A THIRD Volume having been completed, I take this opportunity of again conveying my thanks to all supporters, and especially to those who have contributed articles.

I may mention more particularly Mr. F. CUNDALL, Mrs. B. F. SCARLETT, Miss M. NEMBARD, Rev. Dr. L. B. THOMAS, Mr. J. BROMLEY, Mr. N. DARNELL DAVIS, and Mr. E. G. SINCKLER.

The Lists of early settlers and of testators have been of much use to a wide circle of readers; the M.I. of West Indians in this country have been the means of rescuing from oblivion the names of past worthies; and the pedigrees have often served to again bring into touch forgotten relatives.

A visit of six months' duration to the Islands last winter enabled me to investigate the local records and to collect a mass of notes, some of which will be embodied in a separate volume dealing with the M.I. of Barbados and the Leeward Islands

In the coming year a List of Wills recorded in Barbados will appear, and the Parish Register of St. Thomas, Middle Island, St. Kitts, will fill the Supplement.

ADDITIONS AND CORRECTIONS.

Page 36.

A correspondent writes (I think it was Major Phipps): Ann Campbell was the dau. of another James Tierney, Esq., of the firm of Tierney, Lilly & Roberts of Lawrence Pountney Lane, London. He was also of Theobald, Herts, from where his other dau. Eliz., mar. in 1771 Constantine Phipps, formerly of St. Kitts.

Ann mar. 1, Isaac Elton, Mayor of Bristol; 2, Colin Campbell of Brock Street, Bath. Mr. James Tierney, died at Stapleton, near Bristol, on 12 Jan. 1781, and was probably buried in the Cathedral by his wife. Will proved in P.C.C., in 1781, of which Adm. James Young was an Exor. I think Jas. Tierney had no connection with Jamaica, except perhaps through trade.

Page 41.

Applewhaite Frere, entered Eton 31 Oct. 1765, was adm. Fell. Com. of St. John's Coll., Cam., 19 March 1771, aged 18, M.A. 1776. Adm. to Lincoln's Inn, 14 Jan. 1775.

Page 50.

Major Phipps writes: Eliz. Phipps was certainly not sister of Capt. James Phipps, all of whose brothers and sisters are known to me. She was probably his dau., born about 1683.

Page 51.

1st paragraph. This Eliz. Pym cannot be the dau. of Capt. James Phipps, who himself was born in 1653, marrying about 1678-80. I suggest that Col. Pym mar. twice.

The Editor saw recently at Nevis a Butler deed, dated 28 Feb. 1754, by which it appears that Tho. Pym mar. on 15 Sept. 1730, Eliz., one of the daus. of Tho. Butler, their marriage settlement being dated 7 July 1730. Eliz., relict of the said Tho. Pym, mar. in 1744 John Dasent, late of Nevis, deceased, and he died 7 March 1752.

Jane Lanhather of Nevis, widow. Will dated 23 Oct. 1693. All est. to my granddau. Jane Pym, widow of Tho. Pym, late of Nevis, and to Tho. Pym, son of Eliz. Pym (his father Chas. Pym) equally.

Page 62.

Page 68.

Delete lines 19 and 20. Line 22. Mrs. Cath. Johnson was née Williams.

Page 81.

Mr. G. F. Judah writes to Mr. F. Cundall: "I am sorry that the friend who gave you the information that the 'old Town' of Morant Bay was at 'Church Corner' was mistaken. There was never any other town than the present one. Church Corner is a locality deriving its name from its being the corner which you turn into when you leave Morant Bay to go on the road to the Church."

Page 100.

For "Cannt" read "Caunt."

Page 171.

Eleventh line from the bottom. *For "Cat" read "Cod Pen, afterwards known as the Hounslow Estate."*

Page 200.

Sixth entry from the bottom. *For "Field" read "Ford."*

Page 215.

The Rev. Dr. Thomas points out that some confusion has arisen owing to my arrangement of the notes. Note 1 on p. 215 refers to the entry of 21 July 1750 on p. 216. Note 2 on p. 216 refers to the entries of 25 May 1812 and following paragraph on p. 217. On p. 220 the two entries of Charles Symonds probably relate to two children, and there was no error on Dr. Thomas's part in transcribing the Register.

Edward Frye, late of St. Ann's, Esq., now residing in Montserrat, for £150 sells to Jane Frye of St. Anthony, Montserrat, spinster, a house in Basseterre, St. Christopher, for seven years. (Vol. N, Deed No. 4132, *Ibid.*)

Daniel Cunningham of St. George's, Bloomsbury, co. Middlesex, Esq., son and heir of Robert Cunningham, late of St. Christopher, Esq., deceased. Lease of 1731 by Robert C., then of London, recited. 18 Jan. 1748. (*Ibid.*, No. 4072. There are several other deeds.)

Page 281.

Mrs. Scarlett informs us that Mitford Crowe was younger son of Patrick Crowe of Roseden and Ashington, and of the Hermitage, Hexham, who died 13 Jan. 1694, M.I. in St. Nicholas, Newcastle-on-Tyne, by Anne, 3^d dau. of Robert Mitford of Newcastle, and Philadelphia Wharton his wife.

Arms of Crowe: *Gules, a chevron Or between three cocks Argent.*

Crest: *A cock Argent, combed, wrattled, and legged Or.*

1813 Feb. 25. Monday was mar. Job Ede, esq., late of the island of Nevis, to Catherine Maria, eldest dau. of Lieut-Col. Williams of Falmouth, and grandniece of Mrs. Bulkeley, of Sidney-pl. in this city. (Bath Chronicle.)

There is a floor-stone to him in St. Thomas Lowland, Nevis.

Dominick Trant, late of Montserrat, now of London. Will dated 9 June 1761. To the 2 daurs. of Joan Sayer, viz., Sarah S. and Bridget S., and to her granddau. Mrs. Molineux £50 apiece. (176, St. Eloy.)

In 1678 Governor Stapleton wrote that he had presented Mr. Molineux to Montserrat and that each minister would be paid £100 st. a year besides fees. 1697, Aug. 12. Rich^d M. sworn of the Council. ("W.I. Cal.," 580.)

In the summer of 1772 Miss Wilkes paid a visit to Mr. and Mrs. Crisp Molyneux at Garboldisham in Norfolk. She wrote to her father: "This situation, and the country around it are very pleasant. There is a good garden, with a very pretty wood. The house is good and convenient, but does not stand high; it has however an agreeable prospect." . . . Mr. Crisp Molyneux's brother‡ is here. . . . Mr. Molyneux and his family are safely arrived at Paris. (Almon's "Memoirs of John Wilkes," vol. iv.)

Jamaica: Description of the Principal Persons there.

(ABOUT 1720, SIR NICH^s LAWES, GOVERNOR.)

The following interesting letter has been transcribed by Mr. N. Darnell Davis from the Records at Fulham Palace. It was written to the Bishop of London by the Rev. Wm. May, Rector of Kingston, whose will see in Vol. I., p. 261:—

My Lord,

This may serve in some measure to make an estimate of this people from the other Relations.

There is not six families who are well descended as gentlemen on the whole Island. The original character Your Lordship has in Sir Rich^d Baker's *Chronicle & Patrem sequitur sua proles*. And as for those Englishmen that came as mechanics hither, very young, and have now acquired good Estates in Sugar Plantations and Indigo, &c., of course they know no better than what maxims they learn in the Country. To be now short & plain, Your Lordship will see that they have no maxims of Church or State but what are absolutely anarchical.

There is a mystery I'm sure which yourself, My Lord, & our ministers are puzzled to unfold, to see the printed Votes, scolding like Billingsgates, as if our Governor and Council were on the right side, that is to say, ready for the true maxims of our Constitution, and the Assembly, assuming more than our House of Commons pretend. I doubt not but your estated Creolians tell you that this is only the effect of the two Parties, Whiggs and Torys as we have at home, and that the Gov^r & Council moderate between them by the right maxims of our Constitution. But, Your Lp. cannot but see how it would be to kick against the pricks, to attempt to have not only a single Act of Parliament, but a Cumulative Law (of which my Lawyer, *sub rosa*, assures me, there are no less than 25, all relating to one another) put in execution, though the fact is notorious.

Accordingly, any pragmatic fellow; an Officer or Justice, when he thinks fit, will go out of our churches before sermon is ended, to disturb our Congregation, contrary to the same statute, tho' the Penalty for the Laymen is, for the first fault 65 pounds sterling. This can be no wonder if Your Lp. consider that our estated men now are all like Jonah's gourd, and *novi homines*.

The Governor* himself was Apprentice to one Rabey in Spanish Town, who sold locks, & nails, pots, frying-pans, bills, axes, hinges, hammers, &c., and, there are people alive now, who remember that he went barefooted, & bare leg'd, with shoes on, as was the custom for most young shop-keepers & planters in those dayes.

The famous Peter Beckford† his Father came with 2 or 3 Negroes on the Island, a small time after it was taken, & being a hunter, he & his Negroes catch'd horses and sold them again, for some years, by which he made a beginning of his fortune here.

The great Colonel Gale‡ his father was a horse-catcher, for all his prodigious Estate, and he is nevertheless as illiterate as his Father was.

When the Spaniards were driven out of the Island, they left great flocks of cattle, sheep, & horses, which they had lodged in the woods when the Invasion began. This afforded an occasion to a good many of those, who are now prouder than our Dukes & Marquesses, to so make a Livelihood of, & to lay the foundation of the Estates they now enjoy.

There are three Creolians in England who have had English Education, & make a figure at London with their Estates in this country: M^r Langley, M^r Low, & M^r Dawkins. The Fathers of two of them were but mean men. M^r Dawkins's Father was an overseer here first. The Father of M^r Low|| (called Colonel Low) was, as I have heard, some of such employment as a Porter in Leadenhall Street, but he set up here as a Surgeon. M^r Langley's¶ Father was a Turkey Merchant who had misfortunes in his business, but came over here with a considerable stock, was a man of good education, a good man & man of honour.

In our Council now, I shall shew you that tho' they be all estated men, & of the greatest, yet are they all of the same original. M^r Bernard's Father was a man of Education, and had some creditable beginning. The two Moores' Father was an illiterate, poor, but honest man, who came hither from Barbadoes, & began

meanly, but had success. These two Brothers, John and Samuel,* Councillors, have been some small time at Oxford University, are Masters in Musick, well bred, and have a competent smack of the *belles lettres*. They are very civil to clergymen, & all men, & have morals enough which would have qualified them for the highest character of Gentlemen in the Augustan Age of Rome. But, as to their Christian Religion, no man here can say what they are, for they don't hardly come to church at all. Samuel has been in his Parish Church but once in five years. They outwardly, with D^r Hoy, profess to be strenuous for M^r Whiston's new Vampt Arrian principles, while they carress the formerly mentioned M^r Fry, & have now taken him home to the house of Samuel, for a constant companion, if not for something else. But, they are rigid for the anarchical principles of the country. John goes now for England, & I know, has sense enough to hide these matters when there, & deny them if asked about them; and, so will they all, except when the country men get together, for certainly, no noble Englishman can be more zealous for our excellent constitution than they are for the present condition of this unhappy Island.

He called Colonel Rose† is a cooper by trade, and wrought with his apron for dayly hire since he came here. He is no immoral man, but you may imagine whether fitted to be a tool to the others who are men of parts, such as the two Moores, & M^r Bernard who is a Lawyer. This man appears to be for the true maxims of our English Constitution, if you'll judge, my Lord, by the Governor's speeches, & the Council's proceedings with the Assembly. For all these discourses and arguments are his composition; and yet, for all this, he is as much for the anarchical principles of the country, when out of the Council, as Peter Beckford, who wears no mask, and is the God of the Criolians; for, he is equal in parts and learning to M^r Bernard, & having so many sugar-works & vast territories in Land, the country Natives believe that for the good of his children, 'tis impossible for him to do anything but what is the true interest of the country. And no men are greater than they. And, as for the Chief Justice, who is the second man in Peter's Party, M^r Bernard and he are hand & glove.

Another of our Councillors is called Colonel Gomersel,‡ bred a Factor here, is a fair moral man. His Father was a waterman who plyed between Passage Fort and Kingstone Village, &c.

He called Colonel Archpold,§ the Councillor, his Father was a mean man, after the taking of the Island, but a small Planter, and relations (?) to the neighbours who came to settle after him, to whom Colonel D'Oyly (then Governor) used to give many a dram of his bottle, which was a good lusty cane he employed upon complaints made. He was wont to send for him in a morning and hear both parties, and then called for his Dram Bottle to treat him with. He and his brother Henry are civil, well-bred men, but no one can tell their Religion.

There are many more great estated men on the Island, but these, excepting one or two more, are the men who have a Notion of our Constitution, and who have found out the way to blind you at home with these sham-fights, & in all probability will continue to govern the Island, and hand down their anarchical principles to their Posterity; for, it is no matter whether the Hamiltonians (so called), or the Beckfordians be at the uppermost spoke of the wheel, these principles will and must continue, unless God should bless our Ministry to take some pains to be informed of these matters.

Now, whether it may not be destructive to our State to have a generation of subjects bred up so, who have great Estates, and will come over all, or most of them, in times, to live with us, do poyson Englishmen in their principles. This consideration is of much more importance, when your Lordship shall be farther informed of another stratagem for these ends which they have got, which is this. The only Act of this Island for bringing over White Men, whom they are sensible of themselves, to be the only defence of the country, is that called the *Deficiency Act*: viz. Every planter for 40 Negroes which he has shall procure from England one white man, i.e., a Britton or Irishman, or pay £13 19s. per an., which is termed Deficiency Money. They scarcely bring any in respect of what they might do (but pay the Deficiency constantly). If Your Lordship considers that it is a certain truth, which I can demonstrate; and the late Secretary of the Island, M^r Wood, an Englishman, in his Essayes about Trade, and the improvement of this Island, has asserted that there are not on the Island of White persons capable in any manner of bearing Arms, reckoning (according to the vulgar saying) rag, tag, and bobtail, 2500.

Now, what is this number to govern at least 90,000 or 100,000 Negroes. It is manifest that the Spaniards, our Neighbours, when they, by Providence, turn'd their Arms of two Expeditions, at one time one against Pensicola, and 'tother against Providence, had they united them and made the descent on us, we must have been a sacrifice, and an easy prey to them.

Next, if one half of this noble Island is certainly uninhabited, & may be hundreds of years unmanured upon the present maxims, this deserves serious consideration of our Ministry. The Government at present is anarchical, but nearest to any form of Aristocracy. And this seems to be the principal aim of all our great estated men now, to turn it into an Aristocracy in time, and make use of the mentioned signs for this purpose.

Tho' some of the Councillors do make occasional conformity for once in communicating with the church, but never more, others never.

M^r Pennant's* Father had some beginning that was creditable, but left but an ordinary Estate behind him. Now, the son having got the escheat of Cupos the Dutchman, as is related in the pamphlet *The Groans of Jamaica*, is become a Councillor, & a vehement Propagator of the country principles, Whiston's, and Erastianism.

John Morant,† mentioned Councillor, was brought up a shoemaker, is a moral man. Pretended to be of the Church, but vehement for the country principles; therefore variable, and a fit tool to these mentioned before, for any new emergency, to pull down the Church, &c.

There is our Chief Justice: no man can tell his Religion. He has never qualified himself (& he has held it since my Lord Hamilton's time) by the Act of Parliament. He has risen from a very mean beginning, though himself and brothers have great Estates.

Colonel Heywood,§ lately Governor, Mamnon is his God, & vehement for the present corrupt principles; and, his son, Jemmy, another colonel, and most wicked debauchee, his Heir.

M^r Beckford's Brother, Tom,|| Colonel too, is a Libertine, & of the country principles, & has a great Estate. He has killel his man, and so has his Brother Peter, but this makes neither a bit more Religious. He was a Councillor in Colonel Heywood's time, & his graceless son was Governor of ye Fort at Port Royal, a post worth 500 at least (Libs.) per ann. And so these Estanted men govern the Island at this rate. Their brothers, sons, &c., let them be never so

worthless, are put into all the hon^{ble} & profitable posts; and, let either My Lord Hamilton's Party, as they are called (for a cloak), or M^r Beckford's, have the Council, this is the disposition of the body politick.

There is another Councillor still: one M^r Gregory,* a man of some education and parts, but a Libertine, & of ye country principles, tho' by the Minutes of the Assembly, in England you would be apt to think him stanch for our Constitution. His Parents had an obscure beginning here also.

And, as for the late Colonel Peak,† his Father taught poor boyes here at first, as a Schoolmaster; and, when K. James was on the Throne, & the Duke of Albemarle was sent over with Father Churchill, to pervert the country by force, if not by fair means, this good prebendal Church of England schoolmaster publicly gave God thanks that he had lived to see the time that he durst own his Religion, which was the Popish.

Next, there is now another Councillor, Colonel Sadler, a man bred a factor, and has had some education. Is a man well bred, perfectly civil, & of parts. His Father was another schoolmaster, & a known Papist too. He is an occasional conformist, but, both he and the late M^r Peak (who has left a good Estate) is rigid for the present state of the country principles.

Our Council, viz., His Matie's at home, have thought fit hitherto to grant License to every Planter to run as much land as he thinks he may be able in his life time to manure, & in the mean time to pay one halfpenny p^r acre p^r an., which is termed quit Rents. But the end of this is quite perverted. And all the great Sugar-Planting men mentioned, & others have run out ten times as much land as now they are able to manure (paying quit rents). Some have run out 40,000 and 50,000 acres of land, as Peter Beckford and Colonel Gale. Some 15,000, some 10,000, some 8000, some 7000, besides what, with their utmost ability they are able to manure. Must the King's good subjects at home, who are as capable to begin plantations, as their Fathers, and themselves were, be excluded from their Liberty of settling Plantations in this noble Island, for ever, & the King and Nation at home be deprived of so much riches, to make a few upstart Gentlemen Princes? The remainder of the Land which they have run out is every whit as good as what is already planted. And could these present Planters be ever capable to cultivate one 6th or 7th, or 10th of what they pay quit-rents for, they will have much greater Estates then our greatest Dukes at home; and this Aristocracy, and this accession to our Nobility they must necessarily have at heart. This must be the grand project of our Creolian Politicians, if we may judge of men by their actions. Every Englishman who is not one of them in interest, feels their exorbitancies often; which made the late learned M^r Barrow, the Lawyer, often say that this People, *innuendo* the Jamaicans, ought to be governed with a rod as we do children. And to corroborate their interest & grand project, they have incorporated two Lawyers, men of parts, among them, by marrying them to Sugar Works: M^r Kelby and M^r Melling. These are the present circumstances of the Island, & the test of all Englishmen who are Lovers of our Constitution. Your Lordship's assistance, which has been so advantageous to our Nation, may, by God's Blessing contribute much to change those for the better, which is the hearty prayer of, My L^d,

F. and Anne F. £150 each at 16 or marriage. All residue to my children John Edward Alexander James Line Firebrace and Phillips Firebrace at 21. I appoint John Moore, Esq., Phillips Davies, Esq., Jas. Gohier, gent., and Sus^a Needham, wid., Ex'ors and G. Whereas my 1. husb^d purchased a negro woman, Great Sabina, of W^m Page, gent., dec^d, who hath 2 chⁿ, Dick and Boy, I give Sabina to Dorothy Page, Boy to Mary Page, and Dick to Sarah Page. Bed, &c. to Ann Page that lives with me.

In the p. of Jane Peirce, Tho. Clarke. Sworn by Mr Tho. Clarke before Gov. Hen. Worsley at Pilgrim 4 Feb. 172 $\frac{1}{2}$. Entered same day.

Alexander Firebrace. Will dated 1763.* Unto my wife . . . Firebrace all the residue of my estate for life . . . as I have herein before devised unto my said wife; unto my two youngest sons, Thomas Firebrace and Alexander Firebrace, them and their heirs and assigns for ever, they paying to their brother, my eldest son John Firebrace, now at the University of . . . in the Kingdom of Great Britain, the sum of £50 currency immediately after the decease of my said wife Sarah Firebrace. I appoint my said wife Sarah Firebrace executrix, the Reverend Mr Thomas. . . . Proved 8 June 1764.

William Firebrace of St. Michael, Barbados, merchant. Will dated 6 Aug. 1801. Transactions depending between the firm of W^m Firebrace & Sons and Joseph Barrow and Co., if a balance be due to latter I charge my private est. with £1000c. towards it. To my wife Angelletta F. all my est. for her life. To my dau. Line F. £500c., dau. Marg^t Williams F. £500c., and all residue to my s. W^m Newton F. My wife and son, and friend Rob. Reed, Ex^{trix} and Ex^{ors}. In the p. of M. A. Parks, Tho. Woodin. Sworn by Marg^t A. Parks before Gov^r Seaforth at Pilgrim 10 Feb. 1802. Ent^d same day.

* This is one of the wills contained in the box recently found, and is very much perished, the papers having been completely worn away at the folds, and much of the writing illegible. The later part of the will is in mere fragments.

Will of Richard Scott of the Island of Barbados, Esq., dated 8 Oct. 1719. Mentions his estate in Barbados, Great Britain, and elsewhere. John Wheeler of the Parish of St. Peter's, Barbados. Will dated 15 June 1770. Dau. Ann Wheeler, granddau. Ann Lyne Wheeler, son John Borell Wheeler; John Borell Wheeler and Anne Wheeler Ex'ors. Proved 25 July 1770.

NOTE.—John Borell Wheeler of the Parish of St. James, Barbados, married Anne Lyne, daughter of Edward Firebrace, at St. Michael's 31 Dec. 1765.

This Indenture made 3rd January 1732 between Richard Firebrace of St Michael, Gentleman, eldest Grandson and heir at law, as well of John Firebrace, merchant, his late Grandfather, of Susannah Firebrace, widow, his late Grandmother, of John Firebrace, Gentleman, his late uncle,† all late of St Michail, Barbados, and Richard Lindon, Gentleman, for a legacy of £250 bequeathed by the will of John Firebrace the elder to his daughter Hannah Firebrace, with whom the said Richard Lindon intermarried. Witness: Edward Firebrace. Recorded 25 June 1734, vol. 129, fo. 18.

This Indenture made 1 July 1784 between William Firebrace of St Michael, and Samuel Nasum of the same, whereby William Firebrace, in consideration of his love for his wife Angeletta, and his daughters Anne Lyne and Margaret Williams, grants slaves to Samuel Nasum upon trust for William Firebrace for his life, with remainder to Angeletta and Anne Lyne and Margaret Williams the daughters, being minors at the date of the deed. If the daughters die before reaching the age of 21 years the slaves to be divided between his sons William Newton and Samuel Thomas and their mother Angeletta Firebrace.

This Indenture made 17 April 1805 between William Newton Firebrace and Samuel Thomas Firebrace, both late of the Parish of St Michael and Island of

In consideration of £2350 paid by the said John Cummins, the said William Newton Firebrace and Samuel Thomas Firebrace grant a piece of land in Bridgetown containing 6830½ square feet, together with a mansion and dwelling house to the said John Cummins in fee.

This Indenture made 21 Oct. 1805 between Ward Cadogan of S^t Michael's, Esq^{re}, of the one part, William Newton Firebrace, late of the said Parish, but at present of the Colony of Demerara, Esquire, and Mehetabel Christian his wife, late Mehetabel Christian Collier, spinster, of the second part, and Christopher Knight of S^t Michail, Gentleman, as trustee, of the third part, regarding the sale of three male slaves for £500 to William Newton Firebrace and Mehetabel Christian his wife.

Deed Poll made 27 May 1806 under the hand of Angeletta Firebrace of the Parish of S^t Michael's, Widow, granting in consideration of the sum of £90 to be paid by Catherine Lacey, a free mulatto, a negro female slave by name Melissinda.

This Indenture made 2 Dec. 1808 between William Newton Firebrace of the Colony of Demerara, Esquire, of the one part, and William Sturge Joy of the Parish of S^t Michael's, Wheelwright, of the other part, regarding the sale of a piece of land in Bridgetown, containing about 13,247 square feet, for the sum of £500, together with a mansion as per plan endorsed.

This Indenture made 7 June 1810 between William Newton Firebrace of the Colony of Demerara, Esquire, of the one part, and Frances Maynard Weeks, widow, of the other part, granting to her for the sum of £650 a piece of land, together with a Dwelling House in the parish of S^t Michaels in a certain Street called Mare Hill St., bounding lands belonging to M^{rs} Duke, M^{rs} Dewsbury, and John Ironmonger, Esquire.

Lyne of Barbados and Jamaica.

Christopher Lyne of Barbados, Gent. Will not dated. My brother Edward Lyne £100 if my estate be over £1000. My sister Alice Lyne £100. Kinswoman Sarah Andrews, wife of John Andrews, £50, my dear friend M^{rs} Barberye Waldin, dau. of Edmund Waldin, deceased, Executrix, my Father in law M^r Francis Raynes Overseer. Witnessed by Richard Hawkins, Simon Lynde, Thomas Ellacott, Clem. Starr, 17 Mar. 1650. Sworn by M^r Thomas Ellacott, aged about 23, and M^r Simon Lynde,* aged about 27. Recorded in Barbados.

* His pedigree is given in "N. and Q.," 68, iv., 390, where it is stated that he was born in 1624, and went to Boston in 1650. From the above will he must have gone to America *via* Barbados. It is not stated what relationship he bore to the testator.

Will of Colonel Christopher Lyne of Jamaica in the Parish of St Thomas, dated 27 Feb. 1689-90. My son Captain Richard Lyne of Barbados and Parish of St George's, all my estate in England, Barbados, Jamaica, and elsewhere. My dau. Mary, wife of John Batten, £1500 Barbados c., wife Elizabeth Lyne £150 a year and a dwelling house in Barbados, son Richard Lyne Ex'or. Michael Bond and James Stretch to be trustees in Jamaica until my said son comes or sends from Barbados. Witnesses: Modyford Freeman, Lewis Evans, John Campion, John Clarke. Proved 25 Sept. 1690. Recorded in Spanish Town, Jamaica.

Testator in 1679 owned 272 a., was Col. of a foot reg., and had a licence to go to Jamaica. (Hotten and "Colon. Cal.")

Elizabeth Lyne of Barbados. Will dated 16 Nov. 1690. My dau. Mary Bratten "one Cabbanett," sister Mary Wale "a new morning gownd and a petticoate and £5," cousin Elizabeth Hasell "my seddan," grandson Christopher Lyne "one silver tankard marked C. L., and two mourning rings, one that was his grandfather's, and another his father's," grandson Richard Lyne £100 at the age of 18, grandson Christopher Lyne "all the rest of my estate, but in case he die before the age of twenty-one years then to my grandson Richard Lyne," "a pair of pearle braseletts to my daughter Mary Bratten, and after her decease to my granddaughter Elizabeth Lyne, provided my daughter have no issue," "my granddaughter Elizabeth Lyne," and "my daughter Anne Lyne," my kinsman Samuel Hasell £5. Proved 2 Nov. 1693. Recorded in Barbados.

There is nothing to shew the relationship between the Christopher Lyne of 1650 and Col. Christopher Lyne who died in 1693. There is no record of the death of Christopher Lyne in 1650, nor of the marriage of Christopher Lyne and his wife Elizabeth in Barbados Registers, nor of the baptisms of any of their children.

Anne Lyne, daughter of the testator above, and of Col. Christopher Lyne, married Capt. John Firebrace of St Michael's.

Admiral Alan Gardner, 1st Lord Gardner.

Admiral Alan Gardner, 1st Lord Gardner, son of Lieut.-Col. Gardner of the 11th Dragoon Guards, was born at Uttoxeter in Staffordshire 11 April 1742. He entered the Navy in 1755, became a Captain in 1766, going out to Jamaica in the "Preston" as flag-ship of Rear-Admiral Parry, and stayed on that station until 1771. In 1775-79 he was again there, and fought in the battle of Grenada 6 July 1779, and again under Rodney in 1782. He was sent to Jamaica as Commander-in-Chief in 1786, and returned to England after three years. From 1790-5 he sat at the Board of Admiralty, and was M.P. for Plymouth 1795-6. In 1793, being advanced to flag-rank, he went out to the W.I. with a squadron; fought under Howe 1 June 1794; was created a Baronet, and in 1801 a peer. He died 1 Jan. 1809, and there is a portrait of him at Greenwich. He married at Jamaica in 1769 Susanna Hyde, dau. and heiress of Fra. Gale and widow of Sabine Turner, and by her had several children ("D.N.B."). He appears to have married secondly Maria Eliz. Adderly, whom he divorced in 1804. ("Notes and Queries," 11 S., iv., 473.) See his M.I., *ante*, II., p. 229.

Daniel Smith of Nevis (? son of Col. Michael Smith of Nevis) was Member of the Assembly 1688, of the Council 1692, aged 40 in 1707, and recommended for the next vacancy as Lieut.-Governor. He died in April 1722 in Battersea, and in his will, made 17 April and proved 4 June 1722 (126, Marlboro'), named his wife Eliz., his sons William and Daniel, and daus. Penelope and Frances, all four minors. His other dau. Ann had married William Mathew, Lieut.-Governor of St. Kitts. Elizabeth, the widow, may have been a Williams of Nevis, but her parentage is unknown. She was probably an heiress, because her dau., Mrs. Ann Mathew, used her parents' arms quarterly. (See "Antigua," iii., 89, for pedigree of Smith.)

ARMS.—*Quarterly: 1 and 4, Sable, a stork close within a bordure Argent [STARKIE]; 2 and 3, Azure, two stars of six points in fess [VAN LEEMPUTT]. On an inescutcheon of pretence Sable, on a bar Argent, a lion passant between three garbs [HILL], impaling, Quarterly, 1 and 4, Gules, on a chevron Or between three bezants, as many crosses formée fitchée Sable [SMITH]; 2 and 3, Gules, three men's heads, full-faced, coupéd at the shoulders [? WILLIAMS].*

William Isaac Mathew, Lieut.-Governor of St. Kitts, later Governor of the Leeward Islands for twenty years, died 14 Aug. 1752 at St. John's Town, Antigua. His first wife was Anna, dau. and heiress of Col. Tho. Hill, Lieut.-Gov. of St. Kitts, mar. 1707-8 and died 26 April 1715, aged 29, at Sandy Point, and her arms are on the inescutcheon above. His second wife was Ann, dau. of Daniel Smith, Lieut.-Governor of Nevis, and she died 5 April 1730, aged 31, also at Sandy Point, and her arms are impaled above as Smith quartering (? Williams), being those of her father and mother. (See pedigree of Mathew in "Antigua," ii., 252.)

* On the Mathew shield the chevron of the Smith coat is distinctly Or, as are the bezants.

Grenada and St. Vincent.

From the Report of the Parliamentary Committee, printed 28 April, 1800, 42 fos., the following abstracts have been made.

It covers the three cases of (1) Alexr. Houstoun & Co., (2) Ex'ors of Charles Ashwell, deceased, and (3) Wm. Johnstone of London.

ALEX. HOUSTOUN & CO. OF GLASGOW.

By certain Acts of Parliament of 35, 37 & 39 Geo. III., Exchequer Bills to the amount of £240,000 had been advanced in 1795 and 1797 on behalf of Wm. McDowall, James McDowall, Andrew Houstoun and Rob. Houstoun Rae of Glasgow, Merchants and Partners, trading as Alexr. Houstoun & Co., to persons connected with Grenada and St. Vincent. The above debt, amounting now with Interest to £265,008, was secured by their Bond, by Sureties for £180,000, on Estates in Scotland and a Mortgage on Mr. Wm. McDowall's estate called Millikens in St. Vincent.

Owing to the losses occasioned by the late War and Insurrection and incautious acceptances during peace, the Firm had been unable to repay any instalments to the Government without occasioning great injury to "their Sureties, their Creditors, and the Public at large."

During the eight years 1792—1798 the annual balances due to the Firm averaged over £340,000, and in 1799 the following balances were due to the Firm from these debtors:—

It was further proposed that there should be an extension of time given and the debt repaid by three equal instalments in 1804, 1805 and 1806; further sureties of £145,000 given; all the real estate conveyed to Trustees; the Firm being authorised to call in debts and wind up their affairs.

In Burke's "Landed Gentry" is a pedigree of Macdowall of Garthland, Co. Renfrew, from which it appears that Col. Wm. Macdowall purchased in 1727 the Barony of Castle Semple, and died in 1748. He married 1, Tovie, daughter of

* It appears that in 1798 there was a Conveyance of an Estate in St. Vincent of Wm. Milliken's to Wm. McDowall, Esq., of Castle Semple. It produced in 1799 185 hogsheads and the St. Kitts one (not named) 220 hogsheads.

Mrs. Milliken of Milliken, and had a son Wm., born in 1700. He married 2, Isabella Wallace, and had a son "James who went to the West Indies."

Wm., the eldest son, born 1700, had two sons: 1. Wm., of Castle Semple, M.P., who died, bachelor, in 1810, and 2. James, Provost of Glasgow.

These two brothers are presumably the partners of A. Houstoun and Co. alluded to in the foregoing Report, though Burke is silent on that point.

Castle Semple was apparently sold to John Rae-Harvey, President of Grenada, who died in 1820.

In 1722 Wm. Macdowall, Esq., and James Milliken, Esq., were appointed Executors in St. Kitts by Walter Hamilton, Esq., and in Baker's "Map" of 1753, Wm. Macdowall, Esq., is entered as owner of a plantation in the parish of St. Mary Cayonne, and James Milliken, Esq., as owner of one in the Parish of St. Peter Basseterre.

1738, Jan. 24. Wm. McDowell and James Millicken, M. of Council of St. Kitts, were both absent in Scotland. (B.T. Leeward I., vol. 26, x. 47.)

1780, Nov. Alexander Houston, esq. late of the Island of Grenada, to Miss Mackie of Glasgow. ("Town and Country Mag.," 671.)

In Burke's "Landed Gentry" is a short pedigree of Houstoun of Clerkington, co. Haddington, headed by a Col. Andrew H. of Jordan Hill, co. Renfrew, who died 2 Oct. 1800; also one of the ancient family of H. of Johnstone Castle, but there is no allusion in either to a branch connected with Grenada.

In the above Report there is, however, a note under 8 Oct. 1799, of a Bill of Exchange for £1,196 on "Alexander Houstoun, Esq. of Clerkington payable in Scotland."

CHARLES ASHWELL OF GRENADA, DECEASED.

"The Executors of Charles Ashwell, Esq; late of Ayot St. Lawrence in the County of Hertford, deceased; in Account with the Commissioners for the Issue of Exchequer Bills to Persons connected with and trading to the Islands of Grenada and St. Vincent." A sum of £16,000 had been advanced him in Sept. 1797 secured by his Bond, a mortgage on his interest in the Kingston estate, St. Vincent, and sureties for £32,000, and the interest due to the 25th March 1800 was £2,038 and unpaid. "It appears to Your Committee that Mr. Ashwell was one of the greatest Sufferers by the Insurrection. He was possessed, at that Time, of three Estates in Grenada, called Madey, Belvedera, and La Fortune; the two first of which he afterwards sold." The loss sustained on those three Estates is estimated, in a Report of certain Commissioners appointed by the Legislature of that Island, to have amounted to £52,601.

"Stores supplied and Payments made by Charles Ashwell, in his Lifetime, on Account of the La Fortune Estate, since the Restoration of Tranquillity in Grenada, after the Insurrection and Rebellion which happened there in March 1795.

From the copy of Mr. Ashwell's will I give the following abstract:—

"Charles Ashwell late of the I. of Grenada but at present of Ayot St. Lawrence Co. Herts. I give to my Wife Frances Eliz. A. all property real and personal in Great Britain. To Kenneth Fra. Mackenzie and Joseph Beete Esq^{rs} of Demerara, Rich^d Landreth of G., John Brown Esq. of Lothbury, Edw^d Cha. Whitehouse of the Custom House, Sir Wm. Bruce Bart. of Stenhouse N.B. and Coll. Turner Esq. all my Plantations in G. or elsewhere with slaves and stock in Trust for my dau. Frances Ashwell and the child (if a dau.) with which my Wife is now enceinte until the age of 21 subject to £60 a year to my Aunt Eliz. Hall of the Town of Alcester Co. Warwick. If daus. die under 21 then estates to my sisters Mary Ashwell, Ann Ashwell and Sally Ashwell and Mary Fleming all of the City of Litchfield Co. Stafford. I appoint my Wife and sister Mary Ashwell and the Trustees to be Ex'ors. 8 April 1797." (Will not yet proved.)

AYOT ST. LAWRENCE, CO. HERTS.

THE CASE OF WILLIAM JOHNSTONE OF LONDON,
MERCHANT.

On 28 Nov. 1795, £2000 was advanced him and on 4 April 1797 £8000 secured by his Bond and Sureties for £20,000. The total debt with Interest to 25 March 1800 being £11,209.

Debts of £10,445 on Granton and £10,789 on Boisjency contracted since the Insurrection, as well as £7,170 contracted previously, have been paid.

"In the Report already referred to of the Commissioners appointed by the Legislature of Grenada, the Losses on Mr. Johnstone's Estates (then called Upper and Lower Granton) in that Island are estimated at £13,609. Mr. Johnstone appears to be possessed of Two Estates in Grenada, now called Boisjency and Granton. The First consisting of what was formerly Upper Granton, with the addition of some Lands which he purchased and joined to that Plantation, calling the whole Boisjency. The other the same with what was formerly called Lower Granton.

"He had last Year made a Sale of an Undivided Moiety of Granton to Messrs. Henderson & Abernethie (Two of his Sureties who have lately become Bankrupts) for £13,000. The Purchase not being completed at the Time of the Bankruptcy, Mr. Johnstone, who had continued in Possession, has come to an Agreement (during the Sitting of Your Committee) with the Assignees of the Bankrupts for rescinding the Sale.

"Taking the Price which was to have been paid for the Moiety as the Measure of the Value of the Whole, this Estate is worth £26,000, and is stated to be subject, only as to a Moiety, to a Mortgage for £5000, to certain Trustees, in Trust for Mrs. Henderson, but that sum not payable till Mr. Henderson's Death."

This Ind^re made the 6 June 38 Geo. III. 1798 BETWEEN Jacob Israel Bernal late of Kingston J. but now of the City of London Esq. (surviving assignee of the estate of Abraham Tavares the Y^r late of J. an insolvent debtor) of the one part and David Samuda of Lemon Street Goodmans Fields in the said City Esq. of the other WHEREAS by an Ind^re of mortgage dated the 1 April 1774 Frances Crees of J. in consideration of £2000 c. conveyed 104 male and female negroe slaves to Abr. Tavares and by another deed of 1 Feb. 1777 for securing the payment of the further £1500 c. Wm. Robinson and Frances his Wife (formerly Fra. Crees) mortgaged a Penn called Friendship to him and by a deed of 26 Jan. 1775 in consideration of £2000 c. advanced and secured by bond Ab. Tavares transferred the slaves to Jacob Israel Bernal and on 19 Dec. 1772 Ab. Tavares being indebted to David Samuda in £5000 st. executed a bond and becoming further largely indebted executed to Benjamin Dias Fernandez the attorney of D. S. two bonds dated 8 Feb. 1776 for the payment of £1168 c. and £1168 c. and a third one dated 30 Ap. 1777 for £504 c. and whereas by another Ind^re dated 27 Feb. 1778 made between Ab. Tavares and Rebecca his Wife of the one part and B. D. Fernandez as attorney of D. Samuda of the other reciting that considerable sums had been repaid Tavares conveyed the said Penn and slaves subject to certain trusts and David Samuda being the correspondent of Tavares in England received from him a bill of exchange drawn by John Myric of J. on Messrs. Serocold and Jackson of London merchants dated 28 June 1774 for £596 st. but the acceptors stop't payment and judgment against the drawer and acceptors was obtained in May 1779 and in 1779 Ab. Tavares became insolvent and his estate was vested in Clayton Littlehales merchant Tho. King Esq. (both since deceased) and the said J. I. Bernal and the assignees in Ap. 1781 obtained a verdict against D. Samuda for the said bill but no money received and whereas D. S. filed his bill in Chancery against J. I. Bernal and on 20 Feb. 1792 the Chancellor decreed that D. S. should not be charged for the bill and it was referred to John Strand one of the M.C.C. to take accounts and Bernal appealed to H. Majesty in Council who decreed on 4 July 1794 judgment should be reversed and both parties having expended large sums in the suits and being desirous to put an end thereto amicably have referred all matters to Henry Smith of Cannon Street Esq. who awarded that J. I. Bernal shall assign to D. Samuda the judgment of Tavares against John Serocold and

John Jackson and no demand shall be made by D. S. against Bernal for sums received from Frances Crees and Bernal shall assign to Samuda the mortgage of 1 Ap. 1774 and all proceedings shall cease each side to pay costs of suits depending these last 20 years now for 5s. Bernal hath confirmed to Samuda those 124 slaves and the premises and the recited Judgement. Signed and sealed (plain seal) by J. I. Bernal and David Samuda in the presence of Robert Shawe, W. H. Haselfoot, clerk to Messrs. Rich^d and Rob^t Shawe.

1784, Jan. 1. Yesterday se'nnight was married Zachary Bayly Edwards esq; of Greenwich-Park, Jamaica, to Miss Katharina Otto Bayer, of Farleigh-House, Somerset. (*Ibid.*)

The above were three sisters. See pedigree in "Antigua," i., 19.

The Ottos and Baijers were of Dutch origin. Nicholas B., a planter, stated in 1665 that he had long lived at Antigua. Dr. Ashton Warner, uncle of the above sisters, was a tenant of Farleigh House in 1782. (Rev. J. E. Jackson's "Guide to Farleigh Hungerford," p. 72.)

The Fryers purchased two farms here in 1700. The families of Woodley and Losack were both of St. Kitts, so Mrs. Fryer was probably of West Indian origin.

Tobias Wall of Southampton and formerly of the same island, in his will dated 2 July 1743, writes: "To my nephew William Woodley £2000, 'tis the said William that is now married to Mrs. Paine."

I think this must be the above William, whose only son, also named William, mar. in 1758 Frances, only surviving dau. and heir of Abraham Payne of St. Kitts, and became Governor of the Leeward Islands in 1766 and again in 1792, dying at St. Kitts 2 June 1793.

Notes and Queries.

CUNNINGHAM OF ST. KITTS (I., 101).*

Henrietta Cunningham was married at Stokesay, co. Salop, 24 Oct. 1765, to John Knight of Cookley, co. Worcester. She was buried at Wolverley, leaving issue, 20 Aug. 1802. Both she and her husband are described as "of this Parish," *i.e.*, Stokesay, in the marriage register. In an old pedigree I have of the Knights, Miss Cunningham's name is written "Cunning," without the final syllable. Edward Knight, late of London, was buried at Wolverley 12 June 1812, aged 78, s.p. I find in Balfour Paul's "Ordinary of Scottish Arms" that the arms of Cunninghame of Cayon St. Christopher's are duly recorded in Lyon Office as follows: 1 and 4, CUNNINGHAME of Cayon, *Argent, a shakefork Sable*; 2 and 3, *Or, a fess chequy Azure and Argent, in chief a crescent of the second*. No name is mentioned for the second coat, but it is, of course, that of Stewart.

The two unicorns are not Supporters. They were probably inserted by the artist to improve the design. In other shields he has used lions in the same manner. [EDITOR.]

CHAMBERLAINE v. HEWETSON.†

Col. Edward Chamberlaine of Barbados, born in co. Leicester, died 23 July 1673, aged 50, having married Mary, dau. of Col. Edward Butler. (Archer, 362.)

His two sons were both at Merchant Taylors' School. Seagrave, born 15 Jan. 1661, entered March 1674-5, and Willoughby entered June 1675 (School Register).

Willoughby C., born in Barbados, s. of Edw. C., Esq., matriculated from Christ Church Coll., Oxf., 25 Nov. 1681, aged 18, and joined the Middle Temple the same year. (Foster.) Described as a Colonel he was knighted at Kensington 6 Feb. 1695, and died s.p. at Little Chelsey 1697 distracted, and his widow Oliana remarried Capt. Mitford Crowe (Le Neve). In his will he names his wife *Oriana* (259, Lort).

Pedigrees were entered in the Visitations of Leicester and Warwick 1619 and London 1634. Crowe was later Governor, and the Editor has his engraved portrait.

NEMBARD OF JAMAICA.

My great-great-grandfather, Dr. John Nembhard (1711—1777), said to be of Dutch extraction, took out a patent of naturalization as a British subject in Jamaica, bearing date 8 Aug. 1745. In March 1758 he received a grant of land in St. George's parish, Jamaica, and in the patent for this he is described as having "transported himself with his servants and slaves into our said island." I shall be glad if anyone can tell me of any trace of him, or others of his name, having been found in either one of the other slave-owning islands, or in Virginia.

London October 31^t 1752.

Sir,

Since my Last Adviseing you of the Sale of your Ten hhd^s Sug^r by Packet I have Disposed of y^r 20 hhd^s by Davis at 38 & your ten by Coulter at 39 & have by this opportunity Inclosed you their Severall Sales netting in the whole £689 . 13 . 1^d which when Reced shall be Carried to your Acc^t Curr^t & forwarded by the first opportunity afterwards.

I sold Some of Josiah Martins for 43 & M^r Ball showd me Some Very pretty Sug^r of M^r Gunthorps w^{ch} he tells me he Asks 46 for these are Encourageing prices & likely to Continue Unless the Bakers Determine As some of them threaten to Leave off Working. In this Situation I think Early Sug^r must Sell Well & I hope Cap^t Darroch who faild this year of a Loading & went to y^e Norward will Stand a good Chance (being but a Small Vessell) of bringing the first Sug^r to market.

His Majesty is Expected in a few Days & then I Suppose will be Declared y^e person who is to Succeed Generall Mathew. tis Said M^r Thomas† Stands fairest for it.

To pay to M^r Oliver on the first of Nov^{br} next by a bill of Exchange accepted payable then one thousand pounds with interest thereon calculated from May y^e 1st to Nov^{br} y^e 1st & the remainder of the six thousand two hundred pounds to be paid on the first of May 1773 by bill of Exchange payable that day with interest calculated thereon from the first of this next ensuing May this bill of Exchange to be paid to M^r Morris or whomsoever he shall direct.

Rent of the Estate to cease the first of May when the conveyances are to be executed. The expence of the conveyances & sale to be paid by Mr. Brook.

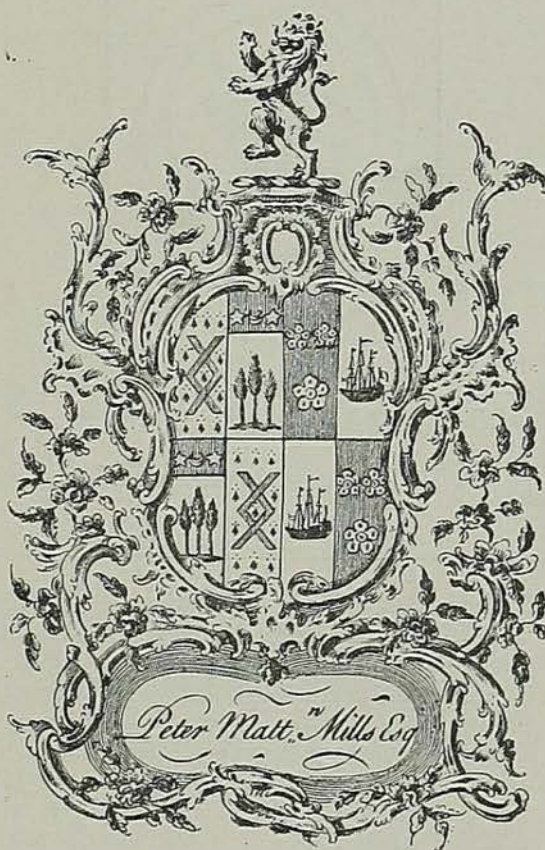

BOOKPLATE OF PETER MATTHEW MILLS, ESQ., OF ST. KITTS.



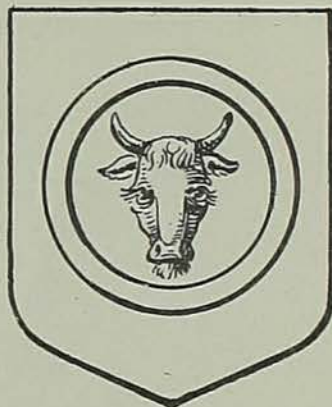

Sir Codrington Edmund Carrington, the son of Codrington Carrington of the Blackmoor estate in Barbados, by the eldest dau. of the Rev. Edmund Morris, Rector of Nutshalling, was born at Longwood in Hampshire 22 Oct. 1769. He was educated at Winchester, and called to the Bar at the Middle Temple 10 Feb. 1792, went to India the same year, returned in 1799, codified the laws of Ceylon, and was knighted and appointed Chief Justice of that Island in 1800. In 1806 he retired and purchased an estate in Bucks, was J.P., D.L., and Chairman of Quarter Sessions, D.C.L., F.R.S., and F.S.A., and M.P. for St Mawes 1826—1831. During his last years he resided at St. Helier's, Jersey, and died at Exmouth 28 Nov. 1849, aged 80, leaving two sons, Edmund F. J. Carrington of Park Hill, Paignton, Devonshire, and the Very Rev. H. Carrington, Dean and Rector of Bocking, Essex. (See full account in "D.N.B.")

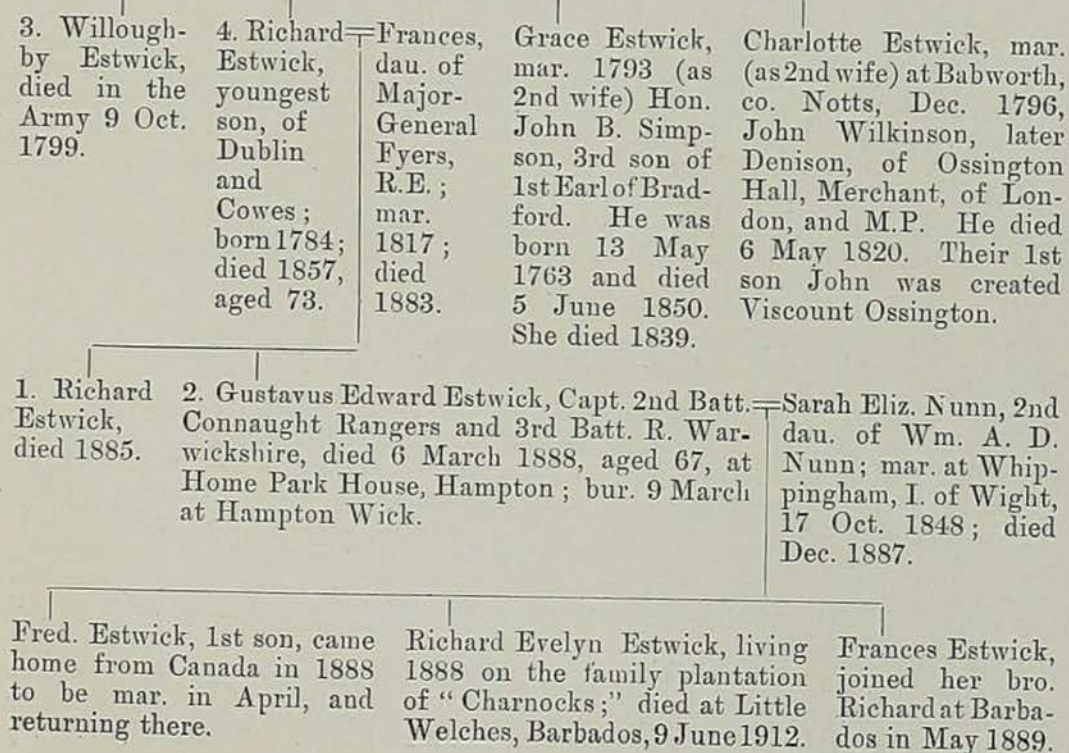

ROWE OF JAMAICA.

"William Ricketts Johnson m. his cousin Catherine Williams, who survived him, and married again William Rowe. She had one child by her 1st marriage, Elizabeth Johnson, and one by the 2nd marriage, William Rowe.

"Mr. Rowe was a widower when she married him, and his son James Rowe married her dau. Elizabeth Johnson. This James Rowe was then in the Army, in the 'Black Watch,' and served in the Peninsula War, and also, I think, at Waterloo.

"He then gave up the Army, and married and went to Oxford, where he took his degree (some of his children were born while he was an Undergraduate). He died a very old man at Morchard-Bishop, Devon, where he had been Rector for many years. His wife had died there some years previously. She was an exceedingly pretty woman, quite lovely in her youth.

"All her sons died unmarried, except the sole surviving one, Colonel Valentine Rowe. One of her daughters m. the late William Shore, and d. leaving two children, Arabella and William. He m. again Frances Rowe, a cousin of his first wife. She was dau. of William Rowe, Archdeacon of Jamaica, with whose family we were extremely intimate in Jamaica. They lived at the old family place 'Belle-Vue' in the Santa-Cruz Mountains, and we lived near.

"Very few days passed in which we did not meet. Emily Rowe and I were like sisters.

"I can just remember old Mrs. Rowe, Catherine Williams that was. She was an immense age and quite childish when she died. She lived with her son the Archdeacon.

"Another dau. of Elizabeth Rowe *née* Johnson married her cousin Canon James Simpson. His mother was a Skinner. They lived at Littlecommon, Bexhill, where she died. They had several children.

"Julia, the youngest dau. of Elizabeth R. *née* J., is still alive (1909), but is a great invalid and above 80 now."

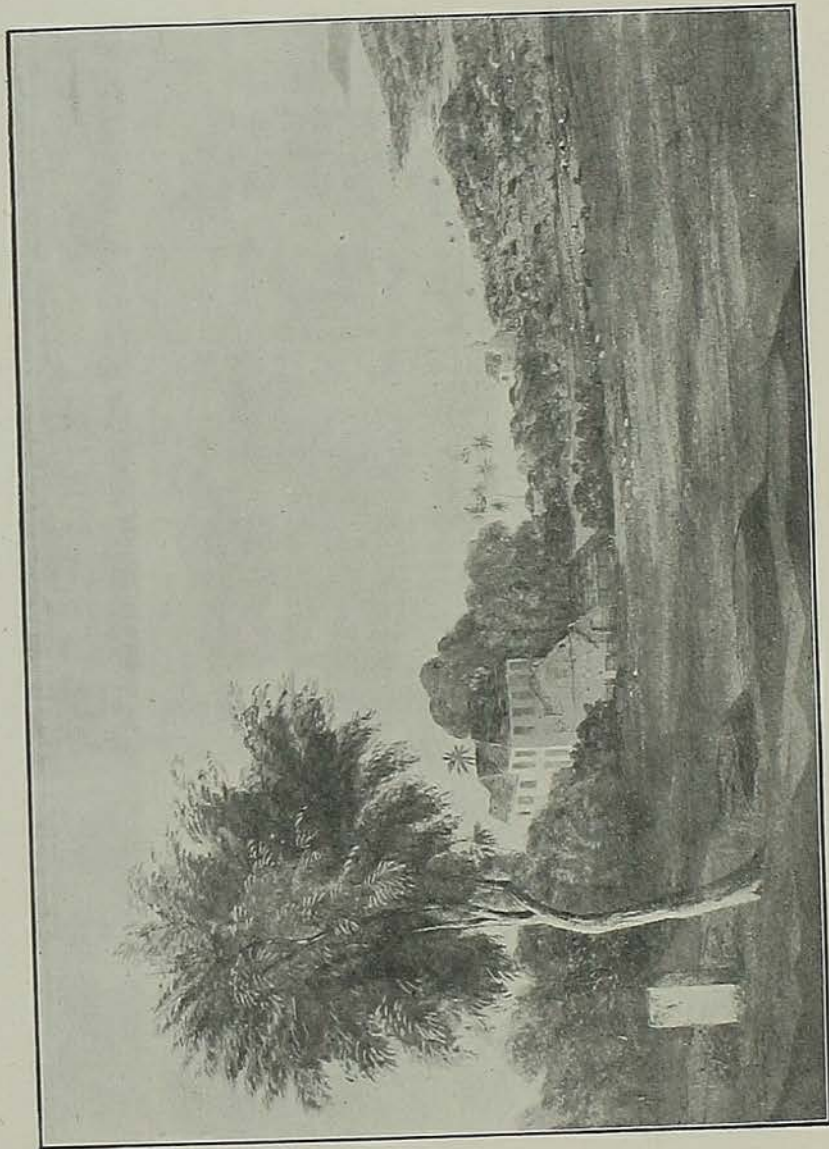

This illustration is from a well-executed eighteenth-century (?) water-colour drawing in my possession. The milestone under the tree has on it "xxxi to Kingston." Mr. F. Cundall, F.S.A., has kindly forwarded the following letter about the identification of the view.

"With regard to your water-colour drawing there is no doubt that it represents a scene in Morant Bay. I have consulted several people on the subject, and a resident writes as follows:—

'The picture, as far as I can make out and after consultation with local authorities—among them Mr. Bancroft—must have been taken from behind the residence now occupied by Mr. Bicknell, and known as Church Hill. The church must be the old church at Church Corner,* although it is not represented as it was. The Johnson River and White River appear in the distance. Mr. Hawkins tells me that the old main road went past Williams' Retirement, and that alterations in the route would account for the position of the milestone. Of course you know that the old town of Morant Bay was at Church Corner, as represented in the picture.'

Extract of the Obituary of the Orphan Chamber of Demerara.*

1812.

Lands in St Elizabeth to brother-in-law John Foster Barham and sons of late brothers-in-law Wm. and Sam. Foster. Nephew Rose Herring May. Will proved 10 Sept. 1778 (379, Hay). Testator formerly of Marylebone, but late of Jamaica, deceased.

Florentius was born 1709 in Jamaica, the son of Florentius Vassall of St. Elizabeth, probably by Ann, sister of Peter Beckford. She remarried the Hon. Rich^d Mill, who in his will, proved 1738 (264, HENCHMAN), named his dau.-in-law Bathshua May, wife of Wm. May, clerk, his brother Peter Beckford, his son-in-law Florentius Vassall, and F. V.'s children Richard and Eliz. Vassall, his son-in-law Dr Rose Fuller and his late wife, dau. of testator. Henry Barham, Esq., in his will of 1746 (253, Edmunds) also names Florentius Vassall and Richard and Eliz. V., his children.

Florentius the second is stated to have married, 16 Sept. 1729, Mary, b. 1713, dau. of Col. John Foster. If so the Eliz. on the stone must have been the second wife.

Proved 19 March 1795 (218, Newcastle). The dau., b. 25 March 1771, inherited the plantations of her father and grandfather, producing about £7000 a year.

Whilst clearing some bush land on Colebrooke's Estate some time ago we came across two tombs each covered by a horizontal slab of some very hard black stone, no doubt imported from the Old Country.

On one of the slabs is cut the following: "Here lieth the body of Mr. Peter Gaynor who departed this life the 3^d of Octo^r 1738 Aged 49 years."

On the slab next to it is cut: "Here lyeth the body of Letitia Wife of Thomas Elmes, Esq., who departed this life the 2^d day of April 1763 In the 26th year of her age Greatly lamented by all her Friends and Acquaintances but particularly by her disconsolate Husband who in her lost a most affectionate wife an agreeable companion and valuable friend. Sic transit Gloria Mundi."

The two tombs are enclosed by a stone wall, and there are the remains of an entrance gate in the shape of two lignum-vitæ posts and a lintel lying on the ground.

ARCHD. SPOONER.

In the Parish Register of St. John's is recorded his burial: "1738, Oct. 4, M^r Peter Gaynor." His estates passed to his posthumous dau. and h. Mary, who married, in 1754, Sir George Colebrooke, Bart. ("Antigua," ii., 9.)

Adjoining Gaynor's on the S.W. side is Elmes' estate. Mrs. Letitia Elmes was the dau. and coheiress of Dr. Patrick Cusack. (*Ibid.*, i., 243.)

MAJOR-GENERAL THOMAS DUNDAS.‡

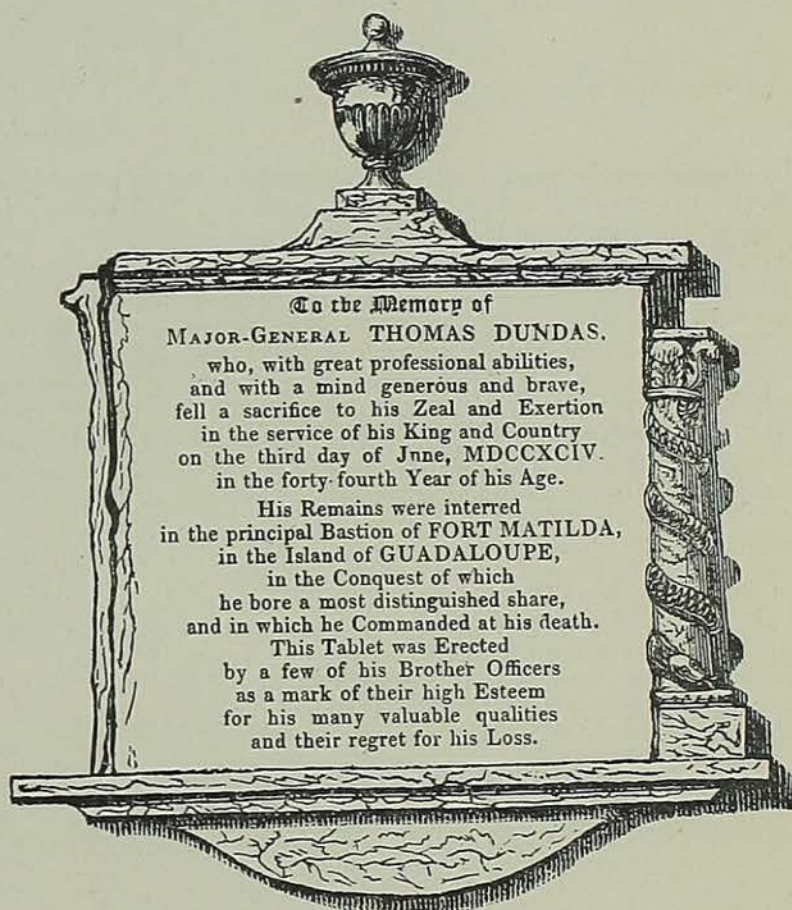
During my residence in Trinidad as a Crown Magistrate, a Mr. James Ross, master mason of the capital of Port of Spain, was directing the removal of some loose rubbish and stones from a yard in Edward Street, when the labourers employed accidentally stumbled on a marble slab, which, on a more minute inspection, turned out to be a marble urn and tablet, and on cleansing them

from the particles of earth adhering thereto, were found to bear the following inscription:—



It is worthy of remark that the spot on which this tablet, etc., were found is near to a house once occupied by an *ordnance store keeper* of the name of Edwards. Two broken screws of brass were found sticking in the holes of the tablet, by which it would appear this memento had been already *somewhere* suspended; some pieces of stone or wall were also found adhering thereto.

With reference to the memorial itself, the urn was found to be in a perfect state, while the tablet, it would appear, had a small piece detached from the corners by accident, and one of the pilasters is unfortunately missing. It is, however, hoped these trifling deficiencies can be without difficulty replaced, and that in testimony of the services of the gallant and lamented General it will find a place in the Protestant Cathedral of Trinidad, or (what would be more consonant to the feelings of the Dundas family, so memorable in the annals of their country for "deeds of arms") that this tributary relic to the warrior be brought over to the Mother Country, and find a niche among the other revered memorials of our illustrious dead, or near the tombs of his ancestors. [The account of the Expedition follows, but is omitted for want of space.—EDITOR.]

In the Privy Council. On an Appeal from the Court of Error in St. Vincent between Jas. Evan Baillie, Alex. Fraser, Hugh Duncan Baillie, Geo. Henry Ames, and John Fowler, Appellants. Josias Jackson, Jenetta Jackson, Warner Ottley, John Wilson, and Hastings Elwin, heir and devisees of Josias Jackson, deceased.

The Case of the Appellants.

The late Mr. Josias Jackson at his death in 1819 was indebted to the Appellants in a large sum, part of which was secured by a bond of £39,500 for the payment of £19,766 with interest, and by a mortgage of Mr. Jackson's estates. He by his will devised all his estates to his wife Jenetta and Warner Ottley, John Wilson, and Hastings Elwin, charged with an annuity to her and on certain trusts. The will was proved by her, but the others declined to act, and Mr. Warner Ottley renounced by deed of May 1823.

In 1822 Mrs. Jackson and Mr. Josias Jackson, the son and heir, confessed judgment by their attorney Edward Jackson, and on 3 June there was due £24,149 st. besides costs. On 28 Oct. 1833 Mr. W. Ottley sued out a Writ of Error, and on 25 April 1834 made an assignment of Errors by his attorney John Geo. Nanton, and the original judgment was reversed. On 1 July 1834 the Appellants had leave to appeal to H.M. in Council from the Judgment of the Court of Error. (Printed on seven large sheets.)

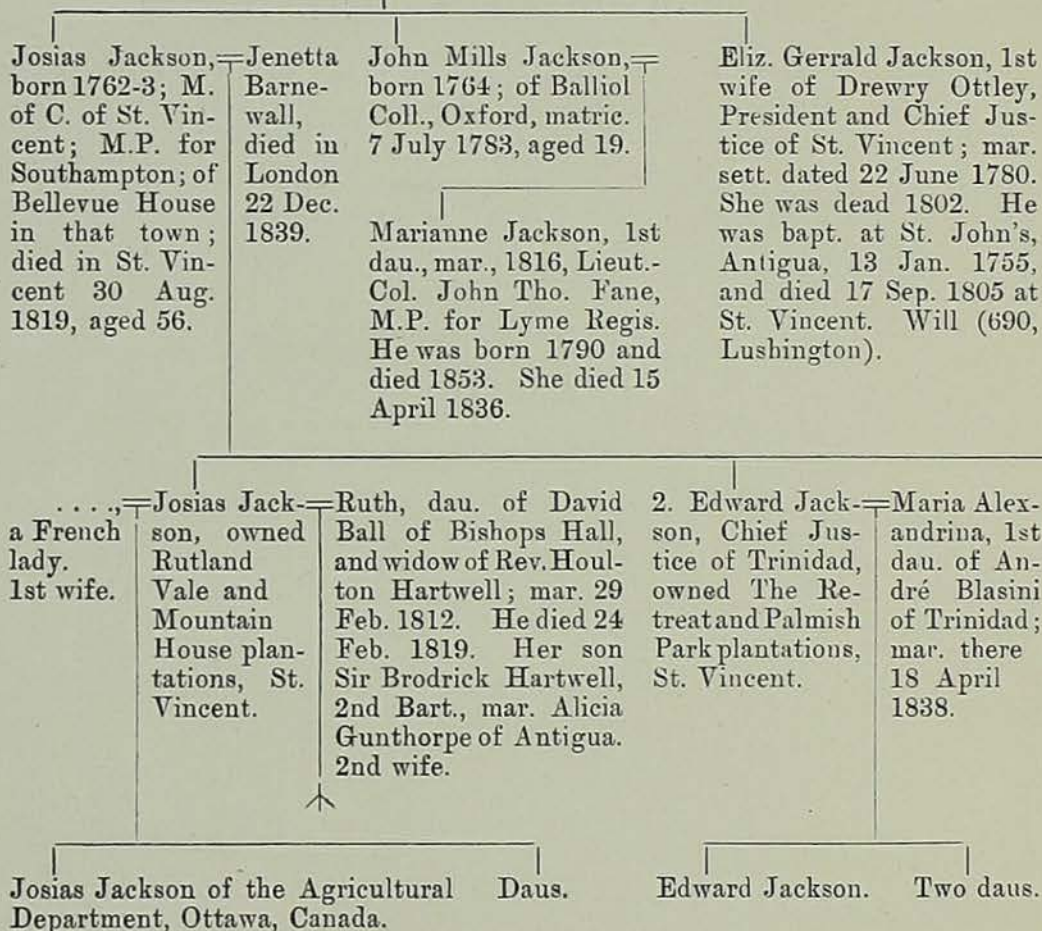
From the Appendix (of sixteen pages) it appears that the first claim was for £239,500. Testator on 23 Dec. 1817 at Kingstown became bound in £39,500, and on 20 Aug. 1819 in five several sums of £40,000.

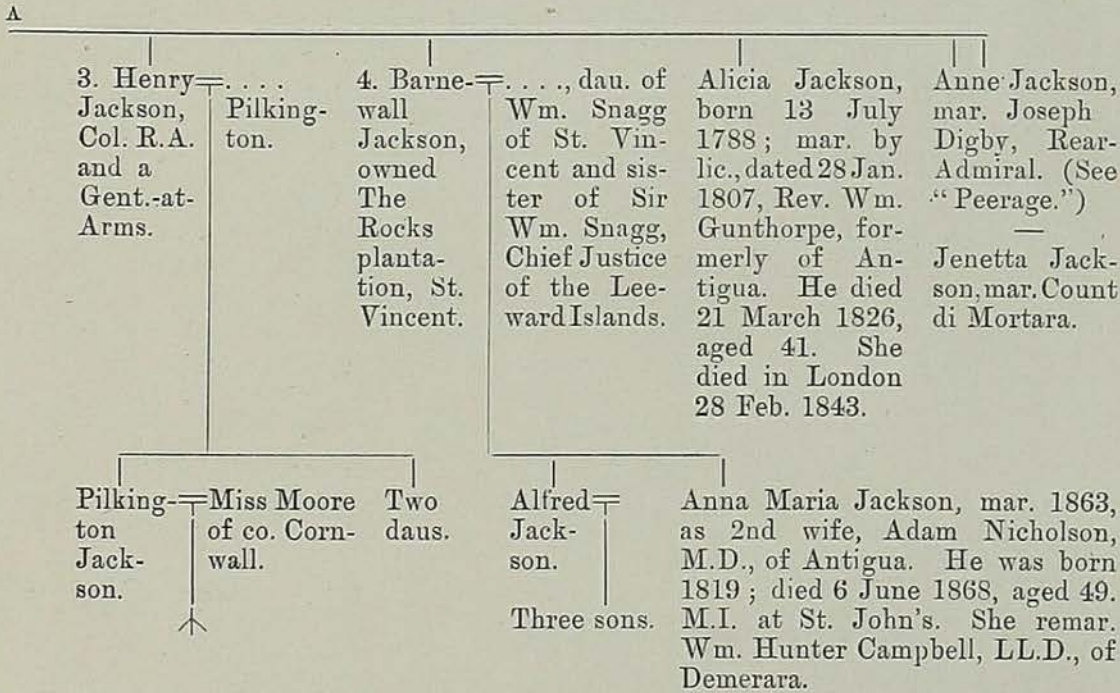

Deeds relating to Jamaica.

Having had an opportunity of looking through a large parcel of deeds, some of which were catalogued *ante*, I., 19, I am able to give the following notes and correct errors in the catalogues.

Monumental Inscriptions in England relating to West Indians.*

OLD ST. PANCRAS CHURCHYARD, CO. MIDDLESEX.

This was a favourite burial-ground for Roman Catholics.

On a stone tomb to the south of the church. The Inscription is now (1909) indistinct from incrustations of dirt, etc., and the portions in brackets are taken from Cansick, who published his "Epitaphs" of this parish in 1869.

On the south face:—

Here lieth the Body of M^{rs} HANNAH KIRWAN
Wife of JOHN KIRWAN Esq^r Merchant of Lime Street
[Who depart]ed this life the 1st of November 17[87]
Aged 45 Years.
(Two lines follow.)

On the top slab is a large incised shield of arms, now somewhat weather-worn, which Cansick omitted giving.

CREST.—*A bird.*

ARMS.— *a chevron between three like birds;*† impaling, *Ermine, a chevron*
. . . . The Motto below is quite worn away.

Lower down is the following, which is also rapidly disappearing:—

Cansick has not followed the correct lettering and lines, and has omitted the arms.

An abstract of his will was printed in "Antigua," iii., 404. It was dated 5 Feb. 1772 and proved 27 Nov. following (P.C.C., 425, Taverner). He owned estates at St. Croix and Montserrat; left his wife Ann £2000 a year; had kinsfolk in co. Cork. His daus. were Ellinor, wife of Tho. Selby, Ann, wife of Tho. Stapleton, Winifred, wife of Justin M^cCarthy. His only son and heir was Robert. Testator was from Tuitestown, co. Westmeath. Robert probably died young, as Mrs. Elinor Selby became coheirress. Her husband was of Biddleston, co. Northumberland, whose pedigree see in Burke's "Landed Gentry." Nichs. Tuite Selby, their second son, was born 1754.

1834, July. Lately. In Upper Seymour-street, aged 80, Nicholas Tuite Selby, esq., for more than 50 years a partner in the firm of Messrs. Wright and Co. bankers. ("G.M.," 109.)

Of these the tombs to Lynch, Tuite, Kirwan and M^cEvoy were noted by Cansick in 1869, and the latter three are still preserved. The others have presumably been destroyed. The churchyard is now under the control of the London C.C., is well cared for, and tastefully planted with trees and shrubs.

She was travelling, with her family of seven children, to Southampton, on her way to the Isle of Wight, where she intended to pass the summer. Her eldest daughter and the gentleman to whom she was on the point of being married, attended her most affectionately during her short illness of three days. ("G.M.," 862.)

"Robert Skerrett, Esq^r, 1771."

His will was dated 26 Dec. 1769, late of London, now of Antigua; p. 12 Aug. 1771. (P.C.C., 357, Trevor.) He named his kinsman Steven Lynch of Antigua, now in England, and left all his est. to his wife Antonetta. He came of an ancient Galway family settled at Montserrat before 1712 and at Antigua before 1707. (See ped. in "Antigua," iii., 89.)

See a lease for 15 years of a plantation in Montserrat to Titham Skerrett by Patrick Blake in 1743. Titham was succeeded before the determination of the lease by Robt. Skerrett.

The Bodkins from Galway settled in several W.I. islands, especially Montserrat, Antigua and St Croix.

Andrew Blake, from Montserrat and St. Kitts, in his will of 1760 desired to be buried in St. Pancras Church.

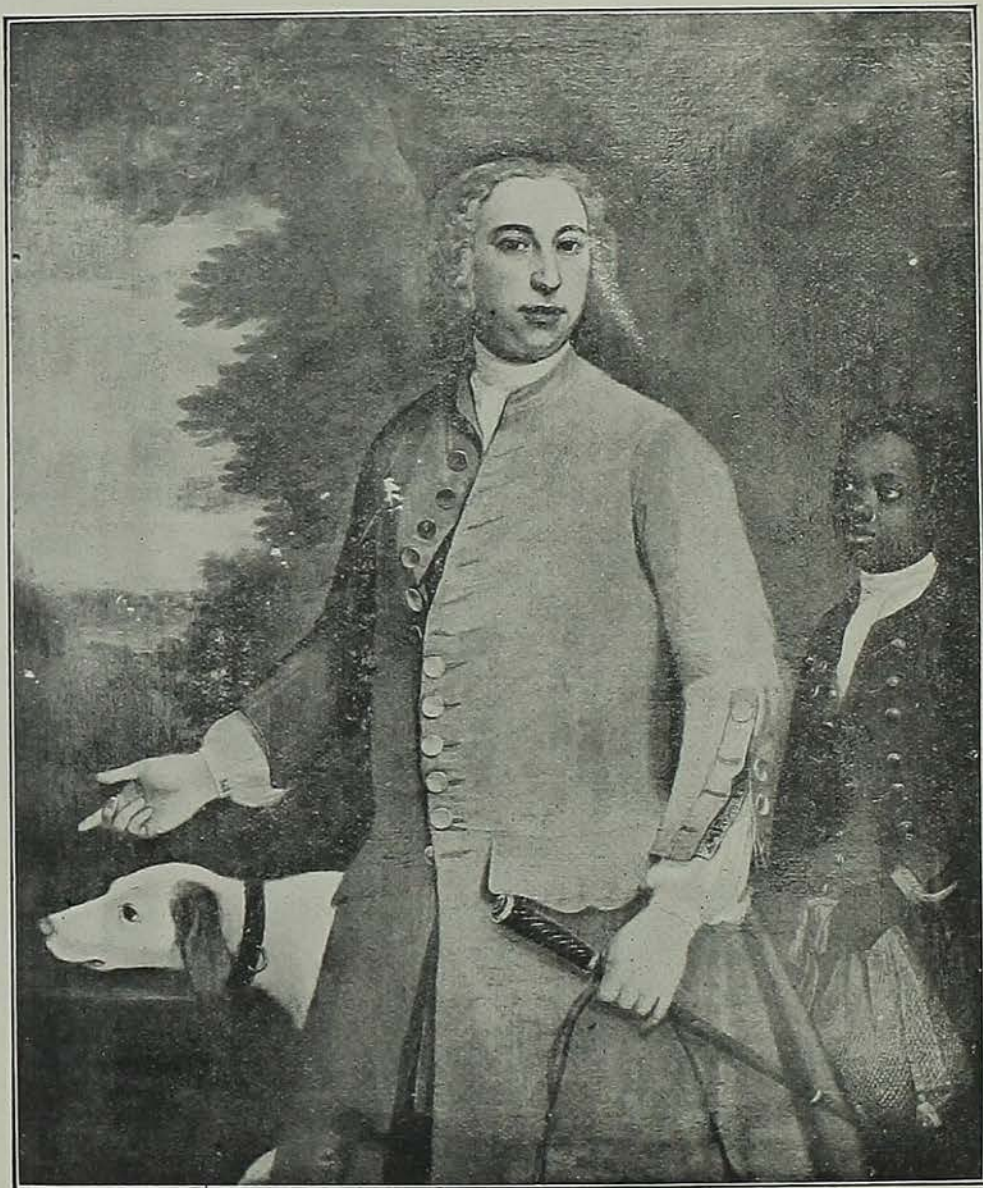
Hender Molesworth of Egleshayle mar. at St. Andrew's, Plymouth, 25 Aug. 1630, Mary, eldest dau. of John Sparke of that town [Vivian's "Visit. of Devon," ii., 856], and their 2nd son Hender settled in J., where in 1670, styled "Captain," he owned 2480 acres in St. Cath. parish. He became later a M. of C. and as President acted as Governor after the death of Sir Tho. Lynch. In a will of 1688 he was styled "Lieut. Gov." He marr. 1stly Grace, dau. of Capt. Geo. Mangye of J. and widow of Tho. Totthill the Receiver Gen. (T. T. d. 1673), and 2dly, on 12 Feb. 1688-9 at St. Martin in the Fields, Mary, dau. of Tho. Temple of Frankton, Warwickshire, the relict of Govr. Sir Tho. Lynch, Kt. He was created a Baronet on 19 July 1689 and d. s.p. and was bur. at St. Anne's, Soho, 12 Aug. 1689, the title passing to his elder bro. John.

Sir Hans Sloan described "Sir H. M.," evidently the above, as a man aged 45, of drinking habits, who d. soon after. Buried at St. Andrew's, J., "1673 April 17 Thomas Totthill."

Scarlett of Jamaica.

The accompanying portraits are of Robert Scarlett of Duckett's Spring Estate, St. James's, Jamaica, and two of his sons, William and another, to which is no name, but is supposed to be his eldest son Philip Anglin Scarlett of Cambridge and Success Estates, of whom no descendants remain. William was afterwards Sir William Anglin Scarlett, Chief Justice of Jamaica, who died in 1831, whence descend the younger branch of this name in England; now Scarlett of Gigha, N.B.

The Scarletts were connected with many of the families in the parish of St. James in Jamaica, and some in St. Andrew's, where they were first settled, such as Hine, Gordon, Le Comte, Gallimore, Le Bert, Bowen, Campbell (of Fish River, Jamaica, and Kilmory, N.B.), Williams, Lawrence, Anglin, Grignon, and many others.

The first in Jamaica was Captain Francis Scarlett, who was at the taking of the Island, and for his services given a large grant of land in the parish of St. Andrew. He was member for this parish in 1680 and Captain of the Regiment. He left the estate to his nephew William Scarlett, and died in England, where he had property at Eastbourne, in 1685, a bachelor. His nephew William was of the Middle Temple and of Eastbourne, and married the daughter of Major Thomas Smallman of Wilderhope, Shropshire, and both she and her husband were related to the Leightons of that county, whose name appears in the early records of the Island.

Robert Scarlett of Duckett's Spring was great-grandson of this William (who died the year after coming to Jamaica), and was the father of James Scarlett, Lord Chief Baron of the Exchequer, created Baron Abinger, who settled in England, and was the great-grandfather of the present peer, who owns these pictures. Mrs. Robert Scarlett was the daughter of Philip Anglin of Paradise Estate by Mary, dau. of John Lawrence of Fairfield Estate, a great-granddau. of Henry Lawrence, President of Cromwell's Council. The fourth portrait is that of Mary Lawrence, and her cousins were extremely numerous, so that the many connections were too many to keep an accurate note of. From James, the second son (after Lord Abinger), descends the present elder line of the Scarletts, formerly of Parkhurst, co. Surrey, now in England; of the third son Robert Scarlett, M.D., all issue is extinct; and the youngest son, as mentioned before, is represented by the Scarletts of Gigha.

The Scarletts of Eastbourne held much property in Sussex in the seventeenth century, and the name occurs in that county as early as 1309.

Notes and Queries.

THE GROANS OF JAMAICA, 1714.

This rare pamphlet was printed in 1714, 8°, pp. 48. The name of the author is not disclosed, but he was a classical scholar, and probably a clergyman. The publisher in his preface states, that after casting his eyes on a collection of letters written by some gentlemen in Jamaica to their friends in London and printed in 1713, he selected for publication this letter written on 6 Oct. 1712, as containing the most variety of useful matter. It was quoted at large by Oldmixon in his "British Colonies of America."

The letter gives an account in detail of grievances arising from the extortionate exactions made by the then Governor, Lord Archibald Hamilton, in conjunction with a certain "triumvirate of escheat brokers," Mr. Rigby, Sec. and Provost Marshal Gen., Mr. Brodrick, the Attorney General, and Dr. John Stewart.

Mr. Rigby, the writer states, had some years schooling on the foundation of Eaton College, served as a clerk to an attorney in the Temple, and then resided some years abroad at the Court of St. Germain's.

Returning to England he in 1705 purchased from Mr. Edward Hyde his office of Provost Marshal General of Jamaica and settled in that Island, inducing Col. B r, (? Blair) to be security in a bond of £4000. In Oct. 1706 Governor Handasyd appointed him Clerk of the Council and Dep. Sec., and the following year Mr. Rigby obtained from Mr. Baber the patentee the offices of Secretary, Clerk of Enrolments, and Commissary Gen. of Stores.

Complaints having been made about his arbitrary fees, the Gov. C. and A. passed an Act for regulating them, and it was also enacted that in future the offices of Secretary and Provost Marshal General were never to be held by the same person.

Lord Archibald Campbell, the new Governor, arriving in July 1711, then gave Mr. Rigby a seat in the Council.

Many of the title deeds of the freeholders having become worn and defaced, or lost in the Earthquake of 1692, the Fire that destroyed Port Royal a second time in 1702, and the Hurricane of Aug. last 1712, it was of great importance that the public records should be in safe custody, yet it was discovered that all deeds enrolled in 1671 and 1672 were missing.

Many plantations had been fraudulently escheated and grants secured to Rigby and his friends. By the Royal Instructions all escheats over £10 in value were to be referred to H. Majesty, but by means of packed juries estates were sworn under that sum.

Nathaniel Herring, Esq., brother-in-law of Peter Beckford, Esq., both M. of A., having purchased a plantation of 540 acres in the parish of Westmorland, the Prov. Mar. impanelled such a jury as returned the value to be £1 2s. 6d., yet Mr. Herring was forced to give a premium of £300 to the Governor for an escheat-patent.

Nicholas Blake, of the parish of St. Elizabeth, a Quaker, obtained from the former Governor, Col. Handasyd, a patent for two parcels of land of 1100 acres in the same parish, dated 19 Jan. 1710-11. Some defect in the title being pretended, he was compelled to pay £300 to the present Gov. in return for a new patent granted in March last.

A small plantation of 52 acres in the parish of St. Elizabeth was valued by the Jury at 2s. 2½d., and yet Mr. John Foster (the son-in-law of the aforementioned Nich. Blake) paid £50 to the Gov. besides fees and charges.

In like manner five parcels of land of 200 acres in the parish of Westmorland were valued by the Jury at 8s. 4d., and yet Wm. Dorrel paid 2 or £300 to the Gov. Mr. Taber the Rector of St. Katharine's.

Upon some pretended defect in the title of Jenkins, an old blind man living near Dry River in Clarendon, Dr. John Stuart took out a writ of escheat against him; the jury valued the estate at 12s. 6d., and the doctor obtained a patent thereof. J. S. was born at or near Colrain in Ireland and bred in the West of Scotland. Mr. Rigby obtained a patent for some negroes which were cried out at the Grand Court and escheated in the name of Delamain, tho' in the possession of Mr. James Whitechurch, then in England. By the like trick a freehold of 1000 acres which old Capt. Jones, then at London, had in St. Katharines he had very near been nickt out of. A plantation of 900 acres in Westmoreland, late the estate of Dr. Hume, a Scotchman who died in this Island without heirs, valued by the Jury at £1 17s. 6d., was granted to Mrs. Olivia Reid, Mr. Brodrick's Mother-in-law. Mr. Melling the clerk of the patents. Two plantations containing jointly 500 acres in Clarendon and Vere, valued by the jurors at 19s. 7½d. and £8 16s. 3d., were granted to Mr. Brodrick's countryman and servant John Stafford of Vere, shop-keeper. 20 acres in St. Catherine's valued to the Queen at £5 were granted July last to Richard Stoddard, Esq., one of the Judges of our Grand Court. 30 feet square, late the estate of Mary Gibson, widow, in Port Royal, valued at £9, was granted Jan. last to Robert Snead of the said town, turner. Rigby was a shopkeeper's 2^d son in disgrace with his father, and arrived without money until Col. Lowe lent him £50.

Stewart was without even whole shoes to his feet. Brodrick was in debt by several thousands, bankrupt in reputation and credit, almost disowned even by his own family, and it is greatly wondered at that these three should so suddenly not only jump into chariots but be laying out large sums at interest. Their insolence and tyranny are insupportable.

The estate of Mary Swintee of Port Royal, deceased, having been valued by a jury at £100, and escheated, our Triumvirate intreated the Gov. for a patent to the Naval Officer here, Wm. Norris, Esq., but M^r Mackenzie, the Governor's Sec., refusing to countersign the warrant, which omitted the jury's valuation, the Gov. cancelled it. Mr. M.'s ticket of leave has not yet been signed, though he has given £1000 security. Admiral Walker, Commodore Littleton, and Capt. St. Lo are so much his friends that he will have his passage home in a man-of-war. Other gentlemen who accompanied Lord Arch. Hamilton hither have been equally disappointed of favour and justice, such as Mr. David St. Clair, a younger son of my Lord St. Clair of Scotland; Mr. Robert Paterson, the younger brother of Sir Hugh P., Baronet, and very nearly related to the Gov.; Mr. Richard Dereham, brother of Sir Tho. D., Baronet (all three volunteers recommended by the Duke of Hamilton); Mr. Robert Douglas, recommended by the Duke of Roxburgh; Mr. Elliot, a young gentleman heir to an estate, recommended by Sir Gilbert Elliot of Stobs, Baronet, and Mr. Baillie, one of the Lords Commissioners for Trade; Patrick St. Clair, Doctor of Physick, and younger son of Sir Robert St. Clair, Baronet; Lieut. John Meheux, recommended by the Duke of Ormond. Mr. Patrick Hamilton, late Sheriff of the city of Cork, happening to have had great misfortunes by losses at sea, came as the Governor's steward, recommended by the Duke of Hamilton and Sir Alex. Cairns, yet was dismissed, as were likewise Mr. John Dupray, a confectioner, and Gundimore, a cook. Gundimore's wife died, and he returned to England 13 months since. John Dupray fell sick, but his countryman, Mr. Lewis Galdy, an eminent Merchant in Port Royal, trusted him with a small stock to set up shop with. Mr. Pat Hamilton fell sick and died. Joseph Marshal, the Governor's Valet d'chambre, predetermined to have been dismissed, his wife fell sick and died. Tho. MacMullen, the Governor's groom, happening to marry a barber's widow, was dismissed. Mr. Robert Paterson returned home in Dec. last, and Mr. Rob. Dowglass in April last. Mr. Gilbert Elliot fell sick and died. Mr. Rich. Dereham was forced to enter into very mean service up in the mountains. Mr. Mackenzie's son died on 6 Nov. last. Mr. Wm. Cockburn, the younger son of one of the Judges in Scotland, is a tool of the Triumvirate. Brodrick had been previously banished from Montserrat, where he has a legal title to a plantation, obtained by treacherously supplanting his client.

By an Act of King Charles II. in 1683, it was enacted that any alien settling here and taking the oath should be naturalised, paying only £5 10s. for a patent. A number of Jews and other foreigners came and settled, and one Wm. Kupius, a native of Holland, purchased a plantation in Clarendon, married the dau. of Col. Bernard Andreas,* and had by her one son and one dau. Upon the death of Wm. Kupius some years since, and of his only son, the estate fell to his only surviving child, Anna Williamina Bernarda Kupius, an infant, under the guardianship of Col. Andreas, her grandfather. Her mother then marrying Mr. Anthony Swimmer,† Col. Andreas let the est. to him at £300 a year rent, but both her grandfather and mother dying soon after, the infant, then eight or nine years of age, was left under the guardianship of her step-grandmother, the widow and executrix of Col. Andreas. The child being ill, one Mr. Newsam, a chyrurgeon, treated her, but she was removed from Leeward to Spanish Town, and put under the care of D^r John Stewart, remaining a year at Mr. Merick's house. Dr.

Stewart tormented the child with repeated incisions and pronounced her incurable, when she was removed by Mrs. Andreas home to Leeward and put under Dr. Page. She then improved for four or five months, but died in Jan. last of a fever. Dr. Stewart similarly maltreated Mr. Mackenzie, when Dr. Blair of Kingston stated that the practice was the effect of malice and villainy. Several gentlemen were desirous of giving 4 or £5000 for the Kupius estate, but Mr. Pennent, one of the Assistant Judges of the Grand Court, sent some Spanish arguments to secure the favour of the Governor and Triumvirate. A jury then returned the value at £1456, tho' the estate was underlet at £300, and produced 120 hogsheads of sugar, which at £20 per hhd. makes £2400 a year, and the 120 negroes at £25 per head are worth £3000. Wm. Kupius had several brothers and sisters in Holland. Mr. Brodrick, the Speaker of the Assembly in Oct. 1711. Reference to a sum of £54,830 retained on account of penalties of prize bonds, the duties being only £9043. Col. Rich. Lloyd, Mr. Chas. Kent, Mr. Rich. Thompson, Mr. Edw. James, and Mr. James Knight, late inhabitants of this island. Our present Gov. was bred at sea. Our present Chief Justice* was also bred at sea, lost his frigate on a rock off Port Royal, and settled as a planter. Judge Wm. Careless was a soldier in the Foot Guards, embezzled the week's pay of the company, made his way hither, married a planter's widow, and is now the first of the six assistant judges of the Grand Court. News arrived here that heavy complaints were sent home against Gov. Lowther of Barbados and Govr. Douglas of the Windward Islands, and the latter, under colour of inquiring into the murder of Gov. Parke, was reported to have made £20,000 or more.

NOTES BY THE EDITOR.

The above pamphlet represents only one side of the case, but there is nevertheless a good deal of truth in the statements.

Gov. Walter Douglas was recalled, tried, and sentenced to a fine of £500 and five years' imprisonment. Gov. Rob. Lowther was recalled for maladministration and corruption.

Lord Archibald Hamilton, who was 7th son of the 3rd Duke, was sent prisoner to England, when he published an Answer to the Articles published against him, and Sir Nicholas Lawes, a planter, succeeded him in July 1717. Rigby seems later to have taken sides against Brodrick. (See Oldmixon's "British Colonies of America," ii., 353.)

Edward Rigby, a woollen draper of Paternoster Row, and Factor of the Southsea Co., purchased in 1680 the reversion to lands in Mistley, co. Essex, and on the death of the Earl of Oxford in 1703 entered into possession. His son Richard, the Provost Marshal and Sec. of Jamaica, married in or before 1722 Anne, dau. of John Perry of Antigua, Provost Marshal Gen. of the Leeward Islands, who by his will gave her a portion of £3000. Richard succeeded to Mistley, where he died in 1730, and by his will bequeathed his wife an annuity of £250, besides her joynture of £150 a year, £1500 to each of his two daus., and entailed his lands on his only son Richard. This latter became M.P., a Privy Councillor, Master of the Rolls, Paymaster in Ireland, and died at Bath a bach. in 1788, aged 65.

Wm. Brodrick, 5th son of Sir St. John Brodrick, Knt., of co. Cork, and brother of Alan, Lord Chancellor of Ireland, 1st Viscount Midleton, was appointed Attorney-Gen. of Jamaica in 4, 8, and 11 Will. III. In 1693 he mar. at St. Catherine's, J., Hannah, widow of Tho. Ballard, Jr. She was buried as "Ann" in 1703. Gov. Sir Wm. Beeston wrote 4 Ap. 1695:—"I called Capt. Brodrick from the Assembly and swore him of the Council." Dec. 2. Mr. B., the Attorney-Gen., goes to England in the "Ruby." ("W.I. Cal.," pp. 455, 623.) In

* Col. Peter Heywood, a M. of C. and Chief Justice, was removed from his offices by Gov. Hamilton, and succeeded by Tho. Bernard.

1701 he was a M. of C. of Montserrat. In 1707 he mar. Sarah Ivey. Four of his children were buried 1705-9.

In 1715 he was reinstated as Attorney-Gen. (Bridges, i., 344.) He was appointed one of the Justices of the K. B. in Ireland in 1721, and died leaving an only surviving son Thomas, a Vice-Admiral, born 1705, but not bapt. at St. Cath., according to Roby.

Dr. John Stewart was made a M. of C. in 1716.

ABSTRACT OF THE WILL OF JOHN WELCH OF ST. KITTS.

John Welch of the I. of S^t Christopher, late a Merchant. Will dated 23 Feb. 1780. All my effects (particularly a plantation in the I. of S^t Vincent which I lately purchased but have not yet received a title to) may be sold and the monies arising from the above and from my tea plantations in this I. I give as follows. To my son John, an infant in his fourth year, £3000 st. at 21, he to be sent to the University. My dau. Jane Akers £2000 st. & the infant my wife is now with child £2000 st., & if either of them die under 16 the legacy to lapse. My wife Frances £3000 c. in lieu of dower, if she remain single I give her £200 st. per annum with the use of my house & furniture at Capisterre or £60 per annum if the estate should be sold. I give her also the use of a pair of horses & chaise. If she chooses to reside in England I allow her £50 per annum for house rent. If she marry I give her the £3000 & no more. To Ann & Margaret, two daus. of Margaret Nazarine, £30 per annum. My cousin James Welch £1000 c. To his sister Jane Hawkes £30 per annum free of her husband's debts. I give to an "indolent fellow named Nicholas Kirwar* £300" and to his sister Cath. Chambers £200. To the children of Patrick M^cKenley of M^t Seratt begotten with Mary Welch whom he married £50 each. To the industrious poor of Basseterre £500. I give to James Akers, Robert Thomson & Wm. Beach £100 each & appoint them Ex'ors. All residue to my son John. Witnessed by Robert Crawford, W^m H. Herbert, Alex^r M^cKenzie.

(N^o 10,162—Codicil.) Unless my 2 estates sell for $\frac{7}{8}$ of the sum appraised they may be retained.

On 20 Sept. 1780 I shall owe to the heirs of Peniston on receiving a title to the S^t Vincent estate £10,560. I owe M^r Nesbitt £4000 st. The crop of 1780 will pay near half of this £4000. I owe M^r Rich^d Neave 4 or £500—justly nothing. My rum of 1780 and monies due will pay nearly all my other debts. I have at St. Vincent 102 hhds. of sugar and the present crop estimated at 250—280 hgds. which will pay half of Peniston's balance. I give my Ex'or James Akers £500.

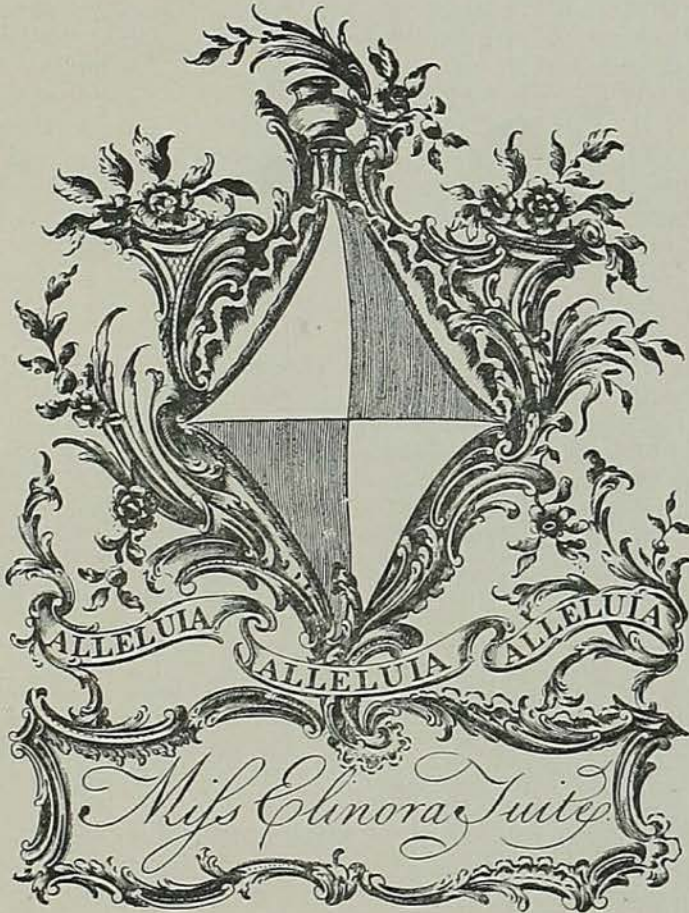
(N^o 10,163) John Welch of St. Chr., Esq., revoke legacies to my dau. Jane Akers of £2000 st. and give her instead £4000 c. and to my unborn child if a boy £3000 st. but if a girl £4000 c., and I give the residue to my son John and to any after born son equally. I give my wife in lieu of all legacies and gifts an annuity of £300 st. and 8 house negros. I revoke the £1000 to my cousin James Welch and give him an annuity of £50 for 10 years. I revoke the legacy to the poor of Basseterre. I appoint Nich. Richards, Esq., as Ex'or in the place of Rob. Thomson, Esq. 25 June 1780. Witnessed by Mary Smith, Rich^d Thistlethwaite, Tho^s Bridgwater. Before the Hon. Anthony Johnson, President of S^t Chr. and Dep. Ordinary, appeared Wm. Henry Herbert, gent., and R^d Thistlethwaite, planter, and were sworn this 16 Sep. 1780. BOOKPLATE OF MISS ELINORA TUITE.



The identity of the owner of this fine bookplate is doubtful. The Tuites of Tuitestown, co. Westmeath, were largely interested in the W.I., especially Montserrat.

Nicholas Tuite of London, merchant, died 1772, aged 66 (see *ante*, p. 127), and had a dau. Elinora, who mar. before 1753 Tho. Selby of Biddleston, co. Northumberland. Robert Tuite of Warrington, co. Lanc., W.I. merchant, in his will, made in 1724, named his dau. Elinora.

John Foord of Bristol, cordwainer, of advanced age in 1727; voted at the Bristol Election of 1722 from the parish of St. Mary Port; owned property in Bristol and in Newport, co. Monmouth. Will dated 14 April 1727; proved at Bristol 6 Oct. 1727. [? Identical with John Ford, tanner, admitted into the Liberties of Bristol 1 Aug. 1653; if so, born in or prior to 1632, and aged at least 95 in 1727.]

Elizabeth Foord, mar. . . . Daniel and had a son Rowland Daniel; living 1727.

Michael Foord of Newport, co. Monmouth, licensed to marry, Bristol, 31 Dec. 1663, Jane Bradford of the parish of St. Mary Port. [A George Bradford was one of the witnesses to the will of John Foord, 1727, who mentions property in Newport, co. Monmouth.]

Michael Foord of Bristol, glover, freeman 1710; voted at the elections of 1722, 1734, and 1739 from the parish of St. Mary Port. Will dated 8 Sept. 1750; proved P.C.C. 11 Dec. 1750 (386, Greenly).

Martha, dau. of . . . Will dated 27 Feb. 1753; proved P.C.C. 27 March 1760 (101, Lynch).

Thomas Foord of Bristol, cordwainer, freedom 7 Dec. 1708, having served an apprenticeship to John Foord (? his father); voted at the Bristol Elections of 1722, 1734, and 1739 from the parish of St. Mary Port, bach. Adm'on granted P.C.C. 25 Oct. 1742 to his brother Michael; second grant, d.b.n., 26 Jan. 1754 to his sister-in-law Martha Foord.

Thomas Foord, carrier or glover, of Bristol, eldest son, a minor in 1727; apprenticed in Bristol 4 Dec. 1735; freeman 16 April 1743; voted at the election of 1754 from the parish of St. Mary Port; named in the will of his father 1750 and in that of his mother 1753; died before Oct. 1774.

Ann, dau. of . . . Adm'on granted P.C.C. 27 Sep. 1775 ("late of Bristol, widow") to her son Edward.

John Foord, Merchant, of Kingston, Jamaica, a minor in 1727; freeman of Bristol 20 Feb. 1754; bur. at Greenwich Park, J., 8 Oct. 1758. Will dated 1 Oct. and proved in Jamaica 2 Nov. 1758. ? Bachelor.

Edward Foord of Bristol, skinner, freeman 24 Oct. 1774; voted at the election of 1774 from the parish of St. Peter; described as a "leather dresser and breeches maker," of 25 Maryport Street, Bristol, in 1775; mentioned in the will of his uncle John Foord 1758. Will dated 11 Dec. 1775; proved P.C.C. 19 April 1776 (178, Bellas). Bachelor.

DELPRATT FAMILY.

The particulars with reference to Martha and Samuel Delpratt given on p. 147 are taken from a pedigree of this family compiled by W. J. C. Moens, Esq., F.S.A., and printed in "Miscellanea Genealogica et Heraldica," 2nd Series, Vol. III. (1890), pp. 344-346.

* Compiled by Hugh Alex. Ford, 1908-1913.

The pedigree in question is a tabular one, and no evidences are printed in proof of its accuracy. It starts the English branch with certainty at the above-named Samuel Delpratt, who is presumed to be the son of Daniel Duprat, born at Nérac (Département de Lot-et-Garonne, France), and naturalized by Act of Parliament 12 William III. (1700). The pedigree is carried down in part to 1889. Joseph Delpratt, grandson of the above-mentioned Samuel, had a grant of arms on the 17th of December 1867.

I have not myself attempted to verify this Delpratt pedigree. I note that there is no mention of anybody of this name in the "G.M." prior to 1816, except in the year 1763, p. 620, December Number, where "Wm. Delpratt of Bristol, merchant," appears in the list of bankrupts. There are no Delpratt wills at Bristol prior to 1800.

The above sketch pedigree may possibly prove of interest, inasmuch as it shews the descent of John Foord, Merchant of Kingston, Jamaica, who died in 1758, and of the Hon. Edward Foord, Member of Council of the island, who died in 1777, and to whose memory there is a tablet in St. Andrew's Church, Jamaica.

I have compiled the pedigree in question from my general "Ford Collections," and no special study of this particular family has been made.

It will be observed that no searches have been made in any of the Parish Registers of Bristol. As this family appears to have resided for several generations in the parish of St. Maryport in that city, a search in the Registers of this parish would doubtless yield much further information.

I should also recommend any one who is especially interested in this Foord family to search the marriages and deaths recorded in the early Bristol newspapers, "Felix Farley's Bristol Journal," etc., of which there is a very fine series in the Bristol Public Reference Library.

Mary Foord, second dau., of Bristol, spinster. Will dated 18 April 1780; proved P.C.C. 10 Dec. 1788 (589, Calvert).

Martha Foord, youngest dau., mar. 1758—1775 Samuel Delpratt of Bristol and Jamaica, Merchant, of Foord and Delpratt of Bristol; died at sea *circa* 8 July 1783, returning from J., where he was owner of Mount Sinai, Coldstream, and other plantations; went there 24 Dec. 1779. Will dated 17 June 1783; proved in J. 3 March 1784. She died in J. 27 Aug. 1782. See note.

This family of Foord does not appear to be connected in any way with that of Gilbert Ford, Attorney-General for Jamaica 1760, Member of the Assembly for St. John's 1761, Member of Council 1764, who was buried at St. Andrew's, Jamaica, in October 1767, although this latter family also had several members resident in Bristol during the eighteenth century. I have compiled a fairly complete pedigree of the family of this Gilbert Ford from 1672 to the present day, comprising eight generations, and giving particulars of some eighty individuals.

I am interested in all Ford pedigrees, either in any part of the United Kingdom or in the West Indies. I have lists of all Ford wills and administrations in the P.C.C. from the earliest to the year 1800, containing some 1,100 references. I now have abstracts of over half of these, and I hope shortly to have the series complete. I also possess numerous pedigrees and sketch pedigrees of many families of this name, as well as thousands of references to individuals, lists of wills in several District Probate Courts, extracts from Parish Registers (including all references to Ford in the whole of the existing Registers in Jamaica prior to 1800), and much other genealogical material. I shall be glad to correspond with anybody interested in a Ford family.

WILLS AND ADMINISTRATIONS.

NOTE.—I have abstracts of all Ford wills proved at Bristol from 1689 to 1807. There are four wills prior to 1689. I have also abstracts of all the Ford wills proved, and administrations granted, in the P.C.C. prior to the year 1800, where the locality given in the Calendar is either Bristol or Gloucester. I also possess notes from all the wills of this name proved in Jamaica between 1660 and 1760. The following ten wills and administrations are selected from the above and appear to be all that relate to this particular family.

Will of John Foord of the city of Bristol, Cordwainer, dated 14 April 1747. Now of advanced age. To his son Michael Foord the reversion of a messuage in Maryport Street. To his three grandchildren, Thomas, John, and Elizabeth Foord, sons and dau. of his son Michael Foord, £100 each at 21 or marriage. His sister Elizabeth Daniel and her son Rowland Daniel to have his cottage and messuage in Newport, co. Monmouth. Poor of St. Maryport. His son Thomas Foord sole executor. Proved at Bristol 6 October 1727 by Thomas Foord.

25 October 1742. Administration of the goods, etc., of Thomas Foord, late of Bristol, bachelor, deceased, was granted to Michael Foord, the brother. (Ad'mon Act Book, P.C.C.)

Will of Michael Foord, glover, of Bristol, dated 8 September 1750. His wife Martha to be executrix. Settlement on eldest son Thomas Foord of messuage, etc., in Henbury, co. Gloucester, purchased by father John Foord, and settled on testator's brother Thomas Foord, whose heir-at-law he—the testator—now is; failing heirs of Thomas, on testator's son John Foord and his heirs, on son Edward and heirs of his body, on daughters Elizabeth, Mary, and Martha and their heirs. A messuage in Milk Street, purchased of David Rose, to his wife Martha, also a messuage in Mary Port Street, together with another messuage leased from the Corporation. Legacies to daughters already named. His wife appointed residuary legatee. Henry Hillman, currier, and Christopher Raymond, upholder, both of Bristol, to be overseers. Proved 11 December 1750 by the executrix named. (386, Greenly.)

26 January 1754. Administration of the goods, etc., of Thomas Foord, late of the city of Bristol, deceased, left unadministered by Michael Foord, deceased, whilst living the brother and only next of kin, was granted to Martha Foord, widow, the relict and sole executrix named in the will of the said Michael Foord, deceased. First grant in October 1742. (Ad'mon Act Book, P.C.C.)

John Foord, late of the city of Bristol, but now of the parish of Kingston in the Island of Jamaica, Merchant. Will dated 1 Oct. 1758. My many and great losses. My funeral to be at Greenwich Park. Unto my friend Thomas Harris, Esq., one of my Executors, the mourning diamond ring I wear inscribed on the outside "Thos. Harris ob. 26 Dec' 1748 Æ 70." To my Nephew Edward Foord my gold headed cane. My Sister Elizabeth Foord my gold sleeve buttons and the Wedding ring of my late Beloved wife. My Friend Zachary Bayly, Esq., my silver mounted Sword. To a Mulatto Boy in the parish of Saint James's named John Cohall, son of Honora Cohall, a free Mulatto woman, my negro boy Ben and £20. My Kinswoman Isabella Lewis a Gold mourning Ring. My Friend Peter King All my wearing Apparel and my negro Boy Charles. Unto my Executors each a mourning ring. My brother Edward Foord five shillings. All the residue of my Estate unto my three Sisters, Elizabeth, Mary, and Martha Foord. My friends, Thomas Harris, Esq^r, and Mr. Morris Ceely, Merchant, both of Bristol, Zachary Bayly, Esq., Nathaniel Bayly, Esq^r, and Peter King, Merchant, all of the parish of Kingston, Executors.

Witnessed by Fort^s Dwarris, Richard Curtin, Hugh Halero. Sworn 2 Nov. 1758 by Richard Curtin before H. Moore.

[Lib. 31 of Wills, fol. 165 (Transcript folio 195), entered 2 November 1758.]

Martha Foord of Bristol, widow. Will dated 27 February 1753. Devises to her eldest dau. Elizabeth Foord a messuage in Mary Port Street, Bristol, leased on the lives of testatrix, of said dau. Elizabeth, and of testatrix' other daughter Mary Foord. A messuage in Milk Street bequeathed to her by her late husband by will, dated 8 September 1750, to her daughter Mary Foord. To her youngest daughter Martha Foord another messuage in Mary Port Street, held of the Corporation for the lives of her sons John and Edward Foord and of said daughter Martha. To her sons, Thomas, John and Edward Foord, mourning. Thirty pounds to the use of her sister Anne Smith, and Five guineas for herself and her husband William Smith for mourning. Proved 27 March 1760 by the executrices named. (101, Lynch.)

27 September 1775. Administration of the goods, etc., of Ann Foord, late of Bristol, widow, deceased, was granted to Edward Foord the son. (Ad'mon Act Book, P.C.C.)

Edward Foord of Bristol, gent. Will dated 11 December 1775. Bequeaths all his freehold messuage to his aunts Elizabeth How and Mary Foord, spinster, and the survivor of them; then to his aunt Martha, wife of Samuel Delpratt of Bristol, and her children. To his cousin Martha, daughter of Martha Delpratt, "my late honoured mother's gold watch." To his cousins Samuel Delpratt and Edward Delpratt, similar legacies. To Mary Foord, spinster, "reputed daughter of my uncle Edward Foord of Jamaica, merchant," £100. To John Page, friend, £100.

Samuel Delpratt and John Page made executors.

Codicil mentions Mary Foord, aunt.

Proved 19 April 1776 by the executors named. (178, Bellas.)

Hon. Edward Foord of the parish of Kingston in the County of Surry in the Island of Jamaica, Esqr. I manumize my two negro slaves named Jack and Molly and I give to each of them £10 c. per annum. All the residue of my estate unto my Brother in Law Saml. Delpratt. If I die in Jamaica, to be buried in the Chancel of Half Way Tree Church near my late friend Zachary Bayley, Esqr., deceased. I appoint my Brother in Law Samuel Delpratt sole Executor, except that until his arrival in this Island, or until Power of Attorney from him as my Executor to some person to act for him here shall arrive, I appoint Joseph Fitch and Eliphalet Fitch of Kingston, Merchants, and Hy. Bayley Ludlow of the same place, Executors so far as relates to the affairs of the House of Foord and Delpratt, and the said Joseph Fitch and Eliphalet Fitch, John Palmer, Jr., of St. James, and Rich^d Milburn, of the same parish, Merchants, Executors so far as relates to the affairs of the House late of Foord, Clarke and Delpratt, but that upon the arrival of Saml. By Indre of 1 June 1775 between Pinnock and Gray reciting the Indre of 20 Ap. 1775 between Aaron Nunes Henriques Merch^t surviving copartner of Moses Nunes Da Costa Merch^t of y^e 1st part, Ph. Pinnock of the 2^d and W^m Gray of the 3^d after reciting that by Indre dated 30 Nov. 1764 between Ph. Pinnock of the one p^t and Moses Nunes Da Costa and Aaron Nunes Henriques of the other it was Witnessed that Ph. P. conveyed to Moses N. Da Costa and Aaron N. Henriques all that penn in the parish of S^t Ann called Black Heath containing 435 acres bounding N. on Ph. Pinnock, E. on Rich^d Hemmings the heirs of Menzie deceased Ph. Pinnock and Daniel Tracey, S. on Rich^d Hemmings, Tho. Gray, Peter Bradey, Fra. Harvey, and W. on Tho. Smeal, Josiah Smeal and Hen. Tucker and buildings and slaves as in schedule annexed and reciting that by a further Indre of 13 March 1765 between Pinnock and Grace his wife and Da Costa and Henriques she released her dower and Da Costa was dead and certain portions had been sold so that there remained only 177 acres and there was due on the mortgage £8916 c. which W^m Gray has paid and the Penn is hereby confirmed to him. Reciting also that Gray had advanced divers large sums to Pinnock so that £120,000 c. was now due, all the above estates with equity of redemption are now conveyed to him together with all furniture, plate, &c.

M^r Gray is about to raise £30,000 st. by the sale of annuities and purposes granting Richmond and Blackheath Penn with all the negros to trustees, and proposes his own bond with Messrs. Tho. and Clayton Case of Liverpool for better security. Counsel's opinion, that his title is good, signed by Mat. Duane, Lincoln's Inn, 27 Nov. 1775.

By Indre trip. of 5 Sept. 1775 between John Morse and Tho. Smith of London Merch^{ts} of the 1st part, W^m Gray of the 2^d and Hugh Lewis of the 3^d, it was recited that W^m Gray on 8 July 1774 became bound in £60,000 to Morse and Smith conditioned for the payment of £30,000 on 8 July 1778 and assigned his estates to them and Gray had paid the £30,000 and the estates are now conveyed to Lewis in Trust.

Similar provision for Edward and John B. until 7 July 1791, when John will be 21, and £300 each for apprenticeship. To my nephew John B., s. of my brother John B., and my nephew Geo. B. and Chr. Monumental Inscriptions in England relating to West Indians.*

ST. JAMES'S CHAPEL, HAMPSTEAD ROAD, CO. MIDDX.

[Cansick, 221.]

To the Memory of
Lieutenant Colonel JOHN HARRIS CRUGER,
late of Ruffel Place, Fitzroy Square,
Who Departed this Life June 3rd, 1807, aged 69 Years,
and is interred in the Vault under this Building.
He had been an Inhabitant of the City of New York,
in North America, and at the commencement
of the Rebellion (disregarding all personal considera-
tions) he took up Arms in support of the Rights of
this Country. In the course of that war he
distinguished himself in the Defence of the important
Post of Ninety six, in South Carolina, which he
maintained with about 300 Provincial Forces, without
Cannon, against a force of 7000 Men, with a numerous
Train of Artillery.

He also distinguished himself most brilliantly in the
Action of the Eutwas, where he rallied a Portion of the
Troops that had left the field, attacked the Enemy,
recovered from them the Artillery they had taken,
and pursued them until recalled by superior Orders.
By a rapid and unexampled March, he relieved the
Garrison of Fort Augusta, which at the Time
was besieged, and in most imminent Danger; And on
every Occasion where he could exert himself
he displayed a Zeal, Intrepidity, and good Conduct,
which procured him the Approbation and Friendship
of his Commander in Chief, the late Marquis Cornwallis,
and all the Officers of Distinction with whom he served.
To his Gallantry and good Conduct as a Soldier,
were added every Virtue that could adorn a Christian
and a Gentleman in social life, which has been fully
testified by the Feelings expressed at his Death
by all those to whom he was known.

This short Memorial is placed here by his
truly disconsolate Widow.

1807, June 3. Aged 69, Lieut.-col. John-Harris Cruser. Lieut.-col. John Harris, of Russell-place, Fitzroy-square (*sic*, "G.M.," 595). In Sabine's "American Loyalists," p. 234, there is the following note of him:—

"CRUGER, JOHN HARRIS. Of New York. He was a member of the Council of the Colony, and considered to be in office in 1782. At that time he was Lieutenant Colonel of De Lancey's First Battalion. His property was confiscated. At the peace he went to England. His wife was De Lancey's daughter."

There is a short pedigree of the De Lanceys in Burke's "Landed Gentry." One of them, Stephen, was Chief Justice of the Bahamas.

Being at the time a Lieut. in the 68th he accompanied his reg. when it was ordered in April 1772 from N. America to St. Vincent for the purpose of subduing the Caribs. He was a Major-Genl. in 1811. (Shepherd's "St. Vincent," 29.)

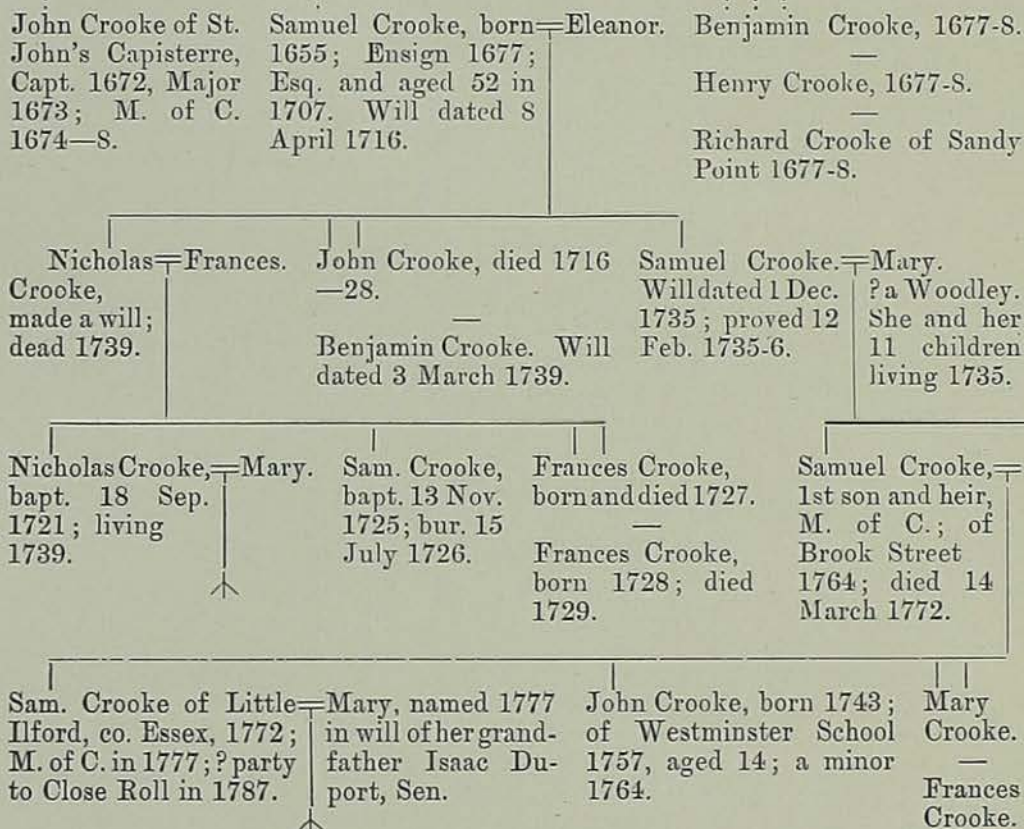

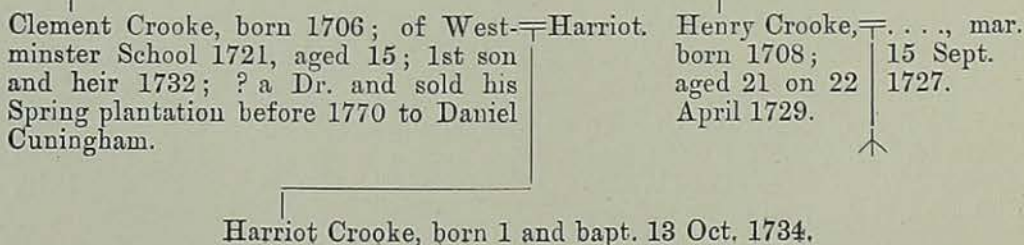

The Church in the W.I.

The records relating to W.I. Clergy are mostly to be found at Fulham Palace in the custody of the Bishop of London, and at 15 Tufton Street, Westminster, the offices of the S.P.G. It is with some of the latter that this article is concerned. The series of Letter-books marked "A" consists of twenty-six volumes of contemporary copies of letters received, ranging from 1702 to 1736. Most of the originals of these and many later letter-books were subsequently destroyed by fire. The bulk of the correspondence relates to North America, where the majority of the missionaries were sent, the W.I. being wealthy and more settled not requiring so much assistance.

The "B" series of Letter-books consists of twenty-one thick volumes of original letters received 1701—1786. B. VI. relates to the W.I. and B. VIII. to Barbados. The others belong to North America.

An odd volume labelled "Barbados Journal," 1710—1737, is the minute book belonging to the Committee which had charge of the Society's property derived from Chr. Codrington.

The "Fulham Papers," of which two volumes relate to the W.I., containing original letters 1803—1827, were presented to the Society by a former Bishop of London.

There are numerous other volumes relating to the Society's business, which would take weeks to properly peruse, and there are, I believe, many documents kept in the fireproof strong room. Perhaps some day the records may be calendared.

Bindley's "Annals of Codrington College" and Fothergill's "Emigrant Ministers to America" give much information. Lists of Clergy taken from Fulham Palace records by Mr. N. Darnell Davis will follow this article as soon as space permits.

It is worth about 1200*l.* p*er* annum. The two plantations in Barbadoes commonly called Conssets & Codringtons are Estates in fee simple consisting of 730 acres of Land & 320 Negroes worth about 1500*l.* p*er* annum." Col. Wm. Codrington claims a moiety of Berbuda. The Society is only entitled to $\frac{3}{16}$. The late Col. Chr. C. owed by bond £3460 to John Sharpe. 70 negroes were purchased after the will was made, and these are claimed by Col. Wm. C., the heir-at-law, as real estate. I was called to preach Col. C.'s funeral sermon, and have sent it to be printed and have dedicated it to the Society.

1710-11, Feb. 5. Nath. Carpenter, Sen*r*, at Newington, to M*r* Hodges. Myself and Capt. Prissick adm*ors* of the will of Col. Chr. C.

1710, March 22. Dudley Woodbridge at Barbadoes to Mr. Newman describes Gen. C.'s plantations. M*r* Consett, the former owner, gave them to Gen. C.'s father, 7 or 800 acres, 3 windmills on one work and 1 on the other, 312 or 315 negroes, 100 head of cattle. The last crop net 2000*l.* They have made 6000 potts of sugar at 60*l.* p*er* pott and 20,000 gals. rum. Up to date they have made 2000 potts at 60*l.* or 120,000*l.* at 16 per cent. is £960 st. All utensils, carts, horses, cattle are claimed by Col. Wm. C. as real estate. M*r* Wm. Sharpe, late our President, was indebted to his brother John Sharpe about £4000 and the General gave bond for £5000 to pay this.

1710-11, March 23. M*r* John Smalbridge to his brother Rev. D*r* S.

1711, June 20. D. Woodbridge at Barbadoes to the Sec. M*r* J. Sharpe made his levy on 294 negroes. M*r* Row. Tryon of L., merchant, makes advances for the Society, and on 18 July "The French took off from Berbuda all the Negroes being 154 most of the Stock & demolished the Castle." I have sent over my eldest son* of tender age for his education.

The nearest Estimac'on that can be had of the Lands formerly belonging to the Popish Clergy in S^t X^toph^s is that there was one plantation possessed by the Jesuits at the Head of Basseterre Town, one other called Blackffryers upon Cayan Hills, possessed also by the Jesuits; Another Plantation belonging to the Carmelites in the Basseterre Quarter and some Lands belonging to the Capucins in Cappeterre Quarter, in all esteemed to be about 400 acres of manurable Land.

There are also Barren Pasture Grounds belonging to y^e s^d settlements and some Ground of y^e like Nature at Fryer's Bay.

It is Judged the said 400 Acres may be sold at about 5^l an Acre, the Barren Grounds being also included in that Price.

That y^e s^d 400 Acres being sufficiently Stocked may produce a Revenue of about twenty five hundred pounds p. ann., but that so to Stock them will require the sum'e of Seven Thousand Pounds Sterling.

My husband received deacon and priest's orders in the parish church of St Patrick, and was ordained by the Bishop of Sodor and Man, Claudius Crigan, a near relative, and received the living of St Philip's from the Hon. John Nugent, L^t Gov. and C. in C. I have a dau. and son, the former blind was born Nov. 1795 in England and baptised in Queen Square Church, Devonshire Street. I have been a widow 21 years . . . in poverty.

His 8 years' work, was educated at Eton, the mortality of 1818, his estate would have been freed of debt but its produce is now only one half its former value. Miss Markham, a near relation, has charge of the children.

St. George's Rectory, Nevis.

May 8th, 1913.

I send a detailed statement of Rectorships at St. George's and some entries to begin the register. The registers are in very bad order, and almost or quite undecipherable in places.

NOTES.

1. As noted, the blanks in the narrative entry are because the leaf is defective at those points. I take it to state that Blencowe applied for the town parish. That Hendrickson was buried and his widow married Doyle, who became Rector, but did not enter his acts on the Register.

2. There are entries in Pemberton's list not in Hampden's. Brodie's entries are on different paper, as are Hampden's.

3. Each year is on a separate page, and there is a space of several inches at the bottom of 1732, blank after Dec. 24.

1675. John Lawson, priest, minister at New River Church (St. George's being on that river), is mentioned in Besse's "Sufferings of the Quakers." [EDITOR.]

In Vol. II., pp. 266 *et seq.*, are printed Transcripts sent the Bishop of London by Henry Pope,* Rector from May 3rd, 1716, to May 24th, 1723-4.

The present register begins April 15th, 1730, and the same handwriting continues until March 20th, 1734-5, without signature to the entries. Another hand runs from April 9th, 1735, to Dec. 3rd, 1736, without signature.

Rev. John Newberry, minister 1735-6. See his burial entered 23 Nov. 1736.

Jan. 15th, 1737-8. Joseph Blumfield,† Rector, begins his register.

Feb. 7th, 1739-40. J. M. signs, who signs at the foot of the page as John Mackay,‡ Rector, and Sept. 9th, 1750, Rev. John Mackay, Rector, is buried.

Entries from March 3rd, 1749-50, to June 20th are made from the papers of the Rev. John Mackay after his death by Edwin Thomas, Clerk.

July 21st, 1750, an entry is made by Edwin Thomas, Clerk, as Rector. Following an entry on Jan. 26th, 1764, in Mr. Thomas' handwriting, there is an undated record: "Mr. Thomas quitted the parish of Gingerland in April 176[3] and Mr. George Blencowe the son of Mr. Blencowe of Blencowe in Cumber[land] succeeded him about July 26 just about that time Mr. Davis Minister of the town parish & went & settled in Stachia upon which Mr. Blencowe ap & was appointed thereto in Febr. 1764 but died the . In Mr. Blencowe's time (besides the 4 last) was Hendrickson whose widow soon after married Will^m [?] Doyle, Batchelor of laws."

[Blanks in the above entry are from defect in the register from age.]

N.B.—The following are from Minutes taken from Mr. Doyle's Papers when he resigned the Parish and are entered exactly as found by him in the Papers aforesaid.

J. Clerkson.

In these entries the dates are from June 10th, 1764, to July 21st, 1767. John Clerkson, sometimes as Curate and sometimes as Clerk, signs the entries until April 4th, 1776. The next entry is as follows:—

"Thus far this Register has been kept by my predecessors and my self, but the Persons whose names are underwritten, being Vestry Men Anno Dom. 1777, it was agreed that 2000 lbs. of Sugar that has been allowed to the Minister for 50 years past & upwards for keeping a Register should no longer be continued;

* Nevis. 1724, May 25. Henry Pope, Minister, Parish of St. George. Above 8 years since he went over and inducted. About 73 Families in Parish. Service every Sunday and on some Festival days. Attendance 50 to 70 on Sundays. On other days number very small. Sacrament 4 times a year, 12 to 20 Communicants.

"We have a good Folio Bible and Common Prayer Book, with 2 chalices and a silver plate for Altar. The Church 'ruinous and past repair.' Value of living from £60 to £70 stlg. Raised by Poll Tax on Slaves. No Public School, but the Liberty of our Church is granted to one Mr Richard Morgan for the instruction of a few youths. No Parochial Library. House and Glebe of 3 or 4 acres." (In later list "since come away.") (Fulham Palace MSS., communicated by Mr. N. Darnell Davis.)

1723. From the Rev. Henry Pope at St. George's. On 5 April 1716 I commenced my Incumbency. Arm, seal. Crest: *A demi-lion rampant coupé.*

1723, April 13. From the same. Arm, seal. Arms: *Two chevronels, on a canton a mullet.* Crest: *A lion or tiger passant.*

June 12. My wife returned here six weeks ago. (*Ibid.*) [EDITOR.]

I do therefore declare that no Record in this Book henceforward during my Incumbency is entered by me; and I do hereby protest against such proceeding as arbitrary, oppressive, & unprecedented, if not illegal.

N.B.—I have a Register which I keep for my own satisfaction, commencing Anno Dom' 1767 the Time I became Incumbent of the Parish of St George, Gingerland.

John Clerkson,* Clerk.

Nine pages blank follow, then fragments which may be from his private register or that of the parish, there is nothing to decide, save that the paper appears to be that of the Register. There is the lower half of a page, the first complete entry dated Dec. 5th, 1777, on another part of a page the last entry is dated May 17th, 1782, signed: "John Clerkson, Clerk," and the entries are in his handwriting.

"The Register of the Parish of Saint George in the Island of Nevis commencing July 14th 1783 and carefully kept by the Rev. George Green presented by his Excellency Governor De Fresne to the abovementioned Parish on the date and in the year aforesaid." His entries continue until 1799, when there are five with the dates torn off.

June 11th, 1799, William Green begins and continues until Aug. 6th, 1801. This is followed by a large number of blank folios. Then two folios ruled in three columns, containing entries of Baptisms, Marriages, and Burials from Sept. 11th, 1811, to Jan. 24th, 1815, certified by J. Hampden, Rector.

Three following pages of foolscap contain entries from May 25th, 1812, to Oct. 4th, 1815, "for insertion in the Parish Register of Gingerland kept by J. H. Pemberton, clerk," which do not correspond with those of Mr. Hampden.

Oct. 15th, 1815, Rev. J. H. Walwyn, Rector, begins and continues until Sept. 7th, 1817. Entries of baptisms apparently from May 11th, 1817, to March 1st, 1818, are certified by A. Brodie.

Feb. 28th, 1818, the Rev. Joseph Herbert Pemberton, A.B., "was collated to the Benefice Parish [*sic*] of Saint George Gingerland by His Excellency Thomas Probyn, Esq., Governor in Chief &c. &c.," and was Rector until his death on Sept. 19th, 1870. Evidently the last two or three years he was in bad health, for "Rector sick" or "not able to come" follows many entries.

From Dec. 29th, 1868, to March 21st, 1871, Thomas Owen "officiates" frequently. [He was Rector of St. James', Windward Parish.] March 27th, 1871, James Bovell signs as "Curate," other entries as "Officiating," and finally without qualification until Jan. 23rd, 1873. Rev. John M. Collins, Rector of St. Paul's, Charlestown, officiates at Baptisms until he signs as Rector of the Parish May 17th, 1874. During this time many burials are signed "Layman" or are without any signature of the officiant. Mr. Collins continued Rector until July 1st, 1890. At the same time there are entries from Oct. 28th to Nov. 20th,

1874, signed by W. J. Serres [so I read the name] as "Acting Rector," and from March 30th, 1883, to May 7th, 1884, by John Drayton, apparently a Curate.

Aug. 6th, 1890. John Jones is Rector and continues until May 24th, 1898, who more or less rebuilt both churches. James Jones succeeds his brother, officiating from Sept. 10th, 1898, to April 11th, 1899.

Walter A. Edwards, B.A., is in charge from May 7th to Oct. 10th, 1899, and the Rev. R. A. Heath, Rector of St. Paul's, Charlestown, is priest in charge from Oct. 18th, 1899, to June 6th, 1900. July 1st, 1900, the Rev. Alfred W. Watt takes charge, remaining until June 30th, 1903, and July 1st, 1903, the present Rector, Lawrence Buckley Thomas, D.D., was appointed to the cure by Bishop Mather.

Wither of the 1 part and Lovelace Bigg of Lincoln's Inn Gent. of the other Wither assigned the messuage to Bigg and about 1685 Tho. Bassett died intestate without having repaid any sum and Sarah his relict entered upon the premises and Sam. Proctor being called upon to satisfy the debt by an Indenture dated the 9 Dec. 1691 between Lovelace Bigg of the 1 part and Tho. Clarke and Sam. Proctor since deceased of the other and reciting that £78 had been paid by Sam. J. Hope on 4 Nov. last and whereas I have now sold to the assignees under a commission of bankrupt against Tod and Co. merchants in London the said Plantations in Antigua and it becomes necessary that Ed. Bouverie the Y^r and Patrick Maxwell the surviving trustees under the marriage articles should concur or release the said plantations of the joynture of £800 upon my agreeing to secure it out of the sale of the estate of Carriden and Stacks therefore I assign to the said Ed. 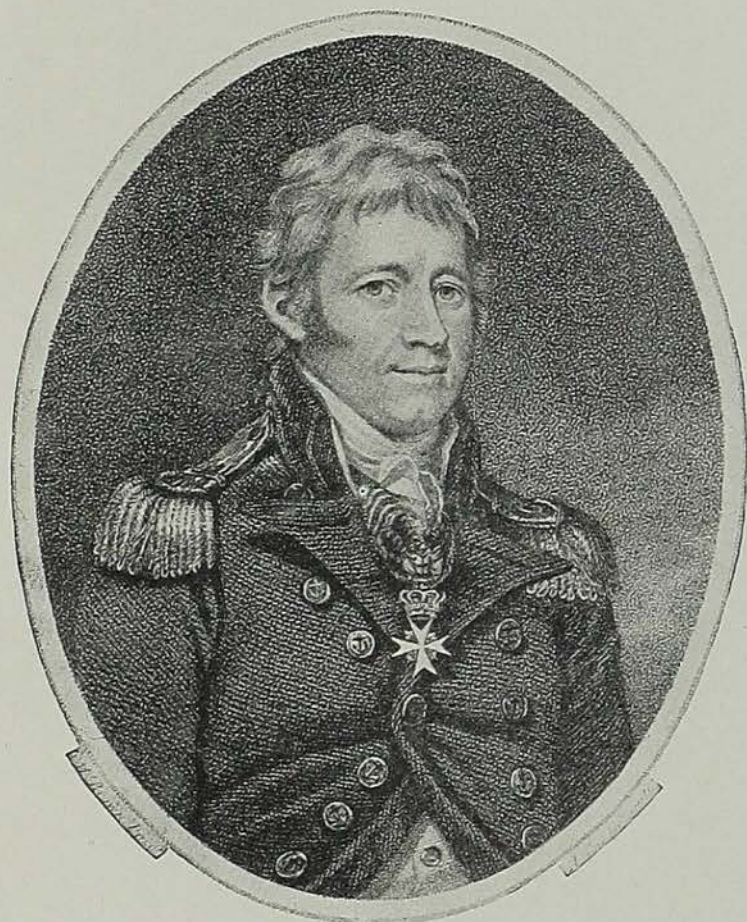

He was born at Gibraltar (or Ireland) in 1762; accounts vary. By his will dated 18 July 1809, proved P.C.C. 23 Sept. 1820, he left all his property to his widow for her life, and at her death to their children equally. The personal estate was sworn under £18,000. (*Ibid.*, 382.)

His portrait, painted by Brown, was engraved in stipple half length by Cardon.

I noted the following from a bookseller's catalogue: "Original Letter-Book of Admiral Sir Home Popham during his command on the Jamaican Station, most of the Letters bearing his Signature; small 4to, original, half binding, 1818-20."

William, the Admiral's eldest son, born April 1791, became a Capt. R.N. in 1819. Brunswick, a younger son, was also Capt. R.N. (O'Byrne's "Naval Biog. Dict.")

John Pakenham, Capt. R.N., 4th son of Adml. the Hon. Sir Tho. P., G.C.B., son of Lord Longford, born 18 Oct. 1790, mar. Aug. 1817 Caroline Emily, 3rd dau. of Sir Home Popham. (Burke's "Landed Gentry," 250, and "G.M." for 3 Nov. 1817, p. 554.)

1818, Nov. 30. At Vera Cruz, Mr. Home Popham, son of Rear Admiral Sir Home Popham, etc. ("G.M.," 376.)

1833, Feb. 20. At Falmouth, aged 63, Capt. Joseph Lamb Popham, R.N. father of the present High Sheriff of Cornwall. He was a half-brother of the 1. Rear-Adm. Sir Home P., K.C.B. There is a long memoir of Governor Sir Charles Brisbane in the "G.M." for 1830, pt. I., 642-6. He was the 4th but eldest surviving son of Admiral John Brisbane, who d. at Southampton 10 Dec. 1807. He entered the Navy about 1779 at the age of about 9, became Lieut. in 1790, Commander in 1794, Capt. in 1796. He saw much active service and in 1807 with 4 frigates captured Curacoa by a brilliant coup-de-main. For this meritorious action he was knighted on April 10, and in December received the following "augmentation to the armorial ensigns used by his family, viz. a chief embattled, thereon a ship of war under sail between two castles; for crest, out of a naval crown, an arm embowed, grasping a sword, and from the hand a medal suspended by a ribbon; for a motto Curacoa; and for Supporters, on the dexter side a British sailor, and on the sinister, a British marine." The House of Assembly of Jamaica presented him with a sword and address. At the latter end of 1808 he was appointed Governor of St. Vincent, which post he retained until his death. His portrait by J. Northcote, R.A., was exhibited at the R.A. in 1809.

To the Editor.

In your last issue of "Caribbeana," p. 130, which is full of interesting material, I am convinced that you unintentionally, I am sure, libelled Sir Hender Molesworth. I went into the matter some years ago, and was satisfied that Sloane's "Sir H. M." was Sir Henry Morgan. In the Manuscript Department of the British Museum is a letter from John Roby, the well-known author of "The History of the Parish of St. James in Jamaica" and "Monuments of the Cathedral Church and Parish of St. Catherine," dated at Montego Bay 21st December 1831, addressed to Charles Edward Long (the grandson of the Jamaica historian), who was preparing for issue "Church Notes of Jamaica." In this matter Roby generously offered to place at his disposal his notes, which he no longer felt inclined to publish, as he had lost £120 to £130 over St. Catherine and St. James.

Roby told Long that he had found in the St. Catherine Register the following entry: "1688 August 26 Sir Henry Morgan was buried at Port Royal." This information is the more interesting, as the early records of St. Catherine are now no longer existing.

Roby refers to Sloane's account of Sir H. M. and says: "It must probably refer to Sir Henry, though Sir Hender Molesworth's initials being the same it may perhaps refer to him."

Now, *pace* Long, who in his account of Morgan in the "Gentleman's Magazine" for 1832,* "Memoir of Sir Henry Morgan, Knt.," concludes as follows:—

"I have shewn Sir Henry Morgan to have been neither by connection, nor conduct, nor acquirement, the low-born, bandit-like, and illiterate desperado, that discontented followers, discomfitted enemies and childish story book would have him, but a fit associate in the annals of a transatlantic adventure, with the Raleighs, the Drakes, the Cliffords, and the Shirleys of earlier renown."

Morgan was known to be a hard drinker, as Lord Vaughan testified. Of Hender Molesworth, Leslie, in his "New and Exact Account of Jamaica Edinburgh, 1739," says: "This gentleman behaved to the universal satisfaction of the island; his deportment was courteous, he was easy of access, given to no vice or extravagance a man of moderate principles."

But lastly, Sloane wrote in 1688, when Molesworth was not a baronet, that honour being conferred on him on the 19th of July, 1689. Sloane's "Sir H. M." presumably died in Jamaica; Morgan died in Jamaica, Molesworth in England.

Formerly I did what lay in my power by petitioning for the good of others to gett money to buy Books to instruct them, but now I must become your Petitioner in my own behalf my Condition being now quite chang'd, for on the 9th of January last a Dreadfull fire happened on Port Royall, leaving nothing standing but our 2 fforts, by which means I lost my Parsonage, 400^l in goods and Houshold stuff, besides much of my Cloathes and all my Books; 2 or 3 pieces of Setts being saved, and all my sticht Books, written ones, and bound being either burnt, or stohn away by the Seamen belonging to Ships, much alike merciless

Enemies with the fire. My Books could not be less worth than 150^l. I have lost my Freehold of a Parsonage, by a late Act of the Country made since the fire, w^{ch} has annex'd Port Royall and all y^t belongs to it, to Kingstown prohibiting any Markett at Port Royall, & the Importation & Exportation of any Goods under the penalty of 200^l forfeiture for every fault So y^t now being without a Parsonage having very little money as well as few Books am forced to live upon y^t little the fire hath left me & therefore do now humbly begg your charity in the Gift of some Books particully D^r Scots works, D^r Ashton's, the 3rd vol. of D^r Barrow, a latin Dictionary, & if you please a Hood suitable to my Degree of Batchelor of Divinity wth w^{ch} the University of Oxford honor'd me for above 17 years since. Rev^d S^r I have no more to add, but to begg pardon for my boldness your acceptance of my most hearty thanks for all your former favors & to assure you y^t I am & always will be

DE REYNAUD OF SAN DOMINGO.

I send you a few notes on West Indian families, these being ancestors or relations of my wife.

Cyprien de Reynaud, born about 1707, died 1804—1812 at New Orleans, La., mar. Martha Nicola and had thirteen children. He had a sugar plantation at Aux Cayes, San Domingo. He and his family were obliged to leave there in 1791, going to Nantes, France. The family were Royalists, and probably driven out of France; in any event a party of them sailed from La Rochelle in 1799, landing in New Port, R.I., Jan. 1, 1800. They then went to New Orleans.

Pierre Gregoire de Reynaud, mar., no issue.

Juste Felix de Reynaud de St. Felix, mar. Marianne Le Juene at Martinique (they were cousins, and she had been mar. before). Prior to 1791 he was colonel and captain of the regiment of Port-au-Prince. After 1791 he took service under the English, having rank of Lieut.-Colonel, on duty in Jamaica.

Reynaud de St. Hilaire, mar., no issue, lawyer at Paris.

Reynaud de Chataudun, two children lived in U.S.A. after 1800.

A daughter, mar. . . . de Brueys (brother of French Admiral).

Julia de Reynaud, mar. 2ndly Nicholas Paillette, who was a lawyer.

Agatha de Reynaud, not mar.

Florence de Reynaud, not mar.

A daughter, was mar.

Two other children.

Among descendants of the above children are found the names d'Auriol, Volozan, Marié, Laval, Petri.

Review.

The Legacy of the American Revolution to the British West Indies and Bahamas. A Chapter out of the History of the American Loyalists. By WILBUR H. SIEBERT, A.M., Professor of European History. (Published by The Ohio State University, Columbus, 1913. Svo., pp. 50.)

This interesting brochure is a welcome addition to a little known period of West Indian history, describing as it does the movements of those American Loyalists who were compelled to quit their homes and take refuge in the West Indies.

Quoting from the above it appears that early in the Rebellion, East Florida served as a retreat for loyalist refugees from the Carolinas and Georgia. Its population of 1000 whites and 3000 negroes, after the evacuation of Savannah and Charleston, had increased in the year 1783 to 16,000, with about two whites to three blacks.

After the surrender of Charleston, 1278 whites and 2613 blacks embarked direct for Jamaica, and 20 whites and 350 blacks for St. Lucia. Many of the refugees in Florida, Honduras and the Mosquito Shore, as well as a considerable portion of the 10,000 persons sent from New York to Shelburne in Nova Scotia, also found their way to the W.I.

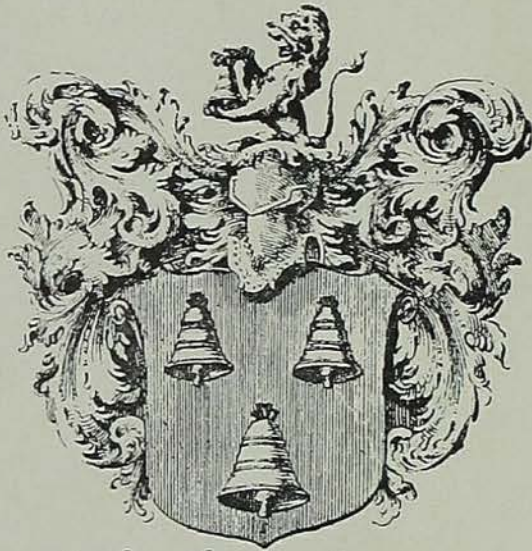
On Florida being ceded to Spain, there was a final exodus in 1783—5 of troops and other refugees, this time to the Bahamas. From New York City 1458 persons, besides 8 companies of Militia, settled in 1783 in the Island of Abaco, the largest island of the Bahamas, where they were joined by 1500 from East Florida. The Bahamas in this way gained an accession of six to seven thousand inhabitants, the newcomers outnumbering the old population. The arrival of so many merchants and experienced planters with considerable gangs of slaves brought about a great increase of trade and prosperity, cotton and Guinea corn being extensively grown.

In Jamaica the loyalists were especially welcomed, and exempted from taxation for seven years. Some lists of the new arrivals appear to exist, but they must of necessity be very incomplete.

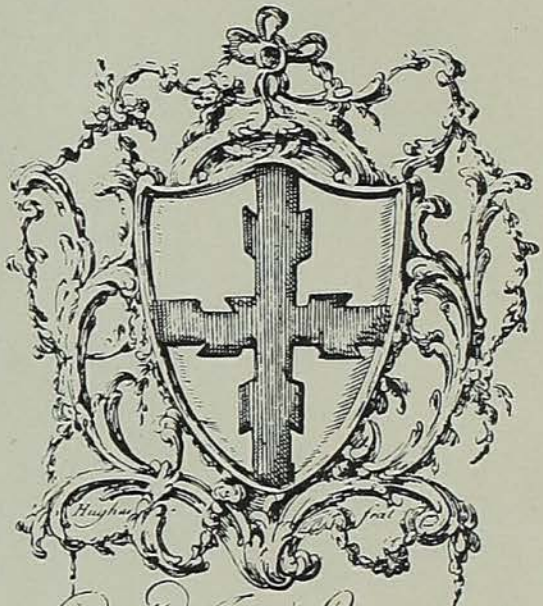

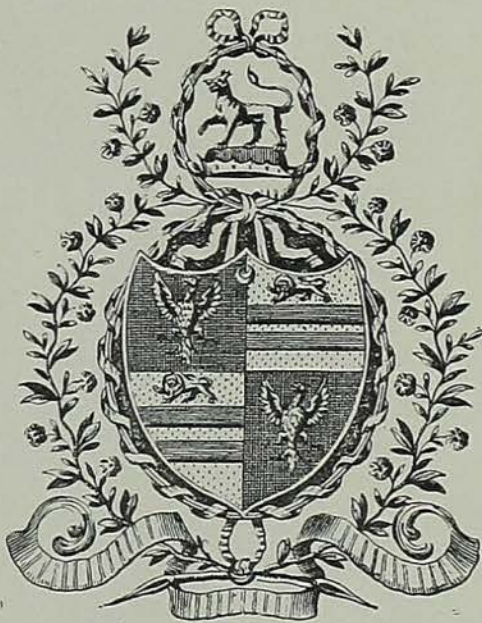

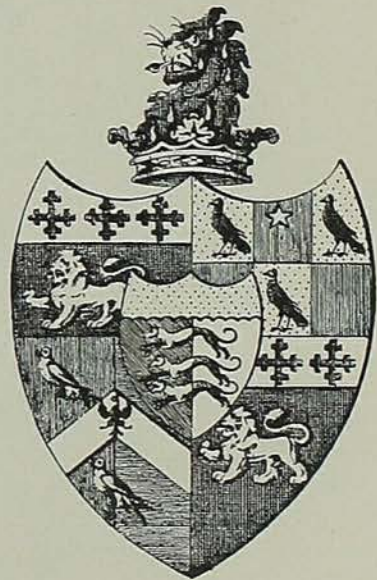

Peter Heiwood, younger Son of Peter Heiwood, one of the Counsellors of Jamaica, by Grace, Daughter of Sir John Muddeford, Knight and Baronet, Great Grandson to Peter Heiwood of Haywood, in the County Palatine of Lancaster; who apprehended Guy Faux, with his dark Lanthorn. And for his zealous Prosecution of Papists, as Justice of Peace, was stabb'd in Westminster-hall, by John James, a Dominican Frier, Anno Dom. 1640. Obiit Novem. 2, 1701.

Reader, if not a Papist bred,
Upon such Athes gently tread.

On 15 October 1913 I visited this church, which has been restored and a wood block floor fixed. The vergers knew nothing of the inscription, and no stone can be found. There is a blue ledger, however, with shield (without arms), but crest a falcon with wings raised—the Heywood crest. No inscription has ever been cut on the stone.

The Maristow estate was sold in 1798 by testator's four daus. and coheireses to Sir Manasseh Lopes, Bart., of a wealthy Jewish family also from Jamaica.

By Close Roll of 18 Oct. 1750 Lewis Chas. Montolieu of Albemarle Str. paid £4500 to the Ex'ors of Wm. Dunbar and the mortgage of Parham plantation of 400 acres in the p. of St. Peter the estate of Arthur Freeman was transferred to him. ("Antigua," ii., 265.)

Sir Albemarle Bertie, R.N., Admiral of the White, created a baronet in 1812, d. s.p. 24 Feb. 1824, aged 70. (Burke's "Extinct Baronetcies.")

Great Seals.

THE GREAT SEAL OF JAMAICA.

Long gives a good description of the early seal (vol. i, p. 48).

Obverse.—The royal arms and titles.

Reverse.—King Charles II. enthroned in royal robes, holding the globe and sceptre. At his feet two negroes kneeling and supporting a basket of West Indian fruits.

On the Exergue.—CAROLVS . SECVNDVS . DEI . GRATIA . MAGNE . BRITANNIE . FRANCIE . ET HIBERNIE . REX . DOMINVS JAMAICÆ . FIDEI DEFENSOR.

Below is this motto: DVRO DE CORTICE FRVCTVS QVAM DVLCIS.

My impression is in beeswax covered with paper, attached to a document of 1787. Like all the other ones its diameter is 4.4 ins.

Obverse.—The royal arms of King George III.

On the Circle.—Inscription illegible.

Reverse.—To the left stands the king in royal vestments, crowned, in his right hand the globe and sceptre, the left hand outstretched. To the right, kneeling on his left knee, is a negro holding on his right knee a basket of fruit. Above the latter's head are the arms and crest of Jamaica.

On the Exergue.—Inscription illegible. Long says the inscription of this seal was *mutatis mutandis* the same as that already described.

THE GREAT SEAL OF BARBADOS.

An illustration of this appeared in the W. I. Committee Circular, vol. xxvii., p. 609.

Obverse.—Not given.

Reverse.—King Charles II. in royal vestments, crowned, in his right hand a trident, seated in a chariot in the sea drawn by a pair of sea horses.

On the Circle.—ET . PENITVS . TOTO . REGNANTES . ORBE . BRITANNOS.

Gov. Henry Grenville writes from Barbados, Oct. 17, 1748: "I have in my past Letters to the Duke of Newcastle, while He was Secretary of State for the Southern Department, and since in my Letters to the Duke of Bedford, represented that His Maj^{ty's} Great Seal appointed for the Use of this Island is so worn out and decayed, that it is become quite incapable of making a due Impression, and have therefore requested that another might be forthwith sent out." (Original letter in my possession.—Ed.)

I have an impression in wax covered with paper of a later seal, which is attached to a deed of 1815.

Obverse.—The royal arms and titles.

Reverse.—The same design as above, but with George III. substituted in the chariot, which is to the right.

The Circle is only carried around the upper half.

THE GREAT SEAL OF THE LEEWARD ISLANDS.

About 1671 these Islands were made a separate government from Barbados, and the commission to Sir Charles Wheeler authorized him to use a public seal. Their Lordships agreed on the inscription for this in 1675, and on 30 Oct. 1678 the new seal was despatched, being described as follows: "On the one side engraven with his Mas^{ties} Effegies crown'd in Royall Vestments holding a trident in one hand sitting in a Charriott drawn by two Sea horses with this inscription round the said figure:—

SIGILLVM . INSVLARVM . S^{RI} . CHRISTOPHERI . NEVIS . ANTEGOA . MONTSERRAT . ETC.

On the other side: His Ma^{ties} Armes with the Garter Crowne Supporters and Motto and round about this inscription:—

"CAROLVS SECVNDVS DEI GRATIA MAGNÆ BRITANNIÆ FRANCIÆ ET HIBERNIÆ REX FIDEI DEFENSOR."

On 27 Feb. 1685-6 a new Great Seal was ordered, to be like the former one but with the name of James II.

On 12 Jan. 1688-9 the Prince of Orange directed the use of the old seal.

On 22 July 1706 the Hon. John Johnson gave up the Great Seal, which was broken at the Council Board.

In May 1707 Gov. Parke wrote that the pieces of the old seal which was broken up had been lost, and that old Col. Codrington and Sir Nath. Johnson kept theirs.

On 20 May 1730 a new seal was ordered to be made with this inscription:—

"GEORGIUS II . D . G . MAG . BRI . FR . ET HIB . REX . F . D . BRUN . ET LUN . DUX . S . R . I . ARC . TH . ET PR . EL."

On 22 Oct. 1814 the Council reported: "The Great Seal is very old and worn and does not bear H.M.'s arms."

I have a paper impression of the seal used in the reign of H.M. Queen Victoria, which was prepared for me in 1888-9 when I was at St. John's Town.

Reverse.—In the centre of base is a pine, fruited, standing on a mound, surrounded by the ocean. To the left is a brig in full sail, to the right a three-masted steamer, the funnel emitting clouds of smoke. Above are the royal arms.

On the Circle.—Above: + VICTORIA D G BRIT : REG : F : D +. Below: LEEWARD ISLANDS +. The supporters incroach on the circle, the unicorn's head occupying the space between BR and T.

The obverse was not given me.

THE GREAT SEAL OF THE SOUTHERN CHARIBBEE ISLANDS.

My impression is in pure beeswax, which has been much broken, and is appended to papers of 1774 relating to Grenada.

Obverse.—The royal arms.

On the Circle.—GEORGIUS III., etc., as on the seal of St. Vincent.

Reverse.—Beneath a lean-to shed is shewn an old-fashioned cane mill* of upright rollers. To the tail on the right are attached two oxen. Two men feed the rollers with canes.

On the Exergue.— . . . TIBI ART

On the Circle.—SIGILLUM . INSULARUM . GRENADE . GRENADINORUM †
SANCTI . VINCENTII . ET . DOMIN

In 1763 Gen. Rob. Melville was appointed Gov. of Grenada, The Grenadines, Tobago, St. Vincent and Dominica, the "Ceded Islands," and the above seal was probably of this date.

THE GREAT SEAL OF ST. VINCENT.

My impression is in hard dark wax covered with paper, and is in excellent condition.

Obverse.—The royal arms.

On the Circle.—GEORGIUS . III . D.G . MAG . BRI . FR . ET . HIB . REX . F.D .
BRUN . ET . LUN . DUX . S.R.I . AR . THES . ET . EL.

Reverse.—In the centre is a Roman votive altar; to the left stands a woman in classical drapery, in her right hand an olive branch; to the right is another woman, kneeling on her right knee and pouring a libation over the flames on the altar.

On the Exergue.—PAX . ET . JUSTITIA.

On the Circle.—SIGILLUM . INSULE . SANCTI . VINCENTII . IN AMERICA.

This island, which in 1763 was part of the Government of the Southern Charibbee Islands, was in 1776 created into a separate one, under Gov. Val. Morris, so that the above seal probably dates from the latter period.

THE GREAT SEAL OF BERBICE.

I have recently seen a specimen of this, in wax, in the Museum at George Town, Demerara.

Obverse.—Blank, but it no doubt had the royal arms.

Reverse.—In the centre is the stern of a ship with a palm tree in the distance.

On the Exergue.—SINE PULVERE PALMA.

On the Circle.—SIGILLUM COLONIE BERBICE.

Berbice was a separate government until 1831.

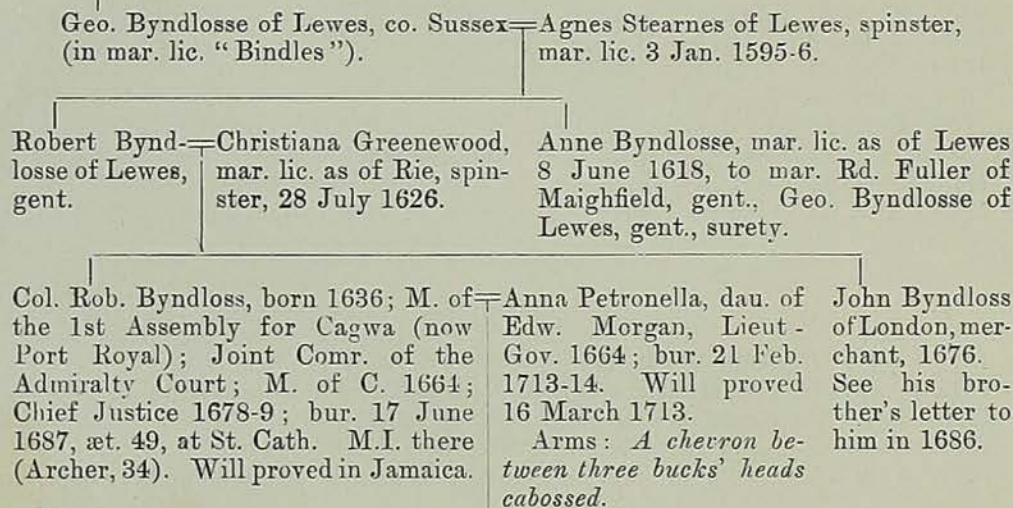

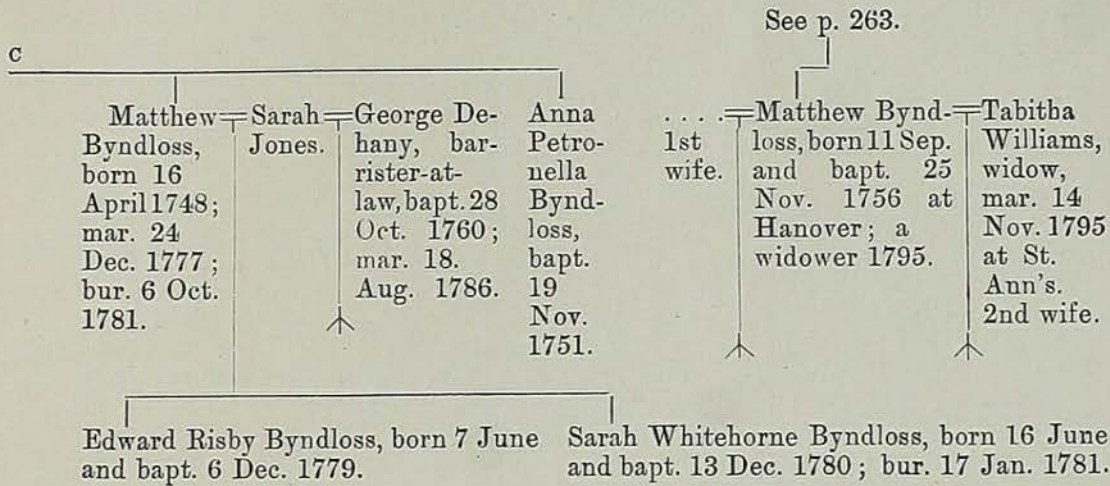

The Church in Barbados.†

[Fulham MSS.]

[Undated, unsigned. About 1690—1710.]

Little care taken of Ecclesiastical affairs in the settlement of it.

Soon after a law made ordering all persons to conform themselves to the discipline and government of the Church of England.

1650. The same more solemnly re-enacted, confirmed, and approved by King Charles II. in 1667.

A law made for the annual choice of a Vestry to transact the business of the parish, who, in the times of the Usurpation, extended their power so far as to place or displace Ministers at pleasure, and to do many things that belonged to the Ordinary, Rector or Churchwarden.

The established religion that of the Church of England, but the island not annexed to any bishoprick in England. Towards the latter end of Charles II. it is supposed that the Colonies were put under the care of the Bishop of London, and that some declarations of that right were made by the Council in the time of Bishop Laud. Council books searched, but no such declarations found.

Enquiry likewise made whether there was an Order of Council either at ye end of Charles II. or beginning of James II. to that purpose. No original order to be found. It is said, how truly I cannot say, that about the time the order is said to be made there is a blank in the Council books, left for inserting some order which had been neglected to be entered.

The reasons for the supposition are these:—

1stly. About this time there was an Order of Council made for adding the Bishop of London to the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations.

2ndly. Several clauses were then added to every Governor's instructions, such as—

You shall prefer no Minister without a certificate of his conformity from the Bishop of London.

You are to enquire if any Minister officiates without being [in] orders, and give an account thereof to the Bishop of London.

And, to the end that the Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction of the Bishop of London may take place in the said island, so far as conveniently may be, you are to give all countenance and encouragement to the same, reserving to the Governor collating to Benefices, granting Licences and Probates of Wills. ("Reserving" implies some previous grant.)

3rdly. There is a letter of Bishop Compton's to Lord Howard, Governor of Virginia, in which are these words:—

"1685. There is a constant Order of Council remaining with Mr. Blaithwait that no man shall continue in any Parish without Orders, nor any be received without a Licence under the hand of the Bishop of London. This order was made 4 or 5 years since, and I make no doubt, among others, you have it in your 'Instructions.' The King has made one likewise lately, that, except Licences for Marriage, &c., all other Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction shall be in the Bishop of London. One chief reason why this power is put in me is because, unless it comes originally from an Ecclesiastical Person, it cannot be legally executed."

4thly. That it is probable there was such an order may be concluded from the two Orders of Council, Oct. 1686, one suspending the Bishop of London from his Diocese and vesting the exercise of his authority in Commissioners; the other, in a week afterwards, suspending him with the same formality from his authority on the Plantations and vesting it in Commissioners.

From these reasons it appears probable there was such an order.

But supposing there was none, the temporary Orders of Council, which the Governors are to obey by their Instructions, as they may be properly called Authorities, and in that view are thought to be of force, have established this jurisdiction.

Bishop Compton appointed a Commissary in Barbados, and likewise Bishop Robinson.

THE SEVERAL COLONIES AND PROVINCES IN THE PLANTATIONS, WITH THE NAMES OF THE RESPECTIVE PARISHES IN EACH.

DIocese BOOK FOR THE PLANTATIONS.

The Laws relating to the Church are contained in a schedule transmitted by Mr. Gordon.

Judicial Acts done by former Commissaries.

Vacancies usually supplied by neighbouring Ministers, and the revenue given to the person who supplies the Cure. This not by any law, but by the Governor's appointment.

Necessaries about 50 per cent. dearer than in London.

Above one-half of the people, especially of the poorer sorts, never go to Divine Service at all.

No Sectaries here, except a few Quakers, but many adult persons never baptized.

Negroes obliged to work and merchandize on Lord's Day for themselves. Even Society's negroes no means of instruction. (Holt.)

Masters debauch their infidel slaves, and subject their own offspring to bondage. (Holt.)

The Rev. Gilbert Ramsay, Rector of Christ Church parish, in reply to "Queries to be answered by every Minister" from the Bishop of London, replied on the 16th of May 1724:—

"My Lord, I came to ye Island of Antigua about ye end of ye year 1688, in Holy Orders. Ordained by ye Right Rev^d Dr. James Atkins, Bishop of Galloway in Scotland, in ye year 1686. I have my Letter of Ordination here now by me. In ye year 1689 I had ye presentation of S^t Paul's Parish of Antigua, where I was Minister somewhat more than 3 years, but being sickly there, I came to this Island in 1692, and had ye presentation of Christ Church Parish here ye same year, whereof I have been incumbent ever since.

"My Lord, having had ye Honor to be personally known to ye two late Right Rev^d Bishops of London, with their approbation I did never ask for any formal licence, but have now by me many favorable Letters from ye Right Rev^d Bishop Compton.

"I was inducted into Christ Church here, ye 3rd of December in ye year 1692."

The Rev. Wm. Gordon, as Bishop's Commissary, wrote to the Bishop of London:—

"Mr Ramsay was at first licens'd for the Leeward Islands, but upon his going to England three or four times for the recovery of his Health, he always return'd to this Island with the approbation and recommendation of the Bishops, your Lordship's Predecessors, with whom he was in great esteem, and deservedly, for he is a person of an exemplary, pious Life, and highly respected by his Parish. I wish I could say the same of the other two." (N.B.—These two were Glasgow and Holt.)

S^t George.—Gilbert Wharton. 27 years. Before this he had S^t Lucy's and S^t John. Mr. Hotchkiss. Income £150 sterling, house and glebe.

S^t James.—John Glasgow, 1707. Removed from S^t James 1710. Mr. Holt, senior, Mr. Gilmore, 1739. Income £150, worth £105 sterling.

S^t John.—Charles Cunningham, 1708. In seven other churches before. In this about 10 years. Mr. Napleton, Mr. Griffith, 1739. £150 Barbados money.

S^t Joseph.—Joseph Holt. 31 years. 20 years in America. Mr. Hunt. £150 sterling.

S^t Lucy.—Edward Brice. 17 years. Mr. Le Hunt, Mr. Hughes, 1739. Income £115, no house nor glebe.

S^t Michael.—William Gordon, 1701. Curate, John Napleton, 2 years. Mr. Johnson. Incomes average £500.

S^t Peter's.—Adam Justice. Almost 23 years. Mr. Dowding, 1739. Income £230 sterling.

S^t Philip.—Charles Irvine, 1692. Mr. Warren. Income £150 Barbados money, with perquisites about £150 sterling.

S^t Thomas.—Alexander Deuchar. 5 years. Mr. Rose, 1739. Income £150, about £115 sterling.

Brice, Edward (S^t Lucy's).—Has held living for 17 years. No living previously. Licensed by Bishop of London.

Irvine, Charles (S^t Philip's).—Came over their Majesties' Chaplain in the West Indies in 1692. Here ever since. On arrival presented to S^t James'. Removed to S^t Philip's in 1704. Licensed by Bishop of London.

Hotchkis, Richard (S^t Andrew's).—Arrived in April 1721. From arrival to 1 Oct. 1722 was Curate of S^t Michael. Since have had care of S^t Andrew by appointment of late President and present Governor. Licensed by Bishop of London 30 Jan. 1720.

Napleton, Thomas, A.M. (S^t Michael's).—In island near 7 years. No Cure before. From 27 Nov. 1717 to date Assistant to Rev. Wm. Gordon. Licensed by Bishop of London.

A Court, John (S^t Michael's).—Arrived Barbados, as a Missionary, 1 April 1716. No Church as yet. Officiated for some time as Curate of S^t Michael's. Licensed 23 Jan. 1715.

Deuchar, Alexander (S^t Thomas).—In April 1724 it will be 6 years since he was in Orders in Barbados. Had no Church, but lived and officiated in S^t Philip's and Christ Church above 5 years. Inducted 27 July 1723. Licensed.

Wharton, Gilbert (S^t George's).—Went to Plantations 27 years ago. Incumbent of S^t Lucy's about 2 years, and S^t John's nearly 15 years. Licensed. Upwards of 9 years since inducted. The ruins of a building called the Free School decayed long before his time.

MR. BARNARD'S CASE, AS APPEARS BY GOVERNOR PINFOLD'S LETTER OF
 JULY 20, 1762.

Mr. Thomas Barnard, Rector of St Michael's in Barbadoes, the most populous and the most valuable living in the Island, obtained Leave of Absence for one year in 1756.

By Annual applications to the Secretary of State, when in England, his leave of absence was continued by Royal Licences to 1762, 6 years, in which time he never saw his Parish.

In April 1762 he returned to Barbadoes, resided two months and then petitioned the Governor for Leave to be absent one year, in order to bring over his Wife and Family. This was granted on express condition that it should be the last favour he asked of that sort.

During his short stay of two months in Barbadoes he made a bargain with his Curate to remit to him in England a certain Annual Sum, and the Curate to have the uncertain surplus.

The Governor from this circumstance collecting his Intention of residing in England and farming out his living, on July 20th, 1762, wrote to the Secretary of State to desire that Mr. Barnard may have no further leave of absence.

Mr. James Stewart claimed descent from the "Stewarts of Appin." Add. MS. 18,683 is a small quarto book containing copies of letters from or to Mr. Archibald Hutcheson,* and relating to certain property in St. Kitts.

1731, Aug. 3. By Ind're Arch. Hutcheson of the Middle Temple Esq. and Eliz. his wife who was relict and Ex'trix of her first husband Col. Robert Stuart deceased, did assign to Robert Cunningham of the I. of S^t Chr. a judgment obtained by the said Robert Stuart ye 4 Aug. 1711 against Bartholomew Rees† late of the I. of Montserrat Esq. for £1296 and all the estate and negroes in S^t Chr. late belonging to the said Rees which were made a security to A. H. for £1373. Signed and sealed 28 Sept. 1733.

1733, Oct. 9. Letter from A. H. to Robert Cunningham about the recent tryal at S^t Chr. relating to Col. Rees' estate and the judge's unjust judgment "My discourse with M^r Dominick Trant,‡ Your advanced age, your dispute with Spooner,§ your warmth of temper."

1733, Oct. 9. Letter from the same to Govr. Wm. Mathew. I hope this letter will find you and your good lady safely arrived in the Leeward Islands. M^r Cunningham has met with very hard usage.

1734, May 8. Letter from the same to Rob. Cunningham. M^{rs} Rees over in England. The 28 Aug. next I shall compleat my 74th year. Your sons. I advise you to return to this country.

1734, May 22. Letter from the same to Gilbert Fleming, Lieut.-Gov. of S^t Chr. My wife joins in compliments to your aunt.||

1734, May 22. Letter from the same to Govr. Mathew. Recapitulation. Many years ago Coll. Rees made a mortgage of all his negroes and cattle to M^r Rowland Tryon for a large debt standing in Aug. 1730 at £500. On 26 March 1711 Coll. Rees, being indebted to Coll. Stewart £648, acknowledged a judgment in M. for £1296 before Coll. Pearn, then L^t Gov., Coll. Rees being Chief Justice. In April 1730 there was due to myself and wife from Coll. Rees £1373, for securing which Coll. Rees conveyed his negroes & cattle in Trust. In Aug. 1731 M^r Wm. Tryon, Ex'or of M^r Rowland Tryon, in consideration of £500 paid by Cunningham, assigned the debt to him, and myself and wife assigned our debt, then £1400, to him. In Aug. 1731 M^{rs} Rees conveyed her plantation to M^r C. in consideration of £100 a year for her life. M^r C. was entitled to a debt of £1900, equal to the whole personal estate. Adm'on of Col. Rees' estate was granted to him, but two judgments have been obtained against him by M^r Gerish¶ and the Ex'ors of M^r Macmahon for £1600 and levied on the negroes —both judgments unjustly given begs for relief.

I have just seen a deed at St. Kitts of 10 Aug. 1740, being a sale of a plantation of 335 acres in Montserrat by Robert Cunyngham, late of St. Chr., now of Cunyngham's Rest, near Irvine in the Bailliewick of Cunynham in the Shire of Ayr, Scotland, Esq. (Book I., No. 3090.)

Mitford Crowe, Governor of Barbados.

1703. Upon the resignation of the Hon. Ralph Grey, the King appointed Mr. Mitford Crowe, an opulent London merchant, as Gov. of Barbados. The King's death preventing his departure, Queen Anne nominated Maj.-Gen. Sir Bevil Granville in his place. Crowe had served his apprenticeship to Mr. Tillard, a Barbados merchant, and had married Lady Chamberlayne of that island. (Schomburgk, 310; Poyer, 174.) She was Oriana, widow of Sir Willoughby Chamberlayne of B'os, Kn^t (he died at Chelsea in 1697). In 1707, in consideration of his eminent services at Barcelona, Crowe was appointed Gov. (Oldmixon, ii., 65.) But upon the change of ministers in 1710 he was removed. His death took place on 15 Dec. 1719. (Historical Register, 43.) The engraving has in the left hand corner: "T. Murrey Pinx:", and in the right "I. Smith fec: et ex:."

John Morant settled in Jamaica soon after the occupation of the Island in 1655, and died 1688. His great-grandson Edward quitted the Island in 1760, and purchased Brockenhurst Manor, was M.P. many years, and died in 1791, aged 64. His descendants still own that estate.

He was of Jamaica, where he acquired a great fortune. His wife died at Bath 1788. Their only son Richard, born in J. 1766, was High Sheriff of Hants in 1798, and died 1805 on his passage from J., leaving a son Richard, born at Milbrooke 1792, M.P. for Winchester, who inherited a fortune of £35,000 a year, and died 1818.

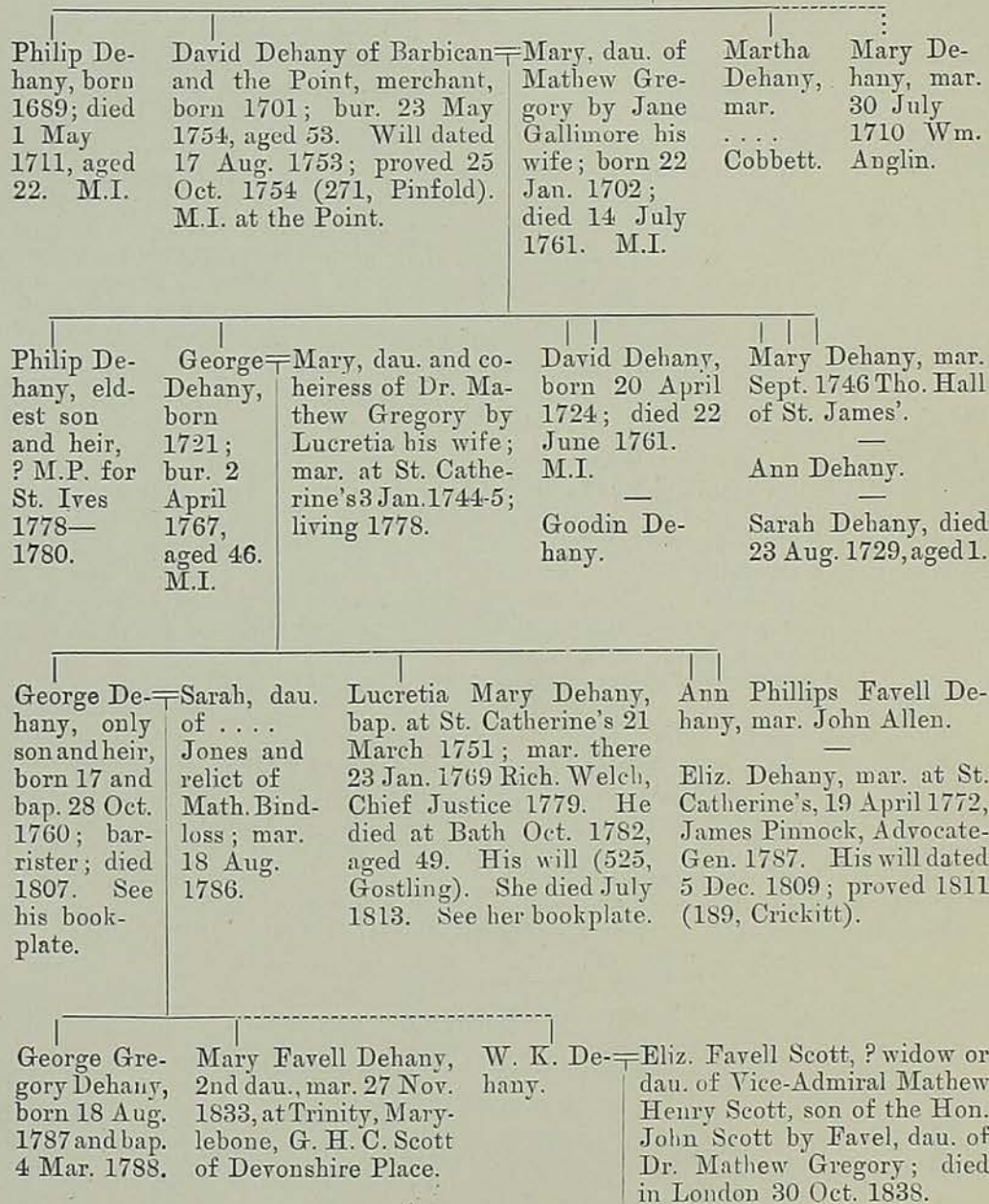

Wilks, E.N. on W^m Beckford Esq. and S. on Plantation Garden River formerly part of 508 a. one moiety of which was vested in W^m Beckford Esq. and the other moiety in Rob. Gordon by a writ of partition and Gordon by Ind're of 12 June 1773 conveyed one half of his moiety to Gilbert Grierson who by Ind're of 14 June 1773 conveyed to W^m Gray and by Ind're of 14 June 1773 Gordon conveyed the other moiety to W^m Gray and all houses mills &c. and slaves as in schedule to have and to hold to Jacob Israel Bernal subject to redemption, and until default be made W^m Gray to have possession.

This Ind're made the 24 April 15 Geo. III. 1775 BETWEEN Jacob Israel Bernal of Kingston Merchant of the one part and Wm. Gray of the same place Esq. of the other WHEREAS J. I. Bernal hath advanced for W^m Gray £8916 c. being of the value of £6368 st. unto Aaron Nunes Henriques of the same parish Merchant and W^m Gray having occasion for the loan of the further sum of £19,599 c. or £13,999 st. or a total of £28,515 c. or £20,368 st. as security proposed to give 13 bills of exchange to be drawn on a London house payable in 13 years to Bernal with interest at 6 per cent. and now wishes to have the £13,999 st. raised immediately, hath proposed to assign 13 bonds from Duncan Chas. MackGlashan of Kingston Esq. to him, 12 whereof are in a penal sum of £5000 c. and the 13th in £5250 which are of the present value of £19,599 c. also an Ind're of conveyance dated 22 Dec. 1774 made between Duncan Chas. MackGlashan of the 1^s part Tho. Hibbert the Y^r of Kingston Esq. of the 2^d and Wm. Gray of the 3^d part, and to secure the payment of the £8916 c. proposed to enter into 12 bonds of £700 c. and further to convey all that plantation called the Rhine and several slaves described in the 2^d Ind're hereinafter mentioned dated 20 April 1775 and whereas the difference in value between a security payable in Jamaica and London arising from commissions exchange the risk is worth to Bernal £3500 st. for which bills are to be given and Bernal hath lent Gray the said £19,599 c. and whereas by Ind're tripartite dated 20 April between Wm. Gray of the 1st Tho. Hibbert the Y^r of the 2^d and J. I. Bernal of the 3^d part Gray assigned to Bernal all sums due from MackGlashan and hath entered into the 13 bonds and by one Ind're made between Wm. Gray and Dorothy his wife of the one part and J. I. Bernal of the other May hath conveyed the Rhine plantation with slaves as described in a schedule subject to redemption.

Signed and sealed (plain seal) by J. I. Bernal W. Grant in the presence of Tho^s Myers, Jacob Bravo Jun^r.

Endorsement dated 6 May 1776 that it was agreed to substitute other security W^m Gray paid £3500 st. and Bernal handed over the 12 bills of exchange to be destroyed. Signed by Gray and Bernal.

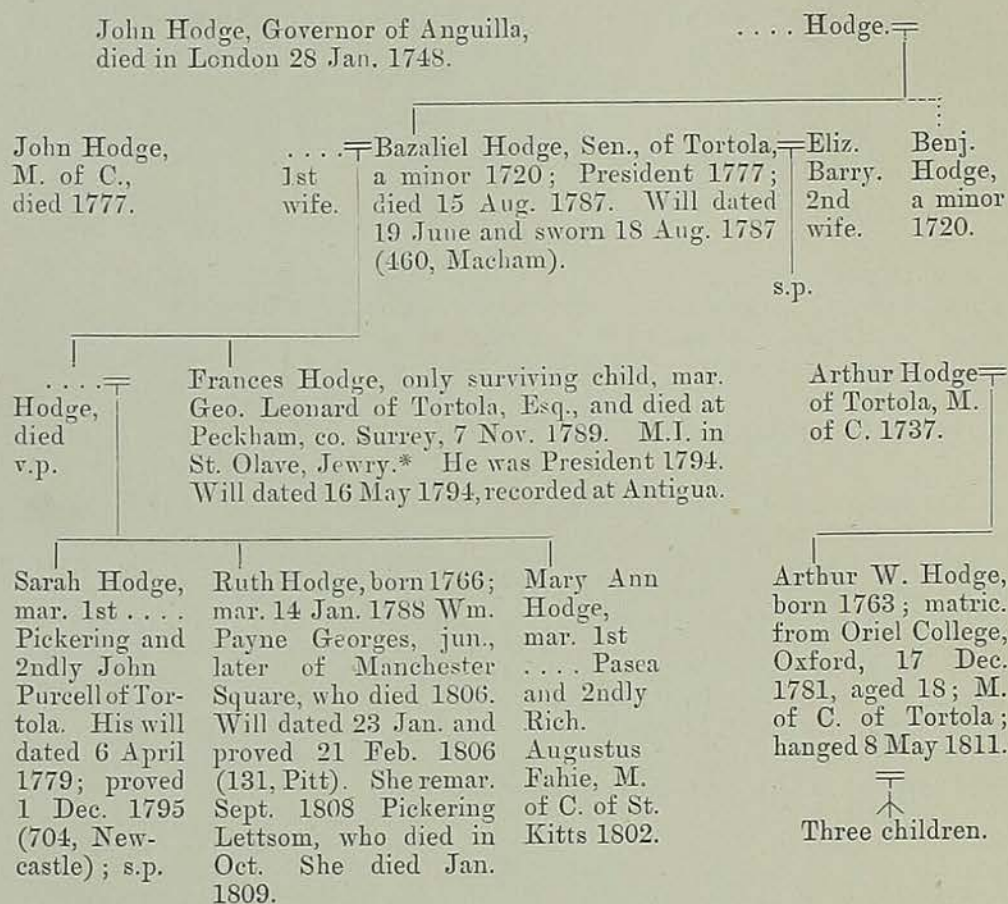

1717, Nov. 22. Census of Anguilla. Arthur Hodge, Henry Hodge, jun., John Hodge, Peter Hodge, and Henry Hodge, sen. (*Ante*, III., 197.)

1720, Feb. 8. Fra. Delap of Antigua, merch^t, guardian to Bazaliel Hodge and Benj. Hodge, minors, leases a plantation of 100 acres in Tortola to Benj. Wickham of A., gent. ("Antigua," ii., 79.)

1737, May 11. Anguilla. Arthur Hodge, a M. of C^l. (B.T. Leeward I., vol. 26, x. 3.)

1748. Jan. John Hodge, Esq. Governor of Anguilla, who lately came over on his private affairs. ("London Mag.," 43. "G.M." gives Jan. 28.)

1768. John Pickering, Gov. of Tortola, d. aged 60. ("G.M." for 1785, 867.)

1777, July 25. Govr. Burt writes that Mr. John Hodge of the Council of Tortola died before his arrival, and that Mr. Bazaliel Hodge desired to be excused from serving as President.

1790. The Hodge Act passed on July 20. The petition recited that £250 a year was given to the Hon. Geo. Leonard by the will of Bazaliel Hodge, the elder, of Tortola, Esq., who died 15 Aug. 1787, leaving a widow Eliz., one dau. being Frances Leonard, late Frances Hodge, since deceased, and 3 granddaus, viz., Sarah Purcell, late Sarah Pickering; Ruth Georges, late Ruth Hodges; and Mary Ann Fahie, late Mary Ann Pasa. Eliz. Hodge, widow, Hon. Geo. Leonard, Wm Payne Georges, Esq., and Ruth his wife, late of Tortola, now of G^t B., Sam^l Purcell of Tortola, R^d Augustus Fahie, and Mary Ann his wife present the petition. ("Antigua," ii., 176.)

1811. The Hon. Arthur W. Hodge of Tortola, having been found guilty of murdering several of his slaves under circumstances of great cruelty, was hanged on May 8. ("G.M.," 79; "Antigua," ii., 285; and Parliamentary Papers.)

The Hon. Arthur W. Hodge hanged 8 May 1811 was f. a gent. commoner of

Surrey, on 7 Nov. 1789, his only surviving child at his death on 15 Aug. 1787, have claim to one-eighth of the annual proceeds of his estate till 1804, and one-third of all his personalty, etc. ("Antigua," ii., 174.)

Isaac Pickering of Tortola in the Virgin I., Esq. Will dated 16 June 1802. To my dau. Eliz. my plantation in Tortola. To my s. John Arthur Hodge P. my plantation in St Croix. To my other s. Wm. P. the plⁿ in St C. in right of his mother. My other dau. Mary P. (251, Marriott.)

Inn, Esq., all my est. real and personal, part of an est. in Tortola to which I succeeded since the death of my Father as joint heir to M^s Downing, one of the Nortons family, negroes, cattle, etc., and sole Ex'or.

1st Codicil.—12 July 1785. J. M., now of Portman Sq., £500 for his lady. My goddau. Mary M. his dau. £1000. £100 a yr. for John Norton, s. of my sister Margaret P.

2nd Codicil.—At Lausanne in Switzerland 11 Oct. 1793, cancel legacies. My misfortunes brought on me by my wicked wife, who lives in open adultery and possesses considerable property. M^r Rob. Lincoln of Lambs Conduit Str. joint Ex'or with J. M. and 50 guineas.

3rd Codicil.—21 July 1795 in L. I find I am entitled at the death of my wife Sarah P. to £2000 paid to D^r John Coakely Lettsom of L. on account of Isaac Pickering, Esq., of England, on 19 May 1778, I leave it to J. M., whom I owe more than I can pay.

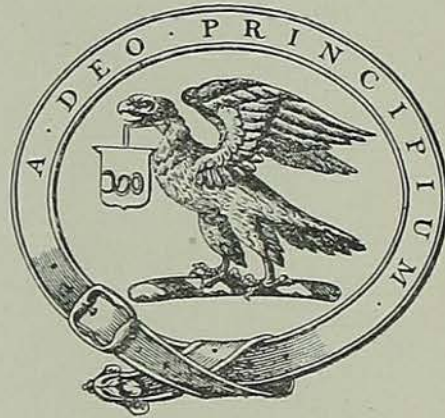

Transactions of The Lord Willoughby in Barbados.†

The Lord Willoughby, soon after his arrival at the Barbados,‡ under colour of an Order of his Council there, did with a Company of ffoote soldiers seize upon the Plantation, Negroes, &c., of Colonel Waldron, without bringing him to any legall triall, contrary to the Laws and practice of that Island.

The said Lord Willoughby did soon after seize ye Plantation, Negroes, &c., of Mr Edward Pye, after the same manner; and kept his Estate from him till he paid him £2400.

The above said Colonel Waldron having made his escape, to free himself from the oppression he groaned under, the said Lord Willoughby did clap up in Gaol all his friends and relations, being the men of best estate and account in that island, under pretence that they had assisted him in making his escape.

He banished one Colonel Sandiford, without pretending him to be guilty of any crime whatsoever, and caused him to be tyed to a pole and carried between two of his officers on board a ship bound for Jamaica.

He sent Mr Farmer, Speaker of the Assembly of the Barbados, Prisoner to England§ to his utter undoing.

The next Speaker chosen by the same Assembly, he caused to be whipt at a Cart's taylor, thorough the Town, who, being at that time very sick, sounded often in his passage.

Hee published Articles of War in such general terms that no man could almost speak or do anything there, without being liable to question for the same. And by virtue of these articles did bring several men to Tryall, as John Waldron, Waterman, and others, who were fined to their undoing. The said fines he did detain to his own use being, as was pretended, given him by His Majesty before his coming out of England.

Which proceedings of his did drive away many Planters and inhabitants out of the Island, that were able to live elsewhere, and many of those that stayed behind did keep their houses and forbear drinking of wine, for fear themselves or their Estates should be brought in danger by something they might say or do.

To countenance his Arbitrary proceedings herein he did make use (for the most part) of the authority of his Council, who, being chosen and put out by himselfe at pleasure, durst not oppose him in anything.

He did with very opprobrious languagees drive away one Colonell Ellis (who was one of his Council, and the best friend he had in the Island) only for laying before him the Illegality of his proceedings against the said Waldron and Pye.

If such actions should continue to be practised by Governours in that Island, it is very unlikely that any man that can live in England will stay there, where his Estate, Person, and Life, will be liable to the pleasure of a Ravenous Governor. By which means the Colony will come to be divested of all those men who by their Estates in England have there a pledge of their Loyalty to the Crown, and of what dangerous consequence that may be is submitted.

Waldron and Pye and many others are now in England, and can prove the truth of what is before offered, and much more if there be occasion for it.

By an ancient Law of the Island of Barbados, no man, unless he were a freeholder to a certain proportion of acres, was to be one of their Council, an Assemblyman, or a field Officer of their Militia. Their reason was because, men that had their Estates in land there were by interest obliged to take more care in the preservation of ye place, than one who had only an Estate employed in Trade which hee could remove when he saw the place in danger to be lost.

The Lord Willoughbie's Council in the Island of the Barbadoes, at present are:—

1. Christopher Codrington,* a young man, borne in the place, of an ambitious nature, hath not state in England and was, when he entered upon the Government, much in Debt there, Hath been taxed with horrid crimes since his being in the Government.

2. Colonell Hawley, who was one of the first Governours, and is a prudent, sober man, out of debt, and fit for his present employment.

3. Colonell Daniel Searle, who was Governor in Cromwell's time. Hath been since madd, and hath twice attempted to cut his own throat, and is in debt more than his Estate is worth.

4. M^r Samuel Farmer, who was, by the Lord Francis Willoughby sent prisoner to England as a seditious person, is a man of a heady, turbulent nature. Is Chief Judge of the Common Pleas there, and in debt as much as he is worth.

5. M^r John Knight, a little Anabaptist, is Merchant, my Lord Willoughbie's Agent, and Spy upon the rest of the Councill.

Never any of these men were of the Council before the Lord Willoughbie's Government, except Hawley and Searle.

And the gravest, wealthiest, and fittest men of Barbados are not employed.

A blank Commission sent by the Lord Willoughby to M^r Knight, who threatens the present Governor, M^r Codrington, to put in another Governor, if he will not do what is desired of him.

A Petition was sent to my Lord from Barbados, to advise with the Planters here, and to alter as they shall think fit. The Petition was presented to His Majesty against their advice.

Emigrant Clergy to the Plantations.

Add. MSS. 17,751—4 comprise four volumes entitled "Abstracts of Acc^{ts} of his Majesty's Revenues Taxes & Moneys Borrowed under the Government of the R^h Hon. the Lords Com^{rs} of the Treasury." Under the heading of "Bounties" occur the names of several clergy, who received a gift of £20 towards the cost of their passage to the Plantations. These names do not appear in Mr. Fothergill's "List of Emigrant Ministers to America, 1690—1811." The following note from the Colonial Calendar for the W.I., p. 79, explains the custom:—

1698, Jan. 3. Memorial of the Bishop of London to the Lords of the Treasury. By the King's command I lay this memorial before you. The late King Charles II. out of great compassion to his Plantations in the West Indies, which till then had been almost destitute of a ministry, granted a bounty of 20^l to each chaplain that should go over . . . This was bestowed all the time during his reign and that of James II. & till last year . . . Prays for its renewal.

Add. MS. 17,751, Michaelmas 1692 to Michaelmas 1693, does not contain any names of clergy, and the Bounties are very few.

Description of a Hurricane in 1670.

S^r

In answer to your Request concerning the Hurricane, I can say little of its effects more than what concerns our Particular Damage & Terrour.

It happened upon y^e 18 of August last, 16 hours after y^e new moon, in y^e 14th Degree of North Latitude, ab^t 90 leagues from Barbados, It Succeeded a Storm of 48 hours continuance, at North East, an unusual Way of its appearing for it commonly follows a Calm. Its presage being a Shifting of y^e Wind ab^t y^e Compass wth the appearance of a Troubled Sky, the only Advantage we have to prepare for its Reception. The Fury of it began at 10 at night & continued till 12 y^e next day, Its observed that the Hurricanes of y^e New Moon begin at night, & those at y^e full in y^e day, as was Noted 2 years since when y^e L^d Willoughby* Perish'd wth 8 ships & near a 1000 persons. During its 14 hours fury wth us it Shifted 14 points, from y^e N.E. to y^e S.S. West, keeping a Method of Changing one point an hour, & then Shifted backward, & in its retreat still abated untill it returned to y^e Original point where it wholly ceased.

In the height of it, wee had some hail, y^e Stones whereof were very great, which Seemed to be thrown upon us for the 20th part of a Minute, & then an Intermission of 5 or 6 Minutes before any more came, y^e Sea in y^e Night Seemed as a real Fire, & I believe we might Have Distinctly perceived any object at a great Distance. In y^e Day Time we Seemed rather to Sayle rather in y^e air than water, y^e Wind forcing the Sea So high y^t wee could scarce make a distinction of either Elem^{ts}.

The Terrour of it was such y^t I thought it y^e Emblem of Hell & y^e last dissolution of all things, Especially y^e first 2 hours y^t was attended with so much Thunder & Lightning, Soe astonishing, as if it had been wrapt up into y^e Clouds & y^e whole air Set on Fire. The strength of y^e wind was such, y^t it blew a boat of 15 foot long fastned to 4 ring bolts, & each bolt through a ring of y^e Ship clear off y^e deck, It blew away a Piece of Timber of great Substance & Weight, called y^e Cross piece of y^e Bits, to w^{ch} we fasten our Cables, It tore of y^e Sails from y^e Yards though fast furled; y^e yards from y^e Masts, & y^e Upper Masts from y^e lower; It blew away 4 Men who were upon y^e Foreyard three of w^{ch} By a Strange Providence were thrown in again & Saved. The last Remains of its Fury was a Weighty Grinding Stone w^{ch} it left fastned between 2 Timber heads, but it blew away y^e Trough from under it, I had several Accounts from Particular Friends how Terrible it was in other Places but to me it Seem'd beyond all Expression.

These Hurricanes are most frequent between y^e Equinoxtial & y^e Tropique of Cancer, They more rarely happen between the line & the Tropique of Capricorn but y^t which is y^e greatest Wonder to me is y^t they should be so Terrible among the Carribbee Island that in some of them they have not left house, Tree, nor plant in y^e ground; Beginning at St. John de Porto Rico, & So running Eastward but y^e Islands of Hispaniola, Cuba & Jamaica are never Troubled wth 'em tho' within few leagues of the rest.

There are some old Indians y^t have given notice of 'em 3 or 4 dayes before their coming by what rules I was never Curious to Understand; It being enough for us to Study how to defend ourselves & Ships from them, rather than by any nice Enquiries to Search into their Cause, only thus much I observed that they have an Influence upon the Sea, as well as the Moon, both upon them & it, for I found by Observation of the Sun & Starrs, that there was a current tending so violently Northwards that in 24 hours it would force us as many leagues from our Easterly Course, which did so confound us, having neither Card nor Compass left to Steer by (which with Several other Goods were Swept away in a breach

which the Sea made into our Ship) that I think it was as great a difficulty for me to find out Barbados (this place being nearest for our relief) as Colombas, who first discover'd those Countreys. S^r I have been as modest as I could in giving you this relation, Because I know many who are unacquainted with y^e violence of these Tempests will be Incredulous, but I should be Sorry y^t all who will not believe this Account, Should have y^e same Confirmation w^{ch} I had, If there be anything in it worth your Notice, It may Engage me hereafter to recollect some more Particulars, In all things I shall Endeavour to assure you that I am &c.

* This Agreement was signed on 26 May 1639 by Governors De Poincy and Warner, by which a decree was issued ordering the immediate destruction of all tobacco plants in St. Christopher and forbidding the planting of new ones for a period of 18 months. The object of this was to reduce the production, a glut having occurred from over-planting. Non-compliance was to be followed by confiscation of estates. In a petition of James, 2nd Earl of Carlisle, this year to the King, he writes: "Through the restraint on tobacco the poor planters are debarred from free trade, and unable to furnish themselves with necessaries, much less to buy ammunition." Labat wrote that tobacco was grown at the first settlement, then Indigo, then Cotton, and that Sugar-making was introduced first by the English in St. Chr. and Barbados in 1643, then by the French in St. Chr., shortly after at Guadaloupe in 1648, and later at Martinique. **Draft of Letters from James, 2nd Earl of
Carlisle, to Governor Ashton of Bar=
bados in 1640 and 1641.***

Capt. Ashton.†

I have as yet recd. 2 l'res from you since you came to Barbadoes ye 1st of 22 March togeather with divers pap's of yor then p'sent actions and the second of the 13 of June in both wh. and otherwise I finde ye hath prospect to the obtayning of wishes the reducing of the Island under Mr. Huncks for as such I am very much yor debtor as to him who hath been soe careful and discret am informed herein and you may be confident I shall not forgett you upon fit occasion. I heard a report here that Sr. Thomas Warner was dead and did then presently dispatch a l're to you to assure of that place yf it were soe as since it I finde the contrary I hope the l're is well delivered to your selfe fearing yf otherwise it should be miscaryed it might cause an increase of Sr. Thomas Warners spleene agt. you which though I still enjoyne him to forbear, yet I find him not content, I have now againe remembred him of my former charge concerning you & could wish I might heare of a reconcilment, hee hath about the 16th of July last given me a very good account of many things in very fit & orderly sort wth protestations of his reall purposes in my behalfe and indeed I take it kindly and shall be fully satisfied wth him, yf I coulde effect you and Mr. Huncks his reconcilment wth him, I would not therefore you should give him any cause to exaspate the former distast, but forbear till I can have my purpose herein. As for Mr. Huncks his jsalousy of you wch. I finde couched in his l'ers, I have given him a better testamony of yor better merrits then soe to be misconceived of and I suppose he will be p'suaded to reforme his eronious conceits of you upon what I have written yf not I shall further enforce my p'suasive power on him for Peter Hay & their indiscreet demeanor I have given admonishment and shall in all things I may see you rep'd, And therefore I shall wish you to goe on in your charge at Antigua cheerfully. I heare of some inroades & losse of people there for wch. I am very sorry & I have written to Sir Thomas Warner to seeke by what meanes hee can to gett the poore people pleased, I could wish the Revenues of the Iland yeilded that p'fitt that would procure annumition powder but the past years supply sent to Barbadoes and Sc^{ia} Lucia etc. was more then it would beare. But I hope you has assistance here this time from St. Christophers & that Sr. Thomas Warner will not suffer Antigua to be plundered by the Indyans in your absence or since your coming on it, for there I conceive you are not having yet heard of you since you went from Barbadoes I understand of the small meanes on Antigua for your support yet hope the addition of your present industry & care will make it much as may in a short tyme yeeld you double requitell for your present sufferance for the disposing of any grants for salt peter making there, I shall not conferre it on any till I heare from you what you have done in your designe concerning it. But for the mynes & mineralls they were long since leased to Sir William Bosseville and others to whom the trustees have now renewed the grant and there is one Bates sent over to take charge of the brymston mynes and other such works to whom the Trustees have your assistance

The latter had been commissioned by the Earl as Governor of Barbados and Antigua, and he signed a patent at Antigua in Sept. 1638 and in 1639. In June 1640 the commissioners wrote that they had recalled Huncks from Antigua and settled him in his government of Barbados. Ashton then seems to have succeeded him at Antigua, where he signed patents 1644-1649, but being a Royalist was turned out by Kaynell in 1652.

given upon all fitt and reasonable occasions yf hee come to Antigua, and therefore I pray bee not wanting herein, for by agreement with the Trustees I am by my selfe and your selfe, and other my Governours, here to advance the profitt and assist the Trustees in the receipt of them, but I hope in short tyme to quitt my self of their interest in the meane tyme you assist no way under them and I shall wish you to write to them how you fynde the state of all things there. Capt. Hawley is yet unheard & unquestioned by reason of the Kings long absence in the North this year but I shall shortly take the tyme to call uppon him, having already acquainted the King with his being come I perceive that Hawley gave such freedome to the Cuntry at his last coming over that they still stand in dispute for his lawlesse p'ceedings to be allowed them, and Mr. Huncks is all so much troubled with them to this tyme. There are also many reports brought to me of late disorders but I hope they are but scandlous and soe shall conclude till I heare further thereof. I could now gladly understand of your arrivall at Antigua etc. I pray deferre not write by any convenient meanes you may that wee may bee informed how matters stand with you there, the wch. I desire may to your best satisfaction & content and soe I bidd you heartly farewell.

Captayne Ashton.

Having received sundry l'res and dispatches from you by your first I p'ceve how unworthily Sir Thomas Warner deales with you & me in eluding my directions about yor busines by his l'rs going about to delude me with speycous protestations for himself and unkind reflexions on you, wch though you seeme desirious to know in particular I must not yeeld unto my aymes and labor being to compose not foster differences, yet lett me assure you, iff there any material things objected wch did leave me unsatisfyed I would not spare to lett you know what they are that I might receive satisfaction from you I seriously promise you that nothing written by Sr. Thomas hath p'vayled the least jott against but rather for you in myne opynion synce I find nothing from him but a ayery flashes and self conceit thinking this to obscure others & avoyd my directions I am exceedingly troubled for your necessities & extremitye wch these courses of his have enforced on you & have here upon resolved to enforme my selfe the best meanes I may to redresse both you & my selfe as soone as I shall see matters of the greatest waight of this Kingdome better settled, which is hoped may be within a short space. And in the meane tyme as I shall not be unmindfull of you soe I would not have you disanimated or suppose any person neerer or farther from me hath any such power where l'res to support Sr. Thomas in his unjust actions but to lett me know yor opinions also and faithfully advise how to assudage the tympany of his self aduracon I could willingly & redily be his Phisition iff I doubted not by chrming these to stirre worse humors and all tymes suyt not for all actions. And though you may suffer by delay as you doubt & conceive I give you not that assistance wch I might yet you may see by the copy of l're to Sr. Thomas here enclosed that you are not all together forgotten. And I pray you thinck not that I will desert your cause or leave you unregarded but that as any good opportunity shall arise yr self may be assured of me to be mindfull willing & provident for you only lett me advise you not to apprehend these accidents so neerly as to be driven into any passion either privately or publiquely agt him but yf you can possibly to learn what effect my letter hath with wch. I send by the Mr. of this

ship Capt. Creame and now that you hath commodity for trade agayne in your Iland I shall hope for more frequent intelligence from you I have as you wrote was necessary committed the Government of Neavis to another one Capt. Jacob Lake* a discreet and honest gentleman as I heare & hope the successe will be ansureable and by him you may be informed more p'ticularly of all matters Mr. Calverley his & his wifes freinds entreatingly have dirrecons from me to Sr. Thomas Warner to invest him in the Government of St. Bartholmews or some other Iland wch I have referred to Sr. Thomas but have given Capt. Calverley a Commission with the Tytle of Colonell & direccions for the levyng of a Regiment of 500 foot on St. Christophers and Barbadoes to be transported to his new plantations of both wch I pray give me your opinion. And yf he like of tytle Colonell† may be to your desire I doe willingly conferre it on you and shall give you warrant for the same. The great motyons in the affayres of the Kingdom admitt not any proceedings as yet to the regulating of or matters or the oppisites to my purposes soe as I cannot determiately resolve on particulars but will apply myself the best remedy for reducing my expectations in my possession & with what speed I can. Concerning Mr. Huncks I accompt my self very unhappy in his miscaryadge yf they shall prove soe. The accusations were soe enormous and in their first appearance his answers and their abettors such so urgent & violent season such all wherein-least opposition seemed the safest way to p'vent worse inconveniencys that all though I took the utmost paynes I could by my selfe my Councell I could noe way satisfye the clamors of that rent agt him but by subjecting him to examinations and that course which is directed for yourself to have been his ymmediate deputy. I purposed moved but knowing some jealousies but lately buried I forbare to be positive at that present. But for his absolute remove or recalling home to England I never desired it myself but was forced at that tyme to give those directions for his coming home to cleere himselfe yet I could still doe wish hee might be enforced home nor shall I be offended yf hee come not soe as he may be permitted to stay there by his accusers & therefore I dislike not your councell to him herein & have written to him to the same purpose. And the truth is I should have hardly brought it to effect yf I had insisted it there being besides some whom you may imagine the generall voyce of Mr. Huncks his open advaisaries agt you as being his intimate friend I know not yet what to say of Mr. Huncks his business till I here what is done herein here are strange reports besides the practises whereof you write against him yt he shall cleare himselfe as I could heartly wish he may I shall be wanting restictution & redresse as farre I may but it otherwise it happene I am not more willing of any mans preferment than yor own infatt tymes for your present charge & place must reserve it to your best manadge according to your instructions but I advise you not to overstrictly strayne the reynes of authority but to give jurys the liberty to decyde & yet useing your discretion herein as in all other matters & your way of petty courts in manner of our county courts & leets is very good & justifiable with your wanted moderate you for your over tymely planting agt Sir Thomas Warners contract I know not what inconveniencys may hereupon follow although I am well satisfied of your exigents for want of nessaryes requisite both for your subsistence & defence likewise for your conservation of human modesty civill decency and health. I cannot but approve of your reason in your occupying St. Christophers trade yet such is the micheif of Sr. Thomas his suplantine assumption to conclude all the Ilands in his late contract with the French in wch. by the way hee writes pro fuitus generalis sub Rege without any note of me although at first I wrote to him to forbare to assume that supream authority in civill matters without Councell & consent of the other Governours(¶) that in truly I much feare and injury may befall him from the French or to you both from them both therefore yf you can prevayle with the people of your charge I would advise him & you to come to some terme of agreement with the French

& Sir Thomas also to keep yourselves safe from their quarells and the clamours of others not well informed of these matters but for Sr. Thomas his addresses to the King & indeed I hear of his letter about it to Mr. Dancks I am purposed to be the first mover when the King returns from Scotland & shall freely acquaint him with Sir Thomas his forward domyneering and untoward dealings & it may be shall obtaine the Kings expresse to rectifye both you & me. And in what soever yor notes and advertisments may stand you in steed they together with my knowledge shall on all occasions bee put to the best use and advantage wee may of your vindication here & to redresse you in your right whereof I am informed satisfied therefore suppose not your selfe destitute of frends, but that as I have ever found and esteemed you worthy of my especyall esteeme soe I will continue and rest.

Postscript there is one Dan^{ll} Fallan of Montserrat wth 3 others (whereof Fallan his wife hath addressed her self by petition here unto me) who along tyme hath stood under Govnor Briskets* censure for a consperacy of Capt. Ayleworth wch. busines I have advise Mr. Brisket to end him selfe without further trouble. But if not I do pray & authorize yor selfe to take cognizance hereof upon any of the p'tyes addresses to you & to pray Mr. Brisket & all the p'ty to declare the truth & state of these matters unto you and that you end or order the same betwixt them wch. if not observed then that you would certifiye me I have written to this purpose to Mr. Brisket doubting some practize agt. Fallon whom I would willingly have repayed yf you finde cause in all p'ticulars of his censure I pray informe yor self well herein.

After writing of the former Mr. Hayes brought me a l're ye enclosed cotype shewes you from whom. I have sd sufficient before in the matter, but shall agayne advise yor speycall consideration & care to be used for the advoyding the difference with the French who it may be would take this occasion to ground any advantage agt us whereof I would have you cleere I will not p'cribe you p'ticulars but only hartly pray you & the people of yor charge to take some speedy course to p'ferment or stay any future detriment wch may ensue. And soe I commit you to Gods p'tecion.

Early Patent by Sir Thomas Warner, Knt.

The following patent which I recently discovered in St. Kitts is the only known one of Sir Thomas Warner. It is given verbatim from an official copy made for me.

There is also an Ind're of last of Sept. 1641 between Wm. Warden, planter, and Simon Gordan, merchant, by which Warden for 20,000 lbs. of tobacco sells to Gordan land near Prince Charles Fort in the p. of St. Thomas of 120 paces in width. Entered in Register B., fos. 189—190, 22 May 1678. (Recorded in 1699, p. 123.)

Another Ind're of 23 May 1643 is a grant by Sir Tho. Warner to S. G., gent., of a parcel of land in the Division of Prince Charles Fort, in breadth 48 paces, for 8 years. Entered in the book B., fos. 186, 187, ye 18 of May 1678. True Copy. Recorded 23 Aug. 1699, p. 125.

The Church in Nevis.*

QUERIES (1723-24). REPLIES BY ROBERT ROBERTSON, MINISTER OF ST. PAUL'S, NEVIS, 1724, MAY 7.

[Fulham Palace MSS.]

1. Came from London 17 years before. Has had no other Church.
3. Ordained at Bishop's Chapel, Fulham, by Bishop of London, 9 Feby., 1706 (Style Angliæ).
4. Presented by Colonel Parke, to whom recommended by B. of L. S^t Paul's then esteemed best living in Leeward Islands, next to S^t John's, Antigua. Produced Governor's presentation to Churchwardens and Vestrymen, 13 Dec. 1707. I performed Divine Service in the Church the Sunday after. That was all the Induction I had.
5. Constantly resided in Parish from 1707, except 6 months I was in England in 1721 for the Recovery of my Health, much impaired by living so long in this hot country, and to settle two of my children at school there, for which I had leave from Colonel Hamilton, Governor of the Leeward Islands.

6. It (the Parish) consists of the Town (Charles Town, from Charles I., in whose Reign this Island was first settled, 1628), and 3 or 4 small Plantations next to it. About 70 Householders, with their Families, being in all (children included) near 300 Whites, whereof one 4th are Jews, who have a Synagogue here, and are said to be very acceptable to the Country Part of the Island, but are far from being so to the Town, by whom they are charged with taking the Bread out of the Christians' mouths. And this, with the encouragement said to be given to the Transient Traders above what is given to the Settlers, is by many thought to be the true cause of the strange decay of this place. At present there is not above 3 or 4 Christian Families of Note in my Parish.

7. Near 1000 Negro Slaves, and no means (or none fitted to such an end) used for their conversion. Some attend their Masters to Church. I have baptiz'd a few, and frequently discoursed with some of the most sensible among them. But that is nothing to what a work of this nature requires—a work the difficulty whereof can hardly be credited by any one who has not seen these Negroes, and conversed with them for a competent time. And yet, hard as it seems here, I know some Clergymen in these parts who tremble at the thoughts of what they own to be much easier, how they shall be able to account at last for the Christians, their chief (if not their sole) cure.

8. DIVINE SERVICE IN CHURCH.

Twice on Sundays; almost every day in Passion week; the Easter and Whitsun Holidays; the 30th of Jan^{ry}, 29th of May, &c. The last Friday of July, August, & September, appointed by an ancient Custom of the Govern^t. in this Island to be observed as days of Fasting, that being the Season of the year which we call Hurricane Time, & the 2nd or 3rd Thursday of October as a day of Thanksgiving every year when there has been no Hurricane. Besides these, there is a Sermon preached annually on the 14th of January, on Prov. 30, 8, by the appoint^{mt} of M^r Henry Carpenter, late Secretary of the Leeward Islands, who gave by his will (he has been dead 20 years) Ten Pieces of Eight to the Minister that preaches it.

Formerly, I used to have a congregation of 150 or more in the forenoon; now seldom above 60 or 70, and many of the Seafaring or Transient Persons. In the afternoon, Ten, Eight, Six, and sometimes none at all; on other Holidays ten or twelve, and much the same number on Fast Days.

10. Formerly, when my Parish was populous, and we had some Persons of note to countenance it, I endeavoured to introduce catechizing, but in vain. Neither old nor young would attend it. Not but most people here are fond enough of frequent preaching and the like; that is, they would have the Minister go to church, but will not do so themselves, and none are louder this way than some that never go to church.

11. ARE ALL THINGS DULY DISPOSED AND PROVIDED IN THE CHURCH, FOR THE DECENT AND ORDERLY PERFORMANCE OF DIVINE SERVICE?

“Considering the present circumstances of the Parish, pretty well.”

Twelve years ago the Parishioners built a neat Church of Brick, which cost them above £1000 Sterl. A fine Pulpit, &c., of Bermudas cedar, but falling to a wonderful decay soon after the Peace. They have not been able as yet to build Pews, but sit on Benches. 3 or 4 Pieces of Plate, A Communion Table, but the Chancel not railed in nor adorned; the French having destroyed the Ten Commandments, King's Arms, and all the old ornaments of Brass in their Invasion in 1706, when the Nation was pleased to make some reparation to the inhabitants, for the losses they had sustained by that Invasion, the damages then done to my church (which the French turned into a Prison for the Inhabitants) were stated by the Commissioners appointed by the Queen to take an account of the said losses, and sworn to by the Churchwardens, and carefully returned to England, with the cost in the year 1708; but, the persons employed by the

Gov^t in England to adjust that affair would not allow one farthing to repair the damages my Church had suffered, tho' computed below the value of £200 sterl. only. The Parishioners will put things into the best order they can, as soon as possible. As I found no Bible and Common Prayer Book in the Church, except one almost quite worn out, I have all along made use of those belonging to the Library.

12. VALUE OF LIVING.

I have 2000 lbs. of Sugar a year for keeping the Parish Register. The Dues for Marriages, &c., this last year may have been worth £10 Sterl. The settlement by law is 16,000^{lbs} of Sugar, which, allowing for the cask, and four & half per cent. Duty here, Wastage (which is commonly fourteen in the cent.), Difference of Weight (the hundred here being only five score), Premium for Insurance, the King's Duty in England, 3^s 6^d per cent., Freight communibus annis as 4^s 6^d per cent., Factorage, & the Petty charges, may clear in London if sold at 23^s per cent. (which is rare, the Sugars I am obliged to receive being generally the worst), about sixty five pounds sterling money. The vestry raise it, by an assessment on the Houses, Trade, & Negroes of the Parishioners that are Planters.

14. REPAIR OF HOUSE, &c.

The Buildings here being all of Timber, they fall presently to decay unless new boarded and shingled every 7th or 8th year, which is very chargeable, we having no materials for building, not so much as a Nail or a Board, nearer than England, or New England, nor any other standard for any one commodity, except the Plenty or Scarceness of it.

16. SCHOOLS.

The Parish Clerk, M^r Henry Gray whose . . . and Minister of Northampton) has sometimes taught Reading, Writing, & Arithmetic, but he grows old and infirm, & can't do it now, notwithstanding his numerous family. Neither has it been worth his or any Body's while, these last twelve years to teach school here. Several have attempted it, but they always failed in Two or Three Months.

17. PAROCHIAL LIBRARY.

A very good one. The Books intire and in good condition, except one or two Volumes of the *Critica Sacra* which were damaged by the great Hurricane in August 1707, a little before my arrival here. M^r Henry Carpenter, the gentleman mentioned in my Answer to Query 8, left by his Will £200 Sterling to be laid out in Books of Divinity and History for the use of the Parish, which was accordingly done by the Bishop of London's direction. Part of the Books sent out here in 1707, & the rest soon after the Peace. The first parcel lay in Chests for several years, in the keeping of the Church Wardens, except a few I had taken out for my own use. Finding them in danger from the cock-roche & other vermin, I took them all into my possession, & about 7 years ago built (wholly at my own expence) a convenient room to place them in, close by my own House, which cost me 25 Pistoles; but, what will become of these excellent Books unless the Minister shall take due care of them for his own sake, I pretend not to guess. There are no Rules prescribed for the preserving of them, nor is there much likelihood if there were, that they would be observ'd, few here having any taste that way, and none caring to put themselves to the least trouble, much less to any expence, without being gainers by it. The worst is, should this Island be invaded in time of war (& 3 or 4 Privateer Sloops from Martinico may do that at pleasure) the Library must be inevitably lost. The Reverend Mr. Commissary Field has a Catalogue of the Books, & there was another at Fulham, otherwise I would have sent one with this. If mislaid I will send one on the first intimation.

George Dewar, a cadet of the Dewars of Vogrie, born 1708, mar. 1stly in 1744, at St. Paul's Cathedral, Christina, only dau. and eventual heir of John Panton of St. Kitts, Esq. (whose will was proved in 1746, "196 Fox"), by whom he had two sons: 1. John, mar. 1766 Caroline Vernon, and having hopelessly ruined himself, was only left annuities by his father. 2. David, mar. 1787 his cousin Penelope, dau. of Gen. Edw. Mathew, Gov. of Grenada and of Clanville Lodge, Hants, by Lady Jane Bertie, and succeeded to his father's plantations in Dominica and St. Kitts, and estate at Enham. George Dewar mar 2ndly in 1753 Lady Caroline Bertie, who died s.p. 1774. The Enham Estate was sold in 1817, and the plantation in St. Kitts in 1867. The family is still seated at Doles, near Enham. (See pedigree in "Antigua," i., 201.)

On the floor of the central walk of the nave is a black stone covering a vault inscribed with the above names and dates.

The late Archdeacon Brooks.*

George Bygrave Brooks, sole survivor of the six children of Dr. George Brooks of Jamaica, was born on the Blenheim estate July 8th, 1832, eleven days only after the death of his grandfather at the same place. In 1854 Dr. Brooks died of cholera in Spanish Town during an epidemic, in which he exhausted himself in his efforts to save those attacked, and two years later his son, taking Holy Orders, was appointed stipendiary Curate of St. Mark's, Craigton. In addition to this he, in 1861, became Chaplain and Secretary to the Bishop of Kingston; in 1865 Acting Chaplain to the Forces in Jamaica; and in 1879 Archdeacon of the Surrey division of the island. In 1884 Archdeacon Brooks accepted the living of Edlesborough, Bucks, offered him by Earl Brownlow, which he held till 1910, when failing health enforced his retirement. He died in London March 9th, 1914, and is buried at Kensal Green. He was thrice married (*vide ante*, Vol. II., pp. 49, 53).

The Archdeacon's life in Jamaica was marked by two public events of some importance—the negro rebellion of 1865, and the hurricane of August 18th, 1880. Of the former he saw little, but by the latter his church at Craigton, not long before beautified at considerable expense, was utterly demolished. It was owing to his tireless efforts, seconded by his wife Laura, that funds were raised for rebuilding it. With her capable assistance, too, many improvements were carried out at Edlesborough.

Archdeacon Brooks left no issue, and with his death the family of Brooks of St. Elizabeth becomes extinct.

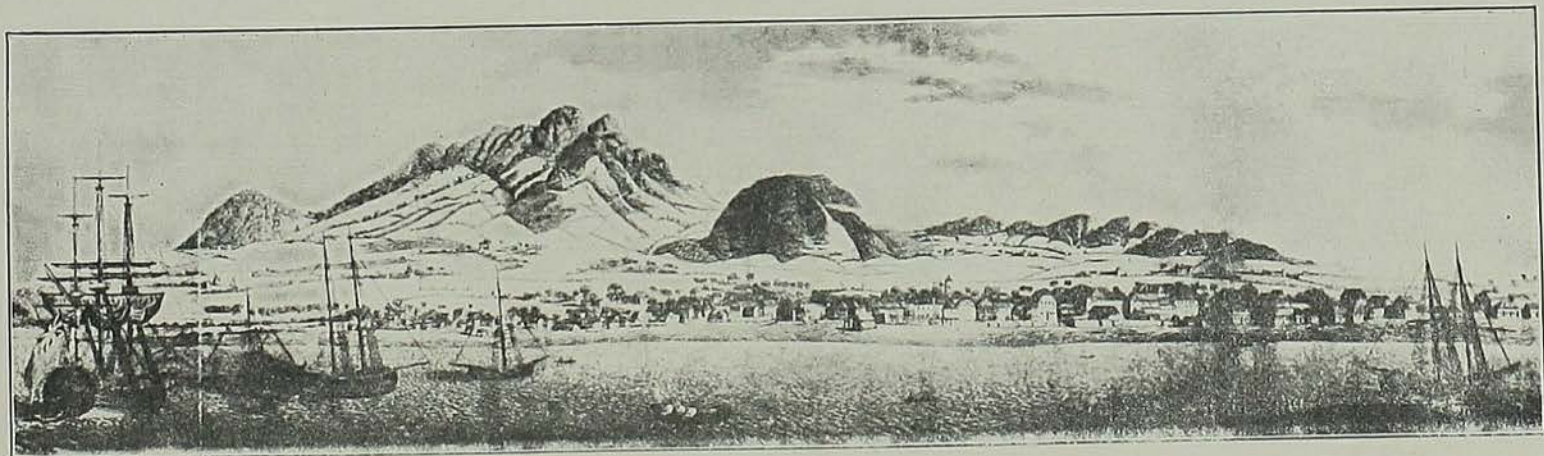

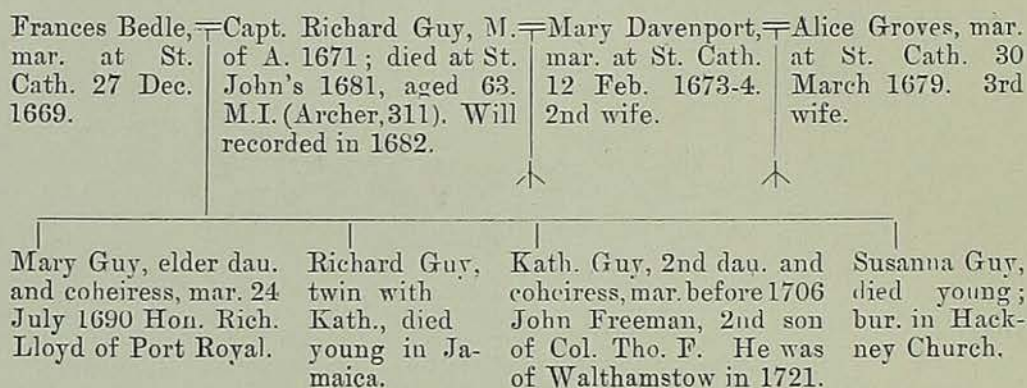

St George.—Henry Pope. Above 8 years. Since come away. Income £60 to £70 a year, raised by a Poll Tax on slaves. House, and glebe of 3 or 4 acres.

St John.—William Smith, the last Minister here. but came away in 1721.

St James.—(Church going to decay). No Minister. Mr. Johnson the last, who died 1719. Glebe 2 or 3 acres. House fallen.

St Paul.—Rob. Robertson. 17 years. Income £65 sterling.

St Thomas.—Cradock Wells,† above 10 years. A country parish congregation—small. No schools. No catechizing at church—Negroes, but care of the parish sufficient to employ the Minister.

ST. CHRISTOPHER'S.

St Anne.—Da. Bethun. 24 years. Before in Nevis and Montserrat. Here 6 years. Income 16,000 lbs. of sugar. House found by the Parish. Glebe 4 acres, 20^s per acre.

Basseterre.—John Anderson. Mr. Thomas 1738. Income £60 to £70 sterling. Mr. Knox says £200 sterling and 24,000 lbs. of sugar. No glebe, a house paid for by the Parish.

Christ Church, Nicholas Town, St John's Cape.‡—Archibald Cockburn, 1711. Mr. Dumonex, 1742. Income about £50. Glebe not known. No house, no allowance for it.

Middle Island.—Mr. Meirac, 1742.

St Mary, Cayon.—Archibald Cockburn. Income 16,000 lbs. of sugar. Glebe. Steer (Cape).§—Dan^l Butchall, 1698. Mr. Dumeny, Mr. Langley. Income £70. No house, but allowance of sugar for it.

St Thomas.—Walter Thomas, 1721, Mr. Davidson. Income 16,000 lbs. of sugar. No house, but instead 9000 lbs. of sugar. Glebe, 3 acres, lets for 8 pieces of 8.

Trinity (Palmetto).—John Anderson, Mr. Meirac 1742. Income £60 to £70 sterling. No house. Glebe, 4 acres, lets for 2 pistoles a year.

ANTIGUA.

St John's.—A new Church, Organ loft, Steeple for 8 Bells. Ornaments sumptuous. James Field, Commissary. Mr. Byam, 1738. Income £250 sterling.

St Mary's, Old Road.—Mr. James Knox, Mr. Holmes, 1738. Service every Sunday in Church or Chapel, by turns. Glebe 80 acres. There is also a Chapel of ease called the Bermudian Valley.

St Paul's, Falmouth.—Tho. Allen, Mr. Wilson, 1738, Mr. Davidson, 1742.

St Peter's, Parham.—Now 2 Parishes, St George's being taken out of it by a Law made there. Mr. Rose, 1738, 1742.

St George's.—No Minister, Hicksman lately dead.

St Philip's, Willoughby Bay.—Sam. Orr, Mr. Burnonville, 1738. Divine service performed alternately in Church or Chapel every Lord's Day. There is also a Chapel of Ease at Belfast.

MONTSERRAT.

St. Anthony.—Thomas Allen, 12 years. First at St Peter's, then of St George. Sometimes served by Mr. Cruickshank. Income £60 sterling. No house. Hires one at £23 a year.

St George.—James Cruickshank, 30 years. Income £60 sterling. No house, no glebe.

St Leonard.—

St Patrick.—Never had a Church nor Minister. Inhabited by Irish Papists.

St Peter.—Sometimes served by M^r Cruickshank. No house. Glebe 20 acres, rented at £12 a year. Divided among Ministers in Island.

Windward.—

In Antigua 25,000 Negroes. In the other 3 that or a greater number. Salary settled on the Clergy by Law, 16,000 lbs. of Sugar per annum. About 100 lbs. that money £60 sterling. By agreement £200 of that money (all except St Philip's, which is £160), but 3 q^{rs} of it taken in goods. £200 equivalent to £130 sterling.

Every minister has more or less of a Glebe (except St Philip's). Some very good, none considerable except St Mary's, and some tolerable Parsonage houses or an allowance for one.

Inductions by the Governor, only the Presentation of the Governor, usually exhibited to the Vestry.

The 200 lbs. in Produce not worth more than £100 sterling.

Food and Raiment as dear again as in England. Perquisites inconsiderable, except St John's in Antegoa and Basseterre in St X^{ers}.

Montserrat.—1724, May 22. Rev. Thomas Allen replies to Queries. Went over 12 years in July next. First had St Peter, then St George. In Oct. 1718 removed to St Anthony. 102 Families, 68 Protestants & rest Papists.

Infidels, many hundreds. "I Baptize them when required & in the same manner as whites, *e.g.*, with Sureties. Divine Services Twice every Sunday. Most part of the Parishioners that are Protestants come constantly to Church, two or three families only excepted. Sacrament 3 times a year, 15 to 20 Communicants."

"Here is no Ch. Warden, noe Vestry, nor Service Books but what I provide myself."

Value of Living, "about 80^{li} paid out of the Public Stock of the Island, in Sugar, at what price they please to sett upon it, out of which, when Duty, Freight, Cask, and other charges are deducted, is not Sixty Pounds." No house. Forced to hire one at 25^{li} per annum. 20 acres of land in St Peter's, leased at 12^{li} per annum, divided amongst all ye clergy of ye Island for the time being. No Public Library.

St George's Parish, St Peter's Cure.—Rev. Ja. Cruickshank replied on 22 May 1724. Went over 30 years in April last. No other cure, but has served St Peter's and St Anthony on death or vacancy of either. Has held living 30 years. 17 Protestant Families & 34 Popish in St George's, 20 Protestant, 40 Popish in St Peter's.

Service, once every Sunday. Few of the Richer sort attend. The poor have the Gospel preached to them. Sacrament 3 times a year. Communicants, 8 to 12.

No Church Warden or Vestry, Bible, or Service Book belonging to the Church in either Parish.

After deductions from £80 Salary, paid in Sugar, £60 net.

Parish never had a school in it. No Library.

JAMAICA.

The 2 Acts relating to the Church in Jamaica are at large in Wood's *Laws* of Jamaica, p. 77 et 362. No Surplice Fees. Testimonials of being in Orders to be exhibited and recorded in the Secretary's Office. No Ecclesiastical Law to establish Penal Mulcts.

Settlements, some of £150, others of £100 per ann. and £50 more if the Justices and Vestry think fit. No salary to any incumbent longer than he officiates, except in case of sickness.

No Visitation since M^r May was Commissary. Little Power left. Some Parishes distant 150 Miles. None to take care of Cures in Absence. Q^y whether any power to convene.

Governor requires not the Bp. of London's Licence, but presents any one lawfully ordained.

No provision for Service during Vacancies.

Beef, Mutton, Pork 7½^d p^d. Veal and Lamb 12^d per p^d. Fowls from a Crown to 7^s 6^d y^e pair.

Salt Beef, Butter, Fish, etc., Wearing apparel, Furniture, and all other things from Old and New England as dear again as in the places they come from.

Madeira Wine, which is mixt with Water, is the Common drink, from 18^{ls} to 34^{ls} p^r pipe. Ale and Cyder 2^s 6^d a bottle, by the dozen 12^s or 15^s.

As decent a figure for 100^{ls} in England as for 300^{ls} a year here.

EXTRACT OF A LETTER FROM HIS GRACE THE DUKE OF PORTLAND, DATED FROM JAMAICA MARCH 4, 1723, TO H. NEWMAN.

I am but too sensible of the looseness of Men's Morals here, and of the growth of Irreligion and Profaneness.

I shall endeavour to discountenance all I can either its Increase or continuance, and give them no occasion of Stumbling by treading in any unguarded irregular Tracts of my own.

Several of the Clergy appear to me very well qualified for the Strict Discharge of their Duties, and the exercise of all Religious Services. I have recommended to 'em all a due care of their Parishes, and a conscientious conducting of their Flocks, like good Shepherds, and, as there are some Vacancies of Incumbents at present, so I have recommended to the Bishop of London, from whom I had the Honour of receiving a Letter, inclos'd in your last, the providing such able men, as he shall find best qualified to supply those cures. His Lordship has my Answer by the same Ship that carries this.

THE STATE OF THE CHURCH IN JAMAICA.

The Governor or Capt. Gen^l presents and inducts by Letters Patent, under the Broad Seal, to all Livings (*Vide* State of Jamaica in the Preface to ye Laws, edition 1st), and by the Laws of Jamaica should present none to Benefices but such as are recommended by my Lord Bishop of London.

The Act of Council (23rd Feby. 1684) ratifying these Laws is to be seen in the preface to the Laws of Jamaica, Edition 1st, and is recorded in the Secretary's Office in Jamaica. But frequently the Governors have done otherwise, without the Bishop's recommendation. For instance, M^r Wright was presented to St Andrew's, when Minister of the *Crown*, Man-of-War, by Colonel Handasyde. Nay, one Mitchel, who had no orders at all, but counterfeit Letters, as from the Arch-Bishop of Dublin, was made Minister of Port Royal by Col^l Handasyde. M^r Dun, likewise, was made Minister of Port Royal, who had fled from Virginia for having three wives at one time. He was cast away, anno 1722, on Cape

Corantes in a Man-of-War. His death was accompanied with the most exquisite torments, for, as the Purser of the Ship (who with several others was saved) told, one of the great guns in the Storm run across him, and crushed his legs and belly before the Ship struck. These and many other instances shew the necessity of the Bishop's recommendation, Letters Demissory, &c.

OF THE CHURCH, GLEBE, MANSION HOUSE, SALARY, AND
MINISTER OF EACH PARISH.

St Catharin's.—Here is a very magnificent Church, rebuilt in my Lord Hamilton's Government, who contributed one hundred pounds towards it, and prevailed with the Council to give £50 each. It cost in all about £5000. Mr Tabor the Minister of it was at much pains to see it elegantly built & furnished with fine ornaments & decoration. But the Statues of Moses and Aaron on each side of the Altar gave great offence, for several weak but well-meaning people would not approach the Altar for fear of bowing to those Images. The last Hurricane, August 28, 1722, flung them down, & broke their Noses and Arms; so they were removed into the Vestry Room, where it is wisht they may continue, for they were so gaudy that they occasioned a great avocation of the mind and desecration of thought in the time of Divine Worship, and great animosities among the people.

This Parish has a good Glebe with 4 or 5 Negroes belonging to it, and has been farmed out at £80 per annum.

The Mansion house is a very good one, built by the Spaniards. On our taking of the Island it was bestowed on one of Oliver's soldiers, who, finding that it formerly belonged to the Prior, in his last Will devised it to the Minister of the Church & his Successors. The house has a fine Garden joining to it, mostly at Mr Tabor's charge. It has in it a good number of exotick Plants, besides the most curious vegetables that grow upon the Island, & fig trees & Vines of the best sorts.

The Salary by Law is £200 p. a. certain, & £50 more at the discretion of the Justices and Vestry, besides the perquisites for Christenings & Burials within the Chancel, at the rate of 10 for each person buried there.

The Minister at present is Mr Scott, educated at Edinburgh in Scotland, a man of an unexceptionable character, thro'ly in the interest of the present Government, but unacceptable to the Duke of Portland and most of the people there on the account of his disagreeable voice and broad Scotch pronunciation.

Kingston.—Here is a good Church, pew'd with cedar, and a fine Altar piece with ornaments & several pieces of Plate. Here is no Glebe nor Mansion House. But, when they like their Minister, they allow him £40 per ann. in lieu of a house, besides his yearly salary of £150 or £200, on the same proviso. The Minister at present is Mr May, of an unexceptionable character, &c., Commissary to the late Bishop of London. The Sacrament here is administered 3 times a year, and there are about 50 or 60 that communicate. The burial Fees here are said to amount to 200 pds. a year, or more.

St Andrew's, Liguanea.—Here was a very fine small Church before the Hurricane, but much shattered then, and not yet repaired. It has a small organ, & an Organist to whom the Parish allows 50 pds. a year. The Glebe land is 600 acres, by a Patent from King Charles the 2nd, and, provided the weather was seasonable, w^d turn to great account. But, these 7 or 8 years past, the weather has been so dry that most of the Tenants have delivered up their leases & gone into the mountains & other parts of the Island that are more seasonable. There is no Mansion House, but the Parish, when they like their Minister, allow him £40 per ann. to provide him one. The salary is £100 per ann., and the perquisites about 50 more. Here was a School considerably endowed by the Gentlemen of the

Parish about the year 1700, and, by Letters Patent under the Broad Seal, my Lord Bishop of London was one of the Governors, and had the nomination and appointment of the Masters. Mr. Moodie, Minister of Liguanea, was appointed School Master, and had two Ushers under him for two years. But the Parishioners not paying in their quota Mr Moodie desisted, and, in fine, that pious and charitable endowment sunk. Colonel Handasyde turned the School into a Barracks for his soldiers, and soon after it was blown up with gunpowder. The School House, with two acres of land and one Negro, were given by Colonel Nicholas Laws, the late Governor. The Minister at present is Mr Johnston, educated at Edinburgh in Scotland. He was at first Minister of Vere, where he lived 10 years & a half; afterwards was removed to Liguanea by my Lord Hamilton. While Mr Johnston was Minister of Vere one Father Warren set up a Mass House there and a School. Mr Johnston vigorously opposed him, and by application to my Lord Hamilton had him turned out of the Parish. But, by so doing, became obnoxious to the wrath of the papists and other disaffected persons in that Island, whom they traduced as a hot litigious man; and afterwards, at Liguanea, was maligned by others for maintaining the rights of his Church there against some great men that endeavoured to escheat it, & who actually had employ'd Mr Arcedeckne, the King's Attorney, and five Lawyers more to oppose the Church's Right to the Glebe. Dr Charles Lambe supplies the Cure for the space of 7 years, as p^r agreement approved of and signed by the Duke of Portland. Port Royal.

 living in Spanish Town. It is a most unhealthy Parish, the air being foggy to 9
 or 10 in the morning, and the ground continually wet.

The Minister at present is Mr Edward Reading, educated at Dublin, & Chap-
 lain to the D. of Grafton, has a Parish in Ireland, but was fain to leave it, his
 wife having used him scurvily and run him in debt. The poor unhappy gentleman
 behaves himself very well, is a sober man, tho' being sickly, came to Jamaica
 about 10 months ago, and has thoughts of returning.

S^t Elizabeth's.—This is a very large Parish, having 2 churches in it at 25 miles distance, one at Lacovia and the other at Black River, where the Minister preaches every other Sunday. It is a healthy Parish, and the Minister lives in it very comfortably, having 150 pds. salary per ann., about as much in perquisites, and pasture enough for sheep and cattle. The people there never fail of presenting the Minister at his first coming with stock of every kind. They gave to one M^r Coleby to the amount of 250 pds. in cattle, but he scarce had well received their present before he accepted of a new living, viz., Port Royal, which much disgusted the people. So that when they like their Minister now, before they offer any presents they take a sacred promise of him that he will not leave them.

Here are more Dissenters than anywhere else in the Island, viz., Quakers and Presbyterians. The Quakers have a Meeting House at Lacovia, and some of 'em have great estates, viz., the Dicksons and Gales, but are so moderate as to permit their children to be christened by the Ministers of the Church of England, when desired by their Relations. The Presbyterians were wont to meet at Col^l Scot's, a son of M^r Scot, one of K. Charles the First's Judges, & had for some time among them the Ministers that came from Caledonia or Darien; but are all of 'em now pretty well reconcil'd to the church, & frequent it more than many of our own people. There are few besides in the Island. Bradshaw, the son of President Bradshaw, came frequently to Liguania, & rec^d the sacrament there; so did Harrison (the son of Col^l Harrison, another of K. Ch. the 1st Judges), and lies buried in the Church of S^t Andrew's, Liguania.

Westmoreland.—This Parish has not been long settled, not above 20 years, but they have both a Church & Mansion House for the Minister. The salary is from 100 to 150, tho' they never gave more to the former Minister, M^r Rudd, than 100 pds., nor more to y^e present, and the Perquisites are of no great value, the people there being of the meaner sort. The Minister is M^r John Dickson, educated at Glasgow in Scotland. He was formerly a Preacher in a Presbyterian Congregation in London, but ejected by them for his lewdness and intemperance, and since his admission to the Church of England has not much mended his life: behaved himself very unhandsomely to my L^d Hamilton, our late Governor, who lent him money tho' he had never seen his face before; refused to pay him, and pretended it was a gift, but my L^d recovered the Money at Common Law. Too many complaints have been made of him to our Governors, but those who have complained are none of the best, & wish he was worse than really he is, being the worst set of people in the Island.

S^t Ann's.—Here was, in the time of the Spaniards, a fine Church and an Abbey, built by Peter Martyr, who was Abbot here, the same Peter Martyr who writ the Decads. A great part of the church remains, and is in a little time to be rebuilt, Colonel Drakes* of that Parish having left by Will a Legacy to that purpose, together with a free School for 30 scholars, to be maintained and educated out of the produce of his Estate, the School Master to live upon his Estate and to have £30 per ann.

There are still some Inscriptions upon the Church (tho' the Weather has effaced some words, which may be easily supply'd). Peter Martyr in these Inscriptions stiles himself *Proto notarius Apostolicus, totius insulæ Abbas, & Senatus Indici Consiliarius*. He says he was sent there by the Council of Trent, & that the Church there was twice burnt with Lightning & a third time rebuilt with Stone. The Town itself, where the Abbey and Church were built, was called Se-villa, which continued to the year 1590, when the Spaniards deserted it,

& went to the South side of the Island, & built St Jago de la Vega, St James in the plain, now called St Catharin's, or most commonly Spanish Town. The Minister is Mr Roger Price, who lately came from Cape Coast in Guinea, and was prefer'd to it by the D. of Portland, without any recommendation from the Bp. of London.

St Mary's.—Here is neither Church nor Mansion House, & but a very small Salary, scarce a competency, viz., 100 pds. per annum, & the Perquisites very inconsiderable. The Minister preaches at his own dwelling house, but has seldom more to hear him than his own family. His name is Mr James Spence, educated at Aberdeen in Scotland, a man of no contemptible learning, but not so regular in his life as he ought to be.

St George's.—Here is neither Church nor Minister, & the people complain they are not able to maintain one. They are but few and poor, the rebellious Negroes from the Mountains frequently making incursions upon them.

St Thomas in the East.—Here is a small Church and a house for the Minister, but the Salary and Perquisites very inconsiderable, both not amounting to 150 pds. per ann. It was once a very rich Parish & well peopled, but ruined by the French under the command of Mons. de Casse anno

The Minister is Mr Nicholas McCalnar, educated at Glasgow, a man of good learning and strict life.

St David's.—This is but a very small Parish, and the Salary but 100 pds. per ann. It has a small Church & house for the Minister, but no Minister at present. This parish was ruined likewise by the French.

St James's.—This is the poorest Parish in Jamaica, and not able to maintain a Minister, has no Church nor Mansion House nor Glebe. The Salary, by Law, is £150 per ann. One Mr Gerrard was sent there in Coll. Handasyd's Government, but soon returned, complaining that he could neither have meat, drink, nor any society in the Parish.

St John's or Guanaboa.—This has a small Church and a good dwelling house. The Glebe likewise has been farmed out 20 or 30 pds. a year. The Salary is 100 pds., but few perquisites, the Gentlemen of the Parish for the most part living at Spanish Town. The Minister at present is Dr Charles Lambe, who has Mr Richard Marsden for his Curate, during his own abode at Liguania.

Port Royal.—Here was, before the Earthquake, a very large and beautiful church, some part of the wall, with its foundation upward, shewing itself still above the water, about 4 foot thick, which probably was some part of the steeple. Another fine church was built afterwards near the wall on the East side of the Town, which continued till the Fire, 1703. And what was very remarkable of that most terrible judgment, and what every one of the Inhabitants alive still own, all the winds in their turn, from every point, whirled about, to the destruction of that place, and nothing in it was left unconsumed but the Jayle, the Whipping Post, & the Ducking Stool.

Here is no Mansion House, but sometimes they make an allowance in lieu of one, but take it off again at discretion. The Salary before the Earthquake, and which continued till the Fire, was £300 per ann., and the Perquisites (being then the only Port in the Isle) amounted to £600 or £700. But now the Salary is, by an Act of the Assembly, from 100 to 150, at the discretion of the Justices and Vestry. The Perquisites are said to be £150 more, arising from Christenings, Weddings, and Burials, & the benefit of the Pall. The Minister at present is Mr Calvin Galpin, educated in New England and formerly a Dissenting Minister, but now very zealous in the defence of the Church of England. Here he set up a Latin School, but it meets with little encouragement, the people at present in that Town being very poor, and others afraid to send their children to such

a corrupt place, & liable to so many accidents. The Duke of Portland gave Mr Galpin a license to keep school exclusive of all others, but soon after, upon the Petition of the Justices & Vestry to permit two others to keep school, who had been very useful to the Town before, his Grace was pleased to grant their Petition, which has given Mr Galpin not a little uneasiness.

St Dorothy's.—Here is no Church at present, being demolisht in the last Storm. Nor was there ever a Manse belonging to it, nor any Glebe. The Salary is from £100 to £200 per ann., at the discretion of the Vestry. The Perquisites are but small, most of the gentlemen belonging to that Parish having houses in Spanish Town, at 7 or 8 miles distance, where they choose to live. The Minister at present is Mr Fulton, educated at Oxford, an ingenious young man and well respected.

Clarendon.—Here was, at a place called the Cross, one of the finest Churches in the Indies before the late Hurricane, all the inside being laid with cedar, from the roof to the foundation, & pews of the same, all finisht by a fine Artist. But it was shattered to pieces in the Storm, the Doors and windows giving way, and is not yet repaired. There is a fine Mansion House, and repaired since the Storm, with a few acres of Glebe land. The Salary per ann. is from 150 to 200, at discretion of the Vestry, and the Perquisites about 50 more.

The Minister at present is [blank], educated at Oxford, a man of a good life and well respected. At his coming to Jamaica his deafness rendered him unfit for conversation, but the change of the clime and the air has much helpt that distemper. This cure probably is owing to nothing else but the rarefaction of the air in Jamaica and its great elasticity. Both which properties of the Jamaica air Dr Kaphan, an Eminent Physician here, long ago observed.

Here is a fine Chapel in the Mountains where the Minister officiates every third Sunday, and the Parishioners resolve to Petition the Assembly to divide the Parish, or to give them liberty to choose another Minister to assist the other.

Vere.—Here was a fine Church about 20 years ago, but much shattered by both the Hurricanes of 1711 & 1722. Is since tolerably well repaired, but lost much of its beauty. Here was likewise a very fine Mansion house built while Mr Johnston was Minister, which cost the Parish in building 1000 pds., but is now almost demolisht by the last Hurricane, & probably will not be rebuilt during the abode of the present incumbent. The Salary by the Act is from 150 to 200, at the discretion of the Vestry, & the Perquisites (while that Parish flourisht) were very considerable. But for these twelve years past they have had such dry weather that a great number of the inhabitants have left it. It has a Glebe of 25 acres joining on the Mansion House, and 25 more at some distance, but of little value. The Minister at present is Mr White, educated at Aberdeen and afterwards practised Physick for some years in Spain & Portugal, was put in orders by the late L^d Bishop of London, and sent over to Jamaica as Curate to Mr Johnston, who before his coming was removed to Liguanea, and Vere being vacant Mr White was preferred to it by my Lord Hamilton. He is a poor, unhappy man, who lives, Salamander like, in the fire of contention with all mankind, and it is not in his power to live otherwise. The Parishioners have petitioned four Governors at several times to turn him out. And though they have rebated 50 pds. of his yearly Salary, and in their Petitions loaded him with most opprobrious reflections, yet he vows he will never leave them while he breathes. And the Governor cannot find sufficient ground to turn him out, the chief Crimes alleged against him being Malice, Destruction, and Calumny (which are not actionable in Jamaica), & his refusing to Christen and Marry in private houses, which doubtless are left to his own discretion, cases of necessity excepted. After all he is a man of great sobriety, with regard to eating and drinking, and whatever his Religion was formerly, the most of his preaching now consists in railing against the Papists and telling ridiculous stories out of their legends.

At Anglesea Pen is a tombstone with a pathetic inscription:—

Samuel Haughton, s. of Sam. Williams & Margaret Bonella Haughton, b. 10 April 1776, d. (9) Dec. 1778, having lived 2 years 8 months & 12 days. His parents lost child after child during seven years & had him inoculated for small-pox, but he alone died.

By the roadside at Struie in the parish of Westmoreland is a stone to Obed Belchambers, private in an Infantry Regiment, who fell into an ambush of negroes in 1832 and was cruelly butchered.

Early Patent by Sir William Tufton, Bart., Governor of Barbados.

A copie of M^r Samuel Richardson's enshewrance or confirmaçõn for his hundred acres of land.

To all Christian People to whome these presents shall come greetinge know yee that I Serg^t William Tufton Knight and Barronett Governor Captain General and Chiefe comander of the Island of Barbados under ye Right Hon^{ble} James Earle of Carlile Lord of the Province of Carlisle By virtue of a condiçõn and in pursuite of especiall and direçõn from the said Earle to me in that behalfe given have lyMITTED appointed and confirmed unto Samuell Richardson gent. his heirs and assignes one hundred ackers of land lying upp in the Island aboute a myle and a halfe from the seasyde and next above and adjoyninge to the plantaçõn of Edward Wiggs gent. the same being the allowance accordinge to the said Earles Direçõn and custome of this Island for ten men To have and to hold the premisses with all þfitts comodities and advantages thereunto belonginge to the said Samuell Richardson his said heires and assignes pay and discharge to the said Earle and Governor all such dues as shall become payable to either of them for or by reason of the same. Witness my hand and seale the twentieth day of Aprill 1630.

W^m Tufton.

Surveyed for M^r Samuell Richardson fittie five ackers of land or their aboutes out of a gulleth norward by the lands of Jon Davis and a Gulleth and southward by the path as it is now cutt that runeth towards Richard Richardsons and Robert Spencers.

Sir Wm. Tufton was appointed Governor by the Earl of Carlisle in 1629, and arrived on 21 Dec. accompanied by Chas. Saltonstall and 200 colonists. He suppressed the Leeward men or Courteens party, but the Earl not approving of his administration, Capt. Henry Hawley superseded him, and arrived in June 1630. Hawley appointed a new Council on 11 April 1631, before whom Tufton was arraigned on a trumped up charge of high treason, and shot the following month. (See Schomburgk, 265.)

The recorded deeds commence in 1640. Occasionally an earlier one, like the above, was brought in for registration.

Brouncker of St. Kitts.

See his pedigree in Burke's "Landed Gentry" as of Boveridge, co. Dorset (i., 227), and see Hutchins, vol. iii., 384—6. Boveridge was purchased in 1788. The estate has been in recent years sold, and the present representative is unknown to the Editor.

Records of Barbados, Demerara, and the Leeward Islands.

The Editor having spent over six months last winter in Barbados and the Leeward Islands, when he transcribed the old M.I. and examined the various records, has drawn up the following notes.

Every assistance was afforded him by the Colonial Office, H.M. Governors and officials, the clergy and planters.

The M.I. of Barbados are now being prepared for publication, and will be issued in a separate volume, being too bulky for this Magazine.

BARBADOS.

The Record Office in this island was established in 1648, when an Act was passed ordering the Secretary to draw an exact list of books and send them to the Chief Officer, who was to cause all the records to be transcribed, and take charge of all future ones. After many vicissitudes and danger from destruction by fire and hurricane, the records are now safely housed in a wing of the public buildings of Bridgetown. Within the last twenty or thirty years all the old papers have been carefully transcribed into large volumes, which stand in proper order on shelves in a fire-proof room. The parish registers have been also copied and indexed, and there is a general index for the whole island. The early wills were mixed up with indentures, but later on separate books were provided. A complete list of testators has been just completed by Mr. Haynes the Registrar, and of this a copy will be printed in this Magazine next year. The Administrations and Inventories are being sorted (I saw a volume of printed forms of 1808—21 and an earlier set 1775—86), and a list of these will be prepared. The deeds relating to land are of great importance and interest. They commenced to be recorded about 1640, with occasionally a recital of a deed as early as 1630. Of Chancery suits there appear to be only quite modern ones. No allegations for marriage licences exist; these were issued by the Governor long before parish registers were kept. The original Minute books of the Council are preserved here; they run from 1653—57, 1667—73, 1681—1704—07, there being several gaps. The Minute books of the House of Assembly are in the custody of their own clerk.

There are three volumes of index to the baptisms, marriages and burials of Roman Catholics, Wesleyans, Moravians and Jews from the year 1745. I was informed that when Mr. Ralph Williams was Secretary several sacks of records

were taken away and sunk in the sea. The records are now well cared for, and the Registrar is endeavouring to provide indices, but the grant he receives is not large, and the salaries offered are too low to attract a good class of native clerk.

BRITISH GUIANA.

Berbice has a separate Record Office of earlier date than that at Demerara.

At George Town, Demerara, there are fine and spacious public buildings where the records are housed. Mr. Dalton, the Registrar, shewed me the various contents of the rooms during my short visit. There is a large series of about 140 volumes, containing deeds in Dutch and labelled "Unknown," as the English officials know nothing of their contents. When they are called for in any court an interpreter is sworn.

The records have been in the past (and still are) very carefully subdivided and classified. There are separate volumes for Transports dating from 1770, Mortgages from 1746 and Miscellaneous from 1756. Of wills there is an early volume 1673-75, then a gap to 1756, from which year the series is complete. Petitions occur in 1700, then 1728-47 with a gap to 1775. Powers of Attorney commence in 1725. Of later records I noted volumes of Powers of Attorney 1810, Execution Sales 1812, Renunciation 1814, Deliberations 1828, Substitution 1837, and Security Bonds 1859. There are also several original wills sealed and deposited by their owners for safe custody which have never been claimed nor opened. The above notes were hurriedly jotted down, as during my week's stay at Government House, H.E. Sir Walter Egerton kept me fairly busy, two days being spent visiting the Penal Settlement up the Essequibo River and other days attending a race meeting and several more social functions. The M.I. of the military ground, the Cathedral and two other churches were copied, but the old Bourda cemetery, which the Governor and I explored the morning of my departure, would take a week's work.

ANTIGUA.

Since my visit to this island twenty-five years ago, a mass of papers from the old Ordnance vaults has been brought to light and roughly sorted into bundles. Many of these were old Chancery petitions and decrees, orders by the Master and estate accounts. They are in no order, and require careful sorting and indexing. The earliest date was 1685. Another series belonged to the Court of Ordinary and consisted of petitions for Letters of Administration. These were signed and often sealed with arms. They were addressed to the Governor, who then signed and directed the Secretary to issue letters of administration. Inventories of slaves and goods with sworn valuations were often appended. As to the general condition of the records, many of them are in a deplorable state of decay, and require immediate transcription. They are so tightly packed away in iron safes that they suffer damage each time a volume is dragged out. Most of the safes are placed in the small rooms on either side of the S. front of the Court House, which are full of inflammable wooden floors and fittings. Mr. Dyett, the Registrar, complains of insufficient space and want of clerks. His office, which he kindly vacated for me, is no larger than a pigeon loft. This being now a Crown Colony and the revenue having improved, proper public buildings should be provided for the judges and officials and fire-proof rooms for the records. If for financial reasons this is not advisable, at any rate the old stone cellars in the police quarters across the road, which are dry and fire-proof, might be utilised at a trifling cost for the records.

The question has been raised about sending some of the oldest and most interesting volumes to the P.R.O. in Fetter Lane for safer custody and for the use of students, but it may seem unfair to deprive the islands of their local papers. In the past the old Council and Assembly took care of them, and ordered their transcription and binding when occasion arose, as appears by entries in their minute-books.

ST. KITTS.

Here the Registrar's Office is located in a large airy room on the ground floor of the old Court House in the square at Basseterre. The volumes are carefully arranged on shelves, and the only reflection one can make is that the room is not fire-proof. In the past there has been great destruction of papers. Chancery suits have rotted away. No marriage licences nor passenger licences exist.

The earliest volume of deeds is marked "1st Book A. I.," and consists of pp. 1 to 269 in good state; the first deed was recorded in April 1698, and the last on 24 June 1701. Several indentures relate to Nevis. Wills are found scattered amongst patents, powers of attorney, &c. No papers covering the period 1701—1728 remain. The next volume is marked "Vol. A. No. 1 Series," and the first entry is 20 Nov. 1727. The general index begins now, and each deed is numbered. This volume is incomplete, and contains 108 instead of 200 deeds; it is also decayed. Vol. B. for the years 1729—31 has been lost. Vol. "C. No. 1" for the years 1731—33 contains deeds Nos. 367—767, and its writing is atrocious. Vol. D. for the years 1733—35 contains deeds Nos. 714 to 1045. Vol. E. for the years 1735—37 deeds Nos. 1045 to 1338. F. is lost. G. covers deeds Nos. 1643—1958, and its paper is so friable that the pages broke off on being turned over, so I left off examining it. Z. covered the years 1759-60, then a 2nd Series was started with A. No. 2.

I have noted that vols. A., C., D., E., G., and M. require immediate transcription. Mr. Semper, the Registrar, was of opinion that the first twenty volumes should be copied.

In 1799 a separate index to the wills was made.

The general index is an excellent one, and was very carefully drawn up, not dated, but I noticed the watermark of its paper bore "1838." The Registrar reported in 1907 on the bad state of the records to the Chief Justice, their legal custodian, but no action was taken. Some of the parish registers of this island are also in a shocking state of dilapidation. I pointed all this out in conversation with Mr. Roxburgh, the Administrator of St. Kitts-Nevis, who promised to remedy the matter by putting down in the estimates a grant of £50. In his office I was glad to see that a bookbinder was at work binding some of their worst papers.

NEVIS.

The Registrar's Office here is also in a room, at the end of the old Court House in Charlestown. Everything is in good order, and proper cupboards have been provided, but the room is not fire-proof.

St. Kitts and Nevis were captured by the French in 1712, and much destruction of property took place. The first volume was evidently commenced as soon as the enemy retired; there is no note as to the fate of the earlier ones.

Vol. 1 of the "Common" Records commences with a deed of 22 Oct. 1712, and contains only one will. The deeds are not numbered as they were in St. Kitts. Many pages have perished or are in scraps, and the paper is rotten throughout. Vol. 2 commences Feb. 1727-8, and at the end there are remains of an index under subject-matter, not surnames. The paper is all perishing. Vol. 3 is in good order, runs from 1741—50, and has a similar index. Vol. 4 is labelled

"G.," the first sixty-three pages are partly destroyed, the rest decayed. The succeeding volumes are complete and in fairly good condition. The first book of wills runs from 1764 to 1786, and has a good index; the wills before 1764 were not kept separate. The Court records of K.B. and C.P. are in several dilapidated volumes which were rescued by the present clerk from an old cupboard. The edges have become frayed, but the writing is quite legible, and they are in better condition than the other records. I did not see any Chancery suits, merely judgments for debt. There is a gap for the years 1710—12, the time Gov. Parke was killed, when there was much disturbance of officials, and the Court may not have sat. No. 1 volume is labelled 1710 to 1710 [*sic*], with index of suits. No. 2 covers 1712—17 and has no index. Another volume is labelled "Court Book Lib. N. 1762." Apparently these three volumes are the sole survivors of the series.

Several of the old Council books have been removed to the Administrator's Office at St. Kitts, where they are safer.

MONTserrat.

The Registrar's Office is in a very good building in St. Anthony's. The records have suffered more destruction here than in any other island. Some few of the more complete volumes have been rebound and placed in the Registrar's custody. In the Commissioner's office I spent several hours with Mr. Martin, Col. Houston's Sec., in roughly sorting and cataloguing a large pile of dilapidated books and loose pages, mere fragments remaining of certain years. The earliest papers were dated 1739. There is a volume of deeds and wills for the year 1749, transcribed in 1793, and containing fifty-eight large pages, the rest blank, the deeds not being numbered. Under the year 1752 was a deed No. 79, so that the system of numbering them probably commenced that year. Under the years 1762-3 are deeds Nos. 803 to 1054. A volume for the years 1770—3 is in good preservation, and contains deeds Nos. 1772—2027, about 635 consecutive pages, less the first 15 missing. For the years 1778—81 there are deeds Nos. 2697—3000 and so on. Huge gaps occur until we reach Vol. H. for the years 1821—6. I. is then missing. J. covers the years 1829—32, K. the years 1832—9, the series onwards being complete. Of the Court records of K.B. and C.P. there remains a single volume of decrees for the years 1752—54, mostly for small debts.

All these papers will be soon carefully sorted and such as can be bound passed on to the Registrar, Mr. Mends.

This gentleman, who is a barrister from Gray's Inn, takes a great interest in the history of the island, and has collected a large quantity of interesting notes, which I hope he will soon print.

DOMINICA.

The Registrar's office is located in the Court House, a handsome commodious edifice, the records being kept in a small fire-proof room just outside the main building.

The Government grants from 1763 onwards are all properly indexed, the names being arranged under parishes.

The earliest volume of deeds marked "A.B. No. 1," from July 1764 to April 1770, consists of 550 pages, which are brown, friable and worm-eaten, and it requires transcribing. The next volume, "B. No. 1," from Jan. 1765 to Nov. 1766, is also in bad condition. There is another volume also labelled "B. No. 1" from Aug. 1766 to Feb. 1769. "C. No. 1" for the years 1768 and 1769 contains about 286 pages, the first thirty missing. "D. No. 2," a large fo. volume of

424 pages for the year 1773, is without index. It has several plans of lands by John Byres, Chief Surveyor. The first twenty pages are much worn, the rest good, but it requires rebinding. "D. No. 1" does not exist. "M. 2" covers the year 1775, as do "N. 2" and "P. 2," the labelling being incomprehensible. The series seems to be complete from this date. An index of all the wills, in some twenty volumes, was drawn up about the year 1866 (judging by the watermark). Since then the book for 1768—70 has disappeared, and before then a still earlier one for 1763—68 was lost. The oldest existing volume consists of 331 pages, the record running from 5 March 1774 to 26 Nov. 1785, and there is an unbroken series onwards.

Mr. Lartigue, the Registrar, informed me that there were some bundles of original wills from about the year 1790.

Stanley of Nevis.

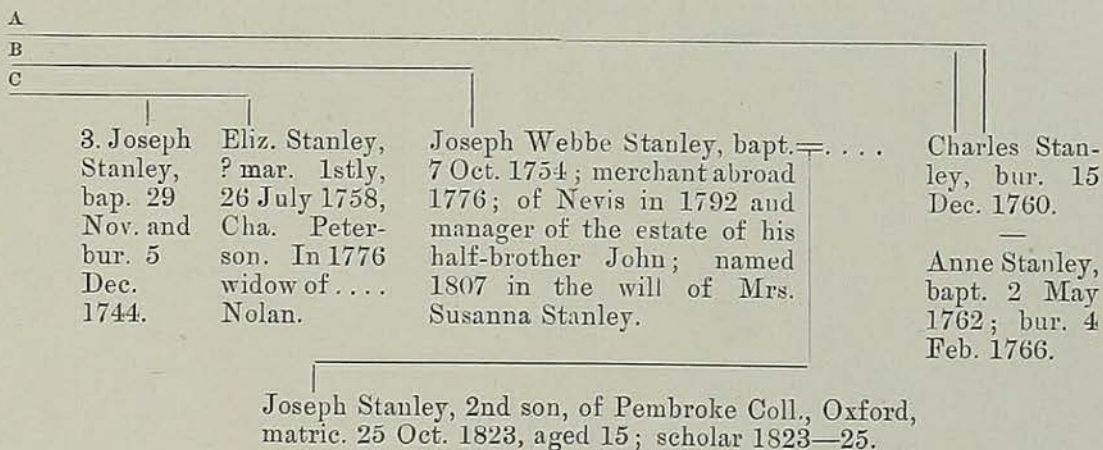

Sacred to the Memory of SUSANNA STANLEY Relict of JOHN STANLEY Esq^r sometime Attorney General in the *Island of St Christopher*. She died March 2^d 1808, Aged 67 years and was buried in the Family Vault at PLUMSTEAD in KENT. This Monument was erected by her only surviving Daughter MARY STRODE.

Above the inscription is a figure of Time presenting a rose to an angel, who is seated on a cloud.

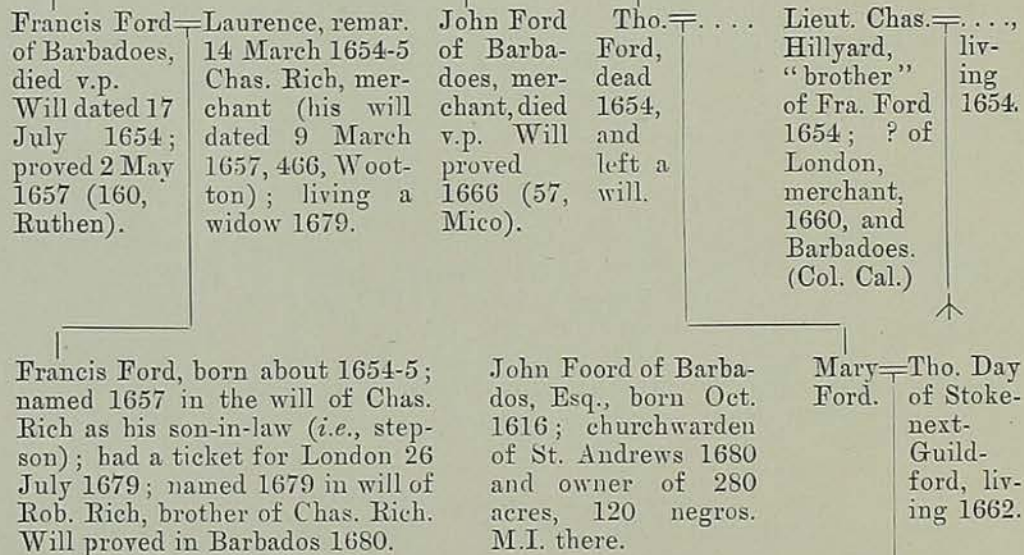
On the south wall of the chancel, west of the Sacrarium, is a small marble monument representing a woman standing by a sarcophagus, on which is an urn. Beneath is this inscription:—

CONFIRMATION OF ARMS TO FRANCIS FORD OF BARBADOS, 1793.

The following grant, on parchment, was purchased with a bundle of W.I. deeds in 1909 from a bookseller. The whole of the left margin, containing the shield, is unfortunately lost, having been cut off. The missing words, placed within brackets, have been supplied from other grants by Heard. The grant must have been made a few days before the grantee was created a Baronet. It is not signed, but is apparently a duplicate, the original of which should be in the College of Arms.

To ALL AND SINGULAR to whom these Presents shall come Sir Isaac Heard Knight GARTER Principal King of Arms and Thomas Lock Esquire CLARENCEUX King of Arms of the South East and West Parts of England from the River Trent Southwards send Greeting.

Whereas Francis Ford of Ember Court in the Parish of Thames-Ditton in the County of Surrey Esquire Son and Heir of Francis Ford of Lears in the Parish of St Michael in the Island of Barbadoes Esquire deceased hath represented

unto the Most Noble Charles Duke of Norfolk Earl Marshal and hereditary Marshal of England that he is by tradition descended from the Family of FORD of Devonshire, and hath borne Armo[rial Ensigns but owing to] the long residence of his Family in the said Island of Barbadoes he is at present unable [to prove his descent therefrom] and therefore requested the favor of his Grace's Warrant for our confirming to him and [his Descendants and to] the Descendants of his said father such Armorial Ensigns as may be proper to be borne by him [and them according to the] Laws of Arms. **And forasmuch** as the said Earl Marshal did by Warrant under [his hand and seal bear]ing date the twentieth day of February instant authorize and direct Us to confirm such [Armorial Ensigns accor]dingly. **Know Ye therefore** that We the said GARTER and CLARENCEUX in [pursuance of the Warrant] of the said Earl Marshal and by Virtue of the Letters Patent of our several Offices to each of Us [respectively granted un]der the Great Seal of Great Britain do by these Presents confirm and exemplify to the said [Francis Ford the Arms fo]llowing that is to say Per Pale Gules and Or two Bends Vair, on a Canton of the second a [Greyhound courant Sab]le and for the Crest on a Wreath of the Colours A Greyhound's Head sable, erased Gules, [muzzled Or as the same] are in the Margin hereof more plainly depicted to be borne and used for ever hereafter by him [the said Francis Ford E]sq[ui]re and his descendants and by the descendants of his said Father Francis Ford Esq[ui]r [with all due and] proper Differences according to the Laws of Arms without the Let or Interruption of any [Person or Persons whats]oever. **In Witness** whereof We the said GARTER and CLARENCEUX [Kings of Arms have to] these Presents subscribed our Names and Affixed the Seals of our several Offices [this . . . day of] February in the thirty third Year of the Reign of our sovereign Lord GEORGE the [Third by the Grace of G]OD King of Great Britain France and Ireland Defender of the Faith &c^a and in the [year of Our Lord One thou]sand seven hundred and ninety three.

Francis Foord, now in the Ship "Honor," Capt. Thomas Warren, Commander, bound for Barbados, now ill of a feavour whereof severall in our Ship have died, do this seventeenth day of March Anno. dom. 1680, make . . . this my last will. To my loving friends Mr. Rowland Holt and Mr. Joseph Hough, now on board our Ship, five pounds sterling a piece, also to my much honored and kinde Master Mr. Francis Bond in Barbados ten pounds, which said twenty pounds I request my cousin Mr. Robt. Rich to pay them with expedition which he may safely do, I having a letter from my uncle Robert Rich other two executors in England so to authorize him and ye remaining thirty pounds in full of said Legacy I give to my sister Ann Rich. If my mother be dead since my departure from England I do bequeath whatever my said mother has left me . . . by her will to my said sister Ann Rich. The following small debts to be first discharged. Mr. Patrick Jenkins' ex'ors £3 0s. 0d., Dr. Birch 10s. 0d., Thos. Allen, Shoemaker, for a pair of shoes, 5s. 0d., Andrew Harbin, cousin of Joseph Harbin, who appointed me to pay in London by letter, which losing is unpaid, £1 5s. 0d.; Capt. Warren £1 2s. 0d.; Capt. Warren for a cask of Brandy containing 8 ½ gallons at 2s. 6d., £1 1s. 3d.; Samuel Carpenter, owing him for a Campaigne Coat, which if his correspondent Mr. Moore expresses not to be paid I desire may be satisfied, £2 4s. 0d. Five pounds to said cousin Robert Rich, whom I request to accept of being my executor, as also eleven pounds more which he may justly apply on my account out of the estate of the said uncle Robt. Rich, decd., his man Abraham Walrond. In the presence of Thomas Warren, R. Holt, Joseph Hough.

Barbados. Mr. Thomas Warren and Mr. Rowland Holt personally appeared 14 April 1680 before his Excellency J. Atkins and made oath.

Legacies to Mr. Nath. Denham, Col. Joseph Salmon, Nath. White, Edw. Freeman, Benj. Bullard, Hon. Dudley Woodbridge, Esq., and his wife, Benj. Woodbridge (under 15), Margaret and Jane Willey, Sarah Willey (under 15), Mary Woodbridge (under 15), Dudley Woodbridge, jun^r (under 15). To my wife Margaret all my real estate for life and twenty-five negroes. The Hon. Dudley Woodbridge, Esq., and Capt. John Hooper executors; and the children of Capt. John Hooper and Capt. George Barrow, by their wives, the daughters of my brother Smithel Matson, to be residuary legatees. Witnessed by Tho^s Shawe, Tho^s Withers, Edw^d Freeman, at Barbados.

8 Oct., 1723. Administration granted to Edward Lascelles, administrator of the goods of Margt. Moore *alias* Matson, deceased, while living executrix [*sic*] and residuary legatee [*sic*] of the deceased, to the use of William Moore her husband, now at Guernsey. (212, Richmond.)

Sam. Forte of St John's B., in his will proved 13 Jan. 1713 names a dau. Ursula, wife of John Ford.

Barbados. Francis Ford, of the parish of Christ Church in the island aforesaid, Esquire. Will dated 26 Oct. 1748. Unto my dear and honoured mother Eleanor Ford, widow, during her natural life my Below Rock Plantation, lands, buildings, slaves, stock, etc., to be held by her during her life in the same manner she has done in my lifetime. Unto my dear and well beloved wife Helena Ford everything that she had a right to before our intermarriage, with the crop standing and growing on her land, to be disposed of by her as she thinks proper. As I have settled an annuity upon her by way of jointure and in lieu of her dower or thirds, I do as a mark of my great esteem and regard for her give her the sum of One hundred pounds to buy her mourning and a piece of plate. All the residue and remainder of my estate real and personal I give and devise unto my well beloved son Francis Ford, Esquire, his heirs and assigns for ever, and I appoint him sole executor. In the presence of Jno. Lyte, Grant Elcock, William Duke.

Barbados, 7 Jan. 1764. William Duke appeared and swore as to the due execution of the above will.

Will of Samuel Osborne, of St. Michael in Barbados, Esquire, dated 11 Oct. 1756. I bequeath to my wife Elizabeth for life all my real and personal estate, and after her death the same to her lawful issue; in default of issue she shall bequeath the same to our most deserving relatives. My said wife to be executrix. Signed Sam. Osborne, and witnessed by Philip Gibbes, John Hothersall, William Duke.

6 Sept. 1773. Commission issued to Philip Gibbes, Esq^r, one of the testamentary guardians appointed to Frances, Martha, Ann and Elizabeth Ford, spinsters, minors, the children of Elizabeth Ford, formerly Osborne (wife of Francis Ford), deceased, the said Elizabeth dying before proving the said will. (368, Stevens.)

Francis Ford, Esquire, of the parish of St. Michael in the island above named. Will dated 29 April 1772. To my mother-in-law Thomazin Ford £25 and also "her living in my dwelling house on my plantation called the Ridge." To each of my daughters Martha Ford, Ann Ford and Elizabeth Ford, £10,000, together with certain slaves (named), to be paid at their ages of 18 or on prior marriage. I give unto Miss Damaris Carter £30 per annum for life. To my esteemed friend Miss Esther Margaret Bordes, £50. To Samuel Padmore, junior, son of my manager Samuel Padmore at Lear's Plantation, £100. To Frances Baker,

daughter of Alice Baker, late of Barbadoes, deceased, £18 per annum, and maintenance for life at my plantation called Lear's, so long as she shall live single. To Elizabeth Millward of the parish of Christ Church, widow, £12 per annum. It is my will that Frederick, the son of the above-named Elizabeth Millward, shall during his minority be decently maintained at the expence of my estate, and that he be put to school at proper age and have a classical education if his genius will take it; I desire that he be bound apprentice to some genteel profession at 16 years of age, and I give him £1000 at his age of 21. Manu-mission of certain slaves (named) and provision made for their maintenance. All the residue and remainder of my estate, real and personal, I give unto my son Francis Ford at 21 years. But in case my said son shall die under age without male issue, I will that my plantations be divided in manner following: to my daughter Martha and her heirs my plantations in this island, one called Bentley's, another called the Ridge, and the other called the Below Rock; to my daughter Ann and her heirs my two plantations called Lear's and the other called the Bay; to my daughter Elizabeth my two other plantations called Carrington's and Pickering's. But if my son leave female issue, then I give to each daughter of my said son £10,000 at her age of 18 or day of marriage. Whereas by indenture of lease dated 11 July 1771, between Alexander Sandiford, Esq^r, and myself, I have let for a term of years to him my Bay Plantation before mentioned, and have covenanted to accept the sum of £13,500 as a full consideration for the said estate, now in case the said plantation should be sold and my son die under age leaving no male issue, I give the said sum of £13,500 to my daughter Ann. I do also give my daughters their residence in my dwelling house on my plantation called Lear's, each to have the sole use of a chamber to herself. Each of my executors the sum of £50. I nominate my friends John Hothersall, Philip Gibbes and John Brathwaite of the Kingdom of Great Britain, Esquires, and Thomas Hothersall and Grant Ellecock of this island, Esquires, executors and guardians of my children. And I also appoint my son Francis Ford, when he shall attain the age of 21, executor of my will and guardian of my daughters. In the presence of John Gibbes, W^m Daley, William Bayley.

BORN AT KINGSTON IN JAMAICA ON THE 24TH OF AUGUST 1754,
AT WHICH TIME HIS FATHER ADMIRAL SIR CHARLES KNOWLES BART.
WAS GOVERNOR OF THAT ISLAND.
DIED IN LONDON, ON THE 28TH OF NOVEMBER 1831.
THIS BRAVE OFFICER FOUGHT AND BLED IN DEFENCE OF HIS COUNTRY
IN SEVERAL PARTS OF THE GLOBE,
RECEIVED THE THANKS OF THE LEGISLATURE FOR HIS SERVICES,
AND FROM HIS SOVEREIGN, HONORARY DISTINCTIONS.

Below is a Crest: *An elephant over a knight's helmet.* On the dexter shield is a single coat: *Azure, a cross-moline voided Or* [KNOWLES], with the motto *TRIA JUNCTA IN UNO* around the shield. On the sinister shield, *KNOWLES*, impaling: *Argent, a saltire Sable, on a chief Gules three cushions Or* [JOHNSTONE]. Supporters: On each side a sailor holding a flag. Motto.—*SEMPER PARATUS.*

1831, Nov. 28. Aged 77, Sir Charles Henry Knowles, the second Baronet, of Lovel-Hill, Berks (1765), Admiral of the Red, and G.C.B.

Sir Charles Henry was b. in Jamaica, Aug. 24, 1754, the only son of Admiral Sir Charles Knowles, then Governor of that colony, and afterwards successively President of the Admiralty to Catherine Empress of Russia, and Rear-Admiral of Great Britain. He matriculated at Glasgow in 1768.

His mother was Maria-Magdalena-Theresa Bouquet, a lady of an old Lorraine family, who was his father's second wife. By his first wife Mary, dau.† of Sir John Gay Alleyne, Bart. Sir Charles Knowles had one son, who was a Captain R.N., and perished in a storm at sea, etc. Long notice follows. ("G.M." for 1831, part ii., 564.)

The remains of Adm. Sir C. H. Knowles were interred, in pursuance of his will, in the church of St. Nicolas, Guildford; in which church is a monument to his father's first wife, which was accidentally overlooked by the authors of the

IN THE SAME VAULT ARE INTERRED THE MORTAL REMAINS OF
JOHN BRATHWAITE, THE INFANT SON AND ONLY CHILD OF JOHN ASHLEY AND
[SUSAN WARRE,
WHO DIED ON THE 2^D OF FEBRUARY 1821, AGED ONE YEAR AND THREE WEEKS.

In St. Michael's Church, Barbados, is a tablet to the above J. Brathwaite, which was erected by the Legislature. He was born 25 Oct. 1722 in the Island, and was of Three Rivers in St. Philip's.

Poyer states (p. 656) that the Assembly appointed a committee to erect a monument to his memory at the public expense (presumably at Bridgetown).

1800, Sep. 21. At Epsom, Surrey, aged 78, John Brathwaite, esq. many years agent for the island of Barbados. ("G.M.," 910.)

1820, July 4. At Epsom, aged 23, Susan, wife of John Ashley Warre, esq. (*Ibid.*, 93.)

Beneath this stone* is placed the remains of SOPHIA MAGDALENA BAYLY wife of NATHANIEL BAYLY Esq. of the Island of Jamaica, who departed this life Thursday the 17th January 1788, in the 36th year of her age. (Manning and Bray, ii.)

1777, Ap. 9. The lady of Nathaniel Bayly, Esq; M.P. for Westbury, of a son, at their house at Whitehall. ("Town and Country Mag.," 222.)

1778, March 13. The lady of Nathaniel Bayley, Esq. member for Westbury, of a dau. at their house at Whitehall. (*Ibid.*, 166.)

1788, Jan. 17. At her lodgings in Norfolk Street, Strand, Mrs. Baily, wife of Nathaniel B. Esq. of Jamaica. ("G.M.," 85.) She must have been his second wife, as Eliz. was the first one.

1798, June 30. At Woodford, Essex, Job Mathew Raikes, Esq. of Alderman's-walk, Bishopsgate, to Miss Bayley, dau. of Nathanael B. Esq. of Bayley's-vale, Jamaica. (*Ibid.*, 625.)

M.I. to Nathaniel H. Bayly in "Genealogical Notes and Queries" and "D.N.B."

Zachary Bayly of Jamaica, Esq. Will dated 22 Sep. 1769. I did settle on the Hon. Mrs. Eliz. Bayly, wife of my brother Nath^l B., Esq., £600 a year dower. My 4 plantations in the parish of St Mary called Trinity Tryal, Bayly's Vale, Brimmer Hall, and Sundry Penns of 3000 acres to my said brother. My 2 other plantations called Nonsuch and Unity of 2000 acres in said parish to my nephew Bryan Edwards. Proved 4 June 1771 (241, Trevor). (See "Antigua," i., 235.)

There is a monument to him in St. Andrew's Church. He died 18 Dec. 1769, æt. 47. (M.I. in "G.M." for 1784, 733.)

Nathaniel Bayley was in 1759 M.P. for Abingdon, in 1766 of Lincoln's Inn Fields. His will was dated 17 Oct. 1798.

Zacchary Bayley of Westbury, co. Wilts, clothier. Will dated 11 Aug. 1702. My grandson Zacchary, son of my son Edmond B. My brother Edmond B., etc. Proved 2 Oct. 1704 (195, Ash).

John Bayly of Westbury, clothier. Will proved 1727 (180, Farrant).

Edmond Bayly of Westbury, gent. Will proved 1729 (30, Abbott).

Sacred to the memory of JOHN PARKER Esq. late of the City of London, merchant, and one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the Town of Port Royal in the Island of Jamaica. He departed this transitory life on the 14th of January 1798, in his 63^d year.

Also of JOHN PARKER, son of the above, who died 30 of May 1776, aged 2 years.

Also of GEORGE PARKER, son of the above, who died 1st of October 1788, aged 18 years. (Manning and Bray, ii.)

Archer (p. 120) gives the following M.I. in Kingston Churchyard to:—

Mr. Michael Parker, d. 9 Nov. 1779, aged 24.

Joseph Parker, Esq., d. 14 June 1783, aged 41.

George Parker, Esq., d. 23 Nov. 1850, aged 66.

* On 11 Aug. 1910 I searched the church and churchyard for this stone but could not find it. The church has been twice rebuilt, and the inscriptions on the numerous tombs in the churchyard are difficult to decipher without scrubbing and cleaning the slabs.

In the churchyard, to the east of the church. (Copied 11 Aug. 1910.) On a slab resting on six stone supports (one missing). The inscription was very difficult to decipher and it is doubtful :—

The Rev. Martin Madan was eldest son of Col. Martin Madan, M.P. (See *ante*, I., 27.) He matriculated from Christ Church, Oxford, 9 Feb. 1742-3, aged 17; B.A. 1746, barrister of the Inner Temple 1748. (Foster.)

"1790, May 2. At Epsom, after a short illness, aged 64, the Rev. Martin Madan, M.A. author of "Thelyphthora" of a late literal translation of Juvenal and Persius, and of several other publications. The writer of this article has had frequent opportunities of admiring his genius, of being improved by his learning, and of being exhilarated by his uncommonly agreeable conversation." ("G.M.," 478. See also the "D.N.B.")

He was buried on 8 May at Kensington (? Lysons' "Environs"), and by his will dated 4 April 1778 and proved 12 May 1790 (252, Bishop) left the lease of his plantation and all his slaves in St. Kitts to his wife Jane and sole ex'trix. She was second dau. of Sir Bernard Hale of King's Walden, co. Herts. "1791, June 15. At Epsom, Mrs. Madan, relict of the Rev. Martin M." ("G.M.," 588.) Her will was proved in 1791 (295, Bevor).*

Charles Laval Molineux of Christ Church, Nichola Town, I. of S^t Chr., Esq. Will dated 30 June 1748. My sister Eliz. Fahie £100 c. and to her sons John Davis F. and Richard F. £50 c. each at 21. My nephews John Davis M., Charles M. and Laval M., £50 c. each, and to each of the said Laval M.'s children £50 c. and to his eldest son Richard M. £30 a year until the age of 24. My niece Mary Daly, wife of Charles D., £50 c. My daughters-in-law Eliz.

Ottley, wife of the Hon. Wm. O., and Margaret Willett, spinster, £100 c. each. My granddau. Eliz. Ottley, dau. of the said Wm. and Eliz. O., £160 c. My nephew John, son of D^r Peter Curvilye of S^t Eustatia, £50 c. My niece Jane, wife of John Davis M., and my niece Ann M., wife of Laval M., £30 c. Rev. Charles Sheard Molineux, rector of Garboldisham, co. Norfolk, clerk. Will dated 17 June 1811. To be buried near Fanny. My brother Crisp Sheard Molineux. My sister Margaret Sheard M. residing with him in France. M^{rs} Molineux, late Jane Dowsing, spinster. Our son Charles John M., soon to be a Lieut. R.N., the money left him by my father. My dau. Cath. Clifton. My dau. Matilda. My s.-in-law the Rev. Chas. Clifton. My sister M^{rs} Stone. My brothers-in-l. Horace and Wm. Dowsing. Proved 4 Oct. 1811 (455, Crickitt).

1712, Aug. 25. Deposition of Richard Molineux, Clerk, aged 55 years or upwards at Mountserat. (Answer, etc., by Geo. French, p. 117.) This agrees with his age at matriculation.

Indenture dated in 1771. Charles Molineux of Montserrat, Esq. Richard M. is his eldest s. and h. by Mary M. his wife, deceased. (Montserrat Records, No. 1848.)

Mary dau. of John Stanley of Nevis, Esq., and wife of John Willett of S^t Chr., Esq., born 1 Feb. 1692, died 25 Nov. 1723. M.I. at S^t John's, Nevis. He may have been the J. W. whose will has been given *ante*, p. 336. Eliz. Willett mar. the Hon. Wm. Ottley at Trinity, Palmetto Point, on 25 Feb. 1735. Her father could not have been the John Willett who mar. Mary Stanley.

John Davis M., s. and h. 1761, was at Eton 1764-69.

Cecil Tho. Crisp M.-M., born 20 May 1846, died 17 April 1901. M.I. at Christ Church, Nichola Town.

Fred. Butler M.-M. died at 1 Cromwell Pl. 11 Nov. 1913 in his 81st year, buried at Hornden-on-the-Hill, co. Essex.

1823, July 10. Thomas Molyneux Montgomerie, Esq., B., of S^t Marylebone, and Marianne Robarts, Spr. Lic. (Par. Reg. of St. George's, Hanover Sq.)

FELONS FOR JAMAICA.

1661, Aug. In this month many prisoners that was saved from the gallow tree, was, by his Majesty, rather than hanged, soald to a merchant to be transplanted over to Jamaica, three score and twelve men and twenty-five women; but the men being in a barge towards Gravesend to take shipping, finding themselves strong enough to overcome the watermen, took away the oares, and conducted themselves on shore, but by the care of the sheriff and other his Majesty's officers, 62 was taken and clapt on shipboard. ("G.M.," 1852, pt. ii, p. 49.)

MORTALITY OF TROOPS IN THE W.I.*

THE NORTHUMBERLAND FUSILIERS.

"Since the Fifth had by that period suffered heavily in the West Indies and General Hamilton compared the mortality of the two regions (Flushing and the W. Indies) it will be useful to give the following return of the deaths of the Leeward Islands, part of the W. Indies, from March 1st 1796 to the end of the year 1799:—

About 187 men belonging to drafted regiments who were left in different general hospitals in July died in the subsequent months of 1796, and are not included in the above return.

The mortality in that year was most prevalent in St. Lucia and Grenada.

The 31st Regt. landed at St. Lucia 775 strong in May, by the latter end of October it had only 16 fit for duty, and by March 1797 had scarcely an officer or man left.

The 27th Regt. lost at Grenada from June 1796 to Feb. 1797 20 officers and 516 men.

The 57th lost at Grenada in the same period 13 officers and 605 men." ("British Regiments in War and Peace.")

STATE OF THE ARMY IN THE WEST INDIES IN 1792.

Jamaica. The first battalion of first or Royal regiment, 10th, 13th, 49th, and 62d regiments, Gardiner's new corps of light dragoons, and three companies of the royal artillery.

Barbadoes. The 4th battalion of the 60th regiment.

St. Vincent's. The 66th regiment.

Grenada. The 45th and 67th regiments, and the corps of black cavalry and pioneers, being the remains of the negroes who joined Lord Dunmore in the beginning of the American war in Virginia.

Dominica. The 15th regiment.

Antigua. Eight companies of the 48th regiment, and the same number of the 3d battalion of the 60th reg.

Montserrat. Two companies of the 48th regiment.

St. Christopher's. Nine companies of the 9th regiment.

Nevis. One company of the 9th regiment.

Tortola. Two companies 3d bat. of the 60th reg.

In all these islands are detachments of the royal artillery, amounting to five companies. ("Bath Chronicle" for June 28.)

West Indian Bookplates.

On 8 March 1912, Mr. W. E. Baillie of Bridgeport, Conn., U.S.A., wrote that he had for twenty years been interested in West Indian bookplates, that he had just returned from a visit to Jamaica, but had not been able to add to his collection during his tour in the W.I.

He then forwarded a list of his plates, and put me into communication with Mr. F. Cattle of Heanor, Derbyshire, who has a very large collection, more especially of Chippendale examples.

Mr. Cattle then obtained a list from Mr. Frank Marshall of Philadelphia, U.S.A.

I then examined the Franks Collection at the British Museum, and the various printed authorities, and with the assistance of Mr. Cattle, who from time to time supplied notes of many rare plates, the following list has been compiled. It is not, of course, complete, as without good pedigrees it is very difficult to identify anonymous plates, but I hope that additions may be supplied when the subject becomes better known.

The blazon may be occasionally faulty, but it is that of an amateur and not of an expert in heraldry.

His son, Dr. James Barter Makittrick Adair, died shortly before him.

Arms of Codrington, the fess Gules and a martlet for a difference, quartering Codrington of Wapley. Crest of Codrington.

37. (CODRINGTON). ANONYMOUS. Arm. (F., 6289.)

ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, *Argent, a fess Sable between three lions passant Gules, a crescent for a difference*; 2 and 3, CODRINGTON of Wapley.

Crest of Codrington, with wings Chequy Azure and Or.

MOTTO.—VERA VIRTUS IMMERSIBILIS.

Another plate "RICH^d CHUTE CODRINGTON, *Rex sc. Camb.*" has the above coats (F.C.), but it does not appear to belong to the Antiguan branch.

39. (DONOVAN). ANONYMOUS. (F., 8868.)

CREST.—*An eagle with wings expanded.*

ARMS.—*A dexter hand vested and cuffed, holding a sword palewise entwined with a serpent* [DONOVAN]; impaling: Quarterly, 1, *Azure, a fess Or, in chief two mullets of the last* [YATE]; 2, *Azure, a chevron between three annulets Or* [DOBYNS]; 3, *Gules, a chevron Argent between ten crosses pattée, six above, four below* [BERKELEY]; 4, *Gules, a stag's head cabossed* [BOX]. See several Dobyns-Yate plates and pedigree in Burke's "Landed Gentry," and Visitation of co. Gloucester 1682-3.

Richard Donovan of A., and of Tibberton Court, co. Gloucester, entered Gray's Inn 1790, mar. 1797 Caroline Eliz. Dobyns-Yate, and died at A. 1816. Nos. 8865 and 8867 have the above coat of Donovan.

40. "HIS EXCELLENCY WALTER DOUGLAS ESQ^r CAP^t. GENERAL AND CHIEF-GOVERNOR OF ALL THE LEEWARD-CARIBBEE-ISLANDS IN AMERICA; & VICE ADMIRAL OF THE SAME &C. IN THE YEAR 1711." Jac. arm. Supporters. (F., 8924.)

ARMS.—*Argent, a human heart proper crowned, on a chief Azure three mullets; impaling: Azure fretty Argent, a chief Or* [ST. LEGER]. Supporters, *A negro proper with feathers on his head, a cloth around the loins, and holding a bow in his dexter hand. A nude white man with cap on his head, his loins encircled with leaves, and a club in his sinister hand.*

CREST.—*An arm in armour embowed, holding a short sword.*

MOTTO.—SAPIENTIA ET VIRTUS.

In St. John's church-yard is a slab recording the death in 1713 of his infant son, "great grandson by Mother's side to Anthony St Leger of Ireland, who was twice Lord Leiu'," and with the above arms thereon. Governor Douglas was superseded 1714-15, and in 1716 sentenced to five years imprisonment and a fine of £500.

Son of the preceding, born 1780, Judge 1822, President of Columbia College 1829, died 1858. A second plate has "LL.D.," and a third one "Arm^r" added after Duer. (F.M.)

43. "WILL^m FRASER, M.D." Festoon arm. (F., 11,277.)

ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, *Azure, three cinquefoils; 2 and 3, Gules, three antique crowns.*

CREST.—*A stag's head erased* [FRASER of Pitcallain]. MOTTO.—JE SUIS PREST. Perhaps of A., born there 1753, M.D. Edin. 1775, d. 1807.

44. "NATHANIEL BOGLE FRENCH." (F., 11,383.)

ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, *Or, a chevron between two roses in chief and a ship in base* [BOGLE]; 2 and 3, *Sable, a bend between two dolphins embowed Argent* [FRENCH].

CRESTS.—1, *A rose; 2, A fleur-de-lis issuing from a crescent.*

Of Cedar Valley, later of Dulwich, born 1758, mar. 1782 Eliz. Skottowe, and died 1816. His father, James Bogle, mar. 1748 Eliz., dau. and heiress of Nath. French of A.

45. "WILLIAM NATHANIEL FRENCH MDCCCLXVI." Printed label. (F., 11,394.)

Son of John French of Barbados (brother of Nath. French of A.), Lieut. in Deacons Musquetiers, mar. Mary Arabella Nicholas of A., and died 1799.

46. "WILLIAM FURLONG." Pict. arm. trophy. 1815 water-mark in paper. (F., 11,486.)

Perhaps of A.

47. "NATH^l GILBERT ESQ^r." Jac. arm. about 1740.

ARMS.—*Gules, a leg in armour couped at the thigh, between two broken spears in pale Or.* CREST.—*An arm in armour grasping a spear.* (F.M.)

Born 1697, M. of C. 1750, and died 1761.

48. "ARCH^d GLOSTER." Chip. arm. These seem to be the arms of Devereux, Earl of Salisbury. (F., 12,029.)

ARMS.—*Paly vairé, Argent and Azure, on a chief Or a lion passant Sable.*

MOTTO.—LEVIUS FIT PATIENTIA.

A surgeon, mar. 1759 Russell Hawes, and died 1773, leaving a son of the same names, bap. 1762, Attorney-General of Trinidad and Chief Justice of Dominica, mar. 1785 Eliz. Jarvis, and died 1825.

49. "JAMES GORDON, ESQ^r MOOR-PLACE." Arm. (F., 12,274. Illustrated in A., ii., 22.)

ARMS.—*Azure, three boars' heads coupes, on a fess chequy Argent and Azure a lion passant.* CREST.—*A stag's head coupes.*

James Brebner, on succeeding in 1768 to the estates of his uncle James Gordon, Chief Justice of St. Kitts 1735-41, M. of C. of A., and of Moor Place, co. Herts, took the name of Gordon. He was M. of C. of A. 1761, Chief Justice of the Ceded Islands 1767, and died in 1807, aged 83.

50. (GUNTHORPE). ? ANONYMOUS. Arm. (DR. ATHILL-CRUTTWELL.)

ARMS.—*Gules, a bordure and bend gobonated, Argent and Azure, on the bend between two lions' heads erased of the second three leopards' faces Or.*

CREST.—*A lion's head erased and collared.*

51. "JOHN DELAP HALLIDAY ESQ^r." Arm. spade shield. (F. 13,381.)

ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, *Argent, a sword paleways, the pomel within a crescent in base, a chief Ermine, a canton Azure, charged with a cross of St. Andrew of the 1st* [HALLIDAY of Annandale]; 2 and 3, *Argent, an eagle displayed Sable* [DELAP], impaling Quarterly, 1 and 4, *Sable, a fret Argent* [TOLLEMACHE, but the tinctures reversed]; 2 and 3, *Azure, a crown between three mullets within a double tressure flory counter-flory* [MURRAY].

Born 1749, mar. 1771 Lady Jane Tollemache, and died 1794.

52. "FRANCIS DELAP HALLIDAY." Festoon arm. (F., 13,379.)

CREST.—*A boar's head coupes.*

ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4 [HALLIDAY]; 2 and 3 [DELAP], *a crescent for a difference.* MOTTO.—*VIRTUTE PARTA.*

Younger brother of John, born 1758, died 1794.

53. "FRANCIS E. HALLIDAY." Arm. (F., 13,380.)

ARMS of Halliday quartering Delap.

Crest and Motto as above.

54. "SAMUEL HARMAN." Arm. (F., 13,816. Illustrated in A., ii., 62.)

ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, *Azure, a chevron between six rams accosted counter-trippant, 2, 2, and 2, Argent, attired Or* [HARMAN]; 2 and 3, *Per pale Or and Azure, a fess counterchanged* [CUSACK].

CREST.—*A demi-man proper, crowned with an Eastern coronet Or, chained around the waist, and holding the end of the chain in the sinister hand of the last, the dexter hand holding a withered tree torn up by the roots proper.*

MOTTO.—*FIDELITER.*

Son of Sam. Harman by Mary, dau. and heiress of Dr. Patrick Cusack. Born 1764, mar. 1786 Mary Ann Athill, and died 1816.

55. "W^m HEYSHAM ESQ^r GREENWICH IN KENT." Early Jac. arm. (F., 14,660, two states J.M. Illustrated in Howard's "Misc. Gen. et Her.," New Series, iv., 375.)

ARMS.—*Argent, an anchor, on a chief Gules three bezants.*

CREST.—*On a mount vert a stag courant, its throat transfixed by an arrow, dropping blood.*

Born 1691, M.P., mar. 1719 Sarah Perry of A., and died 1727.

56. "JAMES M. HILHOUSE (*Burnell sc.*)" Chip. arm. (F., 14,727.) Engraved about 1840 (Fincham).

ARMS.—*Argent, a chevron between in chief two mullets, and in base a human heart, all Gules, penetrated by six arrows, a crescent for a difference.*

CREST.—*An arm in armour embowed, holding a dart bendwise.*

James Martin Hilhouse. This family was of Bristol and A. Emma, wife of Martin Hilhouse, died 1840. James Hilhouse of Bristol, merchant, will p. 1754 (15, Pinfold).

57. "GEO. FAHIE HORSFORD" by *W. Gingell of Bath* (Fincham).

58. "ROBERT MARSH HORSFORD. *Gingell sc. Bath.*" Arm. with mantling. (F., 15,393.) Engraved about 1820 (Fincham).

ARMS.—*Azure, on a chevron ermine three eagles' heads erased Sable, between three swords erect, a martlet charged with a label for a difference* (as first son of the fourth house Horsford), impaling: *Quarterly, 1 and 4, Argent, two battle-axes in saltire Sable [MADDISON]; 2 and 3, Argent, on a chevron Sable, between three martlets of the second, a mullet pierced Or [MARLEY].*

CREST.—*Over an esquire's helmet: Issuant from a mural coronet gules a demipegasus with wings addorsed Ermine, gorged with a collar gemel, also Gules, and holding between the paws a tilting-spear erect.* MOTTO.—*JUSTITIA ET CLEMENTIA.* (Illustrated in A., iii., 429.)

Born 1798, K.C.B. 1841, Chief Justice of the Leeward Islands, etc., mar. 1, in 1826, Mary Furlong, and 2, in 1830, Eliz. Maria Maddison, and died 1875.

59. (HUTCHESON). ANONYMOUS. Early arm. The large plate occurs as a frontispiece to a collection of treatises relating to National Debts and Funds 1717-19, by Archibald Hutcheson of the Middle Temple, London, Esq., and M.P. for Hastings. London, 1721. It occurs in a copy presented by him to the Speaker, Arthur Onslow. (F., 15,832 and 15,833.)

ARMS.—*Gules, three arrows, points upward, Or, the middle one in pale, the other two in bend dexter and sinister; on a chief purple a boar's head erased Or.*

NO CREST. MOTTO.—*CONTRA PATRIE INIMICOS.*

He was a native of co. Antrim, Ireland, but apparently of Scotch descent, born 1661, Attorney-General of the Leeward Islands 1688, M.P. Hastings 1713-1727, Commissioner of Trade and Plantations, friend of the Duke of Ormond; mar. 1, Mary Smith, who died 1698; 2, Rebecca; and 3, Eliz., and died 1740. Will (227, Browne). Attached to a paper of 1692 is his seal with the above arms. (B.T., Leeward Islands, vol. v., P.R.O.)

60. "THOMAS JARVIS." Arm.

ARMS.—*Sable, on a chevron engrailed between three doves Argent as many mullets pierced of the first; on a chief of the second a fleur-de-lis between two escallops of the field.*

CREST.—*A unicorn's head erased, gorged with a collar charged with three annulets.* MOTTO.—*ALL FOR THE BEST.* (Illustrated in A., ii., 98.)

Of Mount Jarvis, died 1877, aged 42. Tomb on his estate.

61. "GEORGE RALPH PAYNE JARVIS." Arm. (F., 16,328.)

Arms of Jarvis (but with cinquefoils instead of mullets) impaling: 1, *Paly of six Argent and Azure, on a chief Gules a lion passant guardant Or, all within a bordure Ermine [BLACKWELL]; 2, Azure, a chevron between three crosses-crosslet fitchée Or, within a bordure engrailed of the last [STURGES].*

Crest as before, but collar charged with cinquefoils. (Illustrated in A., iii., 432.)

Born 1774, mar. 1, in 1802, Philadelphia Blackwell; 2, in 1830, Frances Sturges, and died 1851.

62. "C. M. G. JARVIS." Pict. arm. (F., 16,325.)

Crest and single coat of Jarvis.

Rev. Chas. Macquarie Geo. Jarvis, second son of the above G. R. P. Jarvis.

63. "E. G. JARVIS." Crest. (F., 16,326.)

Edwin Geo. Jarvis, fifth son of the above G. R. P. Jarvis.

64. "GODSCHALL JOHNSON." Festoon arm. (F., 16,533.)

ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, *Argent, a saltire Sable, on a chief Gules two wool-packs Argent* [JOHNSON]; 2, *Gules, a bend engrailed Or between six cinquefoils* [WARNER]; 3, *Gules, three catherine wheels within a border engrailed Argent* [SCOTT of Barbados]. CREST.—*A castle.*

Of Putney Hill, son of John Johnson by Eliz. Anne, second dau. and coheirress of Col. Edw. Warner of A. Born later than 1740, mar. 1, Eliz. Hodges, and 2, in 1792, Mary Francis, and died 1800. His plantations in A. were inherited by his eldest son and heir of the same names.

65. "ROBERT GODSCHALL JOHNSON." Festoon, arms quarterly, branches from upper angles of shield. (E.L.J., xv., 155.)

66. "LADY DAVY." Arm. lozenge. (F., 8164.)

ARMS.—*Sable, a chevron engrailed Erminois between two annulets in chief, and in base a flame encompassed by a chain. Also the badge of Ulster (DAVY); on an inescutcheon, Gules, on a chevron three mullets between a fleur-de-lis in chief, and in base a dove* [KERR]. Granted to Kerr of Northampton in 1787 (Burke's "Armory").

Jane, dau. and coheirress of Chas. Kerr of A., mar. 1, in 1799, Dr. Shukbrugh Ashby Apreece; 2, in 1812, Sir Humphry Davy, created a Baronet 1818, and died 1855.

67. "KERR." Arm. wreath.

ARMS.—*Gules, on a chevron three mullets Argent between a fleur-de-lis in chief and a dove in base* [KERR of Northampton, granted 1787]; impaling: *Or, on a fess dancettée Azure three estoiles, on a canton of the second the sun in splendour* [THOMPSON].

CREST.—*A stag's head erased.* MOTTO.—*DEUS SOLAMEN.*

Another similar plate has no name. (F.C.)

68. "MATTHEW KIRWAN." Arm. spade shield. (F., 17,265.)

ARMS.—*Argent, a chevron between three choughs proper.*

CREST.—*A chough.* MOTTO.—*FIDELIS AD MORTEM.*

Younger son of John Kirwan of Lime Street, W.I. merchant, and of A., who died 1799. He was of London in 1816.

69. (LANGFORD-BROOKE). ANONYMOUS. Arm.

ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, *Or, a cross engrailed per pale Sable and Gules (rightly Gules and Sable)* [BROOKE]; 2 and 3, *Azure (rightly Gules), a shoveller close Argent* [LANGFORD]; impaling: *Argent, two bars Gules, on a canton of the second a cross of the field* [BROUGHTON].

CREST.—*A badger.* MOTTO.—*VIS UNITA FORTIOR.*

Thomas Langford-Brooke of Mere Hall, Cheshire, mar. 1790 Maria Broughton, and died 1815, aged 46. I found the above plate among the papers of my great grandmother, a sister of Thomas Langford-Brooke, but it may not have been strictly a bookplate.

70. "LILLIAN LANGFORD-BROOKE. Mere. Vis unita fortior."

House and garden as a vignette surrounded by a border of arum lilies. Modern plate. (Illustrated in E.L.J., xiii., 125.)

71. "JAMES LAROCHE, JUN^r Esq^r. *Milton F.*" Chip. (E.L.J., xviii., 47. Not in Fincham.)

James Laroche, Sen., an alderman and merchant of Bristol, died 1770. His nephew the above, born 1734, mar. 1764 Eliz. Rachel Anne, dau. and heiress of John Yeamans of A., was created a Baronet 1776, and died s.p. about 1805.

72. "JACOB LEROUX ESQUIRE." Festoon arm. printed in sepia. (F., 18,164.) Plate about 1770-80. (F.C.)

ARMS.—*Azure, a chevron Argent between three leopards' faces cabossed Or.*
CREST.—*A lamb, supporting with its left leg a spear and pennon.*

MOTTO.—FORTITUDINE SED LENITATE.

Jacob Leroux of A. mar. 1707 Sarah Child, and the above may have been a descendant. Buried at St. Paul's, Covent Garden. "1799, May 2, Jacob Leroux, Esq. From St Pancras. Aged 61 years."

73. "WILLIAM LINDSEY, ANTIGUA." Arm. spade shield. (F., 18,353.)

ARMS.—*Gules, a fess chequy Argent and Azure between three stars of the second.*

CREST.—*A withered branch of oak.* MOTTO.—MORTUA VIVESCUNT.

W. Lindsey of A. died 1743, and his grandson Rev. W. Lindsey, bap. 1753, died 1812.

74. "TOBIAS LISLE." Jac. arm. (F., 18,370.)

ARMS.—*Ermine, a lion rampant Gules.*

Geoffrey Lyons of River Lyons, King's Co., eldest brother of Henry Lyons of A., mar. Jane, dau. of John Moore by Ellen, dau. of Dudley Colley, and died before 1714, leaving an only son, Colley Lyons, M.P., LL.D., who died about 1741.

ARMS.—*Gules, a chevron between three crescents Argent.*

CREST.—*A dexter hand grasping a falchion.*

MOTTO.—PUGNA PRO PATRIA LIBERTA. (Allen, 557. Illustrated by F.C. in E.L.J., xviii., 84.)

Born 1699, M. of C. of A. 1735-9, President 1746-50, M. of C. of New York 1759-62, mar. 1, before 1726, Mrs. Chester; 2, in 1735, Mary Yeamans, and died at Rockaway, Long Island, 1778.

78. "SAMUEL MARTIN." Chip. arm. (W.E.B.)

Col. S. Martin of A., elder brother of Josiah, died 1776, aged 83. His eldest son Sam., born 1714, M.P., died 1788 bachelor. (*Ante*, II., 298.) The plate may have been used by either. In the Ponsonby Collection Mr. F. C. and I saw this plate of the single coat of Martin with SAMUEL stopped out and WILLIAM written in ink.

79. (MARTIN). ANONYMOUS. Chip. arm.

Single coat and crest (a cubit arm instead of an arm in armour) of Martin.

MOTTO above: PRO PATRIA, and written signature of "Josiah Martin," the last plate with name of Samuel Martin cut off. (Illustrated in E.L.J., xviii., 84, by F.C.)

Nephew and son-in-law of the preceding, Lieut.-Colonel 68th Regt., M. of C. of A. 1766, Governor of N. Carolina 1770-5, and died in London 1786.

Crest and single arms of Martin. MOTTO over crest.—PRO PATRIA. (F.M.)

Wm. Thos. Martin, M.D. Cam., third son of Sam. Martin of Green Castle, A., died about 1735, leaving an only son, the above Wm., born 1733 in London, mar. 1762 Eliz. Galpine, emigrated to Boston 1783, and died 1814. (A., iii., 440.)

82. "THOMAS BYAM MARTIN." Arm. (F., 19,873.)

Arms of Martin; *anchor at centre of chevron, a mullet for difference.*

Another plate with Supporters. (F., 19,874.)

Two anchors on the chevron. Supporters: An eagle gorged with a coronet and a sea horse gorged with a coronet. Two mottoes.

Younger brother of the 2nd Bart., born 1773, K.C.B. 1815, G.C.B. 1830, Admiral of the Fleet 1849, mar. Cath. Fanshawe, and died 1854. (D.N.B.)

83. "JOSIAH MARTIN." Plain arm. shield.

Single coat of Martin, with the addition of an anchor at centre point of chevron, and a crescent as second son of Sir Henry Martin, the 1st Bart.

MOTTOES.—Above, PRO PATRIA; below, AUXILIO AB ALTO. (Illustrated in E.L.J., xviii., 83, by F.C.)

Born 1772, collector of customs at A., and died 1849.

84. "SIR HENRY W. MARTIN BART." Wreath and ribbon arm. (F., 19,851.)

ARMS.—*Gules, on a chevron Argent an anchor between three crescents. Badge of Ulster.*

CREST.—*A hand, coupéd, holding a falchion.*

MOTTOES.—Above, PRO PATRIA; below, AUXILIO AB ALTO.

Born 1768, succeeded as 2nd Bart. 1794, and died 1842.

85. "HENRY BYAM MARTIN." Crest in a garter. (F., 19,850.)

Crest of Martin. MOTTO.—PRO PATRIA.

Admiral and K.C.B., younger brother of Sir Wm. Fanshawe Martin, 4th Bart., and died 1865.

CREST.—*An eagle with wings expanded.* MOTTO.—REVIRESCO.

Wm. Maxwell, Sen., was of A. and Carriden, co. Linlithgow, and died about 1768.

91. "VALENTINE MORRIS." Arm. Noted in pencil "abt. 1760," but it is lithographic so must be later than 1798. (F., 21,160. Illustrated *ante*, I., 49.)

ARMS.—*Sable, a lion rampant between three scaling ladders Or* [MORRIS]; impaling, *Or, on a chevron three horseshoes of the first, on a chief Gules three fleurs-de-lis of the second* [WATKINS].

Two states (J.M.), of which the earlier has John Ogilvy, Esq^r, of Innercarity (F.C.) (22,218.)

Succeeded 1743 as 5th Bart., mar. 1754 Charlotte, dau. and heiress of Dr. Walter Tullideph, was M. of C. of A. 1782, and died 1802.

Perhaps a merchant of A. of Scotch descent, who died 1793, aged 63.

116. "JAMES BOGLE SMITH." Arm. Arms, Smith impaling Massey (?) (F., 27,280.)

ARMS.—*Ermine, three torteaux, impaling five quarterings.*

CREST.—*Out of a coronet a plume of five ostrich feathers.*

MOTTO.—SUUM CUIQUE.

Son of John Smith, a W.I. merchant, by Rebecca Bogle-French of A., born 1788, mar. 1, before 1829, Mary Ann Shawe, and 2, before 1859, Mary Stewart, and died about 1875.

117. "REV^D ROWLAND SMITH." Crest. (F., 27,370.)

Crest and Motto as above.

Brother of James, born 1807, Rector of Swyncombe, co. Oxon, living 1889.

118. "ADRIAN JOHN SWETE." Chip. arm. (F., 28,646.)

ARMS.—*Gules, two chevrons between two mullets in chief and a rose in base, seeded Or.*

CREST.—*A mullet Or, pierced Azure, between two gillyflowers proper.* (Illustrated in A., iii., 452.)

Only child of Main Swete of A. and Modbury, co. Devon, born 1731, M.A. Oxon 1751, d. bach. 1756. Nos. 28,647 and 8 belong to his descendants.

119. "SYDSERF OF RUCHLAW." Jac. arm. (F., 28,700.)

ARMS.—*Argent, three fleurs-de-lis Azure.*

CREST.—*An eagle's head coupéd.* MOTTO above.—*VIRTUTE PROMOVEO.*
 Dr. Walter Sydserf of A., son of John Sydserf of Dunbar and grandson of Alex. Sydserf of Ruchlaw, co. Haddington, was born 1692 and died 1760.

120. "JOHN SYDSERFF OF RUCHLAW." Arm. (18)24 water-mark in paper. (F., 28,701.)

Arms and Crest as above, eagle erased and "M" below.

ARMS.—*Per bend Argent and Or three dexter hands coupéd Gules, impaling: Argent, three lions rampant, a chief Azure.*

CREST.—*A man's head bearded, affrontée erased.* MOTTO.—*LOYAL AU MORT.*
 Of Flixton Hall, co. Suffolk, mar. 1783 Lydia, dau. of Sir Wm. Thomas, 2nd Bart.

124. "CHARLES CLEMENT TUDWAY." Arm. (F., 29,930.)

CREST.—*A demi-lion rampant, coupéd Gules, in dexter paw a rose slipped.*

ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, *Ermine, a lion rampant Gules between three roses Azure*; 2 and 3, *Vert, a chevron between three bucks trippant Ermine*, impaling: Nelson. MOTTO.—*NIL DESPERANDUM.*

Of Wells, co. Somerset, born 1846 and mar. 1, in 1870, Lady Edith Nelson, who died 1877.

125. "DAVID TULLIDEPH. F. Gardner Sculp." Jac. piet. arm. (F., 29,947.)
 Engraved about 1730. (Fincham.)

ARMS.—*Argent, a stag couchant between in chief two mullets of six points, and in base a crescent.*

CREST.—*A stag's head erased Argent.* MOTTO.—*NON OMNIBUS DORMIO.*

Of Wisbeach, formerly of A., merchant, born 1705, died 1772. See notice of his brother, Dr. Walter T., No. 94. Another brother, Thos., Principal of St. Andrews, died 1777.

126. "H. WALROND." Arm. (F., 30,762.) Above is an earl's coronet.

ARMS.—*Argent, three bulls' heads cabossed, impaling: Ermine, a lion rampant Azure, on a chief Sable a leopard's face between two crosses-crosslet fitchée* [CLARK].

Supporters.—*Two heraldic tigers rampant pelleté gorged with a ducal coronet and chained.* MOTTO.—*BIENFAITZ PAYERAY MAFAITZ VANGERAY.*

Henry W. of Dulford, co. Devon, born 1841, mar. 1861 Caroline Maud Clark. His ancestors were first of Barbados, later of A. His father claimed the Barony of Welles.

Born 1839, succeeded 1854 as 7th Bart., and died 1887.

Lieut.-Gen. Francis Leighton of Bantsley, co. Montgomery, mar. 1746 Renea, born 1712, dau. of Chas. Pinfold, LL.D.

228. "FRANCIS REYNOLDS ESQ^r." Chip. arm. (F., 24,856.)

ARMS.—*Sable, a chevron Argent between three does' heads couped.*

CREST.—*A doe's head erased.*

229. "JOHN RICE Esq^r OF BARBADOS 1768" Chip. A very rare plate, not in Allen nor Hamilton. (J.M.)

Born 1715, of Little Bursted, co. Essex, and died in 1763, leaving a son John, born 1739, of Queen's Coll., Oxf., 1756.

236. "WILLIAM SPRY. *W. Smith, sculp*" (of U.S.A.). Chip. arm. (Allen, 817.) Pict. Chip. and engraved about 1770. (Fincham.)

ARMS.—*Argent, two bars and a chevron in chief Or, a crescent for a difference.*

CREST.—*A dove standing on a serpent.*

Governor of B. 1767 and died 1772. (W.E.B.) Probably of the Cornish family, but he is not in the pedigree. In his will he only names his wife Cath. and his two sisters, Jane and Mary Spry.

There are two states of this plate. The earlier has "W^m Spry" written in ink, and the later has the Crest reworked and the name engraved. On 19 Dec. 1912 Mr. Cattle and I saw a Chip. pict. plate in the Ponsonby Collection with "Horatio Spry" written in ink. Horatio, born 1730, Lieut.-Gen. 1801, died 1811. Mrs. Kath. Tunckes, widow, sister of John Pare, by her will, dated 1777, demised her plantation of 319 acres in B., called Waterford *alias* Forestalles *alias* Tunckes, to her niece Mrs. Rachel Warner of Antigua.

240. "JOHN WILSON. BARBADOS" Pict. arm. (F., 32,098; Allen, 947.)

ARMS.—*Per pale Argent and Azure, three lions' gambes erased, counterchanged.*

CREST.—*A griffin passant.* W.I. seascape.

"PETER WILSON." Festoon arm. (F., 32,120.) Arms as in preceding.

241. "DUDLEIUS WOODBRIDGE ANGLUS AMERICANUS 17(40)." Jac. arm. (J.M.) (Illustrated in E.L.J., xiv., 123, 137; not in F., Allen nor Hamilton.)

ARMS.—*Argent, on a bend Gules three chaplets of roses proper.*

CREST.—*A chaplet of roses proper.* MOTTO.—*VIRTUS SE CORONAT.*

Dudley Woodbridge, Director General of the R. Assiento Co. in B., Judge Advocate and Agent of the South Sea Co., died 11 Feb. 1720 (Hist. Regr., 9). His portrait in mezzotint by Smith, after Kneller, was published in 1718 (Maggs Bros.) See "D.N.B." The Rev. Dudley W., probably his son, Rector of St. Philip's in B., made his will in 1747, and proved 1750 (65, Greenly). His first wife died 1747, and he then mar. Ruth, dau. of Mrs. Susannah Haggatt.

MOTTO.—MUTARE SPERNO. Pendent are two badges.

John Henry Lefroy, born 1817, entered the R.A. 1834, Governor of B. 1871—77, K.C.M.G. 1877, Governor of Tasmania 1880-1, mar. 1st . . . Robinson; 2ndly, . . . Dundas, and died 1890 ("D.N.B."). Author of a History of B., two vols., 1877, of which I have a copy with his bookplate.

246. "WILLIAM LUMLEY. Suffield sculpt." Arm. (F., 18,906.) Engraved about 1810. (Fincham.)

ARMS.—*Argent, a fess Gules between three parrots.*

CREST.—*A pelican with wings expanded in her nest feeding three young.*

Of a Bristol family, Attorney-General of J., and died 1767.

361. "GILBERT FORD ESQ^R LINCOLNS INN" Chip. arm. A different plate from the last. The same coat and crest, but a crescent for a difference.

Arms of F. with F. on an inescutcheon, a crescent charged with a label for a difference as eldest son of the second house. Both plates probably belonged to the same man. This coat was granted in 1760 to Jacob, who was second son of Moses F. of Leghorn.

Jacob and his elder brother Abraham were co-partners, and built themselves adjoining houses in Fenchurch Street. The former mar. his niece Simba, and died in 1777. The marks of cadency are puzzling, as they differ.

368. "RAPHAEL FRANCO, ESQ^R" F. 11,204 with inscription altered. (F., 11,207.)

He was also a merchant of Fenchurch Street, and second son of Jacob and Simba, mar. 1761 Leah D'Aguiar, and died 1781. Three of his sons settled in J., and one of them, Abraham, was father of Sir Ralph Lopes, 2nd Bart.

369. "MOSES FRANCO, ESQ^R" Chip. arm. (F., 11,206.)

Arms as in F. 11,204, but a crescent charged with a label for a difference.

He may have been the eldest son of Jacob and Simba, who died v.p. in 1774. Jacob also had a cousin Moses.

370. "E. FRANCO" Festoon. (J.M.)

Probably Ephraim Franco of London, who was a son of Raphael and Leah, and ex'or 1808 to the will of his brother Joseph of J.

371. "JOHN PHILIP FUHR 1741. *J. Skin. Sculp^t.*" Chip. arm. (F., 11,464.)

ARMS.—FUHR (*the field Argent*) impaling, *Or, two wings conjoined in lure.*

CREST.—*A demi-bear coupéd.*

ARMS.—*Or, on a chevron Sable between in chief three eagles displayed and in base a palm tree on a mound, five mullets of the field.*

Of London, merchant, in 1793 (*ante*, II., 331). The will of Chas. Fuhr of J. was proved in 1801.

CREST.—*A unicorn's head erased, collared, charged on the collar with three saltires.*

F. 11,586 is another state of the same plate, and has three griffins' heads on the fess in place of the lions' heads. (F.C.)

William Gale, M. for Hanover 1754, mar. Eliz. Morant, who died 1759, aged 31.

375. "CALBB JOHN GARBRAND" Chip. arm. (F., 11,633.)

Sixth son of Jos. Estridge of Carshalton Lodge, co. Surrey, born 1811, Lieut.-Col. Bombay Engineers, and died 1890.

Arms as in F. 9969.

Only child of John Estridge by Eliz. Parson his wife, born 1794, died 1868.

640. (FENTON). Anonymous. Chip. arm.

ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, *Gules, three chevrons Argent*; 2, *Sable, a chevron between three spear-heads Argent, embued at the points Gules*; 3, *Azure, a chevron between three crescents Argent.* These arms are painted on the tablet in Bath Abbey (only adding on an escutcheon of pretence, *Argent, a cross between four fleurs-de-dis Sable* for Fenton) in memory of Jane, wife of John Roberts, and only child of Wm. 648. "WILLIAM PAYNE GEORGES" Chip. arm. (F., 11,788.)

Chief Justice of St. Kitts 1780—1799, mar. Eliz. Payne, sister of Lord Lavington, and died about 1804. He had a son and grandson of the same names.

 CREST.—*A fleur-de-lys.* (F.C.)

652. "ISABELLA HAMILTON." Arm. shield on clouds. (F., 13,471.)
 ARMS.—Quarterly: 1 and 4, *Gules, three mullets pierced*; 2 and 3, *Argent, a ship [ARRAN].*

CREST.—*Out of a ducal coronet an oak tree penetrated transversely through trunk by a frame saw.* MOTTOES.—THROUGH. NEC TIMEO NEC SPERNO.

Dau. of 5th Earl of Buchan, mar. 1770 Wm. Leslie H. attorney-gen. of the Leeward I., who died 1780. Her portrait after Romney has been engraved.

653. "G. C. JULIUS" Arm. spade shield. (F., 16,771.)

CREST.—*A star.* MOTTO.—VIRTUTE ET INDUSTRIA FLORESCO.

Geo. Cha. Julius of the Old Palace, Richmond, M.D., mar. 1795 Isabella Maria, dau. of the Rev. Jonathan Gilder, and died 1866, aged 91. He had 1, Geo. Cha. Julius, and 2, Fred. Gilder Julius, born 1811, who mar. Ellen Smith, and died 1886. (Lieut.-Col. H. W. Pook.)

Arms of Julius impaling *Argent, a fess Sable between three martlets.*

P. 1, No. 1. D.D. is a slip for M.D.

P. 5, No. 37. Major H. R. Phipps, R.A., points out that Richard Shute Codrington was of Bridgwater and Combe St. Nicholas, co. Som., son of Rev. Rich. Codrington, R. of Bishop's Hull (died 1825), by Jane, dau. of Rev. A. Webber. (Memoir of the Family of Codrington, 1910, p. 170.)

P. 7, No. 50. This plate has been recently sent me. It bears the name "GUNTORPE." The lions' heads are collared. The Motto is: CÆLUM NON ANIMUM.

P. 16, No. 130. This should read "W^M FAUQUIER ESQ^R JUN."

ARMS of Fauquier, quartering: *Gules, an escutcheon within an orle of eight mullets Argent* [CHAMBERLAYNE]. (F.C.)

BAHAMAS.

P. 19, No. 159. He first went from Georgia to New Brunswick, where he became first Crown Counsel and Registrar of the Court of Vice-Admiralty, but in 1787 removed with his family to the B. In 1788 he was appointed Sol.-Gen. and Surrogate of the Court of Vice-Admiralty. In 1822 he was transferred to the Chief Justiceship of St. Vincent. (Professor Siebert of Ohio, Univ. Bulletin, xvii., No. 27.) He died at Budleigh Salterton, co. Devon, in Feb. 1828, but I could not find any tablet there.

BARBADOS.

P. 21, No. 175. See Egerton MS. 1720, Brit. Mus., for correspondence in 1766 of Gedney Clarke, Sr. and Jr., about Demerara.

P. 24, No. 208. John Keeling mar. 1744 Hester, only child of Marm. Rawdon of B. and Hoddesdon, co Herts. She died 1756.

P. 28, No. 236. The Gov. was son of John Spry, D.D., Archd. of Berks and grandson of Jeffry Spry of Exeter. (Burke's "Armory.")

P. 34, No. 285. Add: Henry Gordon (will proved 1788) by Rachel his wife, dau. of Susanna Lawrence by Lawrence Lawrence of U.S.A., had a dau. Anne Gordon, who mar. 10 July 1797 Alex. Edgar (will proved 1820), and their 3rd dau. Mary Edgar mar. T. H. Archer, M.D., whose only son was Capt. Lawrence Archer. (Covesfield MSS.)

DOMINICA.

P. 30, No. 250. A specimen from "Bacon's Laws, 1832," has been given me here (Dominica). His full names were William Francis Balthazar Blanc. He was Attorney-Gen. in 1824, and several of his children were baptized at Roseau.

JAMAICA.

P. 50, No. 422. Tho. Orby Hunter was only son and heir of Gov. Robert Hunter, and died about 1769; the former's grandson Tho. Orby Hunter mar. 1796 Frances, youngest dau. and coheirress of Jas. Modyford Heywood of J.

P. 54, No. 453. An earlier state is without the crescent. (F.C.)

P. 66, No. 567. Gershom Williams was Judge of Admiralty and Solicitor-Gen. of the Bahamas in 1766. (F.C.)
