up some two Musquet shott from the house sending a trumpeter with a note from Coll. Carden, then prisoner with the Lt. genl. protection, to his wife, for her selfe, family & goods. The said specifieing their civil uses to himselfe & the rest of the prisoners & the enemies resolusion to reduce the Iland. And as they have since avered a summons which if the paper was not delivered, if by verball not understood the Messengers being dismist with thanks for their cevillyties to our prisoners & one promised to use the like to theirs, when any should fall into their hands, they prestly fitted their selves for the assault being .... besides the Marquis the tendant & many other persons of qualtie And use for our defence, nott being two hundred men placed at the foot of the hill behinde the states. The dispute was very sharpe for half an hour, when the enemie much gnaled with our shott ran violently on & broake their passages through upon our men, who were thereby forced to retreat up the Hill in which retreat many of them where slaine & wounded. The enemies presuit being very hot, most were forced to fley into the fields, the others recovered the house, where they made what resistance they could but being overpowered most of them killed & wounded, the rest yeelded upon quarter & where carried away prisoners aboard the ships amongst whom was Lt. Coll. Charles Ghest despreatly wounded, the house they ransacked, plundered & sett on fire with all the building mill bayling house c . . . house with the sugar therin & all other edifices. Having then finished their distruction in this place they returned to Five Ilands & in their way burnt the storehouse of the said Bayer, at the lea side being full of sugar as also all the said Muggs Sugar worke, carrying away his coppers, cases, etc. The major part of them that escaped repaired to Capt. Winthrops, as a place fitt to make head again, where they continued that night expecting the enemies. And the next day more comeing in made up the number near two hundred men, of which were seaven files of the Barbadians, who after they were . . . . with powder . . . . they would obey none but when they . . . . having . . . . Col. Bastian . . . . to be their comander they were persuaded to keep in body & things were orderd as well as the time would permitt. About nine our scouts brought in a trumpeter with this summons.

The lord the labare Lt. Generill of the most Christian King in the West Indians.

Wee make known to the Inhabitance of this Iland Antigua that if the next Theirsday noone they shall nott submitt them selves to the obedience of the King of France, we will distroy by fire the whole Iland & will not give quarter to any person yett promissing favourable & advantageous dealing if they will treat with us.

Done in the Road in Antigua 7 Nov. new stile 1666.

#### Le frbare de la bare.

Very few of the Officers etc. gentlemen of the country where present when these summons was brought being with the Compannies at the figgties in their way towards that party at Capt. Winthrops therefore it was thought fitt to defarr an answer till they would be conveyed, the public interest debated & general result concluded & to that purpose the trumpter was dispatched with the message.

My Lord.

Wee have received your summons & in regard other persons in remote parts of the Island equally concerned with us in that bussiness we will communicate with them about it & return our answer to your lordship by a messenger of our owne, against the time prefixed, in the intrim we are

29 Oct. 1666. The next day the Commanders, officers, & deputies of most of the devisions with some other gentlemen mett at the house of Mr. Henry Meyer, & haveing taken into consideration the enemies strength as is menconed in the begining, his resolution which was to burne & destroy without quarter, his couradge, which are men sufficiently prooved in the last conflict, his advantage haveing ships & boats constantly out to land where they pleased, without tyring or hasarding his men. Good armes & anmonition enough & on the other side our weaknesse, the whole Iland not being able to raise sufficent force to withstand so potent an enimie the impossibillity of following him to such places, as he might land at but that he might burn kill & distroy without resistance, not powder enough, in the whole Iland to hold a considerable dispute or engagement with them firm, & after that noe hope of relieve nor place of safty to retreat to, except the cold & wett mountaines, the maney distractions & confusions amongst our selves, several openly declaring they would oppose the enimie noe more but would goe & make their owne condition if the officers would nott .... running away to the enimie & carrying with them .... lastly .... our old .... enimie\* .... lay ready to burn & destroy upon the Northside which six days after wee found by whofull experience for upon the fifth of November they fell upon my Lord Willoughbies plantation & killed his people, carried away all that was portable for their use & most of his slaves, burnt all his houses & sugar workes downe to the ground doeing the like to Mr. Joseph Hodgskin & others.

Some people killed by them in the paths to the .... as women & children caryd with them into slavery.

The foresight of these our misserys, which as to man are unavoidable added to the . . . distruction seen & felt two days before left us without hope of resisting the present enemie & therefore concluded it better in the sight of God & man to surrender upon articles for the preserving of the lives & as far as we could the estates of the Kings subjects then to loose both through an mindicious obsistance & thereupon, this folling answer was sent to the said Lt. General.

Right honorable.

Wee have received yours of the seaventh of November new stile which is some thing short to us not knowing of a former summons which is specified by your trumpter & by some . . . . of the gentlemen yor prisoners which wee supposed was altogether unknowne to them as . . . to us & therefore desire yor honor not to mistake the intention of our civellyties, nor to beleive that we shall omitt any respects to your civell perposalles, we shall therefore humbly desire (the time you limited being two short) that you will be pleased to appoint some, convienent time & place at your . . . with your honour or commissioners for as we resolved with Gods assistance nott to forfeit our alleadginience to our prince, by delivering up his . . . . session basley so we shall not be injurious to our selfes nor render our actiones so comtemptious to . . . . men of reason as not to accept what shall be moderate between . . . & likewise to advoid the effusion of blood which may happen, thus humbly desireing yor civel construction of what mistakes have passed, we subscribe our selves, dated 29 Oct. 1666.

This answer being sent upon the aforesaid conclussion the 29 Oct. by a messenger of our owne, the said Lt. Generall returned us the same day, by the same messenger this ensueing reply.

#### Gentlemen.

Wee have received yor writing of this day delivered to us by yor deputie we wish that you ... of agreeing with us which would have procured a great deal of ... shed on your side & . . . of hour goods, we are resolved to send you considerable persons on our part, with fit power to .... with you which are to come to the ... it will not be to the dishonor of your .... to put your estates & lives under protection ... he doth not furnish you to resist the armes of our King. And although you bee enimies we should not advise you to leave his obedience, if we had not power in our hands to enforce you to it .... very playnly persuade you, that wee wish to have uppertunity to make our taske the ordinary cevillity & curtisies of our Nation, of which I assure you, singor servant,

Whereupon the next morouning Commissioners for the said treaty were agreed upon & impowered by the subscribers to the following Commission under their hand & seales.

By the Commanders officers & deputies for several divissions of this Iland Antigua.

Whereas the lord le Fabure de la bare Le Generall to the King of France, arived at the Iland the 25 day of this instant with a fleet of Shipping & forces from the said King for the removeing of the said Iland, to the obedience of the King of France & having made severall attempts of hostitlities against the same, did upon the 28 instance by a trumpter send a summons for the surrendering the said Iland, which being answered, a treaty concluded did by consent appoint by his reply of the 29 instant a meeting of Commissioners of both partyes at St. Johns harbour the 30 instant, then & there to treat . . . . the said summons & surrender these are therefore to authorise & empower you Coll. John Boncol Lt. Col. Bastian Bayer, Capt. Joseph Lee, Capt. Samuel Winthrop, Capt. Phillip Warner & Mr. James Hollyday to repair to the said harbour at the said time, then & there to treat, with the said Commissioners p'posalls & articles of surrender (if you shall think fitt to make) & every other imargencie, that may happen to discuss & conclude for the surrender of the said Iland as you in your judgments shall think most beneficiall for the people of the same Iland as also you are hereby further authorised upon your dislike of the said treaty nott receaving such satis-faction as may suite the interest of the inhabitants the said treaty. And what you act & doe in the same we doe hereby promise to ratifie & confirm. In teste-monie whereof we have here unto set our hands & seales in the said Iland. The thirtieth day of October 1666 Richard Burriston, Richard Ayres, Henry Nicholls, John Fry, Gilbert Gregorie, Thomas Longdon, John Noye, Obidiah Bradshaw, Jeremie Watkins, Walter Levens, Harvy Kaynell, Thomas Taylor, James Hill, Richard Browne, William Proctor, Clemine Everard.

So many have been our affections that amongst the many spoiles destructions & invasions of the Enimies wee had almost forgotten to rehearse how that the same time they assauted us at Lt. Col. Bayers they made an inroad upon Bermudian Vally & the Creeke burning & distroying as they went.

31 Oct. 1666. Wee are come now to the last day of the month & the first of the treaty in which our Commissioners repaired to the place appointed where . . . .

little strip severall sloops .... on board where was mons. d Clederip\* Governor of Martin & the intendant Mon. Le Chambre Commissiners on the French part. This day was spent without finishing the articles they standing upon hard tearmes with us, the treaty adjoined till next day aboard the Admirall where both parties mett & after long debate concluded the articles of surrender, which were ractified by the Lt. Generall of the French on the part, & by the commanders officers deputies & other gentlimen inhabitance of this Iland on our part in which wee doubt not all judicious & unaturial man well perceive a greater care have been taken to preserve our alleagianer to our King then any perticular interest of his subjects. Having made what defence possibly could be expected from so weake a Collony laying desperate so far a sunder & three devissions being almost destroyed by the French already, the others expecting hourly to receive the like assaults & to be ruined by fire & sword, had we not harkened to the purposall of a treaty, besides that we were certainly enforced, that the enemies resolution was not to depart without reduceing the Iland, for so many reasons of honor, being engaged therin, & therefore at the beginning had despatch a ship, for more men, to finish their work when in the meane time they should have fired & distroyed round the Iland near the sea by which we should have been forced to fly into the Mountaines there to perish by cold & famine or to the lower woods to bee murthered by the bloody Indians of all which the Enimies intention we had sufficient intelligence from the French boy taken prisoner at the beginning & afterwards confirmed by some of our owne prisoners so that could we have seen the possibillity of defending the place against these two eneimies at ones wee should not have . . Antigua the ninth November 1666.

#### POSTSCRIPT.

Octob.—Forasmuch as the Barbadian Souldiers (taking advantage of the departure of the French Fleet from this Iland) have endeavoured by letters & otherwise to make the world beleive there valor & resolutions had frighted them away & so boast themselves P'servers of the said Iland it is thought convenient to add this small postscript to the foregoing remonstane yt those who desire a true information thought the matter be never so deformed rather then lyes & falsehood of the most amiable complexon may receive a just account of those people & their carriadge, The day of ye engagement at Lt. Col. Bayars being Saterday the twenty seaventh day of the month wear present about seaven files of them under the command of Auntient Wall who was slaine in the fight & by whose encouragment they partly regained their lost reputation the night before when they refused to beat up the enemys quarters notwithstanding they had beged that employment & soe prevened others that would have done it the Evening of the same day (after ye defeat aforesaid) they got together to Capt. Winthope remained there that night & then began to declare that they .... obey no officer but whome they pleased. The next morning amuivion was ginen then two .... for their share . . . . which not being contented they fell to killing hogg & sheepe etc. together with other rude people by their ensample untill they had destroyed that day eleaven hoggs thirty sheep forty odd turkys besides duckes & dunghill foule many of which weare eues with two & three lambs in there bellys when one they had killed was not to their minde they threw it to the Barricadoe & killed another, the 29 the day they seperated themselves from ye rest of ye company & marched away to Mr. Struys his house whear came & one Ensigne Will Lea & most of the

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rest of the Barbadians, the said Lea repaired to the gentlemen of the country that were met at Mr. Mayers to concider whether the Island was in a condition to oppose the enemy or whether they should condescend to treaty it was found neccesary to treat an answer to the said summons was drawne for a treaty & signed by the subscribes of whom the said Lea was one & soe returning to the Barbadian soldier at said Struys his house ye next three days whilst ye bisiness was in action the said Lea & his party haveing gotten possession of three butts of rumm drew all loose people to them that would come elected the said Lea to be their Commander in Chief & in the .... sanding partys aboard to yr neighbours for to bring in their stock to feed them extolled their own couradge & the officers which they had made refuseing to obey their own Captain John Codrington or to agree to any thing the Commissinors of the treaty had done publishing their supposed resolutions to fight it out to the last man but at the time they kept close to ye Buts of rumm at least nine miles from the enemy haveing thus spent five days (Victualls growing scase & the said Struys complaining much of their abuse as by his letter to the Commissioners knowing ye said Commissioners weare at one Captain Kaynall a place secure enough being about six miles distant from the enemy & well furnished with hoggs sheep & cattle they marched up thither under pretence to seaze on ye said Commissioners noe sooner came they thither but that they killed all that they could come at being by the said Kaynells return two & twenty hoggs sheepe besides foules so abominable was their speile in that place that six files of the Islanders who the strength of ye rumm & their vaine glorious boasting had carryed with them thither weare disarmed of their design which only to plunder & destroy & soe left them the next morning being the fourth day of November the said .... sent a small party down the hill to burn Lt. . . . . Guests houses he being a prisoner as in then . . . . mortaly wonded & to bring what cattle they could get from there or from Lt. Col. Bayers the order was put in execution the curing houses & the negro houses . . . . order of the enemy which the said Lea & one Joseph Richardson his councell & Mr. Taylor one of his Captains when the people of the house was reported to be asleepe broke open & carried away everything of value theirin not leaveing him a shirt to weare more than he had on his back in reward of his serving against the enemy the weeke before the same day about ten of the clock the French fleet set saile whether beaten away by these people who except the party of seaven file as aforementioned never saw the enemy nor came within six miles of them but constantly kept themselves as far from them as they could let the impartel judge or whether affaires of more concernement called them away leaving this to further leasure or whether the overuling hand of ye Almighty God who maiketh ware & createth peace hath done this let the wise in hart consider.

# Blackman of Antigua and Barbados.

The following list is written on a double sheet of folio paper, bearing "G.R." on the water-mark. It is unfortunately not signed nor dated, but it was probably drawn up by Rowland Blackman in or soon after 1726, when settling his late father's affairs.

The deeds relate to the Blackmans' plantations in Antigua and Barbados, both called "*Mount Lucie*," which had descended to them by marriage from the family of Messrs. Lucie, who were wealthy Anglo-Dutch merchants, with extensive dealings in the West Indies during the seventeenth century.

# Gymballs and Cherry Garden Estates in the Parish of St. Dorothy, Jamaica, 1783.

## LANE v. MAY AND OTHERS.

Jamaica. In Chancery. To his Honor Alured Clarke Esq. Lt Gov. and Commander in Chief in Jamaica Chancellor and Vice Admiral. Humbly Complaining.

Your Orators and Oratrixes Abraham Lane of the City of Cork, Ireland, Merchant, Ann Lane otherwise Biggs his wife, and Sarah Creed of the same City widow who were the sisters and next of kin and administratrixes of the estate of Abraham Biggs late of the City of Bristol Merchant deceased who was the surviving Mortgagee named in an Indenture and Ex'or and Residuary Devisee of Tho. Pennington Jr deceased who was the Administrator s. and h. of Tho. Pennington the other Mortgagee named in the Indenture by John Kelly of the Parish of St Thos. in the East co. Surrey and Island aforesaid and Patrick Kein of the Parish of S<sup>t</sup> Mary co. Midd<sup>x</sup> in said I. Esq<sup>es</sup> their Attornies state That by an Indenture of Mortgage dated 24 Oct. 1775 made between the Hon. Rose Herring May late of the Parish of St Cath. co. Middx J. but then at Bath co. Som. and Mary Trelawney his Wife of the one part and Tho. Pennington and Abraham Biggs both of the City of Bristol Merchants of the other it was witnessed that in consideration of £6000 to R. H. May paid he conveyed to them all that one moiety of three parcells of land in the Parish of St Dorothy co. Middx J. containing 520 a. late the property of Benjamin Pusey and Geo. Bonner Esquires deceased, whereon a Plantation or Sugar Work called Gymballs had been settled and which said moiety contained 234 a. and was assigned to Geo. Bonner by virtue of a writ of partition in August Grand Court 1768 issued on a judgment obtained by Bonner against one Pierce Cook all which premises were stated to be sold to Rose Herring May by two Indentures the one dated 21 Feb. 1774 between Cha. Brooks of St Dorothy Esq. and Penelope his wife and Milborough Bonner of the same place spr. the daus. and devisees in the will of Geo. Bonner deceased of the one and R. H. May of the other part and the other Ind're dat. Nov. last past between Tho. Gray of the Parish of Kingston co. Surrey J. Merchant of the 1st part; Tho. Brooks of St Dorothy Esq. and Cha. Brooks and

Bonynge of St Dorothy Esq. of the 3d part; Rebecca Bonner of St D. widow of the 4th; and Rose Herring May of the 5<sup>th</sup> part also all that sugar work in S<sup>t</sup> D. called Cherry Garden containing 206 a. being the other moiety of the said three parcells the 1st part of 169 a. butting S. on Mary Bonner, W. on Coleburns Gully and N.W. on land lately belonging to Martin Wilkins s<sup>d</sup> parcell being part of a lot sold to M. Wilkins and Henry Bonner by Andrese Woodstock and Dennis Kelly Esquires 5 May 1743 containing 112 a. bounding N. on Rob. Bindloss Esq. E. on Jas. Prevost Esq. S. on Hen. Bonner and W. on land formerly of John Gymball late belonging to Hen. Bonner The third parcell containing 239 a. bounding S. on Major Tho. Rose, W. on the remaining part of land formerly belonging to Polintz Byndloss Esq. N. and N.E. part on the Kings road to the Bridge over Black River and part on land of Edmond Kelly Esq. and E. on Black River all which last mentioned premises were sold to R. H. May by two Ind'res dated 21 Dec. last past one whereof was made between John Mead of Kingston Esq. of the one part and R. H. May of the other. And the other Indenture made between David Chambers of the one part and R. H. May of the other And all those Negroes and Mules as in the Schedule houses works mills to hold to the said Tho. Pennington and Ab. Biggs without any bar or incumbrance for ever subject to the provisoe for redemption by the repayment of the £6000 with Interest at six per cent. and the deed was recorded 29 Jan. 1776 and a bond of £12,000 was entered into. But your Orators and Oratrixes have discovered that R. H. May previous to the mortgage became indebted to W<sup>m</sup> Gray of the parish of Kingston J. Esq. in a sum of £19,681 sterling being £27,553 currency and with his said wife entered into 12 bonds and on 20 March 1775 by an Ind're of Mortgage conveyed to W<sup>m</sup> Gray the said two plantations of Gymballs and Cherry Garden and the negroes and cattle as duly recorded in the Secretary's Office and W<sup>m</sup> Gray having occasion for the money assigned to Jacob Israel Bernal of the parish of Kingston J. Merchant the said Bonds and Ind're of Mortgage and J. I. Bernal paid to W<sup>m</sup> Gray the £19,681 and W<sup>m</sup> Gray by an Ind're of Transfer tripartite dated 20 Ap. 1775 between him of the 1st part; R. H. May of the 2d part; and J. I. Bernal of the 3rd part confirmed the plantations to the last named and they are the same in both Mortgages and the prior one was not mentioned in the later one of 24 Oct. 1775 to Pennington and Biggs and by the Act of 1692 the estate is now freed from the Equity of Redemption and by an Act of J. passed in 1731 for the prevention of fraudulent mortgages the offenders are liable to punishment according to the laws of England and forfeit the right of redemption and the said estates became vested in Tho. Pennington the Elder and Ab. Biggs for ever and R. H. May having only proved the first bond J. I. Bernal as of Nov. Grand Court 1777 caused an action in Ejectment to be brought and obtained possession of the estates and on 12 Nov. 1779 exhibited his Bill of Complaint in this Court against R. H. May and Mary Trelawny his wife and Tho. Pennington and Ab. Biggs who were absentees and on 29 Dec. 1780 R. H. May and Mary Trelawney his wife filed their Answer and Tho. Pennington died in 1780 and Ab. Biggs in 1782 and in 1784 J. I. Bernal exhibited his Bill of Revivor against R. H. May and his wife and one Daniel Moore of Kingston gent. as adm'or ad litem to Ab. Biggs and by connivance of May and by some gratuity to him procured a final decree and foreclosure and charged many thousands more against the estate than was bona fide due and Tho. Pennington and Ab. Biggs further advanced £2806 on May's bond and £1641 on a current account amounting on 1 Dec. 1778 to £4647 which with Interest to 1 Dec. 1784 amounted to £6041 and the 9 years Interest on the £6000 was  $\pounds 2880$  making a total of  $\pounds 14.921$  and Tho. Pennington d. intestate in 1780 leaving Ab. Biggs his co-partner surviving and Adm'on in the P.C.C. was granted on 7 Nov. 1780 to Tho. Pennington the Eldest s. and h. at l. and the son soon after died and made his Will on 9 Dec. 1780 and gave all his estate to his friend Ab. Biggs who proved the will in the P.C.C. on 12 Jan. 1781 and on 27 Jan. obtained letters of adm'on De bonis non and d. in 1782 intestate and a bachelor

leaving your Oratrixes Ann Lane and Sarah Creed his sisters next of kin and coheiresses who on 5 Sept. 1782 obtained adm'on and on 1 Jan. 1783 adm'on of Tho. Pennington and demand payment of the £6000 and £4647 with Interest and in Feb. or March last past by a power of attorney empowered John Kelly and Patrick Kein to recover these debts.

Proceedings were fraudulent. Pray that sworn answers may be received. "J. I. Bernal upon the five Books of Moses according to the custom of his Nation" and all accounts produced and payment made to them.

#### MAY v. BERNAL, 1783.

Jamaica. In Chancery. The Hon. Rose Herring May of the Parish of S<sup>t</sup> Dorothy Esq. and Mary Trelawny his wife Complainants and Jacob Israel Bernal and Robert Finlay adm'or of Abraham Biggs Defendants.

The Bill filed 10 March 1783 sets forth that Complainant having become indebted to Wm. Gray of the Parish of Kingston J. Esq. in the sum of £19,681 sterling or £27,553 c. repayable by installments spread over 12 years secured by 12 bonds dated 20 March 1775 with Interest at 6 per cent., etc., and being seized in fee simple of those two plantations of Gymballs and Cherry Garden in the Parish of St Dorothy containing together 520 a. and slaves as a collateral security by a Mortgage of 20 March 1775 conveyed them to Wm. Gray [here follow the names of all the slaves] and on Cherry Garden 44 steers and 16 mules and on Gymballs 32 steers 13 cows 5 calves and 10 mules and W<sup>m</sup> Gray assigned his interest to J. I. Bernal on 20 Ap. 1775 by an Ind're of Transfer of Mortgage tripartite between Gray, May, and Bernal. Complainant being in Bath the following Oct. and considering the mortgage was not above one third the value of the estates borrowed £6000 of Messrs. Tho. Pennington and Ab. Biggs of Bristol Merchants and by Ind'res of lease and release dated 23 and 24 Oct. 1775 he granted to them the said two estates by way of mortgage. That the 1<sup>st</sup> bond was paid off but by reason of the great drought preceding the crop of 1777 the proceeds were reduced from 247 hhds. of sugar to one hhd. and 8 tierces and he could not meet the 2<sup>d</sup> bond so by the Common law the est. of Bernal became absolute but subject in equity to be redeemed pro tanto and Bernal at Nov. Grand Court 1777 brought an action in Ejectment and Replevin and Compl<sup>t</sup> came to an agreement with him on 9 Dec. 1777 [recited in full] by which he was to retain the management of the estates M<sup>r</sup> Bernal was to ship the produce and the whole debt was to be paid off in 7 years but Bernal withheld the necessary supplies so on 6 March 1778 he gave up possession but to retain the management and cultivation. Ever since the management has been refused him and no balance has been paid over and Bernal on 12 Nov. 1779 filed his Bill against Compl<sup>t</sup> and Tho. Pennington and Ab. Biggs stating he had discovered there was

the second mortgage defrauding the latter and that therefore the agreements of 9 Dec. 1777 and 6 March 1778 were not valid and that the accounts might be referred to a Master of this Court and the estates sold and Compl<sup>t</sup> put in his Answer about 29 Dec. 1780. Bernal sailed in May last past for Great Britain and has delayed the suits and has received over and above what was due to him having sold 684 hhds. and 346 puncheons of rum worth £34,000 c. Compl<sup>t</sup> ought to be reinstated and accounts submitted. The non reciting of the first mortgage on the 2<sup>d</sup> one was due to his inadvertence. The £6000 was not half the value of the equity of redemption. Pennington and Biggs not being represented in this I. one Rob<sup>t</sup> Finlay of the parish of S<sup>t</sup> Catharine gent. was granted letters of adm'on to defend this suit. Prays that the Agreement may be carried out.

I have also the Cross Bill of May v. Bernal, filed 10 March 1783. It is very voluminous, on twenty-five huge sheets of paper, and signed by Henry Browne, Geo: C: Ricketts, H: Lewis, and Geo: Wotton Sol<sup>r</sup> for Compl'ts. There are also copies of all the subsequent proceedings to 21 April 1784, when the decree was given.

The will of Abraham Bernal was proved in 1790 (3, Bishop).

In the "D.N.B." are long articles on Ralph Bernal and his son Ralph Bernal-Osborne, from which it appears that :---

Ralph Bernal, Sen., was of Spanish Jewish descent, took his degrees of B.A. from Christ's College, Cambridge, in 1806, and M.A. in 1809, and became a barrister of Lincoln's Inn in 1810. He then inherited a large property in the W. I. and sat in Parliament thirty-four years, dying in Eaton Square on 26 August 1854. His art collection was sold in 1855 for £71,000. He married 1stly Anne Elizabeth, only daughter of Richard Samuel White of New Ormond Street, on 10 April 1806. She died 10 July 1823 in Bryanston Square. He married 2ndly a daughter of Dr. Henry White, R.N., surgeon of Chatham Dockyard, and had issue by both wives.

Ralph Bernal-Osborne, the eldest son by the first wife, born 26 March 1808, was educated at Charterhouse, and matriculated from Trinity Coll., Cambridge, Oct. 1829; entered the Army, and then sat in Parliament from 1841 to 1874. On 20 August 1844 he married, at St. George's, Hanover Square, Catherine Isabella, only child and heir of Sir Thomas Osborne, 9th Bart., whose surname he assumed. She died at his seat Newtown Anner near Clonmell 21 June 1880. He died at Bestwood Lodge 4 January 1882, and was there buried on 10 January. They had issue two daughters, of whom the elder, Edith, married, 7 February 1874, Sir Henry Arthur Blake, G.C.M.G., Governor of the Bahamas and Jamaica; and the younger, Grace, on 3 January 1874, the 10th Duke of St. Albans.

## Answer of Defd<sup>t</sup> J. I. Bernal p<sup>r</sup> Att<sup>y</sup>, 1784.

Jamaica. In Chancery. At H.E. the Chancellor's House on Thursday 15 April 1784.

The Petition of Jacob Israel Bernal Merchant of Kingston but now absent from this I. being read it was ordered that he put in his answer by Aaron Nunes Henriques of Kingston Merchant his Att<sup>ny</sup>.

Annexed is a letter dated 14 April 1778 written by Bernal to R. H. May, saying that "Since my receiving possession of Gymballs and Cherry Garden Estates . . . . it has been discovered that there is another Mortgage upon Record from you to Pennington and Biggs of Bristol," 'and the writer expresses his astonishment that his Mortgage was not mentioned in the second one and states that all right of redemption had been forfeited and was now vested in the second mortgagees and refuses to have any further business transactions.'

This Defendant admits that R. H. May became bound by 12 bonds to W<sup>m</sup> Gray and was seized in fee simple of Gymballs and Cherry Garden and certain slaves and Gray transferred them to him for £19,681 sterling the amount due, and soon after the Complainants left for Great Britain and said they would in Oct. be in Bath and he has no doubt May borrowed the £6000 from Pennington and Biggs. £19,681 was greater than the sum May paid for the estates.

There was a very great Drought preceding the crop of 1777 and only 1 hhd. was made. In 1775 the yield was 109 hhds. and 132 tierces (equal to 88 hhds.) or a total of 197 hhds. and 72 puncheons of rum and in 1776 90 hhds. 70 tierces and 56 pun. and in 1775 there were worked 180 slaves. May neglected the slaves and the reason the 2<sup>d</sup> bond was not paid off was owing to his extravagance and great losses in gaming at Bath and elsewhere—that by insufficient supplies and overwork the slaves in 1777 were reduced by death from 180 in 1775 to 111 and the cattle from 115 to 73, there were no mules left, and May had used his chariot horses to turn the mill and Defd<sup>t</sup> obtained possession to save the estate from ruin.—He never knew of the 2<sup>d</sup> mortgage when he met May and signed an agreement on 9 Dec. 1777. Verily believes May intended to defraud his creditors.... has received the following crops

The nett produce while estate has been in his possession has been £24,537, and he hath laid out £13,809—is ready to come to an account for all his transactions. The debt due to Defd<sup>t</sup> was £19,681 st. or £27,553 c. and the estate was not worth more than £36,000 c. viz.

Defd<sup>t</sup> when in England made inquiry of Mr. Lane and saw the title deeds, and believes May deceived Pennington and Biggs, and Mr. Seager their solicitor drew the 2<sup>d</sup> mortgage and May promised them a consignment of 350 hhds. yearly.

# DRAFT OF BRIEF BY WILDMAN AND SMITH.

1784, April 21. The Cause was heard this day and His Excellency decreed that inasmuch as the Compl<sup>t</sup> Rose Herring May had been hindered from carrying the Agreement into Execution by the means in the Bill stated he should have 6 years and 9 months in addition to the 7 years mentioned that he was entitled to the Equity of Redemption of the Mortgage to Tho. Pennington and Ab. Biggs that Rich<sup>d</sup> Batty Esq. one of the Masters should state an account as from Bernal but not allow him any commission on the gross produce and pay all balance to the Registrar of this Court for the beneficiaries of the est. of Ab. Biggs deceased and that Geo. Cuthbert Esq. the Sequestrator of the estates should let R. H. May have the sole conduct of them.

From the above Order Defd<sup>t</sup> J. I. Bernal received permission to appeal to His Majesty in Council.

Bernal lost his first suit for contempt, and paid the legal costs of Ab. Lane's attornies, amounting to £162, in October and November 1789 to Cockburn and Davis, the Solicitors in Kingston, and £263 for law costs incurred in Jamaica by Grant and Shawe in 1789. £250 was also paid Patrick Kein; £130 to Richard Grant.

Jamaica. This Ind're made the 6 of March 26 Geo. III. 1786 BETWEEN Rose Herring May of the Parish of St. Dorothy Co. of Middlesex in the said I. Esq. and Mary Trelawny his Wife of the 1st part Daniel Moore of the Parish of Kingston Co. Surrey Esq. adm'or of Abraham Biggs late of Bristol Merchant deceased who was the survivor of Tho. Pennington late of the same place Merchant deceased of the 2<sup>d</sup> part Jacob Israel Bernal of the Parish of Kingston Esq. of the 3<sup>d</sup> part and Sam. Dickson of the parish of St. Andrew co. Surrey in the said I. Esq. of the 4<sup>th</sup> part WHEREAS Rose Herring May being indebted to W<sup>m</sup> Gray of Kingston Esq. in £19,681 st. or £27,553 c. to secure the payment thereof about 20 March 1775 executed 12 bonds and by an Ind're of Mortgage dated 20 March 1775 between the Hon. Rose Herring May of the Parish of St. Catherine and Mary Trelawny his wife of the 1 part and Wm. Gray of Kingston Esq. of the other May conveyed to Gray his two plantations called Gymballs and Cherry Garden together of 520 acres and all slaves and stock and by a transfer of 20 April 1775 between Wm. Gray of the 1st part R. H. May of the 2d part and Jacob Israel Bernal of the 3<sup>d</sup> the plantations were conveyed to Bernal and by Lease and Release of 24 Oct. 1775 between R. H. May and wife then of Bath and Tho. Pennington and Ab. Biggs of Bristol Merchants for £6000 st. they conveyed the moiety of 520 a. or 235 a. part of Gymballs and WHEREAS on 12 Nov. 1779 Jacob Israel Bernal exhibited his Bill in Chancery against May and Pennington and Biggs and on 29 Dec. 1780 Defendants put in their Answer and

Tho. Pennington dving a Suggestion was filed 20 Aug. 1782 and on 10 Sep. 1784 Bernal filed a Bill of Revivor and Ab. Biggs had died and on 16 Nov. 1784 Daniel Moore filed his Answer and on 22 July 1785 a decree was made and May was to pay Bernal £26,447 c. with interest and costs and the estates were sold on 1 Feb. 1786 by the Master to James Dickson for £25,000 c. All claims are now discharged. Schedule of slaves 27 men 7 boys 24 women 6 girls 22 invalids 16 mules 50 steers.

### BRISTOL CATHEDRAL.

"F.B.J." stands for "Farley's Bristol Journal."

The Rev. J. Woodward noted in 1867 the following on the west wall of transept, but it could not be found this year :--

"WILLIAM WOOLERY, of Barbadoes, died 1789, aged 48.

ARMS.—... two woolpacks in pale inclosed by two flaunches or, each charged with a ... gules. (The charges and tinctures are indistinct. Burke, in the "General Armory," gives the following arms for the name Wolley, Vert, a fleurde-lis or, between two woolpacks in pale argent inclosed by two flaunches of the third, each charged with a wolf passant azure.)"

\* Oliver Yeamans Ash, baptized 15 Feb. 1749-50 at St. John's, Antigua; was Member of Assembly in 1801, and practising as a King's Counsel in 1807. He was probably identical with the above.

The Bengal Bean you was so good as to send Us in Decr. 1801 has proved a Vast acquisition to these Islands-it is amazingly productive and goes by the name of Sir Joseph Bank's Bean. I sent a few of them to Doct<sup>r</sup> Mitchill at New York who is now propagating them with a prospect of Success. If anything will revive the Spirits of our planters, it will be the encouragement and information you are so good as to afford them.

I am now making a Collection of the Marine Productions of these Islands. If there is anything I can send you from hence that will be Acceptable, I shall take a great pleasure in Complying with your Wishes.

# MANNING OF ST. KITTS (I., 245).

In an article contributed to "The Tablet" of 28 Jan. last, Mr. Percival Lucas gives conclusive evidence proving that the late Cardinal Manning was born in the year 1808, and not in 1807, as stated by Purcell in his "Biography."

# BROOKS OF JAMAICA (II., 51).

Francis Brooks, the sixth son of George Brooks, did not die s.p. He left at least two children, a son William and a daughter Frances. The daughter married in August 1791 John Spence Brodbelt (St. Dorothy Register, vol. i., p. 30), and marriage notice in the "St. Jago Gazette" of 4th August 1791 : "Married. On Monday evening John S. Brodbelt, Esquire, to Miss Frances Brooks, the daughter of Francis Brooks, Esq., deceased." The Brodbelts had a large family, of whom the youngest daughter, Julian Cardonal (1806—1842), married, 1 January 1829, my grandfather William Livingston (1805—1863).

The son William Brooks married a sister of the above John Spence Brodbelt, namely, Frances Virgo Brodbelt, a few days after his sister's marriage. The following is the notice from the "St. Jago Gazette" for 11th August 1791: "Married. On Sunday evening last in this Town William Brooks, Esq., to Miss Frances Virgo Brodbelt, daughter of John Brodbelt, Esquire." There was issue of this marriage two daughters.

This Mrs. Brooks was a great friend of Michael Scott, the author of "Tom Cringle's Log."

# SPOONER OF JAMAICA (I., 1).

I find that there is in the Record Office of this Island an exemplification of the will of John Spooner of St. George, Bloomsbury, co. Middlesex, which will was proved in the P.C.C. 17 January 1758.

By the Records of Deeds in the same Office I find that J. Spooner acquired by purchase from John Cossley and others "Eolus Valley" plantation in the parish of St. David in this Island, and adjoining lands, in July 1744, also "Cambridge" plantation and lands in the same parish. They were very extensive properties.

By a deed of assignment and release he and another obtained from Joseph Hiscox and others certain bonds relating to property in the parish above named in July 1746. And he obtained other lands in St. David from John Brook in July 1752.

By the recitals in this deed of assignment and release it appears that he was a merchant, as his father John Spooner, also of Bloomsbury, was, and both were

connected in business with Mr. Hiscox-his father with the elder Hiscox, and he with the younger.

By the records there appear also administrations in Jamaica of the personal estate of Jane Isabella Spooner of Great Britain, widow, 9 April 1802, and of Hungerford Spooner of Great Britain, Esq., 15 October 1823.

### GOLDWIN AND COPPELL OF JAMAICA (II., 93).

I do not think that Thos. Goldwin had any ancestors in Jamaica, and as there is no will of his recorded here I can make no reference to it in order to obtain information. The first mention of the name of "Goldwin" in any of the records of Jamaica is in a deed of sale of eleven slaves from George Moulton of St. Dorothy, Merchant, to Thomas Goldwin of the same place, Merchant, dated 24 July 1773. He thus evidently must have arrived in the Island with some means, for in 1777 he married Elizabeth, daughter of John Shickle of Clarendon, a large landed proprietor and owner (*inter alia*) of "Danks" or "New Savoy" Sugar Estate and "Shickle's Pastures" in Clarendon. When Shickle died he left Goldwin and William Coppell (who had, before Goldwin's marriage, married another daughter) two of his executors. His personal estate, including slaves (£6000), amounted to nearly £60,000 current money of Jamaica (£36,000 sterling). He died in 1782. By the marriage settlement on his daughter's marriage with Goldwin he settled £5000 on her, Goldwin settling also a like amount. In the marriage settlement Goldwin is described as of Clarendon, Merchant. In 1779 Shickle conveyed to Mrs. Goldwin fourteen slaves as a Deed of Gift.

The second and third Deeds of Records to Goldwin describe him as also of St. Dorothy, Merchant. They are dated respectively 1778 and 1779, and are conveyances to him of 200 acres in Clarendon, and of Mullett Hall, 640 acres, also in Clarendon. Following are four deeds (1779). The first is from Shickle of an estate called Monnsons of 185 acres in Vere. The second and third are supplemental deeds of "Mullett Hall," and the fourth a conveyance to him of Chapman's Hall, 300 acres, in Clarendon. In these he is described as of Clarendon, Merchant. I may mention that in 1776, in a deed of conveyance to him of "Long's Wharf" in Clarendon from Beeston Long, he is described as of St. Dorothy, Merchant, but this deed was not recorded until 1784. After this latter date he acquired properties for himself individually and in conjunction with Wm. Coppell, both of them having become partners and trading in Kingston as merchants, and in all these deeds he is described as of Kingston, Merchant. The partnership between him and Coppell must have commenced in about 1784-5, for in the latter year Mullett Hall was conveyed in trust to the firm, the property having been cleared of the several mortgages on it, which fell into Goldwin's hands. He retired to Great Britain in 1796, for his powers of attorney to Coppell and others are dated in June of that year.

Peter Breton of Kingston married Lucy, sister of Thomas Goldwin, in about 1787-8.

Mrs. Elizabeth Israel Pickering was evidently the mother of Mrs. Coppell and Mrs. Goldwin and of their brother John Hayle Shickle, for John Shickle in his will mentions them as children of Elizabeth Montin or Elizabeth Montin Israel. She must have married after the death of John Shickle.

# THE SETTLEMENT OF JAMAICA (II., 45, 93).

The records of the Patents of Lands granted to the old settlers of Jamaica are all intact. But they are indexed alphabetically in the names of the grantees, so that to get at the dates one has to go through the entire index.

June 12 (Death) The remains of Ensign Mackintosh of the 8th West India Regiment, who died of a wound he received in a duel on the preceding day, near St. Ann's, were interred at St. Michael's Church on Tuesday evening last. ## St. Paul's, Rebis.\*

The late Mrs. Arthur Shand wrote me 27 May 1909: "I got Canon Shepherd's young daughter to go with me to the churchyard, and by scraping off moss, etc., managed to get at the inscriptions. Several of the fine old very large slate slabs are broken up and lying in different parts of the churchyard, and some few gravestones have been used for building purposes. I have been inquiring about private burial-grounds, but there appear to be none here." There are eight tablets in this Church, of which the first four are on the walls

There are eight tablets in this Church, of which the first four are on the walls of the chancel and the remaining four elsewhere. There are also six floor-stones, making, with ten stones in the churchyard, a total of twenty-four memorials.

1. This monument is erected by JOHN TOBIN CROSSE, in memory of MARY CROSSE, his late wife—she departed this transitory life on the 26<sup>th</sup> day of December, in the year of our Lord 1804 & in the 44<sup>th</sup> year of her age. (Six lines omitted.)

2. Near this place are deposited the remains of the Revd: WILLIAM GREEN, late rector of the parishes of St: Paul's Charlestown & St: George's Gingerland, who departed this life on the 26<sup>th</sup> April, 1811, in the 38<sup>th</sup> year of his age. (One line omitted.)

He is not in Fothergill's "List of Emigrant Ministers."

3. Near this sacred monument are deposited the remains of WILLIAM BOWRIN who died on the 19<sup>th</sup> day of December 1816, aged 70 years. And of his affectionate wife JANE BUTLER, who departed this life on the 11<sup>th</sup> of April 1777, at the early age of 30 years (several lines omitted). Likewise the remains of JOICE BUTLER mother to the above JANE, who died on the 22<sup>nd</sup> April 1798, aged 85 years.

This monument is erected by WILLIAM only son of the above WILLIAM & JANE BOWRIN (etc.).

1854, Jan. 1. At St. Kitts, aged 28, Grace-Wilhelmina, only dau. of the l. Wm. Bowrin, esq. of the Paradise Estate, Nevis, and granddau. of Rear-Adm. Gourly, R.N. ("G.M.," 329.) Adm. G. d. 29 Aug. a. 88. (Ibid., 515.)

4. Underneath lie the remains of SARAH CLAXTON, wife of BUTLER CLAXTON deceased, who departed this life May  $4^{\text{th}}$  1813. (Erected by surviving daus.)

By Indenture dated 26 December 1806 Butler Claxton of Nevis, Esq., eldest son and heir of Butler Claxton the elder, late of Nevis, Esq., deceased, and his residuary legatee and sole ex'or, mortgaged for a year to Ed. Protheroe, Ph. Protheroe, and Robert Claxton of England, Merchants, his two plantations in St. John's parish called North Wales and Williams's. The release of 27 Dec. states that Butler Claxton, deceased, and his son, trading as Claxton and Son, owed £5151 to Messrs. Protheroe and Claxton. (Deeds penes General Pemberton.)

This Robert Claxton died 20 June 1812, aged 58. M.I. in the Gaunts Chapel, Bristol.

I think this 52 should be 32. Her husband was only 32 in 1820, and she would hardly be twenty years his senior.

St. Peter's, St. Kitts. 1813, Dec. 16. The Rev. Daniel Gateward Davis and Anne Claxton in Figtree Church, Nevis, by Licence. (Parish Register.)

He was son of the Rev. William Davis, Rector of St. Peter's in St. Kitts 1807—19, and matriculated from Pembroke Coll., Oxon., 17 May 1808, aged 20, B.A. 1814, M.A. 1823, D.D. 1842; Bishop of the Leeward Islands 1842—57. (Foster.)

At St. Mary Cayon, St. Kitts, is the baptism : "1788, 1 and 5 Jan. Daniel Gateward son of William & Anne Davis," and by the date this should be the Bishop, but there is on the other hand the burial : "1788, Jan. 5. Daniel Gateward son of William & Ann Davis."

In St. Paul's, Charlestown, is recorded the burial: "1837, June 14. Thomas Seaton Pemberton Davis. Charlestown. abt 14 years."

6. Sacred to the memory of JOHN RICHARDSON Esq. many years a resident of this island who departed this life the 6<sup>th</sup> day of September 1816, aged 60 years. And is interred near this place.

George Richardson of Nevis, vintner. Will dated 30 December 13 William and Mary. Wife Eliz., dau. Hester, sons John and Tho. (153, Richmond.)

A John Richardson was President in 1724, and another of the same name appointed 3 February 1748-9 to the Council.

1828, May 29. Col. J. F. Browne, Bristol, 28<sup>th</sup> Reg., to Grace, relict of the late Hon. John Richardson, of the Island of Nevis. ("G.M.," 640.)

There was a family of this name owning a plantation in 1679 in Antigua, whence they spread to Nevis.

7. Sacred to the memory of DIANA MILLS POWELL, native of Charmouth, Dorsetshire, who departed this life, on the 16<sup>th</sup> of Sept<sup>r</sup> 1845, aged 31 years. (A bible verse omitted.)

8. To the memory of Lieut: JOSEPH BAILEY, R.N., Many years master of the ship "Earl of Liverpool" Trading to this island. He was lost in that vessel's Pinnace in the Narrows, on the 8<sup>th</sup> May 1842, aged 47 years. (Erected by a friend.)

1842, May 8. Aged 48, Lieut. Joseph Baily, R.N. for many years Capt. of the Earl of Liverpool, a vessel trading between Bristol and Nevis. He was drowned whilst crossing the strait between Nevis and St. Kitt's, by the upsetting of his boat in a sudden squall. ("G.M.," 335.)

The next six are floor-slabs of slate or marble.

9. Here lyeth the body of Mr: ARTHUR PLOMER of the city of Bristoll Merchant who departed this life the 15<sup>th</sup> July 1702 aged 38 years. (Six lines follow.)

10. The Revd: WILLIAM GREEN died 26th April 1811 in the 38th year of his age.

11. Here lies the body of JOHN HUGGINS  $Esq^r$  who died on the 6<sup>th</sup> day of Dec: 1821\* aged 58 years. He began a career of usefulness as a merchant in this town. In private life he was a firm friend, an affectionate husband & a sincere Christian. In public life he gave universal satisfaction as Clerk of the Assembly & Deputy treasurer of the island. Not many years before his death he became proprietor of the neighbouring hot springs, over which out of goodwill towards his fellowcreatures & not for any advantage of his own he erected convenient baths & at

a short distance a large & expensive stone edifice for the accommodation of invalids.\* This stone was put up by his widow.



(Several lines follow.)



16. (Vault with large slate slab and coat of arms.) Here lies with her still-born child what was mortal of MARY daughter of Captain PETER MELOTE (a native of New York, & MARTHA his wife) a native of this place & wife of SAMUEL NEW late collector of the  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cents & Treasurer of Nevis. (Ten eulogistic lines omitted.) She was born in Charlestown the 12<sup>th</sup> of October, 1715, married to Mr: SAMUEL NEW (from Bristol) merchant, March 27<sup>th</sup> 1733, & died in child-bed in the prime of her years February 26<sup>th</sup> 174 $\frac{3}{4}$ .

Of SAMUEL the 2<sup>nd</sup> son of SAMUEL NEW & MARY his wife born the 15<sup>th</sup> day of February 1737 & died December 28<sup>th</sup> 1739.

Of SAMUEL, their 4<sup>th</sup> son, born the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of March  $174\frac{4}{5}$ , & died the  $17^{\text{th}}$  of January  $174\frac{6}{7}$ .

And of HENRY NEW (near this stone) Commander of a merchant ship, born in the city of Bristol the .... day of .... 17. . & died September 2<sup>nd</sup> 1743 in the 34<sup>th</sup> year of his age. (Several lines follow.)

ARMS.—.... A saltire between four rustres.... CREST.—A demi-lion rampant couped.

1810, July 15. Aged 74, the Rev. James New, M.A. vicar of St. Philip and S. Jacob, Bristol, and rector of Compton Greenfield, Gloucestershire. ("G.M.," 93.)

\* This building, known as the "Bath House," has been repaired, and is now open for the reception of visitors. The waters from quite early times were noted for their great curative

properties. + See "Antigua," iii., 256, as to Jasper and Tobias Wall of Nevis. Mathew was not named in the latter's will of 1743, but he may have been a younger brother. They used the arms of the Lancashire family, but on the tablet at Little Parndon, Essex, the boars' heads have been blazoned as wolves' heads.

1828, June 5. At Clifton, co. Glouc. Francis Tho. New, esq. yst. s. of Dr. N. to Sarah Eliza, eldest dau. of Cha. Payne of Freeman House. ("G.M.," 640.)

1832, July 28. At Fyfield, Berks, after a few hours illness of malignant cholera, the Rev. Edward Parris New, Fellow of St. John's college Oxford, and Perpetual Curate of Northmoor in that county. He was educated at Merchanttaylor's school,\* from which he was elected a Fellow of St. John's; he graduated M.A. 1825, B.D. 1831; and was presented to Northmoor by his college. (Ibid., 281.)

1846, Feb. 21. At Bath, a. 74, Mr. Ed. New, yst. s. of the l. Rev. Jas. N.

Vicar of St. Philip & Jacob, Bristol. (Ibid., 444.) James New, son of Samuel New of Nevis, gent., Oriel Coll., matric. 25 June 1752, aged 17; B.A. 1756; Vicar of St. Philip & St. Jacob, Bristol, 1772, and Rector of Compton Greenfield, co. Glouc.; died 15 July 1810. Edward Parris New, son of James New of Bristol, gent., St. John's Coll.,

matric. 26 June 1818, aged 14; Scholar and Fellow 1818-32, B.A. 1822, M.A. 1825, B.D. 1831; Dean of Arts 1827; Perp. Curate Northmoor, Oxon., 1829, until his death 28 July 1832. (Foster.)



19. (Large stone slab.) JANE BROOKS died April the 6th 1812.

20. (Slate slab.) In memory of Captain Moses MOBRELL of Wales, in Nº America who died the 21st August 1802. Ætat. 26. (Three lines omitted.)


21. (A large stone slab.) Sacred to the memory of Mrs. SARAH BROADBELT who died in child-bed on the 15<sup>th</sup> July 1802. (Followed by a long but very indistinct inscription.—A. H. S.)

The Brodbelts or Broadbelts of Nevis are all descended from Lawrence B. of that Island, whose will was proved 9 April 1660 (P.C.C., 136, May). They resided in St. John's Parish, and it is hoped that their pedigree may appear later.

In St. Catherine's Cathedral, Jamaica (Roby, 31), is a tablet with arms to Francis Rigby Brodbelt, M.D. (born 9 October 1746, died 9 December 1795), but his parentage is not given.

There is another tablet in the same church to Mrs. Anna Maria Eldred, wife of Mr. Edward Eldred, surgeon. She died 21 December 1761, aged 19, and was dau. of Daniel Brodbelt, Esq., by Anna Maria his wife. She may have been sister to Dr. F. R. Brodbelt.

Lawrence Brodbelt of Nevis, at his death about 1727, left a son Daniel Brodbelt, and the latter may be identical with Daniel Brodbelt of Jamaica.



William Woodley of Nevis in 1678 had two children then living. One of these was, I believe, William Woodley of St. Kitts, who was aged 32 in 1707 (which would give his birth about 1675), and the other was probably the John Woodley who was of St. Paul's, Nevis. A pedigree of the St. Kitts branch of the family appeared in "Antigua," iii., 256. The arms used were: Sable, a chevron between three owls Argent. CREST.—An owl.


CREST.—An owl. A William Woodley matriculated from Queen's Coll., Oxon., 21 April 1738, aged 16, as son of John of Nevis, esq. (Foster). His father was Member of Assembly 1718, 1724, and 1730-1. William appears to have married, 25 January 1749, Lucretia, dau. of Mrs. Anne Newth of Hunsdon, co. Herts, widow, deceased. ("G.M.") Lucretia was named 1743 in the will of her uncle Tobias Wall, formerly of Nevis and St. Kitts, then of Southampton. She died in childbed 11 May 1750, aged 28. (See Vol. I., 182.) William was residing at Rougham Hall, near Bury St. Edmunds, Suffolk, in 1756. He was afterwards named as of Eccles, co. Norfolk, in wills of 1767, 1771, 1784, and 1792, and his natural son John was named in 1767. His cousin William, the M.P. and Governor, was also residing in Norfolk, and some confusion between the two men has arisen on account of their Christian names being the same.

The Hampden family, descendants of the Buckinghamshire patriot, fled to the W.I. at the Restoration. (Dr. Bindley's article in the W. India Committee Circular for 15 March 1910, p. 124.) This has not, I think, been proved.

## Rotes and Queries.

#### MADAN OF NEVIS.

An excellent tabular pedigree of eleven generations of this family has just been privately printed. Martin Madan settled in Nevis about 1687, and married Penelope, third dau. and coheiress of Col. Sir James Russell, the Lieut.-Governor. It has now been proved that Martin's great-grandfather was Richard, the Mayor of Waterford in 1599. One of Martin's grandsons was Spencer Madan, the wellknown Bishop of Peterborough, and his descendants are now numerous.

#### LUCAS FAMILY.

Benjamin Lucas (*circa* 1750—1822) was President of Dominica, and Nathaniel Lucas, his contemporary (Charles Kingsley's grandfather), Judge of Barbadoes. They were related (perhaps brothers) and belonged to the well-known family of St. John's, Colchester.

Can anyone help me to connect them either with the Lucases of Antigua or those of Mount Lucas, Phillipstown, King's County, Ireland? Nathaniel Lucas, who died at St. John's, Antigua, 1753, may possibly have been their father.

#### BRISBANE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.

The Rt Hon. Frances Herbert Dowager Viscountess Nelson widow and relict of the Rt Hon. Horatio late Viscount Nelson deceased and sole administratrix of the goods etc. of her first husband Josiah Nisbet formerly of the I. of Nevis and afterwards of the Close of Sarum co. Wilts Esq. who d. intestate and who was one of the sons of Walter Nisbet heretofore of the I. of Nevis Esq. deceased and a legatee named in his will, sendeth greeting WHEREAS Walter Nisbet made his Will the 14 June 1765 and gave all his lands and slaves to John Mills, Tho. Mills, Thompson Hicks, and Tho. Cottle as Trustees to raise £5000 st. for portions for his 4 younger children and disposed of the same as follows, to his two sons Josiah and James Nisbet £1000 apiece and to his two daus. Anne and Mary-Amelia £1500 apiece and his Trustees should then convey his estates to his son Walter Nisbet and d. soon after and the will was proved 18 July 1765 and recorded in Nevis and the Trustees have all died and the estates became vested in the heir at law of Thompson Hicks who survived his co-trustees and WHEREAS Walter Nisbet entered into possession of the estates and having further charged them on his death his eldest son Walter Nisbet now of Calcutta in the E. I. Esq. became entitled to them and the remainders thereon have been since barred and by an Indenture of 10 March 1813 the said estates were agreed to be sold by the attorney of Walter Nisbet the grandson unto James Daniell of Nevis Esq. and WHEREAS Josiah Nisbet d. intestate on 5 Oct. 1781 leaving Frances Viscountess Nelson then Frances Herbert Nisbet his widow who on the 28 Nov. 1781 obtained administration out of the P.C.C. and WHEREAS the said legacy of  $\pounds 1000$  and all arrears of interest hath been discharged to her by James Daniell she gives this Release.

a sugar plantation in the parish of S<sup>t</sup> Joseph called Maccoucherie formerly the property of John Mair Esq. with the buildings slaves cattle and stock also one third of another sugar work and part coffee plantation called Battalie in the same p'sh with buildings slaves etc. and he made his Will on 8 May 1806 and thereby devised an annuity of  $\pounds 300$  to Mary Ann Lucas his wife and all the residue of his estate to his brother the said Tho. Lucas and by a Codicil dated 15 May 1810 increased the annuity for his wife to £500 and died and the will hath been proved by Cha. James of New Inn Esq. one of the Ex'ors in the P.C.C. and WHEREAS the said James Laing and Rob<sup>t</sup> Reid are possessed of the remaining  $\frac{2}{3}$  of the said 2 plantations and desire jointly to purchase the  $\frac{1}{3}$  of John Lucas deceased and the three at the time of purchase borrowed of John Mair £12,000 st. being 1 of the agreed purchase money for Maccoucherie which has not been wholly paid £1200 being still due and whereas Rob<sup>t</sup> Reid by a deed poll made 19 Ap. last hath appointed Jas. Laing and Allan Stewart Laing his attornies and WHEREAS Jas. Laing for himself and Robt Reid hath agreed to purchase from Tho. Lucas the said  $\frac{1}{3}$  part of John Lucas in the two plantations for £8,400 st. to be secured by a mortgage to Tho. Lucas of the whole plantations with interest at 5 per cent. and £200 a year of such interest to be paid to Charles James towards the annuity of £500 to  $M^{15}$  Lucas.

#### WEBB OF JAMAICA. (Ante, 96.)

Thomas Webb of the parish of Saint Elizabeth in the county of Cornwall, and Island of Jamaica (by his will, proved 3rd September 1845), was possessed of "Keyneshem" in the parish of Manchester, and "Chew Magna" in the adjoining parish of St. Elizabeth. He resided at "Chew Magna" up to the time of his death. His will is dated 19th April 1844. He married Frances Faith, and had a son William, who resided with him at "Chew Magna" up to the time of his decease. Thomas Webb was the son of John Rackam Webb of the parish of Manchester, whose will is dated 15th August 1829, and was proved 1st April 1830. Besides his son Thomas he had two daughters-Mrs. Mary Clark, wife of Robert Padmore Clark of the city of Bristol in Great Britain, and Mrs. Hester Medley, the wife of George Bondley Medley, at that time resident in Jamaica. John R. Webb mentions in his will William Morrish of Keynshem in the county of Somerset in England, also a nephew John Morrish.

John Rackam Webb was the brother and residuary devisee and sole executor of William Webb of Saint Elizabeth, whose will is dated 24th September 1801, and was proved 21st December 1802. William Webb in his will mentions his sisters Elizabeth Hitchman, Mary Rackam Charleton, and Hester Morrish, all of the kingdom of Great Britain.

## Bertrand of Dominica.\*

Authorities from which this Pedigree is compiled are as follows: "Notices Genealogiques de Genève par Galliffe" in British Museum; a grant of arms to J. P. Bertrand *alias* J. P. D'Angleberne, 1820, Heralds' College, London; information from W. W. Bertrand, Esq., of Roy Cove, West Falkland Islands, and the Registrar of Dominica; also a small pedigree supplied by Mr. J. Platel of Newcastle, which completes the identity of the Charles Bertrand of Galliffe with the Charles Bertrand of Dominica and father of Harriott D'Angleberne Bertrand.

The Bertrand family, originally from Montpellier, emigrated to Geneva, Antoine Bertrand with his two sons becoming burghers in 1704, and the cause of their emigration being presumably the revocation of the Edict of Nantes, 1685. The family appear to have been considered "Noble," and they intermarried with the best Genevan families. Pierre Bertrand, the first of the line, must have been born about 1620. The Bertrand arms are probably of French origin, as they bear a great similarity to several other French coats, notably that of Romilly. They are : Argent, on a field Vert a bull Sable, collared and belled Or, upon a chief Azure a crescent between two estoiles of the first. CREST.—A crescent superimposed upon three plumes argent.

Antoine Bertrand, fourth of the line, acquired about 1770 large estates in Dominica, which were chiefly in the parishes of St. Patrick and St. David, and adjoining the River Wayanery. One of these estates was called "Geneva." He appears to have had a brother Charles, who, when his own sons Charles

He appears to have had a brother Charles, who, when his own sons Charles and Antoine (?) died without issue, adopted John Peter D'Angleberne, a refugee French officer from Martinique, who married his daughter Harriet and assumed the name of Bertrand (1820). The story goes that he had to fly from Martinique, having killed a soldier who had insulted his wife. He possessed or inherited the estates Taberie, Carse o'Gowry, and Felicitée Hall.

estates Taberie, Carse o'Gowry, and Felicitée Hall. Edmund Rufus Bertrand, his son, married an English lady of good family, and had a large family, most of whom, however, died s.p. The estates were finally inherited by Mr. William Wickham Bertrand, who had acquired estates in the Falkland Islands. On inheriting and finding that the estates were not only heavily encumbered, but that the family mansion had been burnt in a hurricane, which had also much damaged the estate, he allowed it to be sold, under the Encumbered Estates Act, to Henri St. Hilaire, and they are now owned by a family of the name of Potter. In the English grant of arms, either by accident or design, the bull is changed to a ram, and the helmet surmounting the escutcheon is that of a baron, *i.e.*, full faced with golden bars. Any information as to the places named or to the family in general other than the above will be most acceptable, more especially—

(1) Any details as to the life and antecedents of J. P. D'Angleberne.

(2) Any dates of births and deaths not given in pedigree.

(3) Existence of any direct or collateral descendants of any of the persons named.



Will. Wickham, first son of Henry Wickham of Cottingley, Yorkshire, Col. of the 1st Foot Guards, was born Oct. 1761, B.A. Oxon. 1782, then proceeded to Geneva, where he studied civil law. In Geneva he became acquainted with Eleonora Madeleine Bertrand, whose father was Professor of Mathematics in the University, and on 10 Aug. 1788 they were married. She died in 1836. He was a very active secret confidential correspondent, and in 1795 was appointed Minister to the Swiss Cantons. In 1798 he was Under-Secretary of State for the Home Department, served as Foreign Envoy 1799, P.C. 1802, M.P. for Heytesbury and Chief Secretary for Ireland, and retiring on a pension about 1804, died at Brighton 22 Oct. 1840. # The Washingtons of Barbados.\*

Although no connection has yet been established between the Washingtons of Barbados and the Washingtons of Virginia, it may be well to place on record such information as is attainable respecting the Barbadian family, who held a good position in that Island.

In the October Number of the "Register of the New England Historic Genealogical Society" (Boston, Mass) was printed a letter from Theodore Pargiter of London, dated 2 August 1654, in which the writer refers to John Washington of Barbados as his cousin. This John Washington has not, so far as one knows, been properly identified, and Mr. Waters makes scant reference to his existence on p. 32, and in a footnote thereto, in the "Ancestry of Washington," published at Boston, U.S.A., in 1889. At the same time it is to be noted that at the date of John Washington's presence in Barbados, families mentioned in the "Ancestry" as connections of the Virginia family were living in the Island and doing business with it from London. There were Pargiters (pp. 25, 31, 32, 43), Rumballs (32, 33), and Tyrrells (42). The notable family of Codrington was connected with the Washingtons, through the Guises of the Baronetage. The first Virginian settler married a Pope, and there was a family of Pope in Barbados. In each

case the Popes were of Bristol. In 1633 a Philippata Curtis died in Guiana, who was probably of the family of Philip Curtis of Islip, near Banbury, whose daughter married Sir John Washington (see Commission, 9 Dec. 1633, to Roger North, a Creditor of Philip Curtis, late in Amazonia, in parts, deceased, at Somerset House).

It may have been from a traditional interest of their family in Barbados that Lawrence and George Washington visited the Island in November and December 1751, rather than Jamaica or some other Island of the Caribbeans, when they sought a change of climate for the elder brother, then a dying man. Lawrence, it must be remembered, had also served in the West Indies as a British Naval Officer, under Admiral Vernon, in whose honour he had named his grant of land Mount Vernon.

Subjoined are some extracts from the Records of Barbados, made by Mr. Sinckler and another, to whom access has been readily granted by Mr. Lindsay - Haynes, the Registrar of the Colony, in whose keeping the old documents have loving care.

Capt. Philip Payne signed a petition of the planters of St. Kitts in January 1659. In 1669 he was one of the Commissioners appointed to receive back the English quarter of the Island. In 1673 it was reported that his estate and that of Capt. Sam. Payne had been devastated by the French since the declaration of peace. In 1683 and 1686 Lieut. Abraham Payne was a Member of the Assembly. In 1707-8 Stephen Payne, Esq., aged 47, was entered in the census, and in 1711 styled "Colonel," and of the parish of St. Thomas. This Stephen's parentage is unknown, but he was probably son or grandson of either the above Philip or Samuel. His wife's name is also unknown, but he had several sons, of whom the second, Charles, was created a baronet in 1737. The Paynes are supposed to have come from Lavington in Wilts, Dorset, or Jersey. (See vol. iii. of "Antigua.")

He owned several estates, which apparently passed to his widow Priscilla, who was living in 1753, when she owned three plantations in St. Thomas, Middle Island. He also possessed the "New Invention" of 106 acres in the French quarter and the "College" of 200 acres. He left no sons, but three daughters and coheiresses :--

I. Susannah, married first Major Rich. Holmes, Member of Council of St. Kitts, who died in London in 1725 (will proved 13 October),\* by whom she had Rich., Priscilla, and Martha. She married secondly John Douglas, Esq., of St. Kitts, whose will was proved 1748 (359, Strahan), and had an eldest son and heir, John St. Leger Douglas. She died at Rickmansworth, Herts. Will dated 1750 (323, Greenly).

II. Margaret, married Col. James Weatherill of Antigua, and had two sons, Lambert Weatherill and Chas. Pym Weatherill, besides others. (See pedigree in "Antigua," vol. iii.)

III. Frances, the youngest, married Col. Chas. Pym of St. Kitts, Member of Council. Will proved 1741 (132, Spurway). They had Priscilla, only dau. and heiress, who married, 8 June 1742, Robert, 2nd Lord Romney. Lady Romney's will was dated 1746 and proved 1771 (126, Trevor), and she died 26 February 1771. In 1753 Lord Romney owned "Pym's Bay" estate in St. George's, Basseterre, and his wife had one-third of a plantation in St. Thomas, Middle Island, formerly that of her grandfather Michael Lambert.

The following inscriptions were copied in 1879 by Mr. N. Darnell Davis. The Rector writes, 8 June 1911: "We can find nothing of the stones to John Helden, Mrs. Susanna Phipps, Archibald Esdaile, or Col. Stephen Payne. The stones to Capt. Sam. Jefferson and Dr. John Hutchinson are in good condition. There is an estate called Hutchinsons in the parish." I wonder who was responsible for the destruction of the above memorials to the dead?

Here lieth the body of Cap<sup>t</sup> SAMUEL JEFFERSON, who deceased the 12<sup>th</sup> day of December Anno Dom. 1649.

I think this must be the second oldest tomb in the Island, Sir Tho. Warner's being dated 1648. John Jeaffreson, a Master Mariner from Pettistree in Suffolk, arrived at St. Kitts in 1624 in the ship "Hopewell," which he commanded. In 1625, when Warner obtained the King's commission, Jeaffreson's name was inserted as his Lieutenant. Capt. Samuel Jeaffreson, a brother of John, settled the "Red House Plantation," and left, with other issue, a son Samuel, who removed about 1669 to Antigua, and whose son, also Samuel, was in 1678 Member of Council for St. Kitts. Very little is known of this branch. ("Antigua," ii., 106.) John's descendants or heirs were seated at Dullingham House, Cambridgeshire.

# Accounts relating to Aliens' Property in the Leeward Islands.

#### CONFISCATED IN 1651-1654.

#### [EGERTON MS. 2395, Fo. 54.]

Pursuant to the Act of Parliament of 1650,\* confiscating the property of all aliens trading or residing in the W.I., Sir George Ayscue, on his arrival with the fleet at Barbados in 1651-2, seized all the Dutch shipping there trading without licence.

Later, in 1654, the Prize Commissioners, who arrived with the fleet under Penn and Venables, appear to have taken possession of all storehouses belonging to Dutch merchants, as well as of their goods, book debts, and other assets.

Mr. Edward Winslow wrote to Secretary Thurloe from Barbados 16 March 1654: "You told us of a great parcell of sugar was ready for our use, which was due upon the prizes taken by sir Geo. Ascue, we found not a penny in readyness, but abroade in such hands, as were not well affected for nothing; having had the use of large sums for these three yeares, and upon that foundation raised fine estates." (Thurloe's "State Papers.")

The following prize accounts relating to these transactions are bound up in a large volume of Colonial State Papers, which formerly belonged to Thomas Povey, purchased by the trustees of the British Museum at Sotheby's in 1875 (now Egerton MS. 2395).

The lists are invaluable, as they give the names of most of the more important settlers during a period when so few similar records exist. The first census of the Leeward Islands was not made until 1678, some twenty-five years later.

# Monumental Inscriptions in England relating to West Indians.\*

## BATH ABBEY CHURCH.

During a recent visit to Bath this year (1911), the opportunity arose of making a more careful study of the inscriptions in the Abbey Church. It appears that when Sir Gilbert Scott restored the building, between 1860 and 1870, all the monuments were taken down and rearranged : all superfluous portions removed, only the coats of arms and inscriptions being retained : and the tablets were then refixed. The old pews were subsequently removed and the flooring taken up, thus exposing many slabs previously lost to sight. In the year 1872 the then clerk, Charles P. Russell, carefully copied the 847 floor inscriptions and tricked the coats of arms. Most of these were again hidden when the new pews were fixed, but the list of them is carefully preserved, and from it I have copied several additional inscriptions.

When the floor-slabs give no additional information, other than that on the wall tablets, I have omitted such inscriptions. The numbers refer to the Abbey List. "B.C." is for "Bath Chronicle."

North aisle, north wall, opposite the fourth bay :----

Sacred to the Memory of ELIZABETH, relict of the above MATTHEW MUNRO Esq<sup>r</sup>. Who, after a life spent in The conscientious discharge of every duty, And the practice of every Christian Virtue, Resigned her Spirit to Him who gave it, On the 13<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818, aged 45 years.

Within six feet of the above :--

Sacred to the Memory of CHARLOTTE ISABELLA, youngest daughter of MATTHEW and ELIZABETH MUNRO, who in the bloom of youth after a long illnefs which she bore without a murmur, exchanged this life for a better on the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of March 1815.

The M.I. to Mathew Munro has been already given (I., 76). His tablet, now in the south aisle, was no doubt separated from the above during the restoration. In the floor of nave is a slab with all three names on it, which gives the daughter's age as 18.

1818, March 19. Friday, died in Pulteney-street, Mrs. Munro, widow of Matthew M. esq; of the island of Granada, and eldest dau. of Thos. Townsend, esq; of Pickwick House; etc.

South transept, on the west wall, next to the tablet to Fenton of St. Kitts :--

Sacred to the Memory of ALAN LORD GARDNER Admiral of the Red Squadron of His Majeftys Fleet and Major General of the Marine Forces whofe remains lie interred in a Vault near this Place His Lordfhip departed this Life the 31st of December 1808 Æt. 66 Having relinquifhed the important Command of the Channel Fleet in the month of May preceding with a Conftitution worn out in the Service of his Country For his long and meritorious Services (which the ample page of History has recorded) He was raifed in the year 1806 to the dignity of the British Peerage. The post of Major General of the Marine Forces was also purposely created and bestowed on him by His most Gracious Sovereign for the very diftinguifhed part He took in the ever Memorable Battle of the 1st of June 1794. His Lordfhips Family The Profession to which he had the honor to belong and his numerous Friends will long lament his Lofs.

On the floor-slab over his vault in the south aisle he is described as of Uttoxeter in Staffordshire (No. 420).

1809, Thursday, Jan. 5. Died on the 31st ult. at his lodgings in this city, Admiral Lord Gardner, late commander of the Channel Fleet; who has immortalized his name by many gallant actions, during a long and laborious service, in the cause of his country, and whose name will ever stand illustrious in the page of history ("B.C.").

He was appointed Commander-in-Chief at Jamaica in 1786, and served three years. He had previously married there in 1769 Susanna Hyde, dau. and heiress of Francis Gale and widow of Sabine Turner ("D.N.B."). He was created a Baronet in 1794.

At the far end of the north aisle, near the porch, on a small white marble urn on the south wall of recess :--

> Near this Spot reft the Remains of M<sup>RS</sup> ALETTA DE LA COUSAYE ESDAILE who died 21<sup>st</sup> Sept<sup>r</sup> 1800 Aged 57 Years (Sixteen lines omitted.) This Tablet was erected by her affectionate Son *R. ESDAILE.*

1800, Sep. 24. Mrs Eletta Esdaile. (Burial Register.)

1800, Oct. 9. Died, a few days since, at her apartments in the Abbey-Green, Mrs. Aletta Esdaile, relict of the late Archibald E. esq; of the island of St. Kitts, etc. (" B.C.")

Her husband died 25 Sept. 1796, aged 61, being then Commander-in-chief at the Leeward Islands, and there is a tablet to him in the church of St. Thomas, St. Kitts. (See ante, p. 207.)

On a floor-slab, close to the pulpit steps, covered by carpet :--

Here lies interred RICHARD WELCH Efgr Chief Justice of JAMAICA who died October the . . . . 1782 Aged 49 Years.

Oct. 15 was the date noted in 1872. "1782, Oct. 18, Richard Welch, Esq. Choir" (Burial Register). He was appointed Chief Justice in 1779 (Feurtado). His will was proved in 1782 (525, Gostling).

Richard Welch, son of Richard of I. of J., arm., Christ Church, Oxford, matriculated 7 Oct. 1786, aged 16; B.A. 1790 (Foster). A descendant in still living in Bath, who informed the verger that the Chief Justice was of the Höch-Walch (? Walsh) family of Castle Höch, co. Kilkenny, but changed his name to Welch after a family dispute. In the pedigree of Walsh of Cranagh in Burke's "Landed Gentry" it is stated that Richard Walsh of Cranagh, born 1740, married 1759 Mary, dau. of Walter Walsh of Mount Talbot, and their second son William of Kilmore married Mary Anne, dau. of Michael Cuffe of Jamaica.

1782, Oct. 14. At Bath, Ri. Welch, esq; a W.I. planter. ("G.M.," 504.) Marr<sup>d</sup> 1769 Jan. 23 the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Richard Welsh a Barrister and Lucretia Favell Dehany, Spinster. (St. Catharine's Register. See Add. MS. 27,968, fo. 196.)

On the floor of the nave (No. 122) :--

HENRY ARCHBOULD Esqr Late of Jamaica died 25th Novr 1805 Aged 64 Years. Also SARAH ROSEWELL his Wife died 27th March 1812 Aged 74 Years.

This gives dates not on the tablet. (See I., 32.)

bould, relict of Henry A. esq. l. of J. (Ibid.)

She was the only daughter of Samuel Redhead, and was born 22 March 1737, and married 1 Aug. 1757. Her husband was a physician and Member of Council, who died at St. John's 23 Sep. 1779. ("Antigua," i., 10.)

#### PARISH REGISTERS IN BARBADOS.\*

Each Parish has its own Records of Births, Marriages, and Deaths, ancient and modern. Under the registration system introduced in the last century, transcripts of the modern registers are regularly sent to the Registration Office.

Besides the old registers kept in each parish there are books in the Registration Office, Bridgetown, containing copies of the entries in the old registers of the parishes. At what period this was carried out I cannot say, but I am under the impression that it was done before some of the parish registers perished. Even as it is, there are gaps in most of these entries, in some cases for considerable periods.

The following are the years from which the earliest entries date, in the registers preserved in the Registration Office at Bridgetown :---

Roundhill plantation of 60 acres bounded to the E. with Tho. Cottle Esq. to the W. with ditto to the N. with the Sea and to the S. with the center line and also the 3 above-mentioned plantations and the moiety of 59 negroes (names given) and WHEREAS the £1388 and Interest was not paid and Wm Coleman and Tho. Lucas have obtained judgment for £2000 Alex' Houston and the others have agreed to discharge the sum of £2,100 and pay £600 to David Gardner now Roundhill and the said three other plantations and negroes are hereby conveyed to them subject to a mortgage of  $\pounds 1000$  to Tho. Cottle charged on Roundhill and a lease of the same plantation to him.

His name was accordingly restored as Senior Councillor but not as Lt.-Govr. 422.

(Extract from an article on the Milwards of Old Swinford, co. Worcester.) A grandson of the Tho. Milward of the Civil War time, a John Milward, D.D., of Oxford, obtained the living of St. Thomas, Middle Island, and a sugar estate called "Godwins," to which Island he emigrated with Mr. Harry Freeman, a creole (Freeman of Farley Court, Bucks), whose sister he married ("Herald and Genealogist," i.). He matriculated from Pembroke Hall, Oxford, 24 March 1670-1, aged 16, as son of Tho. Milward of Wollescote, co. Worc. (Foster.)

1677, Nov. 1. The Bishop of L. has selected 6 priests who are embarking. Mr. Milward. (Col. Cal., 174.) 1678, Jan. 24. Gov. Stapleton writes that he has presented Mr. Milward to

St. Chr. (Col. Cal., 212). He married a dau. of Col. Wm. Freeman of St. Christopher, one of the very early settlers. He was buried in the east cloister of Westminster Abbey 14 April 1703. Will dated 3 April and proved 29 April 1703 (Chester).

George Milward inherited an estate in St. Christopher in 1707.

There is a letter from Wm. Freeman at St. Kitts, dated 19 Jan. 1682-3, saying that his younger brother Henry had lately come from France, and there is a petition of the latter stating he was now of age. It is probable that John Milward had been his tutor, as Henry was only 17 in 1678, the year they arrived at St. Kitts.

Charles Pinfold, eldest child of Charles Pinfold, LL.D., was born 3 Sept. and bapt. 16 Sept. 1709 in the parish of St. Benet, Paul's Wharf. (Harl. Soc. Pub.) He was Governor of Barbados from 1756—66. Seven volumes of copies of his official correspondence, etc., were lately offered for sale by a dealer. He died in Bloomsbury Square 24 Oct. 1788 in his 80th year ("G.M.," 1127), and there is an account of him in the same magazine for 1804, p. 646. The Editor's copy of the "Memoirs of the Settlement of Barbados" was the Governor's, and contains certain laudatory verses to him from the pen of Mr. Duke, the donor.

Elizabeth Marian Adye (née Ross) died 30th March 1905, aged 82.

#### NOTES BY MRS. E. J. RAM, APRIL 1876.

My great-grandfather Stephen Adye married Clara Payne, who was cousin to Ralph Willett. They had 8 children—Stephen Payne, John Willett, Abraham, Ralph, Clara, Polly, Patty (died in London 1820), and ? Mary.

Abraham had one dau. Eliza Adye, who was educated at Blackheath and being sent out passed her Parents on the voyage. I think he was a Physician and Ralph Attorney-General at Grenada.\*

Uncle Willett married Miss Brouncker. Besides their 2 sons they had a daughter who died early. I think her name was Anna. He afterwards married a Miss Wilson.

The other Miss Brouncker married the Hon. Capt. Finch of the Navy. She was the particular friend of Aunt Vivion, and lived at Broom Hall, Shooters Hill.

#### St Christophers, July 30th, 1795.

#### My Dear Brother,

I wrote to you in May last in consequence of the very melancholy event which you had announced to my mother .... our late worthy and respected kinsman and benefactor, "you who have been the child of his adoption from your infancy." Our poor sister's death. Our debts of £800 .... the legacy left my mother .... the additional allowance you make her .... your donation for mourning.

I am encamped out of Town with the Militia. We have been for upwards of twelve months past under great Apprehension of being attacked by the French, and our fears have been much encreased since the Enemy has been in possession of S<sup>t</sup> Eustatius, which is devided from the Island only by a narrow Channel of about three leagues breadth, across which they may easily invade us in Boats. In consequence of this, Detachments of the Militia are encamped near the Coast, opposite to St Eustatius and in other Places; A Corps of Negroes has been embodied and are training to Arms, and every precaution taken to prevent them landing, for if they once affect that an inconceivable Deal of Mischief must ensue; and the Colony be ruined although they may not acquire the Sovereignty of it. We have very few regular Troops here, not enough to defend even the fortress of Brimstone Hill without the Aid of some Militia. This last Body therefore have and still continue to undergo very fatiguing Duty, and as it consists of every Male Inhabitant of the Island, Occupations of all Kinds are practically suspended, and every man's Interest must of course be much impaired. It has been productive of much expence and Inconvenience to me as well as others; however, the necessity of the Case must be submitted to; and if we are finally successfull in preserving the Island our private sufferings will sit lightly upon us.

Our new General+ arrived here a few days ago, and seems determined to use every exertion for the Defence of the Island, and we place great Confidence in the Fame of his professional Abilities, a military governor in times like this is certainly preferable to any other, let his Character be high as can be in other Respects.

Our good old Mother has enjoyed a great Share of good Health for these last six months, notwithstanding the sorrows she has encountered. She has lived in more ease and quiet than she formerly did, and endeavour is made by my wife as well as myself to make her happy. She writes to you by this Fleet. My Sisters are all well and request their Affectionate Remembrance to yourself, Mrs. Willett and Family. My Wife and my little Girl (the only child 1 have living) beg to add theirs also. We are all concerned to hear of the illness of your dear daughter,\* and sincerely hope she may have found all the Benefits you could have wished from your journey to Bristol and is long ere this perfectly recovered.

As you have mentioned in your letter that you will apprize us when to draw for the Legacies left us by our late worthy Kinsman; permit me; before I conclude to say a few words upon the Subject. I my dear Brother have no right to call upon you-I owe you alass more than I can ever hope to repay, but if you allow me that Liberty I should wish to appropriate it to the discharge of some Debts in England, which though they may be of too longstanding to be recoverable by law, have for that reason a stronger claim upon my feelings. I have however taken the liberty of enclosing you a memorandum of a few professional Books which will engross but a small part of it, and if when convenient you will take the trouble of ordering them out to me I shall be infinately obliged. Books I cannot do without, and I have long lamented my Inability to send regularly for them.

You have said nothing in your letter of our poor Brother Stephen's+ family, if any of them are near you pray be kind enough to say everything Affectionate to them for all here. I should be Happy to have some Account of them. Adieu my dear Brother. Present my Cordial and Affectionate good wishes to Mrs Willett and your Children, and Believe me ever most faithfully and affect<sup>ly</sup> yrs.

Our poor father's Ashes have since his decease remained uncovered by any Tombstone and our dear old Mother's remains are now deposited in the same place, if you will have the goodness to send a Stone out, I will have it properly erected.

The family all unite in Love and best Regards to you and yours. My wife is still very poorly.

#### My dear Stephen,

I know I deserve to be thought a very idle fellow for not having written to you before, but will now try and make amends for my long neglect.

I shall tell you first of my own affairs and my father's. You know when you left England he was about to put his affairs in the hands of trustees, which has been done, and he is living upon a £1000 a year till all the debts are paid. Poor Merly looks very miserable—the pictures and books are all gone, the former did not sell owing to the great scarcity of ready money at that time, indeed we bought in many of them, so that the amount of what were sold came to little more than £7000.

The Books sold remarkably well—the whole of them came to £13,580—some of the specimens of early print such as Caxton's Bible and the other books of that date went, some of them, for two and three hundred guineas each, yet with all these sales I am afraid it will be a long time before the debt to the Trust, which is very large, will be paid off.

My father, I am happy to say, has hitherto kept his health and spirits as well as could be expected under such an accumulation of misfortunes. With regard to myself, I am living as economically as I can and am studying the Law. I intend putting on the gown and wig in about two months and go the western circuit.

[The above is from a copy in the late Sir John Adye's notebook. The back of the letter with the address was missing. The writer was probably Henry Ralph Willett, born 1786, M.A. Oxford and of Lincoln's Inn, 2nd son of John Willett Adye (later Willett), the then owner of Merly. "Stephen" was Stephen Payne Gallwey, a first-cousin. I do not know what misfortunes had overtaken the family apart from the depreciation of W.I. property. The sale of Ralph Willett's library, etc., occupied seventeen days in December 1813, so the above letter was probably written early in 1814. The father did not long survive, but died in 1815 at Bath.—EDITOR.]

#### 13 Feb. 1817.

#### Dear Henry,

I am sure you will be much concerned to receive bad news of my poor brother John; he was seized with an apoplectic fit on Monday last in the Street at Fareham and expired shortly after.

His Brother in law Colonel Bradley wrote to Vivian and mentioned that the presence of any of our family would be extremely acceptable.

The funeral is to take place Saturday, as it cannot be deferred longer. I have taken my place for Fareham, and shall set out to-morrow morning.

We have heard from Stephen in his own handwriting; he, however, mends but slowly.

To the above interesting article by Miss Nembhard the Editor adds the following supplementary notes :---

The said five English Regiments were subsequently raised in the W.I. to about 1000 men each. A sixth regiment of Barbadians was commanded by Col. Edward Doyley, a seventh of Leeward Islands men by Col. Richard Holdip, and an eighth under Col. John Humfrey arrived from England the end of 1655 as a reinforcement. The seventh regiment was soon after disbanded.

In a petition of 1660 Capt. Gregory Butler, one of the Commissioners under Venables, stated that he lost his brother the Adjutant-General and six servants, and disbursed £1200 (Thurloe, vii., 912).

#### Col. John Humfrey's Regiment.

1655, Sept. 6. Major-General Robert Sedgwick writes from Barbados that he sailed from Plymouth on 11 July with a regiment of 800 men drawn out of the old regiments in England, with eight ships of war, and arrived at Barbados on 27 Aug. Capt. H. Maddison on board the *Gift* was sent on 7 Sept. to S<sup>t</sup> Christopher to get recruits with Joshua Wilson on board the *Marmaduke* (W.I. Cal., 96, 97).

On 14 Nov. he wrote that he arrived on 1 Oct. at Jamaica. Thirty men died of the flux, including Capt. Fenn of the Wildeman and Capt. Maddison of the Gift, who died at Barbados. Major-General Fortescue died about 20 Oct. and many officers are dead. There had been 700 deaths, also 50 of the new soldiers. Encloses list of men, women, and children in the Generals, Major-Generals, Col. Carters, Col. Bullers, Col. Doyles, Col. Holdippes, and Col. Humpheres regiments, 2194 well, 2316 sick, 172 women and children (*Ib.*, p. 105). Col. Fortescue's regiment is not referred to. Doyley had reduced each regiment by two companies and disbanded the Leeward Islands one (Bridge, i., 217). "With Sedgewick went Col. Humfreys, the Son of him who carry'd the Sword before President Bradshaw at the King's Trial." He returned to England (Oldmixon's "British Empire in America," ii., 271, 273). Col. H. was named 11 May 1658 (W.I. Cal., p. 472). He returned to England and fought in Flanders (Thurloe). See ante, p. 54, for the will of Gilbert Bury, soldier in Capt. Sedgwick's company in the above regiment.



# Admiral Sir Peter Parker, Bart.

The Parker family in four generations supplied no less than five admirals, all noted men. Christopher died a Rear-Admiral in 1765, very aged. His son Peter, an "Irishman," was a Captain in 1747, and in 1757, in command of the "Woolwich," went out to the W.I. with Commodore John Moore,\* Commanderin-Chief at the Leeward Islands.

In 1759 he took part in the abortive attack on Martinique and reduction of Guadaloupe, + returning in 1760 to England.

He married about 1759 Margaret, daughter of Walter Nugent, Esq., of "Nugents" in Antigua, who had died the previous year, leaving her a portion of £2000. Parker was knighted in 1772, and served as Commander-in-Chief at Jamaica 1777-82, receiving on his return a baronetcy. He eventually became Admiral of the Fleet in 1799, and died in Weymouth Street 21 December 1811

at the advanced age of 90. His portrait by Abbot is at Greenwich. His two daughters both married West Indians (only one is mentioned in the "D.N.B."). Anne, born 3 May 1773, married, 10 September 1800, George Ellis of Jamaica, M.P., and died in 1862 in her 90th year. Antoinette married 1795 John Ellis, cousin of George, and died in 1829.

Sir Peter Parker, 2nd Bart. (grandson of the 1st Bart), in 1814 sold Nugents plantation to Chr. Codrington, after repayment of £8000 his grandfather had lent on mortgage.<sup>‡</sup> He was killed in action at Baltimore the same year, aged 28, being then a Post Captain.

He was evidently first buried at Bermuda, as appears by the following entry from the parish register of St. George :§ "1815, April 2. Memorandum. This day the body of Sir Peter Parker was taken up at the request of Captain Edmund Palmer, R.N., one of his Executors, to be conveyed to England in the Hebrus frigate." The reinterment took place in St. Margaret's, Westminster. The baronetcy became extinct in 1869.

#### THE EARLIEST WILL OF ST. KITTS.

Robert Barwicke of the Town and County of Southampton, yeoman, but at present resident in the ship The Plough of London, bound for England, 23 Sept. 4 Charles, 1628. To my wife Margaret, living in Southampton, the  $30^1$  I left with her, the  $30^1$  due as her fortune from her mother . . . Cheason, a widow, living in the said town, and  $30^1$  when my goods are sold. If she have a son  $200^1$ , if a dau.  $100^1$ . If either die then the legacy to be divided, and I give  $\frac{3}{4}$  to my brother William B. and my sister Jane B., and  $\frac{1}{4}$  to my brother Daniell B.  $40^1$ out of the  $200^1$  "to be laid out in provisions to be sent to my brother Daniell B. and my manservant at Saint Christophers." To the poor of Newport, I. of W.,  $5^1$  and of All Hallows, Southampton, 40s. My father Emanuell B.  $10^1$ . My mother Joyce B.  $10^1$ . To the three children of my sister Barnell Puckford  $15^1$ .

"Item forasmuch as the worshippfull my verie loving Master Captaine Thomas Warner hath been verie kind and loving unto me and hath benne the cause by whom I have gotten my estate in testimonie therefore of my thankfullness although I am not able to requite him, I do give and bequeath unto him one Beaver hatt of the best kind which I humblie intreat him to weare for my sake to be given unto him within one moneth next after his arrival in England."

To my kind mistress  $M^{rs}$  Rebecca Warner, wief to the said Capt. Tho. W., one beaver hat of 5<sup>1</sup> after her arrival in England. To my well beloved friend  $M^r$  John ffeatley, Minister and Preacher, now aboard the good shipp Plough, 5<sup>1</sup> after his arrival. My friend Chr. Havers 50s. John Underwood 50s. Wm. Snellgrove, chirurgeon, of the Plough, 40 lbs. of tobacco. To my Ex'or 50<sup>1</sup> to be deducted from the profit of the labour of my servant Raph Reade, living upon the Isle of St. Christopher in the W. I. with my brother Daniell B., and the rest to be

divided into equal parts,  $\frac{1}{2}$  to any child and  $\frac{1}{2}$  to my Ex'or and sister Jane B. My brother Wm. B., living in the Burrough of Southworke by London, shoomaker, sole Ex'or. Witnessed by John ffeatley, ffrancis Jeffrey, Nich. Burghes. Proved 26 Nov. 1628 by W. B. (102, Barrington).

In Egerton MS. 2395 is a copy of the Articles of Peace, dated 5 Sept. and 8 Nov. 1628, which were signed on 8 Nov. by Capt. *Edward* Warner, Governor of St. Christopher, and by George Molle and Godfrey Haverchampe, Esquires (the Commissioners appointed by the Earl of Carlile), and by Capt. Anthony Hylton, President of Mevis. Capt. Thos. Warner apparently had deputed his son Edward to act as Governor in his place during his absence. From Robert Barwicke's will it seems that Capt. Thos. Warner was still out in the W. I., possibly at some other island than St. Christopher. The "Plough" of London was evidently returning to that port with several planters and a cargo of tobacco. On p. 8 under the Featley Memoir nothing is said about the Rev. John Featley's return from St. Christopher in the "Plough," but there is a gap between 1625 and 1630.

# Parish Register of St. George, Rebis.

Some ten years ago the Editor found among the ecclesiastical correspondence preserved in the muniment-room in Fulham Palace a transcript of a few years of the parish register of St. George's, Nevis. He made at the time a few extracts, which were printed in the "History of Antigua," vol. iii. As the records for the North American and West Indian Colonies were unsorted and in great confusion no further search was then made by him. Major-General R. Pemberton, however, examined these same papers about 1903, and then found them all properly arranged, and fortunately made a copy of the transcript. The Editor last October went carefully twice through the box of papers relating to the Leeward Islands, but could discover no trace of any parish registers. How or why the paper has been removed it is impossible to say, and the Bishop of London's Secretary could throw no light on the loss.

The Editor at once wrote to General Pemberton, with the gratifying result that the following copy of the transcript is now printed. The original parish register for the first quarter of the eighteenth century is no longer in existence, so that the transcript is unique.

All the entries were copied, but those relating to Pemberton were abstracted and placed separately. As these have been already printed in this Magazine, they have not been reinstated.

#### WEST INDIAN REGISTERS.\*

In reply to your inquiry I do not find that we have any Transcripts from the Islands of St. Christopher and Nevis. The Registrar General has some Registers from St. Lucia 1898 to 1905, Barbados and the Windward and Leeward Islands 1804 to 1906.

# Monumental Inscriptions in England relating to West Indians.\*

## ST. JAMES, BRISTOL.

## "F.B.J." stands for "Farley's Bristol Journal."

The monument here to Sir James Russell, Knt., of Nevis has been fixed (probably during some so-called restoration) very high up above the first arch of the chancel facing the north aisle.

With the help of a ladder I endeavoured to decipher the inscription in 1909, but owing to the insufficient length of the ladder, the dirty encrusted surface of the stone, and bad light, was unsuccessful.

The photograph was taken for me by flashlight, and gives one a good idea of the condition of the tablet.

The inscription has been preserved in "Bristol Past and Present," ii., 44. In that book, however, it is not properly set out, so I have spaced the lines from the photograph as accurately as possible.

> HERE LYETH THE BODY OF IAMES RUSSELL KNT. LATE OF NEVIS, ONE OF THE FIRST SETTLERS IN THAT ISLAND WHO WAS YE FIRST MAYOR+ AND COILONEL THERE, AND AFTER BY COM--MISSION OF KING CHARLES 2ND (BEARING DATE YE 12TH DAY OF SEPTE IN YE 13TH YEERE OF HIS REIGN) APPOINTED GOVERNO<sup>E</sup> OF Y<sup>E</sup> SAID ISLAND, & SO CONTINUED TILL 1671; BY WHOSE WISDOM AND VALO<sup>B</sup> (UNDER GOD) IT WAS PRESERVED, WHEN THAT & YR REST OF THOSE ISLANDS WERE ENDANGERED BY THE FRENCH AND DUTCH, IN 1666; WHO, AFTER OBTAINING LEAVE OF HIS MAJESTY TO COME FOR ENGLAND, HERE DEPARTED THIS LIFE YE 15TH DAY OF NOVEMBER 1674, AGED 74 YEARS.

 Frror for "Major." In 1664 Sir T. Modyford, Governor of Jamaica, was instructed to pay £600 a year to his Lieut.-Governor and £300 a year to his Major. The latter was to discipline and command all the forces in the absence of and next to the Governor and Deputy-Governor. (W.I. Cal., p. 187.) Some years later the Major was styled Major-General. During the absence of Governor Hilton from Nevis in 1630-1 Mr, James Russell was elected by the settlers as their leader for a few months.

No mention is here made of Lady Russell, but an entry in the Church accounts shews that she was interred in the same tomb with her husband :--

1677, September 13th. Received for breaking ground in the chancel for y<sup>e</sup> Lady Russell £1.

The arms on the shield are: .... on a bend three swans ...., between three mullets [RUSSELL]; impaling .... three bucks trippant [HUNT].

CREST.—A demi-goat issuant from a coronet.

James Russell, late of Neivis, now living at Bristoll. Will dated 6 Nov. 1674. Mr Tho. Horne, minister, of St James, £5, and to the poor £10. To my loving brother Col. Randall Russell my saddle horse, pistols, rapier, and coat of armes, to be sent to him at Nevis. My sister  $M^{18}$  Kath. Fenton, if living in Ireland, £50. To the Lady March a 20s. ring. All estate in England to my wife Margaret Russell and sole Exitrix, and I give her all the right of the S<sup>t</sup> Christophers plantation that was formerly hers. As to my own proper plantation in Nevis, leased out to my brother Col. Randall Russell for 5 years at £400 a year, 11 years yet to run, I give my Wife the residue of the rent and then all the plantation and slaves to my nephew Captain James Russell, he to pay £200 a year in sugar or indigo to my Wife as long as she remain my Widow, and she is to live in the house there if she like. James Russell to be Ex'or there. Witnessed by Tho. Cole, Geo. Morris.

Proved 10 Dec. 1674 by Margaret Russell the relict (147, Bunce). On 26 Jan. 1676 new probate to Dame Margaret Russell because Sir James Russell, the testator, did not state his title.

1677, Oct. 9. Dame Margaret Russell of St James, Bristol, widow, deceased. Adm'on to Robert Hunt, the brother. (For further details see "Antigua," iii., 60.) The parentage of Sir James is not known at present.

## ST. STEPHEN'S, BRISTOL.

On the south wall of the south aisle behind the chancel (copied 19 Aug. 1910):-

Sacred to the Memory of WILLIAM DELPRATT Esq<sup>r</sup>. who departed this life the 20th July 1826, Aged 74 Years, and lies interr'd in the Chancel of this Church.

1826, July 20. In Berkeley-square (Bristol) Wm. Delpratt, esq. ("G.M.," 93.)

1810, Feb. 2. Saturday last was married, Mr. John Harris, surgeon, of Exeter, to Miss Delpratt, dau. of the late Samuel Delpratt, esq. of Jamaica. (? "Bath Chronicle."

1850, Sept. 8. At her son's, J. Delpratt, esq. Old Charlton, aged 76, Agnes, widow of Samuel Dellpratt, esq. of Jamaica. ("G.M.," 452.) Edward Delpratt, Esq., died 10 Nov. 1841, aged 52. (Archer, 153.)

A pedigree of this family by the late W. J. C. Moens, F.S.A., appeared in "Misc. Gen. et Her.," 2nd Series, iii., 344, but it does not seem to be a complete one. He sent me a copy of this many years ago. The will of Sam. Delpratt of the firm of Foord and Delpratt of Bristol was proved in 1784 (129, Rockingham). His brother William of St. James', Bristol, Merchant, also died the same year.

## ST. MICHAEL'S, BRISTOL.

On the north wall of the nave near the gallery :---

Near this place lies the Body of M<sup>R</sup> HUGH INGLIS, A Native of INVERNES in Scotland, and many years commander of a Ship in the Trade betwixt BRISTOL and the West Indies : He was born in the Month of August 1750, and he died on the 6<sup>th</sup> day of March 1796 (Five lines.) erected by his surviving brothers WILLIAM and

GEORGE INGLIS.

Above is a shield with his arms: Azure, a lion rampant, on a chief Argent three six-pointed mullets within a bordure Gules. MOTTO.—Not legible on account of dirt.

1796, March 6. At Bristol, Capt. Inglis, many years a respectable and muchrespected commander of a ship from that port to the West Indies. ("G.M.," 259.)

1796, Sat. March 12. On Sunday last died at his house in Trinity-street, sincerely lamented by all who knew him, Captain Inglis, many years a respectable and much respected commander of a ship from this port to the West-Indies. ("F.B.J.")

## ST. NICHOLAS, BRISTOL.

South wall of nave beneath the fourth window :---

Sacred to the memory of WILLIAM HENRY TERRELL, second Son of WILLIAM TERRELL of this City, Merchant. He died July 4<sup>th</sup> 1846, aged 46 Years. Also of HENRIETTA JANET Daughter of PETER and HENRIETTA MOFFATT, of Montego Bay, Jamaica, the beloved wife of WILLIAM TERRELL, of Falmouth, Jamaica, grandson of the above-named WILLIAM TERRELL. She died July 13<sup>th</sup> 1848, at Funchal, Madeira, and lies buried in the Cemetery of that place. Also of WILLIAM TERRELL, Merchant of this City, Father of the above-named W. H. TERRELL. The whole of his life an Inhabitant, and for nearly fifty years a Vestryman of this Parish. He died July 25<sup>th</sup>, 1851, aged 82 Years.

1851, July 25. At Bristol, in his 83d year, William Terrell, esq. He was born in the parish of St. Nicholas, where he carried on a successful business as a button-factor. He served several parochial offices, and by his cordial manners and blameless life obtained the esteem and affection of his neighbours. ("G.M.," 333.)

1813, Sat. Ap. 10. Tuesday se'nnight, aged 82, Mrs. Sarah Terrell, mother of Mr. William T., Charlotte-st. Queen-sq. ("F.B.J." and "G.M.," 393.)

South wall of nave beneath the third window :---

Sacred to the Memory of KOSCIUSKO TERRELL, Attorney at Law, son of WILLIAM and MARY ELIZABETH TERRELL, of this City. He died the 13<sup>th</sup> of August, 1821, in the 30<sup>th</sup> Year of his Age, at Falmouth in Jamaica, and lies buried in the same place. Also of MARY ELIZABETH TERRELL, the beloved wife of WILLIAM TERRELL. She departed this life the 28<sup>th</sup> November, 1826, Aged 57 Years, and lies buried in the Crypt of this Church. Also of ELIZABETH BRYANT, Mother of the above MARY ELIZABETH TERRELL. She departed this life the 12<sup>th</sup> May, 1827, Aged 76 Years.

In Falmouth Church in the parish of Trelawney is an inscription to "Kosciusko Terrell, son of William and Mary Terrell, of the city of Bristol, England, ob. 1821." (Archer, 323.)

On the north wall of the nave :---

Sacred to the memory of FANNY HUGHES the beloved wife of M<sup>R</sup> FREDERICK TERRELL, Surgeon Queen Square, and second daughter of M<sup>R</sup> JOHN MILLS of S<sup>t</sup> Michael's Hill in this City, She departed this life 19<sup>th</sup> Aug<sup>st</sup> 1829, Aged 21 Years and 5 Months and lies buried in the Crypt of this Church.

Also FREDERICK TERRELL Justice of the Peace of this City, Who was born in this parish March 7<sup>th</sup> 1804, and died in peace Aug<sup>st</sup> 14<sup>th</sup> 1889 and was interred in the family vault at Arnos Vale Cemetery.

On the east wall of the chancel was formerly a tablet to Edward Buncombe of Montserrat, who died 11 Sep. 1712, aged 53. This was probably destroyed at the rebuilding of the church at the end of the eighteenth century.

He had been Speaker of the Assembly. His son-in-law Col. John Molineux matriculated from Trinity College, Oxford, 20 Feb. 1700-1, aged 16, and was alive in 1727, and his eldest son John Davis Molineux was also Speaker. The Molineux-Montgomerie family is now of Garboldisham Manor in Norfolk. Edward Buncombe, late of Mountseratt, now of Bristol, Esq., by his will dated

Edward Buncombe, late of Mountseratt, now of Bristol, Esq., by his will dated 26 Aug. and proved 30 Oct. 1712 (182, Barnes) devised his share of the manor of Goathurst, co. Somerset, and his plantation in Montserrat to his eldest son John. He names his wife Ann and his other children William, Charles, Joseph, Edward, Thomas, George, and Ann Buncombe, Mary wife of John Molineux of the same Island, and the latter's children, John Davis Molineux and Mary Molineux.

In the Crypt I saw some twenty years ago several memorial ledger stones, but at the recent restoration these disappeared, and at my last visit in 1909 the floor consisted of modern tiling. I noted a ledger here to Mungo Forbes of Jamaica, who died in 1807, aged 61. The Vicar writes, 22 May 1909, that when the crypt was restored there appears to have been no inscription to him remaining, but a careful record of all existing inscriptions was made.

## BATH ABBEY CHURCH.

When the floor-slabs give no additional information, other than that on the wall tablets, I have omitted such inscriptions. The numbers refer to the Abbey List. "B.C." is for "Bath Chronicle."

North aisle: M.I. to SOPHIA LOUISA GOMM, dau. of Lieut.-Col. Gomm and Mary Alleyne Gomm (formerly Maynard). He was knighted 2 July 1794 at Guadaloupe. She died 1814.

Sir William Maynard Gomm, Field Marshal, G.C.B., eldest son of Lieut.-Col. William Gomm of the 55th Regt. by Mary Alleyne, dau. of Joseph Maynard, Esq., of Barbadoes, was born in that Island in 1784. His mother died at Penzance in 1796, leaving three sons and a dau. He commanded the troops in Jamaica 1839 -42 and died 15 March 1875, aged 90. ("D.N.B.") I believe his tomb is in the churchyard of Rotherhithe. His aunt Miss Gomm left him the manor of Rotherhithe.

On the floor of south aisle of nave (No. 434) :--

Here rest the Remains

of ANN MEYLER Wife of JEREMIAH MEYLER, Esq. who departed this Life December 26<sup>th</sup> 1788 Aged 51 years.

He was son of Jeremiah, was born in Jamaica, and matriculated from Christ Church, Oxford, 22 Oct. 1784, aged 18 (Foster). Served as High Sheriff of Hants in 1798; married, 11 Nov. 1790, a dau. of J. Jarrett of Freemantle, and left issue Richard, born at Metbrooke, whose obituary follows :---

1818, March 3. Near Melton Mowbray, co. Leicester, aged 26, Richard Meyler, esq. of Grosvenor-sq. M.P. for the city of Winchester . . . He was the last descendant of an eminent mercantile family in Bristol and Jamaica, from whom he inherited a fortune of 35,000/. per annum. Educated at Eton and at Christ Church College, Oxford. Mr. died intestate . . . ("G.M.," 470.) He matriculated 26 Jan. 1809, aged 17 (Foster).

Canon Mayo has given me the references to two wills of this family, viz., Richard Meyler, proved 1773 (215, Stevens), and Richard Meyler, proved 1787 (504, Major), uncle and nephew, both merchants of Bristol. They came from Haverfordwest in co. Pembroke.

On the floor of north aisle of nave (No. 440) :---

Philip Gibbes of Barbados by Eliz. his wife, dau. of John Harris, was father of Philip (1730–1815), created a Baronet in 1774. The relationship of the above is not given in Burke.

Reynold Alleyne of "Four Hills," Barbados, by Eliz., dau. and coh. of John Gay, had four sons and four daus., and of the latter Isabella married Joseph Gibbes of "Plumtree," and Christian (died 1780, aged 77) married John Gibbes of "The Castle." (Archer, 373.)

She was first married to THOMAS COTON of Coton Bridge in the County of Warwick Esq. by whom She had one Son and by the said S<sup>r</sup> NICHOLAS LAWES one Daughter both now liveing. After a lingering Sickness she departed this Life for a better in this City of Bath on the 26<sup>th</sup> day of October in the Year of our Lord 1725 and in the thirty sixth Year of her age.

Arms undecipherable in 1872.

Ann Stephens Amory was born 26 Feb. 1807 (No. 546). See I., 80.

1840, Nov. 16. At Bath, aged 67, Mrs. Lynch, relict of Dr. L. ("G.M.," 1841, p. 108.)

On the floor of north transept (No. 693) :--

DOWDING THORNHILL Esq. late of the Island of Barbadoes Died Sep. 16<sup>th</sup> 1826 Aged 68.

1826, Sep. 28. In this city, aged 68, Dowding Thornhill, esq; late of Barbadoes. ("B.C." and "G.M.," 380.)

Sir Timothy Thornhill, the 1st Bart., died in 1693. A pedigree of his family seems to be wanting. Governor Kendall wrote 1693, Feb. 10, that Sir T. T. is dead of the distemper, much in debt and his lady poor. She was Thomasine, dau. of Sir Rob. Legard, Knt., and married secondly Col. Nathaniel Blakiston, Deputy Governor of Montserrat, and her will was proved in 1697 (130, Pyne).

Cecilia Blake, sister of Martin Blake of St. Vincent, died 22 Aug. 1838, aged 41. This was omitted from the M.I. (I., 28) to her brother. She was born 9 March 1797, and baptized at St. John's, Antigua.

On the floor of choir (No. 749). See I., 31:-

Underneath this Stone lie the Remains of MARY JANE TROTMAN of the Island of Barbadoes died April 25<sup>th</sup> 1817 Aged 20 years.

On the floor of choir (No. 756) :---

JOHN WHITE Esq<sup>r</sup> of the Island of Barbadoes died March 15<sup>th</sup> 1832 Aged 61 years.

On the floor of choir under the stalls (No. 760) :-

Sacred to the Memory of Doctor JAMES BROW (sic) of Falmouth in the Parish of Pill and Island of Jamaica who departed in his 49<sup>th</sup> year in this City y<sup>e</sup> 5<sup>th</sup> J . . . . (Five lines omitted.)

## WEST INDIA COMMITTEE.

I am anxious to trace the early history of the West India Committee. Can any of your readers assist me with information regarding it? The earliest minute-book of the Committee is dated 1769; and it would seem that in that year there existed a Committee of West India Merchants and a Committee of West India Planters. The full title of the West India Committee then, and for many subsequent years, was "The Standing Committee of West India Planters and Merchants."

#### ALGERNON E. ASPINALL.

The Colonial Office was in or about 1769 reorganized, and the Act of Parliament probably authorized the constitution of the Committee. (EDITOR.)

## BARHAM'S HISTORY OF JAMAICA 1722.

This work, now in the British Museum (Sloan MS. 3918), consists of 140 small folio pages. The contents did not appear to me to contain much original matter. On the first page is the following heading :-

> " A most Correct, and particular Account of th . . . .\* Island of Jamaica, From the Time of th . . . .\* Spaniards first discovering and settling . . . .\* it. Together With a full and succinct Account of the present Government of it; as also, of all the Generals, and Governours in Chief that have been appoin ted to preside over the said Island, and all the other Territories thereon depending, in America, &c. Wrote by Hen. Barham Sen<sup>r</sup> F.R.S.'

The history is carried down to the year 1722. Dr. Barham died soon after in 1726.

## LONG'S JAMAICAN GENEALOGIES.

This volume, now in the British Museum (Add. MS. 27,968), contains various letters, pedigrees, and extracts from parish registers and wills relating to Jamaican families. The correspondence was mostly addressed to Charles Edward Long, a well-known West-Indian genealogist. The collection then apparently passed into the hands of Captain J. H. Lawrence Archer, author of "W.I. Monumental Inscriptions," and the Museum Trustees purchased it from him on 13 Feb. 1869.

Most of the numerous extracts from parish registers were made about 1830-35 by the late John Roby, author of the rare Histories of the parishes of St. Catherine and St. James (see ante I., 335), and were sent to C. E Long, then in London. Among the families noted are the following :-

## BOOKPLATE OF JOHN OTTO BAIJER, ESQ.



There were two men of the above names in Antigua, first-cousins and of Dutch origin. The one, a Captain of the 38th Regiment, was sometime of Ham Common, co. Surrey, and died in Antigua 10 May 1817, aged 66. The other, a Colonel of Militia, resided for many years at St. Thomas, near Exeter, where he died 1 Nov. 1790, aged 67. The same crest, with the addition of the arms, are on a tomb of 1727 in St. John's churchyard in Antigua.

The above plate is not in the Catalogue of the Franks Collection in the British Museum, which, however, includes two others belonging to the same family. Mr. W. E. Baillie of Bridgeport, U.S.A., writes: "I do not know of any other plate than the crest with large Chippendale surroundings, and I think the catalogue is wrong."



In the same Vault are the remains of ELIZABETH his faithful Wife, Daughter of JAMES TOBIN Esqr who died at Clifton May the 20th 1824 aged fifty two years And of JAMES their Son, who died at Bristol Decr the 4th 1818 aged nine years.

Above on a shield are his arms: Ermine, on a chief Sable three lions rampant Argent.

He was buried in a vault in the churchyard with his wife, but the inscription on the flat stone has nearly all perished.

She was Harriet, only child and heiress of the Hon. Byam Freeman of

Antigua, and was married at St. John's Church in that Island, 3 June 1781, as the Governor's second wife.

Some twenty years ago the late Capt. Spencer Vassall Henslow took me to the house of his aunt in Bayswater to see the portraits of the above John Vassall and his wife. Geo. Hay Dawkins-Pennant (grandson of Henry Dawkins of Jamaica by Eliz. Pennant his wife) succeeded his cousin Lord Penrhyn, and died in Portland Place 17 Dec. 1840, aged 76.

1. North side of the nave, near the chancel: "Rev. Joseph Herbert Pemberton,<sup>2</sup> born 10th Sept. 1787, died 19th Sept. 1870. Rector of this parish nearly sixty years, erected by his affectionate parishioners."

2. Same wall, near the pulpit: "Edward Parr Cottle,<sup>5</sup> died 17th August 1811, aged 10 months and twelve days." (Eight lines follow.)

3. On the floor of the nave, beyond the transept: "Sally Maynard Daniell<sup>4</sup> daughter of the Hon. James Daniell, Esq. died 22d July 1813 aged 3 years 9 months 19 days, also her infant sister, Sally Maynard Daniell, died 22d August 1809 aged 11 months 17 days."

4. South side of nave, by the chancel: "Jane wife of Edward Huggins Esq. of this Island and eldest daughter of Maj. Juxon died August 24th 1840 aged 48.

7. "Georgiana Eliza Huggins, wife of Richard Litcott [sie] Hicks, 1 Esq. [error] died 5th August 1835 aged 21."

8. On one slab, with coat of arms<sup>2</sup> at the head : Argent, a chevron Or between three cherry sprigs,<sup>3</sup> on a chief Azure a lion passant. CREST.—A griffin's head erased. MOTTO.—INDUSTRIA. "Elizabeth Huggins died Jan. 3, 1818, aged 101. Edward Huggins, died 3d June 1822, aged 74, and John Huggins, Esq., son of Edward Huggins died 17th June 1822, aged 34."

9. This inscription is repeated, without the arms, on a slablying on the floor of the transept aisle, probably from the vault or tomb outside in the churchyard.

10. On the floor of the transept aisle: "Mrs. Mary Symonds, wife of James Symonds, Esq., died 10th Sept. 1751, aged 59." And on the same slab: "Her brother John Butler,<sup>4</sup> Esq., died 20th May 1717."

11. "Francis Sanders,<sup>5</sup> junior, died 18th July 1742, aged 51. Put by his widow Sarah Sanders."

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

## Admiral Phillips Cosby.

This officer was second son of Col. Alexander Cosby, Lieut.-Governor of Nova Scotia, where he died 26 Dec. 1743, by Anne, dau. of Alexander Winnard of Annapolis. Alexander's younger brother, Col. William Cosby, was Governor of New York from 1732 till his death 10 March 1736. They were sons of Alexander Cosby of Stradbally in Queen's County, who died in 1694. The Admiral married in August 1792 Eliza, dau. of William Gunthorpe of Antigua, by whom he left no issue. He succeeded to the Stradbally estate on the death of his cousin Lord Sydney (Burke's "Landed Gentry"). The "G.M.," p. 92, records his death : "1808, Jan. 10. In Alfred-street, Bath, aged 80, Philip Cosby, esq. Admiral of the Red. He was at the Rooms the preceding evening and played at Whist." On his tablet in the south transept of the Abbey his age is given as 77 ("Antigua," ii., 243). The Burial Register has: "1808, Jan. 16. Admiral Philip Cosby" ("Genealogist," vi., 184). His aunt Elizabeth married Lieut.-General Richard Phillips, Governor of Nova Scotia, probably his godfather.

# Letters from D. Walsh to J. Scott.

## Dear Sir

## Antigua 15th August 1770.

I have long since answer'd all your letters, your last was dated the 14<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup>, wherein you mentioned your conversation with  $M^{r}$  W<sup>m</sup> Gunthorpe; thank God that matter is all over! We had a reappraisment the 10<sup>th</sup> instant, ballance in our favour £3520.10.7, which is paid in Cash & Bills of Exch<sup>n</sup>. I chose Mefs<sup>15</sup> Jarvis & Christian, Mefs<sup>15</sup> Jeremiah Blizard & Looby were the Appraisers for M<sup>r</sup> Gunthorpe. The estate was deliver'd up in good order, the works compleat & fit for immediate service-the Negroes & Cattle in excellent condition.

Mr Gunthorpe has good reason to be pleased with this appraisment, for he has a valuable consideration for what he pays. I am perfectly satisfyed on my part. I paid for 24 New Negroes bought for Paynter's estate £825. 10 Sterling which is at  $67\frac{1}{2}$   $\tilde{p}$  C<sup>t</sup> £1382.14.3 Currency. I gave up in the reappraisment two valuable Negroes of my own (one of them a Cooper) valued at £250. I paid out of the reappraisment for a year's rent £940. I alsure you this Affair has cost me a great deal of attention & trouble. I sold 20 Hhds. of Sugar this year at 40° & ship'd 130 & kept 80 for the refining house. I sent home to Mefs's Oliver, William Warner's bills on W<sup>m</sup> Gunthorpe for £1025.18.9 Sterling.

I believe a War not far off, & shall be glad of your opinion, if you think it advisable to sell out of the Stocks, before they may be too low.

My chief attention will now be to this Estate, & make all the Dung I can. I have an inclination to go home next year, but if I continue my health, may probably stay one year longer, & then if it is agreeable to the Family, shall be glad to rent upon English security, for it is running too great a wrisk to trust a Manager, who will think only of himself, & I dont know where to get a Man I wou'd confide in.

We are all well & join in love & compliment to you & our Friends. I am Dear Sir Your very affectionate humble servant

## [On a double folio sheet in the possession of the Editor.]

This letter evidently relates to "Gunthorpes" and "Paynters," two adjoining estates in Antigua, owned by William Gunthorpe, who was at the time resident in London ("Antigua," ii., 39). The appraisement on entering upon a lease, and reappraisement on giving it up, any losses being paid by the tenant and any improvements by the landlord, was a very equitable arrangement.

De la Court Walsh, the letter writer, had been a Captain in the 38th Regiment, and married two wives in Antigua, dying in 1784 at Richmond, Surrey. In his will he names no family, but mentions Robert De La Court, Sen., Esq., of Ireland, and Robert's eldest son Walsh De La Court. (*Ibid.*, ii., 5.) Edward Warner and his brother-in-law John Johnson were merchants and

Edward Warner and his brother-in-law John Johnson were merchants and partners in London, both holding much property in Antigua. James Scott, Esq., left the Island in 1760-1. There was a firm of Ledwell and Scott about 1780.

### Dear Sir

## Antigua 18th Sep<sup>r</sup> 1772.

The 31<sup>st</sup> of last month we had the most violent Hurricane ever known; very few Estates, if any, but what have felt the effects of it, many of them quite destroyed, several white people kill'd & a number of Negroes. The King's Ships in English Harbor dismasted, & many Vefsels lost. We are in sad distrefs for want of Negro provision, what little Corn we have sells at 15/- a bushel. S<sup>t</sup> Christophers has suffer'd as much if not more, & the other Islands, very considerably.

We lost part of our Dwelling house, our Refining house blown down & twenty Hhds. of Sugar destroyed, however we shall recover part of it, which must be manufactured anew, our Rum house down, & the South side of the Curing house, Boiling house strip'd, Sick house & Coopers Shop down, Trash house, Stock house, Coach house & Stables down, a large new Dove house quite gone, & our Store house strip'd. The house in Town which was compleated with glafs sashes new painted & a handsom stone wall, very much shatter'd & the wall down little or no Lumber to be had. Provision extreme dear, & little of that. Our Canes whip'd to shreds & a great part of them broke short off; we have not suffer'd much that way, & I hope, if we have good weather, to make a tolerable Crop. The new stone building, containing the Offices, stood it very well & was of great service. We lost only one Negro. M<sup>r</sup> Otto had four kill'd upon the spot. The Barracks & Hospital terribly shatter'd & the Gallery down. The strength of the Winds is incredible, they seemed to contend & battle together.

Thank God we are all well, & join in love & compliment to you and our Friends; all the Family are here at present, and talk of going home next year. If I find myself well. I will endeavour to put it off a year longer.

I fear we shall have bloody work at S<sup>t</sup> Vincents. Six Companies of our Regiment are gone thither.

I wish you health and am truly Dear Sir

Governor Sir Ralph Payne sent home a long letter describing the effects of this hurricane. The Court House was blown in, the Hospital at English Harbour levelled, the flagship and two frigates driven ashore, and the Governor's new study and papers blown away. Montserrat suffered £60,000 damage, but St. Kitts much less. The King gave a donation of £2000 to Antigua towards the fund for repairing losses. The 68th Regiment was to return to Europe the end of 1772. ("Antigua," i., exxi.) Thos. Oliver was my great-great-grandfather and Michael Lovell was his first-cousin and partner; their counting-house was in Mark Lane.

## ELIZABETH LEITH OF TOBAGO.

John Reid of the I. of Tobago, Esq., Edward Ellis and Francis Adams both of Copthall Buildings London Merchants in the High Court of Chancery appearing acknowledge themselves to owe to the R<sup>4</sup> Hon. Sir W<sup>m</sup> Grant K<sup>4</sup> Master of the Rolls and Sir John Simeon B<sup>4</sup> the Senior Master of the said Court £4000 this year 1817. WHEREAS by an order made by the R<sup>4</sup> Hon. the Lord High Chancellor dated 21 Aug. 1816 in the matter of Eliz. Leith spinster a Lunatic on the petition of Ann Hinson widow and Victoria Felicite Forbes it was ordered that John Reid should be appointed the Manager of the Plantations of the said lunatic in the I. of Tobago upon his giving security to consign the produce to Messieurs W<sup>m</sup> Manning, Fred. Manning and John Le Viscount Anderdon, and Sir John Simeon in his Report of 7 Aug. 1817 has approved of this bond and of Ed. Ellis and Fra. Adams as Sureties of John Reid. Signed by John Simeon.

The following abstracts of deeds have been made from a folio MS. book of copies of various Indentures made in the eighteenth century by a certain "Francis Buxton of Tookes Court London gent. sollicitor of the High Court of Chancery and one of the attorneys of the Court of King's Bench." He appears to have acted for certain Norfolk and Suffolk families, and the book came into the Editor's possession in Sept. 1909 by purchase from a dealer, who obtained it from the library of the late Dr. Blofield of Norwich.

## BLAKE OF ST. KITTS.

This Ind're made the 1 Jan., 5 Geo. III., 1745, BETWEEN Patrick Blake of Langham co. Suffolk Esq. 1st s. and h. of Andrew Blake late of New Norfolk Str. in the p'sh of S<sup>t</sup> Geo. Hanover Sq. Esq. deceased and grands. and h. named in the will of Patrick Blake 1. of the I. of S<sup>t</sup> Chr. Esq. deceased of the 1 part; Sir W<sup>m</sup> Gage of Bury S<sup>t</sup> Edmunds B<sup>t</sup>, Rob<sup>t</sup> Harland of Sproughton in co. Suffolk Esq. the surviving Trustees and Ex'ors named in the will of said Andrew Blake deceased in Trust for Chr. Blake, Edw<sup>d</sup> Blake, Arthur Blake, Barbara Frances Blake and Mary Ann Blake the only younger children of the said Andrew Blake all under 21 of the other part, WHEREAS Patrick Blake the grandfather of Patrick Blake party to these presents and father of Andrew Blake by his will dated 5 March 1743 gave to Andrew Blake his son the rents of his estates in the I. of Montserrat for life and all residue of his est. he devised unto his grands. Patrick Blake and appointed Dominick Trant, John Willett, Geo. Blake the younger sons of the other part reciting that the estates in M. and St Chr. should be absolutely settled after his death on his 1st s. Pat. Blake and that he had settled £300 a year upon Marcella his Wife and that Jeffery French had been appointed by the Court of

Chancery of G. B. Guardian of Pat. Blake it was agreed that Andrew Blake should during his life receive the yearly income of £1000 st., 2<sup>dly</sup> that he should yield up to Jeffery French for Pat. Blake all rents from the estates,  $3^{aly}$  and settle them on him with a power to charge them with £8000 for his younger children, 4<sup>thly</sup> that all proceeds sh<sup>d</sup> be laid out in the purchase of lands in G. B. and a decree of the Court of Chancery or Act of P. was to be obtained and WHEREAS by a deed poll of the said Andrew Blake and Martin Blake of Savage Gardens Esq. dated 28 May 1755 reciting the said agreement that the £1000 a year had been paid that Jeffery French was since dead and that Martin Blake had been appointed Guardian in his place and that the said agreement had been lost Andrew Blake confirmed it and d. 30 July 1760 and made his Will 21 July 1760 and charged the £8000 on his estates viz. £2000 to be paid to Sir W<sup>m</sup> Gage and Rob. Arthur Blake and paid him at 21, £500 for his dau. Barbara Frances at 21 or marriage and £500 for his dau. Mary Ann and £4500 for his s. Chr. Blake at 21 and all residue and WHEREAS Pat. Blake on his father's death succeeded to all the estates and attained the age of 21 on 30 Dec. 1762 and then barred the estate in tail male and he is advised the said agreement is prejudicial to him and disavows it but desires to more amply provide for his 5 brothers and sisters than was done by his father's will and hath proposed to charge £8000 on all his estates in lieu of the above £8000 bequeathed by his father and to give them in addition £17,000 st. and Sir  $W^m$  Gage and Rob. Harland have agreed to such proposals he therefore conveys his plantations to them to raise £8000 at 4 per cent. and £17,000 at 3 per cent. payable as to the last-named sum at the age of 25.

B<sup>t</sup> and W<sup>m</sup> Codrington Esq. his only s. and h. of the 1<sup>st</sup> part; Francis Buxton of Tooke's Court L. gent. of the 2<sup>d</sup> part; and Neast Havard of Tewkesbury co. Gl. gent. of the 3<sup>d</sup> part. WITNESSETH that for barring all estates tail in the following manors and settling them upon several trusts and in consideration of Sir W. C. settling upon his said son for life the messuage and lands in Marshfield co. Gl. of the yearly rent of £507, they confirm to F. B. for 1 year until a Recovery can be executed by Neast Havard against F. Buxton and to hold the lands as they shall appoint. (See pedigree of Codrington "in "Antigua," i., 147.)

This Indenture made the 14 May 1763 Between Sir W<sup>m</sup> Codrington of Dodington co. Glouc. B<sup>t</sup> (eldest s. and devisee for life of Sir W<sup>m</sup> C. late of D. B<sup>t</sup> deceased) and W<sup>m</sup> C. Esq. his only s. of the 1 part and Francis Buxton of Tookes

Court London gent. of the other WITNESSETH that in pursuance of an Act of the Leeward I. made 4 Ann for supplying the want of fines and recoverys and for barring all estates tail and for 5s. they sell to Fra. B. all that the Island of Barbuda and its rights quarries also the Castle\* with all the Guns Cannons warlike and other stores buildings vessels negroes horses mules cattle deer and other stock also those plantations in the I. of Antigua called the Garden, Bettys-Hope, Cotton and Cotton New Work with negroes and stock, also lands called Cables, all which were devised to the said Sir W<sup>m</sup> C. party hereto by the will of Sir W. C. his father for life with remainder in tail male—to hold upon such trusts as they may appoint.

## SAMUELL FIERBRACE, CORPORALL IN CAPT. DAVICE'S COMPANY IN 1654.

This Samuell was the son of Bryan Firebrace, Merchant Tailor, of the City of London. His father went to Constantinople about 1640, leaving his wife with two children, Samuel and John, in London in poor circumstances. He died there intestate, administration being granted in London in May 1643 to Robert Cheeringe, a creditor. Her son Samuel was baptized 9 March 1634-5 at St. Margaret's, Westminster. He died in Jamaica, unmarried, and administration of his effects was granted to his mother Jane Arpe (who appears to have married again) 10 June 1657. He is therein described as "late at Jamaica in the States Service beyond sea, Batchelor."

I have been trying for many years to ascertain how and when my ancestor John Firebrace, uncle of the above Samuel, reached Barbados. It is possible he went out in the same expedition. He became a merchant and died in 1693. His will is in the Barbados Record Office.

### COLLIER OF BARBADOS.

These notes were taken by myself in Barbados in 1904. Mehetabel Christian Collier was my great-grandmother, and I am anxious to find out their earlier history, and whether they belonged to the Dorsetshire family, as their arms lead one to suppose. The inscription was difficult to read, and it may be that Jane Miller, whose register entry does not tally with the tombstone, may have been daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth *Miller*, and not Collier. William and *Jane* Collier of the tombstone seem to have been living at the same time as William and *Mary* Collier of the register. It is rather puzzling.

\* This is the castle which was a short time ago pulled down by Mr. Branch, who was the Government official in charge of the Island. I was this year informed by a friend who resided for three years in Barbuda that the castle was an ancient buccaneers' fort and that it was in need of repairs. I cannot confirm that, because there is no history of the Island, but it was evidently used by the Codringtons, the leaseholders, as a place of defence, and its destruction is to be deplored—a vandalism on which strong comments were made at the time in the W. Indian Committee Circular.

The Collier family bore for their Arms: Gules, on a chevron between three wolves' heads erased Argent, as many roses of the first, stalked and leaves vert. CREST.—A demi-unicorn Argent, almed, maned, and hoofed. (From the impression on a seal in my possession.) In Burke's "General Armoury" these arms are ascribed to Collyer of Dorset-

shire. (There is no evidence of this in Hutchins.-EDITOR.)

Inglis all of Mark Lane London merchants and partners styled Inglis and Cº of the 2<sup>d</sup> part; Cha. Campbell of Bishopsgate St. London merchant, John Deacon of ditto merchant and Alex. Gillespie of America sq. London merchant of the 3<sup>d</sup> part Witnesseth that for 10s. to him W<sup>m</sup> John Jolliffe paid by Chas. Campbell, John Deacon and Alex. Gillespie paid he with the consent of Inglis and Cº doth convey to them all that estate called the Union in the district of Castries in the canton of the Choc in the I. of St Lucia of 249 acres buildings for sugar coppers stock 250 slaves as in the schedule as extracted from the Registry in 1815 and Jas. Lloyd Esq. and Alex. Sim master mariner of St Lucie are appointed attorneys. Signed by all seven. Seal: a lion rampant with the remains of a motto around it. On seven skins.

## SKERRETT OF ANTIGUA AND MONTSERRAT.

This Indenture made 19 Feb. 1756 between Rob. Skerrett, gent., Mary and Anne Skerrett spinsters of co. Galway, Jeremiah and Peter Skerrett of the Island of Antigua, five of the children of Peter Skerrett of the said Co. gent. deceased Michael Semper of said Co. gent. and Eliz. his wife dau. of the said Peter, Robert McNemara of said Co. and Margaret his wife dau. of said Peter, Coleman Heyne of Antigua planter, Patrick, John, Mary, Eliz., and Margaret children of Owen Heyne co. Clare gent, by his late wife Christian dau, to Rob. Skerrett Father of the said Peter; Honora widow of Augustine Moran of said Co. another dau. of said Owen and Christian Heyne and Edmund Heyne of said co. gent. and Jane his wife another dau. of said Owen and Christian Heyne of the one part; Tho. Elmes and Tho. Warner Ex'ors of William Skerrett of Antigua gent. of the other;

Whereas an Indenture was made 16 Aug. 1735 between said William Skerrett and Thiten Skerrett of Mountserrat planter of the 1<sup>st</sup> part, Ashton Warner, Nath. Gilbert and Rob. Tuite of Antigua Esq<sup>res</sup> of the 2<sup>d</sup>; Peter Gaynor of said Island planter of the 3<sup>d</sup> whereby the said Skerretts for £4090 c. paid by Gaynor granted to said Warner Gilbert and Tuite to said Gaynor's use a plantation in ye Division of Nonsuch with slaves stock etc. of 300 acres and half for securing the repayment of said sum and Whereas (after a Chancery Suit in Antigua) William Skerrett made his will 13 Jan. 1750 and devised the residue to the Society in Dublin for English Protestant Schools in Ireland and an Order of said Court was made 7 May 1750 that the said mortgaged estate should be sold and Stephen Lynch purchased for £20,704 7s.  $9\frac{1}{2}$ d. c. and 21 May 1751 it was ordered that all surplus should be laid out in the purchase of a plantation in Antigua settled to William Skerrett's use for life and he by a Codicil of 22 April 1752 revoked the devise to said Society and gave all residue to the children of his kinsman Peter Skerrett and ye children of Owen and Christian Heyne and all said surplus was in said Lynch's hands the said 1<sup>st</sup> parties grant and confirm the said plantation to the said Ex'ors of William Skerrett in Trust to convey to said Lynch on his paying surplus. Inrolled 21 Feb. 1756. P.R.O. Dublin. Old Book, Geo. I., p. 299.

The Skerretts from co. Galway were settled about 1700 in Antigua and Montserrat, and later in St. Kitts (see "Antigua," iii., 88). The above deed was forwarded to me by some correspondent.

## MORNE FORTUNE, ST. LUCIA.

On a monument at St. Lucia (being a pyramid eight feet square at its base and 15 feet S inches high) has been placed the following inscription :-

"Sacred to the memory of his Excellency Major-General George Mackie, C.B. Governor of St. Lucia, who died at the Pavilion, on the 8th of March 1831, in the 53d year of his age, after a severe illness of eight days, and within two months of his arrival in this colony. This tribute of respect to his worth as an amiable man and upright Governor, is erected by the staff officers, non-commissioned officers, and privates of the Royal Artillery, Royal Engineers, 93d Highlanders, and 1st West India regiments, together with a large portion of the respectable inhabitants of the Island, A.D. 1831.'

A similar tablet is placed on the opposite side of the monument to the memory of Major-Gen. Sir David Stewart, K.C.B., who died Governor of the same Island Dec. 28, 1829. ("G.M." for 1832, part ii., p. 94.)

## SIR GEORGE THOMAS, BART., GOVERNOR OF THE LEEWARD ISLANDS.

Eldest son of Col. George Thomas of Antigua by Sarah, only dau. and heiress of Joseph Winthrop and granddau. of Samuel Winthrop the Quaker Deputy-Governor of that Island. His grandfather Major William Thomas of Bristol was a planter as early as 1665. George was born in 1694, but his baptism has not been found. He was a lad of only 13 at his father's death in 1707. In 1718 he inherited the estates of his uncle William Thomas, a wealthy planter who resided at Bushy Hall, Herts. He was returned as a Member of Assembly for Five Islands in 1716 and 1721, for Falmouth in 1723, and again for Five Islands in 1727. From a memo of 1738 it appears that he had been presented to the King by Lord Carteret on his appointment as Governor of Pennsylvania. This was appended to his letter, in which he petitioned against his removal from the Council Board of Antigua by Governor Mathew. In 1753 he was appointed Governor of the Leeward Islands, and after thirteen years of wise and just administration was, on his retirement in 1766, created a baronet and died in Upper Brook Street 31 Dec. 1774 in his 80th year.

He had purchased the estates of Yapton and Ratton in Sussex, and a marble monument was erected to his memory in Willingdon Church. A sketch of his character from the pen of his intimate friend the Hon. Col. Samuel Martin of Antigua, then in his 82nd year, appeared in the "Gent. Mag." for 1775, p. 421.

After making allowance for the fulsome eulogy of the period one may still accept Martin's statement that as a Governor he was a man of courage, energy, and integrity, and as a Chancellor impartial and just in his decrees.

Sir George S. M. Thomas, the present Baronet, owns the portrait of which he has kindly supplied the photograph.





## St. Thomas Lowland, Nevis.

St. Paul's Rectory, Nevis, 10 June 1910.

I enclose a few inscriptions from St. Thomas's Church, Nevis, which may be of interest, together with a description of the Heraldry by Dr. Thomas.

[The Editor has added the notes].

In the church :---

Hic Situs est

THOMAS PYM armiger, vir dignissimus; In hac Insulâ (Nevis) erat a Consiliis Regis Georgii II. fidelis Regi Amator, Patriæ sincerus Amicus, peramans Maritus Philanthropus: Terrestriam pro Cæleste, Vitam reliquit 23° die Novem: Anno Dom: 1743, Ætat 42. Si omnium qui norunt quidquam adversus Mortem Valerent, viveret.

ARMS.--... within an annulet a bull's head cabossed erased [PYM]; impaling .... On a chief .... three covered cups [BUTLER].

CREST.—On a knight's helmet a bird's head between two wings (? an eagle; it is partly covered by the flooring).

Col. Tho. Pym (son of Tho. and grandson of Col. Chas. Pym of Nevis) was a Member of Council. In 1738 he was in London when he executed a mortgage of his plantation of 286 acres, and the Pott Work of 100 acres in St. James's parish, and Parradice of 100 acres in St. Thomas's parish. He also made his will 16 Dec. 1738, proved 21 Feb. 1743 (51, Anstis). By his wife Elizabeth, daughter of Col. Tho. Butler, he left no issue. She remarried John Dasent, and he died 1754. These Pyms were merchants of Bristol, trading with the W.I. I have not been able to prove their relationship to the Pyms of Brymore, co. Som., though both families were connected with the W.I., and the arms on the above ledger are those of the latter, the crest being different.

On a large marble slab :---

Here are the remains of WILLIAM JONES, Esq: who departed this life the 21st day of May

1753, Aged 48 Years.

His Widow, being desirous to shew her Respect to her deceased Husband, hath directed the

following just Inscription. M<sup>r</sup> Jones, altho' without any advantage of a paternal Estate or Education, took early care to forward himself in the world by the Recommendation of his own Behaviour. And so well succeeded in Quality of a Merchant as to become the most considerable one in this Island : during which Time, he maintained a fair character, liv'd in good Credit, and, by keeping ye best of Company, as well as by reading the best of Books, he had acquir'd such a competent knowledge as render'd him very useful to the public, whilst living, and dy'd a worthy Member of the Council of Nevis.

ARMS.—.... A stag statant..... CREST.—(Hidden by the flooring).

Sable, a buck passant argent, Jones of Esthall, Oxfordshire. "Armory.") (Burke's

A Rev. Wm. Jones married, 18 July 1776, Frances Williams, spinster, at St. John's, Nevis. He was buried 18 March 1800 at St. Paul's. I do not know if he was related to the above.

1813, July 12. At Bristol, Frances, widow of Rev. Wm. Jones, of the I. of N. ("G.M.," 93.)

On a large plain stone slab :---

ELIZABETH PETERSEN. Born the 15<sup>th</sup> March 1727 And departed this Life the 1<sup>st</sup> November 1793.

She was a daughter of Wm. Peterson of the "Spring" estate, gent., by Eliz., daughter of Michael Williams, Esq. Anthony Peterson was entered in the Census of 1677-8. Her grandfather, Anthony Peterson, was named in a deed of 1737, and John Peterson, Chief Justice of St. Vincent, who died in 1846, was her nephew.

Her arms were: Gules, on a cross, between four lions rampant, five eagles displayed.

CREST.—An eagle displayed.

#### JACOBUS (the remainder worn away).

ARMS.— .... On a bend three cygnets close between two mullets in chief (the rest defaced-there may have been a third mullet in base).

This is undoubtedly the stone over the vault of Colonel Sir James Russell, Knt., M. of Council 1672, whose will was dated at Nevis 16 July 1687, and proved 4 July 1688 (99, Exton). There is a tablet in St. James's Church, Bristol, to his uncle, Sir James Russell, 1674, with the above arms thereon. There should be a third mullet in base. (See pedigree in "Antigua," iii., 60.) The coat is given in Awbrey's "History of North Wilts."

In the churchyard :--

#### D. CHRISTIANA BROME D. ROBERTI HELME filia, died February 25, 1765.

#### ARMS.—In a lozenge . . . . On a bend three pheons . . . . [HELME].

Robert Helme was a merchant at Nevis in 1676, and later agent for the R. African Co. up to his death in 1685. Sarah his widow and executrix made her will 4 Oct. 1687, proved 1690 (72, Dyke), but mentions no children. Her brother, Capt. Wm. Freeman, was a noted planter of St. Kitts, and later of Fawley Court, near Henley.

1705, July 8, Mr. Tho. Helme of Gillingham, co. Dorset, Gent., only brother and h.-at-l. of Rob. H., late of Nevis. Letter of attorney to Mr. Ph. Brome of N., Gent., and Mr. Rob. H. of N., merchant, to recover all sums owing at the Leeward I. ("Antigua," i., 272.)

Philip Brome, a Member of Council of Nevis (whose will is given in "Antigua," iii., 414, by mistake as Browne), in his will dated 8 Dec. 1705, proved 25 Sep. 1708 (196, Barrett), says: To my wife Christian Brome, formerly Chapman, on whom I have settled £3000, £200 c., furniture, my plate left with Mrs. Mary Helme of London, and 6 negroes.

Eliz. Helme of Gillingham, co. Dorset, spinster, perhaps granddaughter of Robert, in her will dated 12 May 1787, proved 7 Sep. 1792 (470, Fountain), demised her moiety of the plantations and negroes in Nevis to her niece Grace Cox. The abovesaid Robert had a brother, Major Wm. Helme of Antigua, a Member of Council in 1691, and dead before 1703, who left by Mary Baxter his wife a daughter and heiress Maria, whose arms, as above, are on a shield of pretence on the stone in St. John's Church, Nevis, to her husband John Pinney, Esq.

The arms of Helme of Worcestershire are: Argent, on a bend Sable three pheons of the first. (Burke's "Armory.")

In the churchyard :---

RICARDUS ABBOTTUS aged 64 October 23<sup>d</sup> 1724 and Carolus his son. (Latin inscription with English translation.)

ARMS.— .... A chevron between three pears .... CREST.— .... A nag's head erased.

1660, Dec. 27, John Abbott, senior, signed an Act of Assembly. Lieut. John Abbott (probably a son) was entered in the Census of 1678, and was a Member of Assembly 1678, 1682, 1684, and as "Capt." took his seat at the Council on 30 March 1685. He petitioned for a fixed salary as Coroner on 15 April 1686, and after that date his name no longer appears in the Colonial Calendars. A Mrs. Hester Abbott was separately entered in the Census of 1678, and was probably the widow of the John Abbott, sen<sup>r</sup>.

Richard Abbott (probably son of the second John) was first elected to the Assembly in 1688, and as "Major" was returned for the N.W. Division in 1693, for the parish of St. Thomas in 1694-5, and was sworn of the Council on 30 April 1696. Gov<sup>r</sup> Codrington objected to his being omitted from the new list 14 Dec. 1699, and the King directed Sir Wm. Mathew on 15 May 1704 that he should be continued. As "Col." he was entered in the Census of 1707-8. He was appointed Brigadier-General of the Leeward I. on 1711-12. In a deposition of 19 Sep. 1715 his age was given as about 50. In 1717 he petitioned to purchase his leasehold plantation of 250 acres French lands at St. Kitts. In 1720, 1722 and 1723 he was President, no doubt up to his death.

Another Rich<sup>d</sup> Abbott, "jun<sup>r</sup>" in 1720 (perhaps son of the last-named), who had married before 1720 Eliz., daughter of James Bevon, Esq., of Nevis, Speaker in 1699, and left three daughters, Eliz., Frances and Anne, as "Major" was appointed to the Council 6 Oct. 1722, and was apparently residing in the parish of St. Thomas when his daughter Eliz. was buried in 1733. An Edward Abbott was recommended for the Council in 1741. I have no later notes of this family, and there are no wills at Somerset House. The above arms are those of Abbott of Guildford in Surrey, and if search were made I think the first settler John would be found to be a cadet of that family. The "nag's head" should probably be a unicorn's.

#### TRINITY, PALMETTO POINT, ST. KITTS.

The four following M.I. in the churchyard were copied by Mr. N. Darnell Davis in 1879:-

1. John Manning, 1725. (See Vol. I., 347.)

2. Here lyeth interr'd, the body of JOHN BOURRYAU,\* Esq<sup>r</sup> who was born the 11<sup>th</sup> day of Oct. 1662, and departed this life the 6<sup>th</sup> day of August 1728, aged 66 years.

\* He was entered in the Census of 1707-8 as aged 48, and was probably father of Zachariah Bourryau of London, merchant, formerly of St. Kitts, who purchased Blighborough Manor in Lincolnshire in 1747, and died 24 March 1752, leaving issue. Will [59, Bettesworth]. His arms as quartered by the Luards were: Gules, a chevron between three estoiles pierced Arg.

3. Here lyeth interred the body of  $M^{rs}$  JANE GUILMEN a daughter of M<sup>r</sup> ZACHARIAH & MARY PRICE deceased, who departed this life y<sup>e</sup> 28<sup>th</sup> of Sept<sup>r</sup> 1722, in the 44<sup>th</sup> year of her age.

Howell Esq. one of the Masters and upon the Compl<sup>t</sup> bidding £20,421° he should become the purchaser and pay over to the Defd<sup>ts</sup> £935 the balance and deduct costs and whereas on the 16 Feb. 1781 the Master at the house of Robt Pitcairn Tavern Keeper in the Town of St Jago de la Vega sold the plantation to Robt Minto for the said sum and made his Report which was enrolled in the Office of the Register of this Court and whereas the balance due with interest is  $\pounds984$  c. and Complainants taxed costs were  $\pounds343$  and Defd<sup>ts</sup>  $\pounds59$ making £403 and Robt Minto hath paid over the balance of £581 the Virgos now release all claim and confirm to him the said Plantation containing 633 acres butting E. on Tho. #### PRESENTATION AND INSTITUTION TO A LIVING IN NEVIS.

"By his Excellency Walter Hamilton, Efq; Captain-General, and Chief Governour in and over all His Majesty's Leeward Charibbee Iflands in America, and Ordinary of the fame, &c. [L.S.]

Whereas his most Sacred Majesty hath given and granted to me, Power and Authority of Collating Orthodox Ministers to all and every of the Parifhes within my refpective Government; and whereas the Parifh of St. John in the Ifland of Nevis is at present deftitute of a Minifter, and Mr. William Smith being recommended to me by the Right Reverend Father in God, John Lord Bifhop of London, as a perfon qualified to take on him the Cure of Souls: By vertue of the faid Powers and Authorities to me granted, I do by these Presents, Institute the faid William Smith, Clerk, Minister of the faid Parish; to perform all the Duties incumbent on him as Minifter of the fame, and to have and enjoy all such Salaries Dues and Perquifites as do, or fhall belong to him either by Law or Cuftom.

To the Churchwardens and Veftry-men of St. John's Parifh, Nevis.

Given under my Hand and Seal the 18th day of April 1716, in the fecond year of His Majefty's Reign.

# Monumental Inscriptions in England relating to West Indians.<sup>+</sup>

"F.B.J." stands for "Farley's Bristol Journal."

### CLIFTON CHURCH, BRISTOL.

"In memory of CONSTANTINE PHIPPS Esq., who departed this life at Clifton, universally lamented, the 11th June 1797, in the 51st year of his age."

From a letter sent in 1832 by the Rev. Mr. Anstey to Col. P. Phipps it appears that Constantine Phipps, formerly of St. Kitts, was buried at Clifton on 19 June

1797 in the chancel, and Mr. Anstey enclosed the above inscription. I did not find this stone, so it has probably disappeared. See "The Life of Col. Pownoll Phipps," published 1894 for private circulation; also *ante* I., 127, for the M.I. at Bath to Eliza his widow.

Major Phipps writes that letters have been preserved to the above Constantine Phipps from Justinian Casamajor written in 1791-98 from London, referring to mortgages on Constantine Phipps' estate in St. Kitts; also one letter to Constantine Phipps' widow Eliza Tierney, whom he married 13 May 1771. Apparently Constantine Phipps leased his plantation to Mr. Rawlins, who was dead in 1798.

On a marble monument in the Church :---

To the Memory of Mrs. ELIZABETH BLENMAN, (Wife of WILLIAM BLENMAN, Efq; of the Ifland of Barbadoes, and one of the Daughters of JOSEPH DOTIN, Efq; of the faid Ifland) who died in this Village on the 10<sup>th</sup> August 1763, in the 36<sup>th</sup> Year of her Age & the 15<sup>th</sup> of her Marriage, leaving Four Sons & Two Daughters. (Several lines of eulogy follow.)

ARMS.—Gules, two lions passant in pale Or. (Rudder's "Gloucestershire," 382.)

This monument was probably destroyed when the old church was pulled down. The arms are those of Dotin.

Jonathan Blenman was Attorney General in 1726-7 and Judge of the Admiralty in 1734. According to his book-plate he bore: CREST.—A dexter arm holding a scroll. ARMS.—Per chevron engrailed Azure and Argent, two lozenges in chief, a bee in base; impaling, Argent, three daggers.

He was brought to England by his parents in his fourth year, and received his education under Dr. Goddard, at Winchester school. He graduated in medicine at the University of Edinburgh in 1801. In 1802 he came to Bristol, and occupied a house in Park-street; from whence he removed to Berkeley-square, and lived partly there, and partly at a property which he had purchased at Hinton, near Clutton. In 1811 he removed to Clifton .... The loss of his wife in 1838, inflicted a blow from which he never recovered .... He removed from Clifton in 1840, to a house in Warwickshire, near one of his married daughters. About a year before his death, wishing to be near his family, he returned to Bristol . . . ." (long notice). (Ibid., 1843, pp. 93, 94.)

the Sum of £4602 12 and Interest on the several days and times and in manner therein mentioned. ## IN CHANCERY. LORD HEATHFIELD v. DANIEL MACNAMARA.

Bill states that William Elliott about 1768 employed defd<sup>t</sup> as a counsel to place out £26,000, and defd<sup>t</sup> in 1768 so lent to James Hussey of Montserrat, Esq., who was brother-in-law of deft., £4000 on security of certain plantations, and by lease, etc., of 14 and 15 July 1768 Jas. Hussey made over the Hamond plant<sup>n</sup> in the p'sh of St. Geo., Dyers plant<sup>n</sup> in p'sh of S<sup>t</sup> Anthony, also Germans Bay plant<sup>n</sup> in the p'sh of St. Patrick, and 260 negroes, mules, cattle to s<sup>d</sup> W<sup>m</sup> Elliott, repayment with 5 per cent. interest to be made 15 July 1775, and 4 bonds executed by Jas.

Hussey, the Father of  $s^d$  Jas. H., for £4000 were assigned to  $s^d$  defd<sup>t</sup> in T. for  $s^d$  W. E. as collateral security.  $S^d$  £4000 was not repaid but extension of time was allowed and int. was paid till July 1778, and then defd<sup>t</sup> recommended W. E. to employ Tho. Meade of sd I., Esq., also a near relation of defdt, as his attorney, and Tho. Meade in 1777 or 1778 brought action in the Ct of K. B. and C. P. in Montserrat v. Jas. Hussey as h. at l. of s<sup>d</sup> Jas. H. the Father, and in 1779 obtained  $judg^t$  and the plant<sup>s</sup> were sold by auction and Tho. Meade purchased them for £1300 st.

W<sup>m</sup> Elliott died May 1780 and app. Lord Heathfield, plaintiff's late father, and pltf. Ex'ors. Pltf. can get no account of money from Tho. Meade, who arrived in England in 1793, and pltf. has discovered that Jas. H. was only tenant for life and afterwards died abroad insolvent, and there were prior charges on s<sup>d</sup> est., and the mortg. to W<sup>m</sup> Elliott had never been recorded in the Secys office, and defdt having a claim v. Jas. Hussey the Father in right of his defendant's wife, dau. of s<sup>d</sup> Jas. H. the father, obt. judgm<sup>t</sup> v. Jas. H. the s. and seized all slaves and sold them for £5000 st. to Tho. Meade in return for annuity of  $\pm 500$  to defd<sup>t</sup> and his wife. Defd<sup>t</sup> at his house in Lincoln's Inn Fields refuses satisfaction.

#### FURTHER ANSWER OF DEFENDANT.

Does not know where the 4 bonds are. Defdt had a prior lien of £3000 secured by bond of 25 Nov. 1757 exec. by sd Jas. Hussey the F. to Col. Michael Browne (a T. of defd<sup>1</sup>), being part of portion of defendant's wife who was dau. of s<sup>d</sup> Jas. H. the F., and Jas. H. the s. defd<sup>t</sup> lent £750 and the charge of £3750 was secured by deed of 24 and 25 May 1762 and sd Wm E. knew of this, and the only deed he has with Tho. Meade is that of 18 May 1784 bet. defd<sup>t</sup> of 1<sup>st</sup> p<sup>t</sup>, Tho. Meade of 2<sup>d</sup>, and Alex<sup>r</sup> Gordon and Sam. Martin Irish of 3<sup>d</sup> p<sup>t</sup>.
